






Have a good year

Students; start right, meet BCIT's new leading personality, Gordon Thom, a man who has time for you.

His most recent move to principal at BCIT was preceded by five relaxing weeks on Bowen Island. This vacation was spent with his sife, Helen and their three children Kathy, Graham & Margot. Some of his relaxation included fishing with Graham in a red, ten foot boat. Most of his big catches though seemed to be the kind that just didn't measure up.

Thom first came to B.C. upon graduation from Picture Butte High in southern Alberta. He then attended UBC receiving his Bach. of Commerce Degree in 1956. Being time to step out into the world, he found himself covering the barron Alaska Hwy. from Dawson Creek (mile '0') to (mile '640') at Watson Lake. He was a sales representative for Imperial Oil. After a 2 year period he decided to further his education and was granted a leave of aveence to enter the University of Maryland. Here he achieved a Masters in Business Administration.

His next job entitled him to the position of assistant director for the Alumni Association at UBC. Presenting many innovations he shortly found himself the director of the Alumni Annual Giving.

His work here for a four year period involved many events of a "town & gown" nature throughout North America with major emphasis in B.C. They received North American recognition for some aspects of their work.

BCIT first recognized Thom on their staff in 1965. He had a pleasant welcome to BCIT in the event that he arrived just in time for the first graduation ceremonies and BCIT's first grads. This opportunity arose quite unexpectantly when Thom went in search of other employment. "I asked Mr. Roper (the first principal for BCIT and a good friend) whether he thought I would be happy at the job". Mr. Roper didn't think he really would and should join the staff at BCIT. He accepted the position of vice-principal in the Extension Division and maintained it for the next eight years. Some of his eventful evenings during the next eight years led him to achieve a Masters Degree in Adult and Higher Education.

(Don't let this bundle of knowledge let you shy away though because his warm personality and keen interest in knowing people are just a few points emphasizing his charisma).

Last fall during Sept.-Nov. he was appointed to serve on a three man task force in the Lower Fraser Valley Area. The job entailed a feasibility study in the area to determine the demanding need for a Regional College in the area. As of the beginning of Sept. the Fraser Valley Regional College opened.

"I feel that my major contribution in accepting my new position of principal is my dedication and interest in BCIT's tremendous potential to serve B.C. We offer technical education which is advanced, practical and meaningful because of the very diverse talents provided by our faculty members.

I would like both faculty and students to offer suggestions and have a say in the future development of BCIT. (Authority flows upward from the employees to the leaders.) We have a big job to do but I think we have common goals."


On behalf of all students & staff at BCIT we would like to take this opportunity to wish you a warm welcome in your new position of Principal of BCIT.



In conclusion my best luck goes out to all for the coming year.



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For those of you who don't know Shinerama or Cystic Fibrosis is, here is the story.

Cystic Fibrosis afflicts babies, children and young adults. This disease distorts the body to deformity and causes difficulty in breathing due to large mucus formation in the lungs.

One symptom of Cystic Fibrosis is excessively salty sweat and for this reason several glandular and respiratory tests are taken to diagnose this disease. Once the disease has been diagnosed, the patient is subjected to daily treatments in a mist ttent which helps to clear the lungs of the globs of mucus, thereby making breathing easier.

Doctors teach parents of Cystic Fibrosis children how to continue treatment when the child returns home.

Special equipment such as mist tents, therapy boards, oxygen masks plus large supplies of vitamins and drugs are essential to the life of their child. This equipment and medical attention is very expensive for the parents and also time consuming, starting form the time the child gets up in the morning he goes through a multiple amount of exercises which her must do every day. The child must consume a large amount of food as well as up to 30 pills each meal to alleviate the deficiencies in his or her body.

Both the parent and child suffer interruptions to their work and play every day because of the special treatments the child needs.

The Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation was formed because in the 1950's, groups of bewildered and angry parents of Cystic Fibrosis children began to organize and demand answers. In 1960, these isolated groups joined together to form the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation relies on donors form coast to coast to provide money for research. As yet, there is no cure for Cystic Fibrosis. Shinerama is a means through which money can raised to aid in reasearch. It was actually started in 1961 by the



University of Waterloo and since then colleges and universities across Canada have followed their lead by raising money for Cystic Fibrosis research.

This year, BCIT is trying to raise \$20,000 on September 13, 1974.

Shinerama is a lot of work and it is also a lot of fun.

We are looking for volunteers who can go out and shine on Friday, September 13. As there will be no classes on that day, we expect a good turnout. Food will be provided free on that day and shiners will be under shelter in case of rain.

Applejack is the band playing at the Shinerama Dance Friday night, and all shiners will be admitted free. Also, a Texas Mickey will be awarded at the dance as a door prize.







#### TALK ABOUT FUNNY



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


