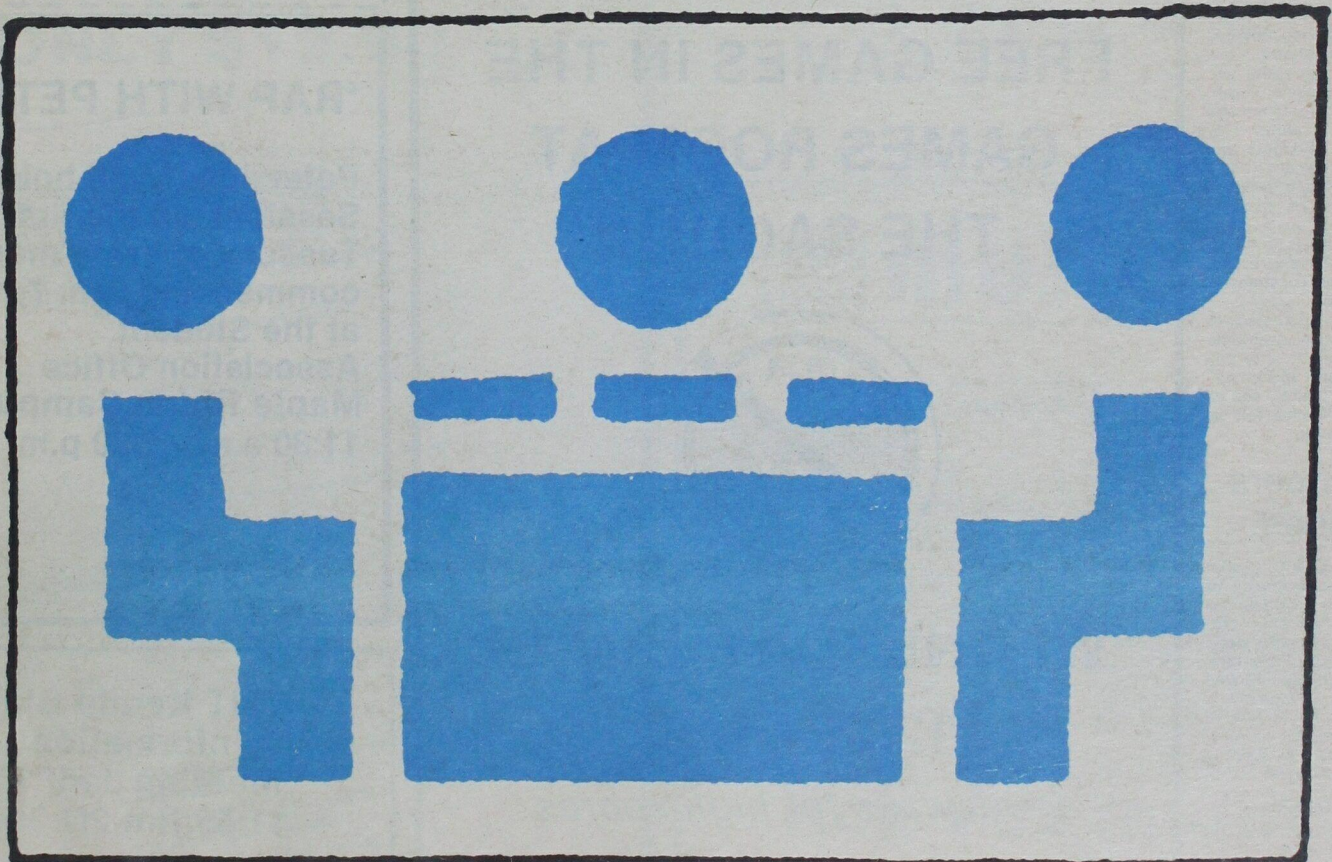

## BCIT/PVI merger update

Legislation merging the B.C. Institute of Technology and Pacific Vocational Institute has been passed. Bill 72, introduced to the legislature on November 22, received Royal Assent on December 2, 1985.

