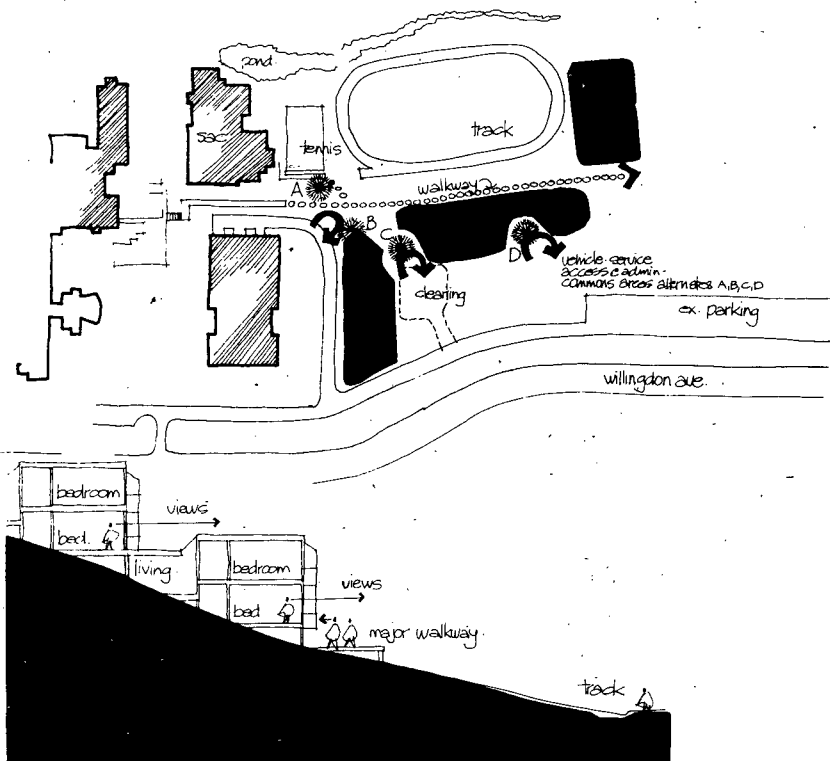
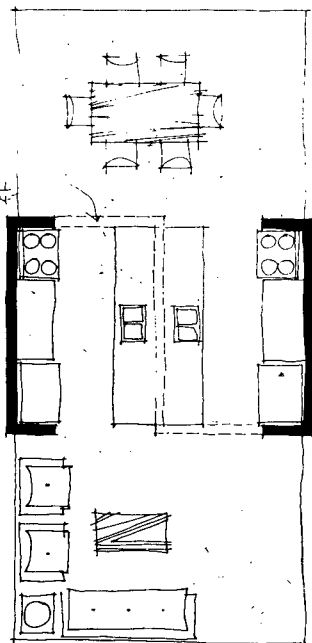


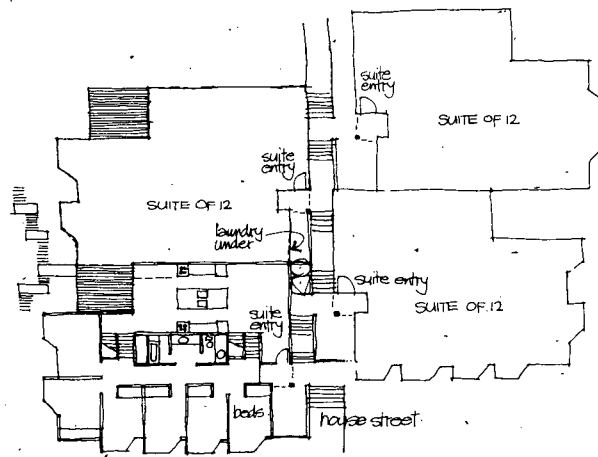

BCIT's residence is well into the planning stages.

Zoltan Kiss and Ray Letkeman, the project architects, are well into the program and preliminary schematics for the 250 bed residence. Completion target date is for occupancy in September 1978.

The architects will be discussing their schemes at the Principal & Open General Meeting in the Staff Lounge at 3 p.m. on Wednesday, April 27, 1977.

Feedback session will be held at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, April 27 in Brentwood House and at the same time in the Willingdon Cottages on Thursday, April 28. An additional session will be held on Wednesday, May 4, at 12:30 in the SAC-lobby, for people not living in residence at present.

The accompanying sketches give some impressions of the current developments. The intention is to have groups of 6 sharing common washrooms, two groups of 6 sharing a large double kitchen and living room, four groups of 12 sharing a "house," and a total of 5 houses.

