




Mixed Martial Arts Ban a Mistake

Vancouver is once again waffling on a decision it should have made years ago: to allow mixed martial arts (MMA) fighting events to be held in the city.

a n c o u v e r city council has turned aside a request by the Vancouver Athletic Commission to permit MMA events, saying it wants more information about the

economic impact on the city before the sport is allowed in Vancouver. Talk about uninformed. Council has just passed on a decision that would have meant an influx of millions of dollars to the local economy.

Yes, the sport can be dangerous, that is part of the draw. Boxing, football, and hockey can also be just as dangerous. There is hitting and fighting in hockey all the time and fans often see blood on the ice. Council has run away from legislating a sport that is so far from where it started. The city's ignorance has caused them to overlook a sport that is populated by individuals who truly are athletes. Those at city hall just don't get it.

What is also strange in this dispute is that Vancouver is perfectly set up to host MMA events. Vancouver has a boxing and wrestling commission already set up that can

MMA fans and officials are frustrated and angry, as they should be. Not allowing MMA fighting events to be held in Vancouver is a huge blunder. Hopefully someone doesn't get seriously injured or killed because of Vancouver city council's ignorance.






BCIT documentary to be shown at a Toronto film festival

You touch, you buy: Shopping study

tudents trying to save money are being encouraged not to touch items when shopping. A recently released study suggests if consumers want to avoid making impulse purchases, they should refrain from handling goods. The study finds that by merely touching an object, one is more likely to increase feelings of ownership. The research also found that touching an object, if the experience is pleasant or even neutral, increases how much money consumers would be willing to pay.



50% of the Great Bear Rainforest now protected

ordon Campbell is finding out that doing the "Green" thing can be smart politics. The Liberal government has announced extensive plans to protect key areas and lessen damage to old growth watersheds along its West Coast that has been dubbed the Great Bear Rainforest. The protection will extend to much of Princess Royal Island, home to the Kermode or "spirit bear," a genetically unique subspecies of black bear that are white or cream-colored. Greenpeace, ForestEthics and Sierra Club B.C. are the three main environmental groups that have been lobbying the government Great Bear Rainforest protection. The agreement includes 2.1 million hectares protected, \$120 million set aside for First Nation communities to help kick-start a new conservation economy as an alternative to logging the rainforest. A new system of 'lighter touch' logging, which leaves behind 50 per cent of a logged area, has also been legislated. Campbell's popular green decision comes on the heels of B.C.'s provincial election to be held in May.





Willingdon Prison B

Students who get on and off the bus at the Willingdon Avenue stops might not know that right behind them is the proposed site for a future pre-trial prison facility that will house people accused of everything from shoplifting to murder.

he Willingdon site, only 100 metres from the campus, is also surrounded by residential property, three elementary schools, and one high school.

Laurie Sheehan is the assistant chair on Cascade Heights Parent Advisory Council, one of four schools within 2 kilometres of the facility.

"They, (prisoners released from the facility into the surrounding area,) will be joining the busses you ride on, they will be on your campus", she said after a recent presentation to Burnaby City Hall.

"We don't need to draw an additional criminal element to our community. I'm sure BCIT students are already impacted by certain elements of crime on campus," she added.

Sheehan is looking to enlist the support of BCIT stu-

dents in opposition to the project.

"We absolutely need the support of the BCIT student community to rally against this and we look forward to seeing how we can leverage both of our networks to send a message to the government that this is in the wrong location."

Another blow to BCIT, as pointed out by Burnaby Mayor Derek

Corrigan, is that BCIT and the city of Burnaby had, until the announcement of the remand facility, been working together to develop the Willingdon lands for student lands for potential student use such as a student village, sports facilities, or added student housing. Corrigan also pointed out that BCIT can't officially come out and oppose the plan as they are funded by the province but they are probably extremely disappointed.

The provincial government stepped back from the plan, just before 600+ people showed up at a public hearing opposing the facility on March 24th. Mayor Corrigan thinks

Mayor Corrigan thinks it is just a ploy by the liberal government to put the issue off until after the election. He said their plan to have all of the mayors in the lower mainland's get together and decide on the best location for the prison was "comical". He also noted that Solicitor-General John van Dongen is still promoting the Burnaby location as the best for the prison.

Sick Prospective Immigrants Barred from Canada

Peter Coyte, professor of health and economics at the University of Toronto, has found that immigrants are being denied into Canada based on their medical burden.

anada's Immigration Act outlines three major reasons why a person would be deemed medically inadmissible to the country.

Coyte's research deals with the reason that the immigrant might cause excessive demands on health and social services.