Reasons for the merger are reported to have been financial as well as representing an opportunity to create a 'polytechnical' institution. On April 1, 1986, BCIT and PVI will operate as one institution.

Signs of the merger are already visible, with 'PVI Accounting' and 'PVI Payroll' signs attached to the BCIT administration building. Over the next few months these departments will be merged with those already at BCIT.

Combining over 400 support staff from PVI and BCIT has resulted in four positions being identified as "redundant."

Personnel Director Ron Bell says it is not certain that these four positions will result in layoffs, however. Fifty management staff have been

laid off as a result of the merger.

The student unions attached to the two institutions began operating as one group on January 1, 1986. PVI student representatives are acting as divisional councils within the BCIT Student Association structure. According to S.A. President Troy Nagy, the S.A. is currently re-writing its constitution.

Nagy says he thinks the merger of the two institutions is a positive move that won't affect the value of the BCIT diploma.

## Financial help: south campus

Students experiencing financial difficulties should be aware that they can still apply for the following types of student aid:

1. BC STUDENT ASSISTANCE (Canada Student Loan/B.C. Student Loan)

Students who have not yet applied for BC Student Assistance for the 1985-86 academic year can still do so. For students in most technologies, the deadline for submitting applications is MARCH 14, 1986.

Students requiring information and assistance in initially applying for government student loans are invited to attend a BCSAP Information Session. The sessions are held every Thursday from 12:30 to 1:30. Students wishing to attend should check with the recep-

tionist in Counselling Services.

Students who have applied for BC Student Assistance earlier in the year but wish to have a reassessment of their award should make an appointment with a Counsellor. The deadline for submitting Requests for Reassessment is MARCH 14, 1986.

2. BCIT SPRING BURSARIES

The deadline for applying for Spring Term Bursaries is January 17, 1986. Students in terms/levels 2, 4 and 5 are eligible to apply.

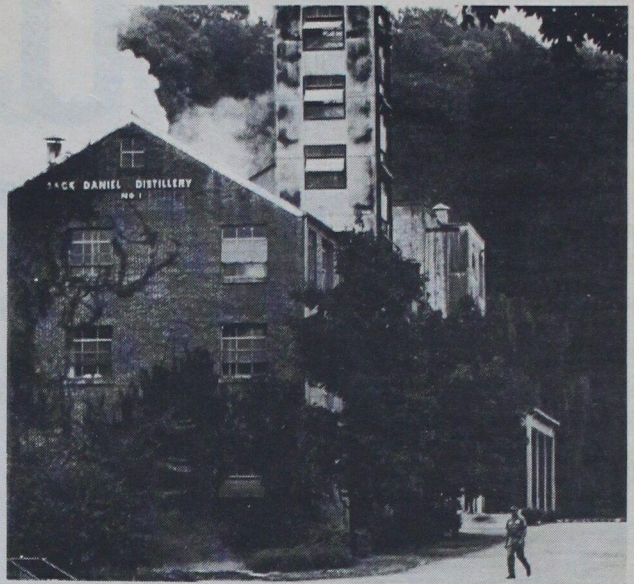
Bursaries are non-repayable grants that can vary between \$100 and \$1000. Applicants must make a good case that they have exhausted all other potential sources of funds and still find that they will be short of

money to finish their year. Students must have an overall average of not less than 60% in their last term at BCIT to be considered for a Bursary.

3. BCIT EMERGENCY LOANS

Students who are expecting to receive funds from a source such as a Canada Student Loan or a BC Student Loan may find themselves in financial difficulty on a short term basis. Such students can apply for a BCIT Emergency Loan. To do so, they must make an appointment with a Counsellor.

For further information on the above programs, students should visit Student Financial Services in the Counselling Centre, Room 2N 05.

## Nomination Procedure:

1. All nominees must be members in good standing of the Association with minimum of sixty-five per cent first term standing, or a letter of recommendation from the Department Head of the nominee in question.