Low-rise wood-frame cedar construction on the slopes overlooking the playing fields would give pleasant views and good proximity to the SAC, library and other facilities. The present schematic arrangement is a dramatic departure from conventional residence design and is aimed at providing individual privacy, small group apartment style living, and opportunities for developing community life-styles.

won. Since then, she has "dedicated" her life to BCIT.

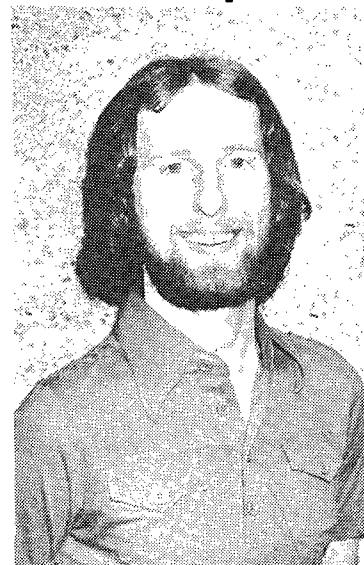
She has organized guest lecturers, seminars and social functions which involved each of the Business Technologies. Exposure '77 was a tremendous success and was all thanks to her.

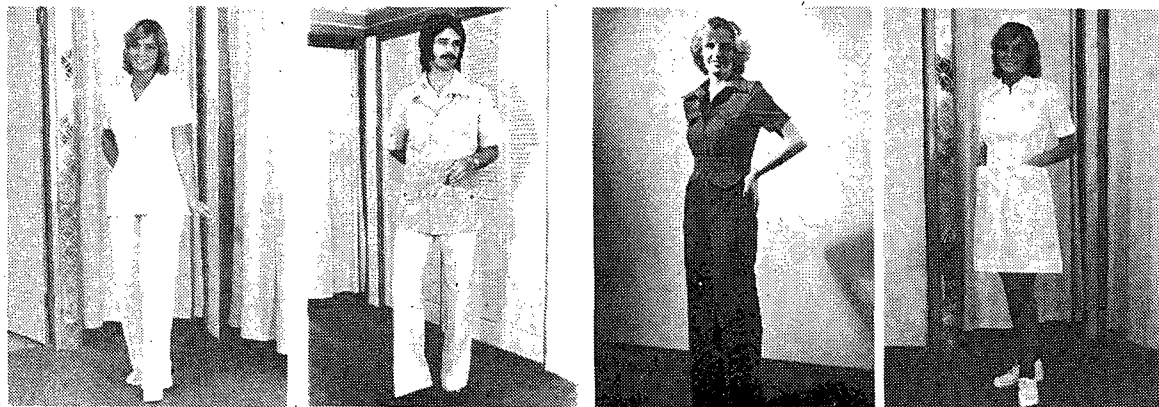

The Business division has been very active in Council and again this year the majority of Council if from this division. It is only natural for the Council to represent the Business division far better as there is more input into it from its members.