Immigration Canada's definition of excessive demand is \$4,867.40 per year. If an immigrant could potentially incur more than this amount, he or she won't be permitted to enter the country.

The study was designed to address whether or not Immigration Canada's current cost threshold is reasonable, and if it isn't, what would be a more appropriate threshold.

"We want to look at factors that would yield a HIV positive immigrant admissible if a new threshold was invoked," said Coyte.

Coyte, a chair in health services research, focuses primarily on research, education, linkage, and exchange activities within Canada's healthcare community.

This particular project has been ongoing over the past year, and is in the final stages of research. They're working toward finalizing research that assesses Canadian immigration decisions that deal with immigrants who are suffering from health conditions.

Based upon these consultations, Coyte and the other researchers involved constructed a statistical test to measure the amount of cost before a prospective immigrant's healthcare burden is deemed to be excessive, or statistically different from that of Canadians.

The study shows that the current cost threshold is too low and that it should be almost three times higher, at around \$15,000. This conclusion was reached based upon the distribution factor involved in health-care costs.

Research has shown that while average health-care costs are known, neither the variance nor the cost distribution is known with any certainty.

Heartbreak, Heartache, or Just Plain Heart?

What could be in store for the Canucks this playoff season

ith the playoffs just around the corner and the Canucks assuring themselves a spot in the march for Lord Stanley's Mug, what should local fans realistically expect from their team this spring? Should they expect their team to win the Cup? Should they prepare themselves for a long run only to be disappointed again? Or will the locals go down earlier than expected, prompting the usual questions of who should stay and who should go?

Let's take a look at what the casual fan might see in the weeks (and hopefully months) to come. The Canucks are currently in a dogfight for first place in the Northwest Division, having come back from the dark side of the moon to position themselves where they control their own destiny. In other words, if the Canucks win their remaining games they will finish in top spot in the division, assuring themselves of home ice advantage in at least the first round of the playoffs. While this ensures the owners extra revenue, it is also very desirable to the team that has been next to unbeatable on home ice as of late.

The team that wins the Stanley Cup each year has a makeup of skill, grit, determination, and character. It takes 16 wins to hoist the Cup, and during that time players are expected to play with injuries. There are stories down

through the years of heroic performances, most notably the Leafs Bob Baun, who played in game six of the finals with a broken leg and scored the winner in overtime.

So what of the Canucks chances? It starts in goal, where the home team has arguably the best in the business in Roberto Luongo. He is capable of stealing a game or even a series by himself. On the blueline, the 'Nucks ice a veteran defense that isn't flashy but very steady. They can play it any way the opponent wants, grind it out tough physical play or a fluid skating style. They are an experienced group who are steady one to six, with capable replacements at the ready should injuries occur. Up front, the Canucks have two very strong offensive lines which means opposing teams can only designate their checkers to one or the other. Should the opposition play their checkers against the Sedins and Burrows, the RPM line of Kesler, Demitra and Sundin will be able to freewheel and provide ample offense for the team. Throw in the very capable third line and the gritty fourth line, and you have a very capable group up front.

On special teams the Canucks have the potential to make a difference in any given game, what with their two power play units and stellar checkers on the penalty kill. These units often make the difference in games, particularly in the playoffs. The area that the Canucks have made the greatest strides in is something called character. This is an intangible that gets tested on a regular basis. Many



teams have suffered melt-downs over the years due to an inability to control emotion. The home team has demonstrated a penchant this season for not succumbing to this malady, with the recent Chicago game a glowing example. The players seem genuinely interested in each other. They care about what happens to their teammates. This ingredient will not show up on the score sheet at the end of the night, but is perhaps as important as any of the others skills over the long grind that is the playoffs.

Should the fans expect a Stanley Cup win this season? Perhaps not, but they certainly have a contender to cheer on. All things will have to fall into place for the Canucks, but they have demonstrated this year that they can conquer adversity. There are very good reasons to be optimistic.




Christine Ramage President

Glasvegas raises the bets with self-titled debut album

Destruction

German Thrash Legends

t's one of those fluke moments that you live for. One of those moments you absolutely can't foresee happening, but one that you're sure glad did.

The first time I was lucky enough to see **Destruction** was at the largest metal festival in the world, *Wacken Open Air 2007* in Germany. That show in front of upwards of 70,000 people was absolutely earth shattering, setting the bar pretty high for all future shows. It happened to be the band's 25th anniversary featuring members from throughout their storied history; including the infamous **Mad Butcher**. Beginning in 1982, **Destruction** have made their way to legendary status, boasting a loyal fan base worldwide.

On their tour bus in front of the *Red Room* on a rainy Vancouver evening, I got a chance to catch up with **Destruction's** lead singer and bassist **Schmier**.