2. Nominations must be submitted to the C.R.O. on the form provided for this purpose. The nomination shall be considered invalid unless the information called for is complete in all respects, to wit:

Name of nominee (printed or typed); position of Executive which the nominee will contest; signatures of at least fifteen members of the Association in good standing; signatures of nominee, campaign manager and present office

holder, and date of nomination.

3. Any member of the Association may sponsor only one candidate for each office. Signing a nomination form shall not be considered a pledge of support in the ensuing campaign and voting except for the case of Campaign Manager, who has stated his or her intentions.

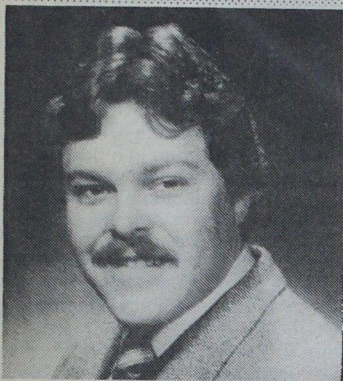
4. A Candidate wishing to withdraw must do so no later than forty-eight hours before the opening of the polls by tendering his withdrawal, in writing, personally or through his Campaign Manager, to the C.R.O. at the offices of the Student Association. If he/she was the sole candidate for the office in question, the office shall be left off the ballot and a special election shall be held no earlier than two weeks following the general election.

# S.A. Executive Members explain positions



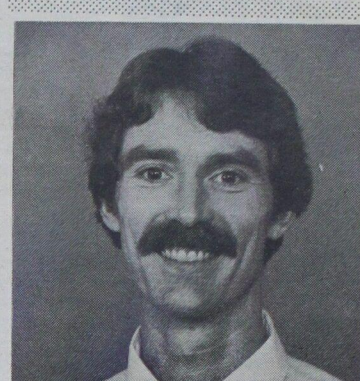

I would like to welcome to BCIT the new students who enrolled in January, and to welcome back all returning students. Good luck to all in 1986!

This school year has been a very dynamic one for the BCIT Student Association. There have been many adjustments to make due to the merger of BCIT and PVI: a new administration, welcoming PVI students into the fold, and taking on new business ventures.

I would like to go over the Student Association's accomplishments to date, and then talk about the S.A. election, set for March 6 and 7th this year.

June 1, 1985

Current executive takes office. This is also the official start of the Student Association Summer Employment Program, which results in work for nine full time and 15 part time employees.

July 15

Work throughout the summer results in a Letter of Intent to amalgamate the BCIT Student Association and the PVI Student Union. A signing ceremony is held with new BCIT President Roy Murray attending his first official function. At the same time, the TAPS renovation project starts, using student labour through the S.A. Summer Employment Program.

August 12

V.P. Administration Bill MacPherson resigns due to failure of two or more courses, as required by the S.A. constitution. The executive elects Business Chairperson Lorraine Reiger to MacPherson's position, and brings in Len Hartley to serve as Business Chairperson, via constitution ruling.

August 30

The Summer Employment Program ends. Taps renovations are complete: price tag \$50,000. Work is completed in preparation for Orientation Week activities and the merger of the BCIT and PVI student unions is on schedule. The BCIT S.A. is now responsible for the PVI S.U. business operations.

September 6

Orientation Week festivities end with a beer garden in the tennis courts. Orientation was a huge success.

Some larger projects include Troy Nagy's organization of a Phase II planning committee whose mandate includes preparing the framework for a new multi-purpose building that will house not only the S.A. but also the Administration, Alumni, Bookstore, an Entertainment complex and many other groups on campus. 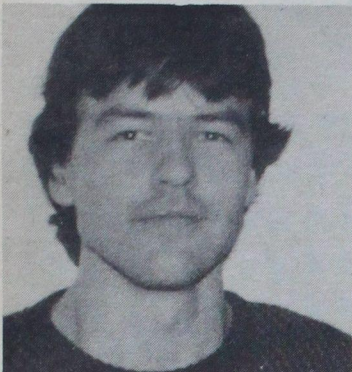

building that is centrally located and serves many purposes, so offices aren't dispersed throughout campus and difficult to locate.

