



# PLACEMENT CENTRE

Your B.C.I.T. Placement Office is located in Room 223 and is operated by the Department of Manpower & Immigration. There are three staff members to serve you, manager Kerry Croll, counsellor Barry Ferrill, and 'lerk Wendell K. S. Joe.

The office is open year round, Monday to Friday, 8:00 AM to 5:00 pm.

The function of your placement office is to find you part-time, summer, and career employment opportunities. An up to date library is maintained offering you company applications and brochures, career information, educational information, company and employer records, statistics on previous graduates and starting salaries.

Kerry Croll and Barry Ferrill are also available for personal vocational counselling and to assist you in preparing your graduating resumes.

The job opportunities for undergraduates and graduating students are displayed on the bulletin boards outside Room 223. In addition a copy is displayed on the specific technology board concerned.

As a student at BCIT it is your own responsibility to make your-self aware of the opportunities which exist in the placement office. Students who are interested in summer employment, especially with the Federal and Provincial governments

should register on a BCIT-UCPA form available in Room 223 by December 31, 1974. Graduating students who are interested in career positions will be notified when and how to apply to specific jobs via the bulletin board system. However every graduating student should leave a resume with the Placement Office for full exposure to all opportunities. For part-time jobs during the school year merely watch the bulletin board outside Room223. If something interests you inquire further in Room223 -- no registration is necessary.

the academic year During approximately 500 employers come on campus to interview undergraduates and graduating students. An additional 300 employers request that student be forward to them. The offical recruiting year at BCIT runs from November 15,1974 to May 15, 1975. The information regarding these vacancies is displayed via the technology bulletin boards. For your information, graduating vacancies are marked in red ink and undergraduates vacancies in green ink. The Placement Service is on campus to serve you. Please drop in and get aquainted with what we have to offer and meet the staff.

For the first time at BCIT we have the opportunity to make our own decisions. Prior to this, approval of any purchases to be made, any new personnel to be hired, etc; had to be approved and administered by the Department of Education with assistance from our advisory council.

For years universities and colleges have had their own Board of Governors initialling decisions very quickly while we have had to wait for lengthy periods of time.

Late in 1973 Eileen Daily, Minister of Education, set up a task force for further studey on the establishment of our own Board of Governors. This task force included Dale Michaels, Chairman; Dave Helgason, Engineering Representative; Ralph Patterson, Chairman Advisory ofr Council; Cliff McAdam, Vice-President; Graham Fane, Student spokesman; Cliff Ansteen, faculty member for B.C. Employees Union and Stan Tonoski, president of the Alumni Association.

After preparation of an intensive study the committee presented their opinions to the spring legislation. The results were favourable with BCIT being directed by an autonomour Board of Governors. What does this mean? It means that the committee are no longer classifies as civil servants but are now BCIT employees, and we can now make our own decisions within a budget.

This council's representation includes fifteen board members. Eight of the fifteen appointees were named and elected by Mrs. Dailey. They include Dr. Patterson of Canadian Forest Products; Jay Langdon of Pacific Press Ltd; Mr. Neill of C.P. Air; Dr. Stirling, a science instructor; Ms. Vera Rosenbluth, of Canadian Boradcasting Corp; Mr. Campbell of Western Joint Electrical Training Society; Greta Nelson, teacher at Vancouver City College, and Mr. Lambert, managing director for the Society of Professional Engineers.

The board's other seven elected members include Dr. Morrison, of Vancouver General Hospital; Mr. Ferrie of Scott Paper Limited; Mr. Malakoff, in our Physics Department; Blaine Kennedy, president of BCIT's Student Association; Ron Isaak of Cameron Surveying and Engineering, Mrs. Y. Kirk, in our counselling Department; and Carolyn Gibbons, of the BC Federation of Labour.

At the meeting of the Board of Governors of B.C.I.T., on September 11, 1974, the Board approved the following resolution:

"The team in accordance with the three functions

Technological Education
Administration
Personnel and Public Relations
J.D. Michaels
be accepted, and that this team be charged, together
with the Principal, with the development of a
puttern of consultative management for the Institute."

We have now enpowered Mr. Thom with the responsibility to set up and administer the machinery by which the consultative management process works. Mr. Thom and his team have a united commitment to this responsibility and intend to begin this job immediately with your support and help.

Effective today, Mr. M.T. McDowell will become Executive Director of Technological Education; Mr. J.C. McAdam will become Executive Director of Administration and Mrs. J.D. Michaels will become Executive Director of Personnel and Public Relations.