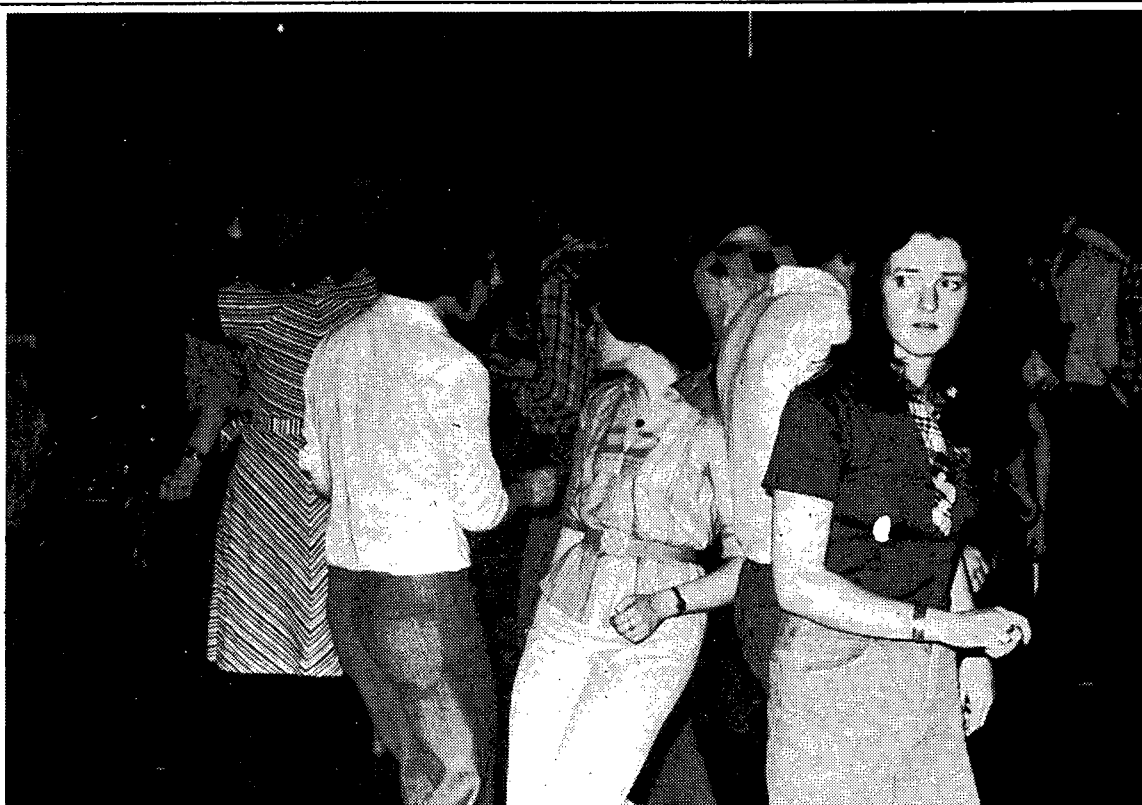

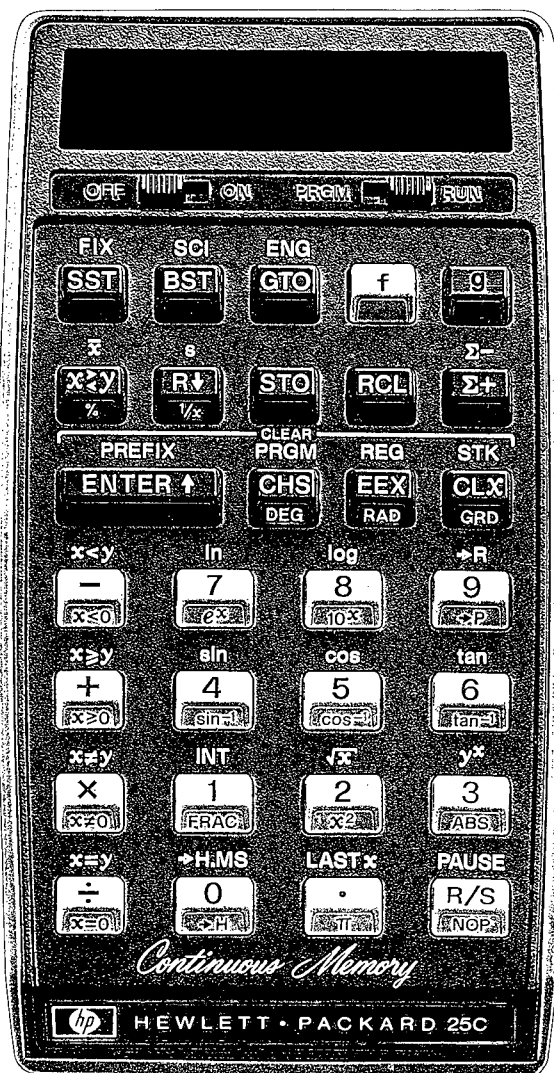

# Lawrence Ng new CSA president

The election of the President and Vice President and other chief executives of the BCIT Chinese Students' Association was held on April 13 and 17.

Over 105 votes were cast in the two days (over 60% of the possible votes). With the exception of President, all other positions were decided by a strong majority lead. The position of the President, however, was a tie, with Carol Ma capturing 50 votes and Lawrence Ng 52 votes, with one vote disqualified and two ballots with no vote. A by-election was therefore agreed upon by

both sides to be held one Wednesday later, April 20, 1977. The turnout for the by-election was so heavy that day with 76 votes cast. Lawrence Ng easily captured the position with over 62% of the popular votes.

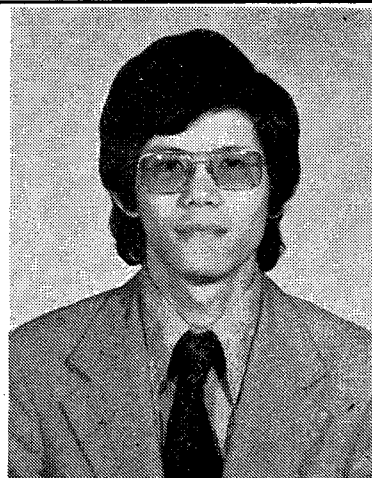

The Association now has over 190 members, both of Chinese and non-Chinese origin.