In continuation with the study done this summer on the practicality of establishment of an Enterprise Development Centre and Student Consulting Service on campus (researched by Robyn Bartlett and myself) the two concepts have been split. The Enterprise Development Centre will probably become a part of the new Applied Research Centre that the Institute is setting up. The Student Consulting Service committee is just in the process of being set up and will be asked to find funding, facilities, program content, coordination with the community and the hiring of staff to run the service. Hopefully the service, which will provide assistance to small businesses through the use of student consultants (us), will be set to go in September.

Also coming up in 1986 is the Association of Collegiate Unions International Conference and BCIT is the host. Last October, Len Hartley, Edwin Loo, Dave Cox and myself attended the conference held in Corvallis, Oregon at Oregon State University. Student Union representatives from Alberta, Idaho, Washington, Oregon and B.C. attended this three day event filled with workshops, speakers and entertainment. Each event was designed to give student representatives ideas on how to be

more effective, involved and efficient at our jobs.

Two of our staff members attended the conference with us, Janice Eden and Patti Kluckner will be organizing the 1986 conference and I hope that all of you who will be in 2nd year next fall will welcome the opportunity to meet other students from the west coast.

All of us on this year's executive hope that our last term in office will be just as fruitful and mind-expanding as the last one. We might make some mistakes enroute, but that is all part of the learning process. I hope that you do consider running for one of the positions and enjoy the experience win or lose. Being elected might mean winning the game, but then you've just started the climb. The job isn't easy, it doesn't make you popular overnight and can sometimes become a nightmare if you let all the hassles get to you.

If you want to run for my position I suggest that you have the following skills to be able to function coherently in the job: accounting, management, public speaking ability and experience in business. Those are skills you can learn. ## A history of the Student Association

BCIT opened its doors to eager students in September, 1964. It did not take long for the student body to organize themselves for social and sports activities. At that time the campus had a 'Butler' type building which was used for dances and socials. In 1966 energetic students started to publish the 'LINK' student newspaper. Annual year-books started to appear that year as well.

In 1968, the BCIT Student Association was officially chartered as a registered B.C. society. The BCIT Student Association has remained a society in good standing, filing an annual return and audited financial statements every year. Initially resulted in the construction of the Student Activity Centre, or SAC Building, which opened its doors in the spring of 1971. The Student Association now had a home with offices for the elected student executive. The 1971 executive decided to hire a full-time Business Manager in July that year, increasing the number of permanent staff to two. Phil Henderson was hired and is still looking after the administrative affairs of the Student Association. Eden, currently in charge of the S.A. front office, joined the Student Association as a secretary in 1976.

The first T.N.T. store appeared in 1971 in part of the area now occupied by the campus bank. First year sales were \$37,000. The Student Association now has three This & That Emporiums on campus with a total sales volume of \$900,000.

Pubs have always been popular with BCIT students. In 1971 students started having pubs in the SAC by use of the occasional permit system. In 1974 the S.A.

finally obtained a year-round license, with a permanent bar eventually being located in the SAC cafeteria.

Meanwhile, students were unhappy with the food operation in the SAC so in 1977, the Student Association opened 'Growlies'. At first this new food outlet featured a salad and sandwich bar, but more recently hot food has been added to the menu. During the summer of 1985, both the 'Taps' bar and Growlies were renovated and the cafeteria remodelled. Much of the work was done by students on a Student Association summer job program.

Mark Coombs is in charge of the S.A. food and beverage operations, with Jeff Greaves as supervisor in Taps and Maureen 'Moe' as supervisor in Growlies.

The Student Association also runs a copying and printing service in the SAC, known as 'SAMS'. Originally established as a dance ticket and poster service, SAMS provides the BCIT community with a wide variety of reproduction and media services. Darren Suveges is manager of SAMS.

In the closet space adjacent to SAMS is the Link newspaper office, where publisher Don Wright cranks out a weekly tabloid full of news, views, rants and raves. The student editor this year is Peter Louwe.

A good source of income for the Student Association is the video games room, located near the SAC lobby. This room full of electronic wizardry generates as much as \$40,000 a year for the S.A.