Please appreciate that the Board is in many ways like a new country. We have been enpowered to act but are in the process of setting up the constitutional machinery to operate effectively. In this initial stage of the Board's development this becomes a time consuming but necessary function of both the Board and the Chief Executive Officer.

The Board cannot over emphasise the emergency situation we are now facing. As a first priority the administration will deal with the issues which are of the greatest concern to the Board, Staff and Management of B.C.I.T. and these in order of priority are:

SALARIES AND COLLECTIVE BARGAINING
 With respect to collective bargaining, we have
 retained the services of Mr. K.R. Martin
 of Management Research (Western) Ltd., to
 negotiate on behalf of the Board.


#### 2. BUDGET

The first budget is a financial reflection of our educational plans and we will be expected to live within the constraints of this budget until 1976.

The Board feels that the urgency of faculty and staff salaries, budget preparation and the host of other pressing problems make it imperative that the Chief Executive Officer have a team of people with whom her can work in order to achieve the functions for which he is held responsible.

We seek your cooperation and support.



And a lecture was what it was. He talked and fumbled in his usual style, and once in awhile zoomingly joked his way through all types of comedy.





It's your choice.


#### CHANGE THE \$ hour BREAK?



Parking close to the main buildings is difficult except for the early arrivals - but did you know that there is a lightly used parking lot for the students (about 120 cars) up the hill south of the Vocational Teachers Training School? The access is direct from Willingdon Avenue close to Moscrop.

The whole parking organisation is under intensive examination - more about that later. Meanwhile, please be patient with the shortcomings. The commissionaires supervising parking are very helpful but have a sensitive and often difficult job in applying regulations which they do NOT make

The Student Assocaition Executive is being asked to give a hand in developing a sound parking policy.



#### BCIT'S RESIDENCE

Residence at BCIT this year is comprised of Brentwood House, on Rosser Ave, and temporarily the Willigngdon School for Girls Complex located across the street from BCIT campus.

Brentwood Houses's availability for BCIT residence was first considered in March of 1974. The BCIT & BCVS administration went ahead and put forth their opinions and ideas for a dire need of a residence to ensure new students (especially those from out of town) of a place to stay. They felt this could be one small possible 'band-aid for surgery' but...it is only a minute proportion of the necessary facilities desperately needed.

The Willington School for girls complex again is in existence to accommodate the large overflow of students from out of town.

Yes! they were found to be sleeping in the cars on the school parking lot, or in habitation of nearby motels and hotels. If YOU are in present need of a place to stay, there are still some vacancies in the Willingdon Complex. If you are interested please register at the councellors office as soon as possible. Also located in this complex is a swimming pool and a gymnasium for student use to release some of their built up anxieties or frustrations or for just plain excercising, a major concern of today.

At present we have allocated 99 rooms for BCIT students and 99 rooms for BCVS students in Brentwood House. In the Willingdon Complex there seems to be 106 possible rooms for students at BCIT. Residence occupancy was determined and appointed by Mrs. Gray, Graham Fane and Blaine Kennedy.

Applications for domicile were reviewed on the basis of:

- l. need
- 2. out of town students
- 3. allocation of extra rooms accordingly

Of approximately 5000 enrolled students (3000 BCIT, 2000 BCVS) you can appreciate the vast need of at least a minimum of 500 rooms just to cover emergency cases.

The reason for the late notice of acceptance was due to the late notice date that the Housing Commission notified the councellors of whether or not we would have Brentwood House or not. Next year we want to be able to advise students of acceptance by the end of July to assure them of a place to live. This way if you are not accepted you can still have a chance to look for something else.

In Brentwood House each person has their own room, They contain a bed, a large desk, a book case, a chair, 2 lamps, an end table, your own bathroom and outlets for cablevision and a telephone. Some the first chosen are priviledged with their own balconies as well. There is also a lobby on each floor facilitated with a sink, fridge, desk, chairs, and a balcony. Sometime in the near future hotplates will be installed in each lobby for student use. Down in the main lobby students have access to a game room where they can play pool, shuffleboard, various card games, watch T.V. or just go to chat with friends or retired folks who are also active participants of the building.

In reference to dining facilities, as yet, there has been no decision made concerning students meals and therefore the students at Brentwood House are eating out.