Schmeir was unexpectedly soft spoken and sweet, a far cry from what I had expected of the brutal band's frontman

With a heavy German accent, he starts by saying that **Destruction's** reception in Canada has been good so far, with the exception of one show. "The show in Calgary

was kind of a disaster," laments **Schmier**, "we couldn't play there because the equipment wasn't there. So that was kind of a sad thing. But so far it was really nice."

Destruction are a band with undeniable longevity, perhaps even more so than fellow thrash pioneers **Sodom** and **Kreator**, particular-

ly given the underground nature of their music. **Schmeir** says there's no real secret to their success. "We always did what we do best. We never listened to any other bands. I mean, we had our problems when we split up at the end of the 80's because we'd been listening to other people. So when the band went without me for several years they also learnt their lesson. Now we're back together we know what we want, and we know what we don't want. And that makes us unbreakable somehow."

Schmeir prefers intimate gigs at smaller venues as opposed to large crowds such as those at *Wacken*. "A big

crowd can be very, not so much thrilling. They're more anonymous this way," he explains. "If someone is very close to you and is staring at you from two meters or one meter, it's more intimate, it's totally different. So I think small clubs are always great to play. The atmosphere is more close; it's more of a rock and roll atmosphere." He continues that that certainly doesn't rule out playing to larger crowds. "The big shows are great of course because the audiences have a fantastic goose bump feeling. But the more intimate shows for metal are still a great feeling; and the small venues just usually sound better."

The burly bassist loves to tour, and admits that he would likely go insane if not in constant motion. "We play a lot of shows every year because we need to be on the road to survive, but we also love to tour. When I'm home for more than three weeks I'm getting bored," he laughs. "So being home for two weeks, on tour for four or five; that's the perfect thing."

I was surprised to discover that quiet, but opinionated thrasher owes a debt of gratitude to the king of rock

and roll. "The first rock and roll experience was definitely "Jailhouse Rock" from **Elvis Presley**," **Schmeir** reflects. "My father had all these rock and roll singles and I listened to them and they were not bad...but then this **Elvis** song, "Jailhouse Rock," was just so much better than the rest. And from that point on I was looking for rock and roll."

That was the beginning of the end for the young **Schmeir.** "Then I bought my first **Status Quo** live album and then it started to be rock and roll, **AC/DC** and all that. Without the **Elvis** though, I wouldn't be sitting here. For me, **Elvis** was the start of everything that came afterwards; the rebellion. **Elvis** was a rebel for his time."

Thrash is one of the most extreme subgenres of metal, faster than most others and heavily rooted in punk and hardcore. To draw a few parallels, the big four of American thrash includes **Anthrax**, **Megadeth**, **Metallica** and of course, **Slayer**. **Schmeir** says that that he and many fellow thrashers are indeed indebted to punk.

"Without punk...for us when we started we had the fastness of punk rock mixed up with the new wave of British heavy metal. In metal there were solos and the guitars were better played, but we wanted to keep the energy from **GBH**, the **Exploited**, **Dead Kennedys**...bring that into the metal, and that's how we started the band basically."

As they progressed, both scenes became heavily influenced by each other, bands even crossing the boundaries of genre to play together. "We played with the Exploited back in the day; 1985. It was the first maybe ever punk and metal show together. It was kind of difficult, because the punks are not very tolerant. The Exploited show wasn't that great, there were a lot of fights and shit."

And **Destruction** had the same problem playing with hardcore bands such as the **Cromags** for many of the same reasons. "When I was growing up there wasn't even one of those genres, it was just metal. And for me it'll always be like that."

"I always try to be open minded with the scene," he continues. "We're all fucking underground and we need to stick together. It's one metal scene, and I've been through all the ups and downs in the last 25 years, so I have a lot of respect. For me, metal's a lifestyle, not just listening to music."

What can one expect from a **Destruction** show? **Schmeir** smiles, "well, we're named **Destruction** so we're going to leave a destructed crowd for sure."

The Nicest Guys From Scotland

Scottish band Travis was in town April 4th, and they represented their homeland extremely well

Travis played an amazing show on April 4 at the *Commodore*. And no, it wasn't raining.

I got to chat with the rhythm section – bassist **Dougie Payne**, and drummer **Neil Primrose**. They are two nice, levelheaded rockers, and from what I saw at the show, it seems like the rest of the band is as well. After being together for over ten years, the band can still have fun, and appear to still love each other and be friends.