The Student Association provides a number of services for students, through installation of facilities or funding of programs. They include free phones in the SAC, an escort service, recreation program support, and construction of the racquet courts and lounge complex.

The Student Association, while expanding into business areas has always been active in the political arena, looking out for the interests of students. In 1972 the student executive forced the abolition of the dress

code (ties, jackets, etc) at BCIT. In 1976 the S.A. assisted students having problems in the Health division. The three hour Wednesday break is another Student Association initiative. The Student Association has always maintained a good relationship with the BCIT administration. Unlike most

university student groups, the S.A. has always maintained a non-confrontation attitude.

With the amalgamation of BCIT and the Pacific Vocational Institute, the student unions will also merge, under the umbrella of the BCIT Student Association. This will further enhance the

role of the S.A. on campus, and result in an even wider variety of services and facilities for students.

The BCIT Student Association is a very active student association, thanks in part to the endeavours of past members of the Student Association, and in part to the efforts of the current stu-

dent body. For a school the size of BCIT the organization and activities of the BCIT Student Association puts it on a par with the 'better' and more sophisticated student unions across Canada.

The Student Association General Office is located in the SAC Building, down the East hall.



### WUSC local committee sets goals

The local committee of World University Services of Canada met on Monday, January 6, to consider possible projects and to decide on how to approach the national conference in Ottawa later this month.

Edwin Loo, vice-president of the local committee, will be attending the WUSC conference on behalf of the local committee, while committee president Amar Kshatriya is hoping to attend as an observer, if he can raise the funds. The BCIT Committee decided to pursue the idea of shorter periods of involvement for overseas participation in WUSC development projects. Currently WUSC participants must commit to

two years of work at a time.

The BCIT committee feels that a 4 to 6 month duration would encourage greater involvement by BCIT/PVI instructors and staff, whose trades and technologies would be better suited to shorter training sessions. The idea must be approved by the WUSC national body before it can be implemented.

The committee also decided to set the referendum fee question at \$1 per term per student. The referendum, which was approved by the S.A. Executive last fall, will run in conjunction with the S.A. election in March, and will ask students to accept a \$1 per term per student fee to go towards WUSC activities, primarily the spon-

sorship of a refugee student.

To increase awareness of WUSC and its activities in developing nations around the world, Edwin Loo plans to run a film series over the next few months. The WUSC local committee also expects to have a display set up during Open House, to promote the organization to the campus community as well as to the general public.

The next meeting of the WUSC Local Committee will be early in February, at a time and place to be announced. For more information, interested students and staff may contact the local committee through Amar Kshatriya, instructor, or Edwin Loo, S.A. Engineering Chairperson.

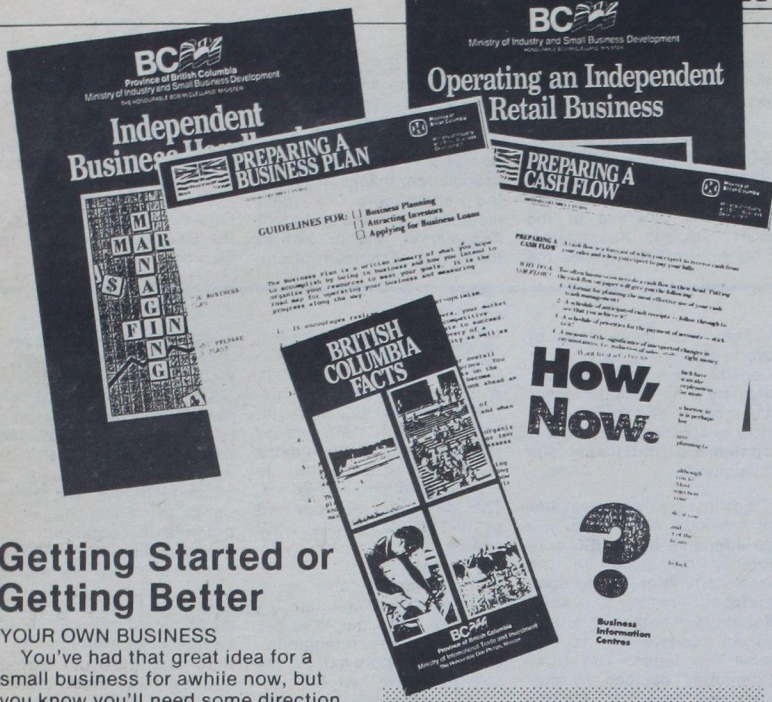

You've had that great idea for a small business for awhile now, but you know you'll need some direction to get it off the ground.

