


The Student Association feels that this year there should be some definite movement towards a teacher performance appraisal It is of course going to be different from the one most students filled in at the end of the last school year. This time a statistically valid form will be used. Spearhead of the Teacher Evaluation at BCIT is Neville Millar Vice President Internal of the Student Association. He has done more research than most people on campus in giving this subject due consideration.

Why you may ask is the Student Council doing this? Pat Thomas may be right when he says that there is provision in the collective agreement since 1975 for the development of a fair orderly and rational appraisal Well if every department were to develop the expertise whereby they could assess an evaluation form it would take them about a year to assemble and come to a conclusion. To date with the exception of one or two of the 31 departments all forms presently used are statistically invalid.

So what is the alternative? According to Neville Millar The alternative is the establishment of a campus wide computer based teacher performance appraisal system using the Student In

struction Report form It is one of the few statistically valid forms today and one that has been granted the most research. It is the only form that allows the necessary flexibility for each dep artment while maintaining proven statistical validity

Pat Thomas mentions in his article performance appraisal systems etc The very use of the S I R form has been statistically proven to automatically improve the quality of the teacher's educational abilities

The Student Association has decided not to delay any longer and will go ahead with a programme of valid Teacher Evaluation. The forms used are processed by a third party and all results are sent directly to the teacher themselves no one else it must be emphasized to some people that no one is out to get the teachers as Pat Thomas says in his letter. The Student Association is only after positive results.

The S A plans to hold seminars and discuss with the three Technologies (teachers etc.) their opinions on the subject. No teacher has to be evaluated. The choice is his or hers. Also the S A will be setting up within the next few days an evaluation committee to be chaired by Neville Millar.

### BCIT students introduced to Willingdon remand centre

A few days ago I along with five other colleagues Gunther Schlieper Bob Wiebe Val Kar pinsky Rob Grant and Terry Scarff had the opportunity to visit the Willingdon Juvenile Detention Centre to see for ourselves exactly what it was like inside. It was also a good chance to dispel any preconceived ideas we might have had about the place First and foremost it must be remembered that the Willing don Detention Centre is only a remand home and not a correc tions centre a temporary holding place while the offenders cases come up before the court

Turnover is fairly high Most of the inmates would not be in there for more than a week (the average stay) although it is possible in some unusual cases to be remanded there for over a month. The majority are on remand for carthefts breaking and entering etc. The age group of the inmates ranges from 13 to 16 years but an inmate could be older if he or she is picked up on a charge they committed when they were a

We first met Mr Ed MacCart ney the principal officer in charge of the day shift who gave us all a tour of the place There

Today and tomorrow there is a Blood Donor's Clinic from 10 am to 3 pm in the SAC. There will be a prize to the tech that bleeds the most are 12 other correctional officers on the staff but of course not all are on duty at the same time Mr MacCartney said that the main criteria for the staff is to keep the kids occupied To help them in this respect the Centre has a gymnasium a swimming pool and a school room The gymna sium and the swimming pool are also shared by the students at BCIT if they want to use them There is also a daily visit by an arts and crafts teacher to provide continued on page 7

# Who's losing respect for whom?

I read Staff Secretary Pat Thomas' rebuttal in last week's LINK with unconcealed delight. With only a few exceptions, he corroborates practically everything you stated in your first article the week before.

As for his first point, What constitutes "change"? Does the fact that motions and articles of a Collective Agreement have been "provided for" and "refined" constitute "change"? Why have they bothered approving "many Performance Appraisal systems' when only one will do, and why do they have others in "various stages of processing at this very

Obviously a Performance Appraisal system must be valid to be effective (Oh, wonderous platitude!) and the people who are being evaluated must have the feeling that they aren't subject to an inquisition or a witch-hunt. Sure-no one's disputing that.

So why is it taking so long? Are you stalling? Are we going to be reading a "No Change since '76" article in 1980? Nobody's asking the Staff Society or the BCIT Administration to create an entirely new Evaluation System. Just pick one that's suitable to both parties and get on with it.