The bands' most recent album, "Ode to J. Smith" took five weeks to write, and two weeks to record. That's a difference from their last album, which took three years to create. **Payne** says it was the most enjoyable. "It was just a really enjoyable, quick, painless, easy time in the studio. When you get to the point that we've got to experience wise, it's tempting to get sucked into trying to make things perfect. Whereas when you perform live, you want to make things better; you enjoy the dynamics more, and you learn to accept the simplest way of doing it, and it's usually the best and most honest way."

Neil Primrose also enjoyed making the newest record, and says it's the flaws that make things interesting. "The bad edits are actually the soul of the record, with the little glitches in there. And with the way technology is at the moment, as far as recording goes, you have the opportunity to make everything perfect and everything absolutely in time and in tune; and it's just not interesting."

Travis has been linked to being responsible for the coming of bands like **Coldplay** and **Snow Patrol**. But, for **Primrose**, he laughed and asked, "Do we take the blame for that?" He went on to say, "Back when the music business was actually still successful, and still functioning (in

the '90's); we sort of inadvertently struck upon a business model, which the record companies then decided, 'this is good, this makes money, let's make our own version of it'."

Primrose says he feels lucky to have grown up with younger parents, who greatly affected his musical influences. He says he likes good music, like classic rock, and older folk and punk music, as well as soul or **Motown** music that his mom was into. **Payne** on the other hand, thanks his sister for his musical upbringing, and for influences like **David Bowie, Roxy Music**, and **T-Rex**. Both bandmates agreed that their early influences shaped the kind of musicians they are now. **Payne** adds, "Like **Neil** said, the first ten years of your life – the music you're exposed to stays with you, in a more profound way than anything else"

Payne shared a fond memory of a recent show in Korea. "Suddenly, as the chorus of 'Closer' hit, probably about 600 multi-coloured paper airplanes came from the crowd, and it just looked amazing. That really was quite something – we've never experienced anything like that

before. It makes you realize how in big cities, especially in the west; you're kind of spoiled because you get bands through every night and you get kind of blasé about it. It made you realize (this show) was something special."

Travis will be playing a few upcoming European festivals and Primrose says he doesn't think people in North America really understand what festivals are. "Festivals are about all kinds of music, and all kinds of people, getting together. It's a cross-ventilation of ideas, and seeing music you would otherwise never buy a ticket for. Most American festivals are held in a car park somewhere, generally with about 12 thrashing skate-punk bands, one after the f**king other."

If you haven't heard **Travis**, I suggest listening to them. Not only did they put on a great live show, and really showed the heart in their music; the music itself is really enjoyable melodic rock. They remind me a bit of **Keane**; but better. They are a band that can still rock out and exude fun, and they seem to understand the grittiness and organics of making music real.

That's the clear message at the 2009 Vancouver International Auto Show, the annual glitz and glamour exhibition of the latest on offer from the world's automakers. Vancouver's production obviously pales in comparison to the monster shows of Geneva, Frankfurt, Tokyo and L.A., but it still attracts some cool machinery, and it's our little way of keeping in touch with the automotive world.

As you meander down the causeway from the ticket booth, glossy posters featuring exotic marques like Ferrari, Lamborghini, Lotus, and even Spyker whet the appetite. The 2nd level walkway starts you off with "Classic Alley", "Tuner Alley", and – new this year – the Motorcycle Expo. With the intertwined history of cars and bikes it makes sense to put the two together, and it just feels right that the show's producers finally have. Other years were like having hot dogs without ketchup, or nachos without beer: good, but not quite complete...

But I digress. As mentioned, level 2 is fantastic. Vintage machinery abounds in the form of wood-framed Morgan's, a barrel-chested AC Cobra 427, and a number of beautiful Indians and Harley-Davidsons, courtesy of the B.C. Classic Motorcycle Club. Further on, your senses are assaulted by enough neon lights and pounding techno beats to make you think you've walked straight into a German nightclub. Rest assured, it's only the tuner gallery. badass), it's a fun place to see what local outfits like the SR Autogroup and Designo Auto House can do to your car.

The remaining exhibits in the breezeway hold interest of a different kind. Mostly focused on environmental movements and electric vehicle technology, there are a lot of concepts to admire and interesting people to talk to.

The main floor beckons though, as that's where the big boys play, and you can almost taste the new-car smell as you wander down the lower ramp.

Germany, Italy, Britain, Holland, Korea, Japan, Sweden, and America are all represented, with Porsche being the most notable absentee of the big-name brands. The US manufacturers have brought an almost embarrassing amount of cars to the show (no less than 26 vehicles on the Chrysler stand), most likely confirmation of the fact that they're not selling any cars, and have to display them all instead. To be fair, some of the homegrown metal is pretty darn cool, with the redesigned 2010 Ford Mustang, the new (and unapologetically huge) F-150, and the 2009 Dodge Charger – ahem – leading the charge.