An on-campus residence is of great importance to campus life. There are of course the primary reasons such as a roof over your head and a place to eat, but here are also very important secondary, sociological reasons such as human relations where you get involved in more inter-personal relationships. A good example of the benefits provided are illustrated in an article appearing in an educational digest showing facts that students living in residence have an overall higher average than the ones living in secluded apartments away from campus life. Could this be because residence is YOUR home; this is where YOU awaken the morning after a late night out.

The existing trend seems to be moving to the 24 hour campus concept. We at BCIT are confronted with the detailed academic performance that is known world wide and draws students from as far away as the Middle East & Asia, but we need more human contact to enable us to meet our futures with even more beneficial capabilities, such as communicating.

Another imperative part of a residence should be the addition of a convention centre. With this, we could hold various meetings to discuss problems now and in the future. Lectures on various academic facilities could be held to illustrate course content and give students an opportunity to meet other students and various important guests attending the meetings.

(What we would like to see for a future residence on BCIT campus is a quadrangle effect similar to that of Gage Towers at UBC.)

Residence living does have its pros and cons. For example you might find it a real drag to find the doors locked after 10 pm. And maybe you don't like to sign guests in and out. But remember there are older people living there too.

But there are good points. You all know that you need your privacy for studying and being on your own, but then not too far away are other fellow students to compare notes with or discuss various rough spots encountered.

Residence also is an abode for out of town students not knowing anyone in town. "A strange place with no one to talk to can be a very lonely place."

So, there does seem to be many valid reasons for living in an on-campus atmosphere and they should not be overlooked.

### MAHAVISHNU ORCHESTRA

#### MAHAVISHNU ORCHESTRA

Apocalpse--Recorded with the London Symphony Orchestra on Columbia Records.

After the dismal flop of his live LP "Between Nothingness and Eternity", and the subsequent disbanding of the Mahavishnu Orchestra, it seemed as though John McLaughlin was headed for "has been" ville. However, rejoice all you McLaughlin fans, Maha-baby is back, bigger and better than before.

He has banded together a group of really fine musicians including Jean Luc Ponty, ace violinist, Mike Waldon, percussionist, and other equally fine artists. From the new disc, Apocalypse has emerged a side of John McLaughlin never heard before.

Apocalypse is an extremely mellow sound and an enjoyable album to listen to. Side one starts with a very romantic, moody track called "Power of Love' containing some fine acoustic guitar work by McLaughlin. The second track, "Vision is the Naked Eye", begins with some very heavy orchestral sounds but mellows out to some very fine uptempo jazz featuring guitar and violin. On this track, Mike Walden proves himself to be a very capable rhythm drummer, but perhaps not the soloist Billy Cobham wa.

The greatest surprise from the new Mahavishnu Orchestra is the track "Smile of the Beyond" in which McLaughlin completely abandons his old style. This song is refreshingly beautiful, enhanced with some excellent orchestration. The unknown female vocalist immediately captures your heart and steals it away.

On the flipside of the LP are two track "Wings of Karma" and "Hymn to Him" both of which contain some of the cleanest guitar work John McLaughlin has ever produced. Although not as electrifying as his previous performances, they nonetheless contain some extremely well done jazz-rock. In particular, listen to some of the sounds Jean Luc Ponty cooks up playing his violin.

At a time when so many of the big names are coming up with dud albums, this one is a refreshing change. A beautifully mellow LP well worth the cost; and a perfect album for lazing around the house doing what we all love best, enjoying music as it should be played.


#### SNOWFLAKES ARE DANCING BY Tomita



This record is played solely on a moog synthesiser and has to be one of the most amazing discs we've ever heard. Tomita has managed to create through his electronic wizardry an ENTIRE philharmonic orchestra and more. He has managed to produce such incredibly delicate and mellow sounds that they would put a bursting soap bubble to shame.

In this unique presentation of synthetic musical tone paintings, it is extremely difficult to choose a track which stands out above the rest. Although all ten tracks are equally well done, it is Arabesque No. 1 that most caught our attention.

Whatever your taste ranges from, whether it be the cybernetic synthesiser music of keyboard artists like Keith Emerson or Rick Wakeman, or the undulating electronic sounds of Terry Riley, or just into modern classical music, your record collection is not complete without this LP (that is if you are a TRUE anglophile).





## ELECTRONIC CALCULATORS

#### A quality electronic calculator from Texas Instruments


The SR-50 is the full function portable slide rule calculator.

Complex scientific calculations are solved
as easily as simple arithmetic problems. The SR-50 features
an algebraic keyboard with single function keys for easy problem solving.

On/Off Switch — Located on the top right front surface of the calculator. Sliding it to the right applies power, and sliding it to the left removes power from the calculator. The power-on condition is indicated by a number in the display.