This brings up the second point which seems to have been missed entirely by Mr. Thomas: the staff are EMPLOYEES-their employer is the Administration and their customers are students. Since when did an employee have veto power over his bosses'

Thomas' point #3 is insulting to students generally: that "the student push for evaluation systems is aimed more at 'getting' certain instructors than being... etc. Students are here to get the best possible education and they are the ONLY group at BCIT who are in any position to judge the teaching abilities of their profs as they are the only group being taught. Let it sink in: the instructors' job is TO TEACH, not to be a whiz bang researcher, bicycle rider or factotem. TEÁCHING: students consume that, and if a significant portion of them are not being taught satisfactorily then THAT is grounds for questioning a teacher's com-

petence. A committee of Administrators and Staff can best judge the instructor's qualifications and knowledge, but they are in no position to judge teaching ability. Mr. Thomas: if you buy a Ford and the bottom rusts out of it, do you expect the Ford Motor Company to listen to you, even though you're not an automotive engineer? Of course you do, because you're a consumer and if they don't listen you'll take your business elsewhere. Unfortunately students aren't in the position of being able to take their business elsewhere.

And his point #4, that respect for student input into Performance Evaluation systems is now being questioned.... What about student respect for the Staff and Administration performance? This place is here because of students, not because of staff or administrators. And these students, as much as you might lack respect for them, will be the ambassadors for BCIT when they enter the work force and pay the taxes that support this place: You don't respect us? How cute.

And, Mr. Thomas, if wonder why the sources and letters, including this one, are

### Security the reason for BoG rep lockout

I read with some amusement the letter which appeared in last week's issue of the Link, entitled "Board rep 'Locked Out" Wants Cooperation."

Mr. Wiebe was, in my opinion, a reasonably intelligent, mature individual, not prone to whining and crying the blues....or so I thought. I fear that his letter is a dismaying example of the kind of representation the students of BCIT have on the Board of Governors.

His belief that an ex-officio member of the Student Association should be permitted to enter into all discussions of the S.A. Executive is ludicrous. Board of Governors has both open and closed meetings and the Student Association Executive is entitled to the same privilege. According to Robert's Rules of Order, Mr. Wiebe is entitled to the excerpts of the minutes of a meeting where the subject matter concerns him; but very often the discussions are none of his business, be he the almighty student representative on the Board of Governors or a Charlie Lewis storm trooper. There is, after all, a certain conflict of interest involved here and perhaps our B.O.G. Representative has been blinded by his own self-importance to see the obvious.

On the subject of keys and office space, it should be pointed out to his highness that only the top level S.A. executive have keys to enter the offices, a plan instituted primarily for security reasons. This means that Mr. Wiebe is not the only individual denied entrance to the offices in the event that no member of the executive is available. Placed in a similar position are the Business, Engineering and Health Division Reps as well as the Activities Chairperson, Charities Chairperson and sundry others.

The other members of the Board of Governors do not have offices either in the SAC or in the administration block. What makes Mr. Wiebe feel that he is so privileged as to command office space? If an office is that important, perhaps the funds paid to our Rep. (by the B.O.G.) should be used by him to acquire a cubby-hole somewhere. Office space in the SAC is precious and limited, as anyone who has seen the Societies Office can testify.

As for his accessibility, any student who really wants to find our B.O.G. rep need only seek him out. It is very difficult to fail

o notice a person such as Rob Niebe.

### Supervisor sick, not absent

Dear Mr. Davies

I would like to take this opportunity to express my concern about the article which appeared in the LINK newspaper on October 20, 1976, page 2, under the headline "Ho-Hum Protest Day". The report submitted by your paper with reference to the Central Stores operation was totally incorrect and I, as the Manager responsible for Central Stores, feel that an official retraction on the part of the LINK is in order.