After years of being an employee, you want the rewards of being your own boss.

Maybe you've got a small - or medium-sized business and are looking for ways to become even more cost efficient and competitive.

If you've got questions about getting started or improving your business, the on-campus Business Information Centre wants your business - at no cost to you.

The Centre, operated by the BCIT Student Association, can help budding or current entrepreneurs with everything from information on business plans, cash flow preparation, and licenses and permits.

The Business Information Centre features a wide selection of handbooks and brochures with detailed, up-to-date information, such as one on operating an independent retail, servicing or manufacturing business.

Another important free service is confidential business counselling by phone or in person on a one-to-one basis through the Ministry of Industry and Small Business Development.

The on-campus Business Information Service is open to all full time, part time and evening students, staff and alumni interested in starting a small business. Once a business plan is put together, people are referred to professional business counsellors.

The BCIT Business Information Centre is generally open Monday to Friday - hours will be posted. The Centre is located down the East hall of the Student Activity Centre, across from Medical Services. The telephone number is 432-8549.

## S.A. maintains escort service

Last term the Student Association established an escort service for women going to their cars late at night.

According to S.A. executive member Denise Sankovich, the service is in response to the fact that students often have to park in the "south 40" through the trees at the back of campus. Sankovich says it is "quite a walk...and not wise for a woman to do at night." The paths are not lighted and it's "very desolate," says Sankovich.

Students wishing to use the escort service are advised to contact the Taps supervisor on duty at the time to arrange for an escort to walk them to their car. "It's better to be safe than sorry," says Sankovich.

## Cabin still available

If you are planning a trip to Whistler - why not stay at the Whistler Cabin?

Last term the Student Association arranged the sale of the Whistler Cabin to Art DeJong. The S.A. could no longer afford to keep it because it cost too much to operate. However, even though the S.A. no longer owns the cabin, BCIT students and alumni still get the same privileges as in the past.

The cost to stay at the cabin for a night on weekends and school holidays is \$12 for full time students and \$13.50 for part-time students and alumni. The cost is \$10 a night mid-week.

The cabin is located about 5 to 10 minutes from the village and has all the facilities you need, including a sauna, full kitchen and fireplace. So if you are thinking about going to Whistler why not stay at the cabin. Bookings can be done through the S.A. General Office. Book early!

Anyone who is interested in running for the president's position, feel free to drop by and see me during my office hours (published elsewhere in today's Link), so we can discuss what is involved.

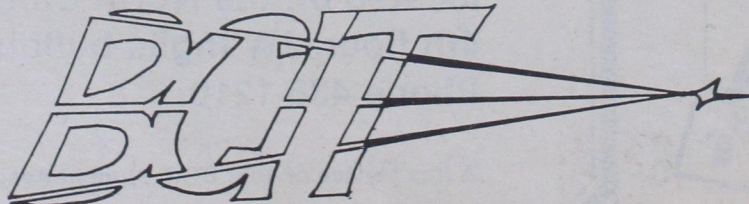

# S.A. Executive Positions

## - Job Descriptions -

### • President

Preside at meetings of the Student Association Executive,  
Act as ex-officio member of all committees,

Ensure that minutes are kept of all Association Council and Student Association Executive meetings,

Perform all other duties of a President as outlined in Robert's Rules of Order, latest edition,

Make the Annual Report at the Annual General Meeting,

Make sure that the performance of the Executive members is up to par, according to their duties outlined in this constitution,

Have the power to recommend to the Executive that appropriate action be taken in cases where the Executive member is not fulfilling his/her duties in accordance with this Constitution,

Sit on, or be presented on, all committees stuck by the Association, Administration, Staff and Alumni where it is deemed of importance to students. If an invitation is not extended by outside groups to sit on such committees, it will be the President's duty to negotiate for such representation,

Make himself/herself a resource person for the rest of the Executive and general council.