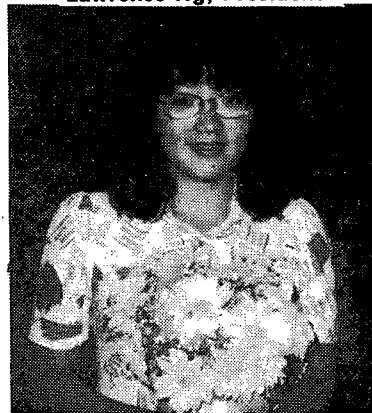

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# Supertramp — albums 2 & 3 revisited

The history of Supertramp's escapades, past and present, is a short, but hopefully a continuing story.

So, let's begin with Album #1. Supertramp's first album was one of little renown and showed a thumping rock style accentuating Thompson's bass and Benburg's drums. Some time between this album and #2, 'Crime of the Century,' the writing of Davies and Hogson advanced from mediocrity to excellence. 'Crime of the Century' was a masterpiece due in part to more sophisticated studio engineering as a greater depth to the music came through on this album. In this second album, Supertramp further improved upon their first effort by softening the thumping rock and relying more on the keyboard work of Davies and Hogson. At the same time, Helliwell's work

on the sax and clarinets was brought more to the forefront. As a group they came together in a unit, the vocals and instrumentation working as one in a brilliant mixture of sounds. This whole album is excellent, with the standout cut being "Bloody Well Right" and "Crime of the Century."

Then came album #3, 'Crisis What Crisis'—a slower, more melodic mixture, slightly more polished than #2. The major change here, is that instead of the explosive nature of #2, the music seemed to boil along at a less intense pace. Secondly, there

seemed to be a greater concentration on the vocals and even more use of Helliwell's wind instruments. My choices for the best cuts would be "Soap Box Opera" and "Lady", and all in all, it was another tremendous album. However, one notices a different style with each album which suggests that from each new album they release, you can expect to see a whole new Supertramp.

Now along comes #4, 'Even in the Quietest Moments,' and a change in the pattern already. "So, what is the change?" you may ask. Well, it comes as a bit

of a disappointment to me. I had naturally expected the pattern to continue, getting a brand new Supertramp with an album as good as either #2 or #3; but alas, here I was foiled. This new album is easily as good as either #2 or #3, but they are not new. Instead of a new style, they have reverted back to their old music, as it sounds like a combination of cuts from their two previous albums. Mind you, I'm not complaining. The album is still loaded with good music, the choice cuts off of this disc being "Give a Little Bit", "Fools Overture", and "In the Quietest Moments..."

My biggest question about this album is where Paul Wakefield went for his album cover design. He did #'s 2 and 3 himself, while his latest reminds me of the cover off of 'Rocky Mountain Christmas', an album by some guy named John Denver.

Since I am writing about Supertramp, I suppose I should mention their upcoming concert. They are supposed to be great in concert, or at least they were last year at the Q.E. I just wonder if the Coliseum is the right place to have them, the acoustics being what they are.

### Pink Floyd's 'Animals'

Pink Floyd first began recording about nine years ago. Ten albums later, we have 'Animals'. Side one opens with a short accoustical song entitled "Pigs on a Wing" (hence the cover shot of a 40 foot inflatable pig floating over a large factory). It warns us to watch for 'pigs on a wing'. The rest of side one is a long number entitled, "Dogs". This seems to be a song paralleling our lives with the lines of dogs. Even though the lyrics are rather doom and gloom, ie. "...Everyone's expendable and no one has a real friend...and you believe at heart, everyone's a killer...", it has an easy listening slowed-down tempo somewhat like that of their previous album.

The first half of side two contains "Pigs (Three Different Ones)" — a song partially criticizing an English woman who lead a crusade against indecency, best known for her protests to the BBC when they were playing "My Ding-A-Ling". The song starts slowly and gets progressively faster.

The second song, "Sheep", seems to encourage sheep (people?) to raise up against their shepherds (big business, government?). Anyway, a modified Lord's Prayer can be heard in the background, but is smothered by all sorts of electronic effects. The album closes with part II of 'Pigs on a Wing' — this time warning all those listening to seek shelter from whatever we were watching for in part I.

Does any of this make sense? No? Well don't worry about it; Pink Floyd's lyrics (all written by Roger Waters) have never made much sense. Fortunately, the album contains more music than lyrics. Unfortunately, missing from this album is Dick Parry on saxophone, which provided an excellent balance between the guitars and the synthesized music. Maybe the many animal noises throughout the album are supposed to fill this gap.

Overall, the album is not quite as good as 'Wish You Were Here' which is probably their best to date. This does not mean to say 'Animals' is not the listening type, it's just not as alive as 'Wish You Were Here'. If you only want one Pink Floyd album, grab 'Wish You Were Here' and if you like it, stay with it; you've got their best.

Emerson, Lake & Palmer, after nearly three years without a new album, are in Paris recording a new one as a follow-up to their just released four-sided album which I will review in next week's LINK.