The Central Stores Supervisor was absent on Thursday, October 14, due to an illness stemming from last February. On October 14, and to this date, the Stores Supervisor has been absent from work and under a doctor's care. The single set of keys to the Central Stores Department are kept by the Stores Supervisor for obvious security reasons. After a short delay of approximately 30

minutes on the morning of October 14, I personally obtained the keys from the Stores Supervisor and from that time on the Stores Department operated in a normal fashion.

One employee from the regular Stores staff was absent on the day of national protest due to lack of public transportation. Of the entire Stores staff, I wish it to be made known that only one employee was absent from work as a result of the National Day of Protest. This employee's absenteeism was within the terms of the B.C.G.E.U. contract and will result in the loss of a day's pay for that employee.

Hopefully the foregoing clears up an obvious misinformed situation for the LINK. I look forward to the retraction I have requested.

### United we stand at the bus stop

The following may have little bearing on students who take buses from New Westminster and Burnaby, but to those students who come from Surrey, Delta, Langley, Cloverdale and White Rock, it's another story.

Any student who comes from any one of these municipalities probably knows by now (October 15 was the change) that B.C. Hydro made a major route change that affects the 619 - Scott, the 620 - North, and the 621 - King George Highway. Instead of those buses going down Canada Way to Willingdon, and then on to Hastings, they now make a sudden exit at Ledger to get onto the Freeway. As a result, we have to transfer from either the 619, 620, or the 621 on to the 820 -

Canada Way. 



Dave Theessen, a fourth-year student and president of the society, said the suspension came after complaints from the RCMP, the university administration and the faculty.

The suspension will last until

Theessen said no single incident had caused the suspension. It resulted from reports of students throwing beer bottles at light standards and smashing bulbs, garbage strewn on campus, trees stripped of branches and glass doors shattered.

The Student Administrative Commission, that conducts the day-to-day business of the AMS, voted to suspend drinking privileges at the Pit and the Lethe in the Student Union Building.

some variety for the kids.

The room an inmate occupies is spartan, but of course functional: a mattress, locker, small table, mirror and the inevitable graffiti. (It should be pointed out that a student who lives at the Willingdon residence has a room similar to the inmates; it is, however, a bit more tastefully furnished.) During the night all the inmates are, naturally, locked in their rooms, but are checked every 15 minutes by a member of the staff. A nurse is available five days a week and a doctor visits twice a week. Parents of the inmates are allowed to visit the Centre three times a week. Obviously, this easy visitor access is a good thing for the kids; they are not cut off from the outside world complete-

At the Centre I was also able to speak to the female corrections officer. At the time of our visit she was in charge of seven girls. She said that the Centre needed a couple of things that possibly some of the students at BCIT could provide: some books and some more visits. Ideally, she added, they would like someone to act as a volunteer coach for the kids in the swimming pool and the

As our visit was around noon time, members of the staff suggested we stay for lunch. The lunch itself was simple, but

main course consisting of a couple of grilled cheese sandwiches (a good student standby), potato salad with a few slices of tomato, and a dessert. While the meal was served by a couple of the kids, the staff on duty also had their lunch (same as the kids). There was however, no problem as to who did the dishes! After lunch was over, all the kids had to go back to their rooms for an hour or so, where they could relax and have a cigarette.

The whole experience was not what we had expected. Centre appeared to be run on almost an informal basis, yet, of course, the atmosphere of discipline was always present. Gunther Schlieper, who has had experience as a corrections officer, said the operation is very similar to that of the remand centre at Oakalla, only a bit less formal. The ideal situation would be where the inmates and the students were not living in such close proximity. But even so, under present circumstances, the kids remanded there should not be thought of as a bunch of wild reprobates who are just itching to assault someone. As first pointed out, most of the delinquents are there for just a short period of time, and are always kept under close supervision. If you would like to spare an hour or so to visit the kids, they would really like to see you. But please check-in with the principal officer first!