Be available to Executive and general population on a regular basis during generally accepted working hours,

Shall co-ordinate and assign all responsibilities to the Executive, the Representatives and appointees as he/she deems necessary except as defined in Constitution.

### • V.P. Administration & Finance

Assume the responsibilities of the President in the absence of the President,

Assist the President in his/her duties,

Act as Parliamentarian at all Association, Council and Student Association Executive meetings,

Be responsible for arranging all Association meetings and notifying the student body of such meetings.

Be responsible for the reviewing of the minutes of all meetings under the jurisdiction of the Association for the purpose of ensuring that the Constitution and Bylaws of the Association are not violated and that they are kept up to date.

Preside as Chairperson of the Constitutional Change Committee,

Be responsible for Student Association Elections as outlined in Bylaw 6 'Elections and Appointments'

Be responsible for assisting the Division Councils in their operations,

Vice President Administration shall be the executive member responsible for all Students Association staff in conjunction with the Business Manager and consistent with the employee manual in force.

Call for the submissions of budgets from all applicable subsidiary organizations for no later than the end of the last week in April,

Prepare and submit to the Council for approval in May the budget of the Association for the ensuing year from the estimates of the proposed expenditures by the subsidiary organizations of the Association and expenditures for any other purpose authorized by the Council. The Secretary-Treasurer shall provide for an operating margin of at least five percent (5%)

Upon assuming office, provide for the Association a fidelity bond at the expense of the Association for a sum to be agreed upon, and to arrange bonds for all employees and student officers so designated,

Obtain a financial report for each activity and function,

Before Council authorizes any allowance for travelling expenses, obtaining an estimate of the expenses, and within one week after the return of the person(s) to whom allowances were made, obtain a detailed account of actual expenditures along with suitable receipts and make any necessary adjustments,

Present to Council any recommendations from the Auditors and shall report to the Council by the end of the academic year, what actions were taken pursuant to the audit,

Be responsible for making a financial report subject to the B.C. Societies Act,

Read the Annual Financial Report at the Annual General Meeting,

Be responsible for the disbursement of all funds as per Bylaw 10

### • V.P. Public Relations & Marketing

The Vice President Public Relations and Marketing shall:

Be responsible for student organizations, events and fundraising activities.

Be responsible for Student Association business related to external organizations in which the Student Association may have membership or interest.

In general, be charged with the Student Association general public relations.

Be responsible for liaison with BCIT Alumni Association.

Be responsible for any conference to take place off campus and should handle enquiries from other students' unions in consultation with the Student Association Executive and/or the President.

Promote the Student Association and its operations.

### • V.P. Student Affairs

Vice President, Student Affairs:

This officer shall be responsible for:

1. Assisting the President in his/her political areas.

2. Liase with the Administration on all matters affecting students' life at BCIT, e.g. Dean of Non-academic support re: general student services, and Registrar re: counselling and administrative problems.

3. Be appointed a member of the Educational Council and attend their meetings and report back to the Student Executive.

4. Act in role of Ombudsman in dealing with student complaints and concerns.

5. Be appointed Student Association Member for the Institute's budget process of P.P.B.A.

6. Be appointed BCIT SA's representative on the Ministry's student loan appeal committee.

7. Liase with the Ministry of Education in conjunction with the President.

Too bad your reviewer, Chip, didn't bother to do his research before he decided to start his one man crusade towards music critic martyrdom.

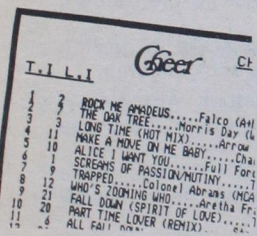