Deg/Rad Switch — Located on the top left front surface of the calculator. The calculator interprets a displayed angle as being in degrees if the switch is to the right (D) and in radians if it is to the left (R)

- [0] through [9] Digit Keys Enter numbers 0 through 9 to a limit of a 10-digit mantissa and a 2-digit exponent.
- Decimal Point Key Enters a decimal point.
- The pi Key Enters the value of pi  $(\pi)$  to 13 significant digits (3.141592653590) into a calculation. Display indicates value rounded off to 10 significant digits (3.141592654).
- [EE] Enter Exponent Key Instructs the calculator that the subsequent number is to be entered as an exponent of 10. To enter a number in scientific notation, first enter the mantissa, press [EE] and enter the desired exponent of 10. After the [EE] key has been pressed, the calculator will display all further results in scientific notation until the [C] key is pressed.
- [47–] Change Sign Key Instructs the calculator to change the sign of the mantissa or exponent appearing in the display. To enter a negative number, first enter the number and then press the [47–] key. Using this change sign key prior to using the [EE] key changes the sign of the mantissa. If the [47–] key is pressed after the [EE] key, the sign of the exponent is changed.
- Clear Entry Key Clears the last keyboard entry, Pi is entered as a calculated value and is not cleared by this key. If the  $\lfloor \underline{\pi} \rfloor$  key is inadvertently pressed in processing a complex expression, it can be nullified by simply entering the correct number to be processed.
- C Clear Key Clears (erases) information in the calculator and display and sets the calculator to zero for the start of a new problem. However, the contents of the memory are not affected by this key. To clear the memory, a zero must be entered in place of the stored data.
- + Add Key Instructs the calculator to add to the previous number or result the next entered quantity.
- Subtract Key Instructs the calculator to subtract from the previous number or result the next entered quantity.
- Multiply Key Instructs the calculator to multiply the previous number or result by the next entered quantity.
- Divide Key Instructs the calculator to divide the previous number or result by the next entered quantity.



- Equals Key Instructs the calculator to complete the previously entered operation to provide the desired calculation result.
- **Square Key** Instructs the calculator to find the square of the number displayed (that is, to multiply the number displayed by itself).
- © Square Root Key Instructs the calculator to find the square root of the number displayed (that is, to find the number which multiplied by itself, equals the number displayed).
- Fig. Reciprocal Key Instructs the calculator to find the reciprocal of the number displayed (that is, to divide the number displayed into 1).
- **x!** Factorial Key Instructs the calculator to find the factorial of the number displayed (that

- is, the product of all integer numbers from one through the integer value displayed). The largest factorial the SR-50 can compute without an overflow condition is 69!
- sin Sine Key Instructs the calculator to determine the sine of the displayed angle.
- Cosine Key Instructs the calculator to determine the cosine of the displayed angle.
- arc Inverse Trigonometric Key Instructs the calculator to determine the angle of the selected trig function whose value is the displayed quantity, when pressed as a prefix to the sin, cos, or tan key.
- Hyperbolic Function Key Instructs the calculator to determine the hyperbolic trig function of the displayed angle when pressed as a prefix to the sin, cos, or tan key.
- D/R Angle Change Key If the Deg/Rad switch is set for degrees, pressing the change key instructs the calculator to convert the displayed angle from radians to degrees. If the switch is set for radians, pressing this key instructs the calculator to convert the displayed angle from degrees to radians.
- [log] Common Logarithm Key Instructs the calculator to determine the logarithm to the base 10 of the displayed number.
- Inz Natural Logarithm Key Instructs the calculator to determine the logarithm to the base e of the displayed number.
- e\* e to the x Power Key Instructs the calculator to raise the value of e to the displayed power.
- $\tilde{y}^{*}$  y to the x Power Key  $\sim$  Instructs the calculator to raise y, the first entered quantity, to the power of x, the second entered quantity.
- The xth Root of y Key Instructs the calculator to process y, the first entered quantity, to find the  $x^{th}$  root. The value of x is the second entered quantity.
- Exp Exchange Key Instructs the calculator to exchange the x and y quantities in [y] or [47] before the function is processed. The operands in x and + can also be exchanged through the use of this key.
- Store Key Instructs the calculator to store the displayed quantity in the memory.
- Sum and Store Key Instructs the calculator to algebraically add the displayed number to the number in the memory, and to store the sum in the memory. The use of this key does not affect the displayed quantity nor the previously processed data.
