struction Report form It is one of the few statistically valid forms today and one that has been granted the most research it is the only form that allows the necessary flexibility for each dep artment while maintaining prov en statistical validity

SIR form has been statistically proven to automatically improve the quality of the teacher s educa tıonal abilities
The Student Association has decided not to delay any longer and will go ahead with a pro gramme of valıd Teacher Evalua tion The forms used are pro cessed by a third party and all results are sent directly to the teacher themselves no one else It must be emphasized to some people that no one is out to get the teachers as Pat Thomas says Association is only after positive Associatio results

istrators and Staff can best judge the instructor's qualifications and knowledge, but they are in no position to judge teaching ability. Mr. Thomas. if you buy a Ford you expect the Ford Motor Comyou expect to listen to you, even though pany to listen to you, even though you're not an automotive engi-
neer? Of course you do, because you're a consumer and if they don't listen you'll take your business elsewhere. Unfortunately students aren't in the position of being able to take their business elsewhere.

some variety for the kids.
The room an inmate occupies is spartan, but of course functional: a mattress, locker, small table, mirror and the inevitable graffiti. (it should be pointed out hat a don residence has a room similar to the inmates; it is however a bit more tastefully furnished.) During the night all the inmates are, naturally, locked in their rooms, but are checked every 15 minutes by a member of the staff. A nurse is available five days a week and a doctor visits twice a week. Parents of the inmates are allowed to visit the Centre three times a week. Obviously, this easy visitor access is a good thing for the kids; they are not cut off from the outside world complete-
At the Centre I was also able to speak to the female corrections she was in charge of seven girls. She said that the Centre needed a couple of things that possibly some of the students at BCIT could provide: some books and some more. visits. Ideally, she added, they would like someone to act as a volunteer coach for the kids in the swimming pool and the gym.
As our visit was around noon time, members of the staff suggested we stay for lunch. The sufficient. Soup, followed by a
main course consisting of a couple of grilled cheese sandwiches (a good student standby), potato salad with a few slices of tomato, and a dessert. While the meal was served by a couple of the kids, the staff on duty also had their lunch (same as the kids). as to who did the dishes! After lunch was over, all the kids had to lunch was over, all the kids had to go back to their rooms for an hour have a cigarette.
The whole experience was not what we had expected. The Centre appeared to be run on almost an informal basis, yet, of course, the atmosphere of discipline was always present. Gunther Schlieper, who has had experience as a corrections officer, said the operation is very similar to that of the remand
centre at Oakalla, only a bit less centre at Oakalla, only a bit less formald be where the inmates and would students were not living in such close proximity. But even so, under present circumstances the kids remanded there should not be thought of as a bunch of wild reprobates who are just itching to assault someone. As first pointed out, most of the delinquents are there for just a short period of time, and are always kept under close supervi sion. If you would like to spare an hour or so to visit the kids, they would really like to see you. Bu please check-
