

Aviation student collects Lieutenant Governor Award

Aviation convocation ceremony yields talented graduates for a growing industry

On August 12, 44 proud, jubilant Aviation students collected their diplomas and certificates at the bright, cavernous Sea Island Campus air hangar. Among them was Dawn Patterson, 30, the recipient of the prestigious Lieutenant Governor's Award for Trades/Vocational studies. The award is presented annually to a BCIT student who has been registered in a pre-employment or apprenticeship program, and who has achieved a high academic standing, as well as contributed positively to the BCIT community. "I was stunned when they told me I had won," Patterson said. The award was truly an honor (one of many she has collected during her studies at BCIT), but it was the icing on the cake. "All my hard work had finally paid off; I worked hard to make this course everything that I could, and everything just panned out." After attending university, as well as working in restaurants and bars for 10 years, Patterson's interest in Aviation began when she took the Women in Trades program at BCIT in the fall of '96. "I liked the industry because it was so specialized. Also, not a lot of women were in this field and I

Motivation the key for award-winning nursing student

For Coral Tipton, winner of this year's Dean's Prize of Excellence in Clinical Nursing, motivation came a little later in life, but once found, things really took off.

Growing up in Squamish, B.C., Tipton was never really excited about academics. "I dropped out of high school at 15, got pregnant, and found myself as a single mom collecting welfare," says Tipton.

It was this experience that motivated Tipton to do something about her situation. She enrolled back in high school, achieved a 96 per cent average, and was awarded a \$150 Provincial Bursary and \$500 Shriner's Scholarship.

After she graduated from high school, Tipton met her husband Marty.

"My husband was my main motivation; he encouraged me to continue my education for

myself, but I wanted to prove to him my potential," Tipton says.

Shortly after meeting her husband, Tipton began to research career options. "After my research, it was clear to me that BCIT was the most practical choice for entering the work force." She applied to the BCIT Nursing Diploma Program.

In her first year at BCIT Tipton found it tough being with younger people and was a self-described "nervous wreck", but she knew that for the wellbeing of her child getting an education was the only way to support her family.

On her BCIT experience, Tipton says, "I never accepted mediocrity and always reached for the top denominator," and adds, "The teachers at BCIT really supported me."

One of Tipton's biggest supporters was the Associate Dean, Health Sciences, Bernadet Ratsoy. "I put her name forward (for the Prize of Excellence) because she overcame adversity, demonstrated conviction, and

focussed on achieving her goals," says Ratsoy.

The Associate Dean's Prize of Excellence recognizes graduates in Nursing who demonstrate the synthesis of theory and practice in the application of their nursing skills to patient care. Nursing faculty recommend the award's recipient. "She (Tipton) obviously impressed a lot of other faculty members," says Ratsoy.

Tipton is a modest individual, and downplays the excitement of her award, but you can tell she is very happy about being recognized. She is currently working at Vancouver Hospital and Health Sciences Centre in the Reconstructing Orthopedics Ward. After completing her Preceptorship at VGH, the head nurse of her ward invited her to apply to the hospital.

As for the future, "I plan to continue my education and become a really well-rounded hospital nurse with a broad knowledge base," says Tipton.



Recommendations

The recommendations of the working group covered the broad spectrum of planning and design, production and distribution, and included a proposed framework for examining these areas in greater detail as shown below:



As a first phase in the process of transforming media services, the group recommended the establishment of a "Distribution Centre". This centre would hold centralized inventory control, warehousing and distribution for a number of media-related functions such as AV equipment, DE warehouse, publications and promotions/displays, and would also provide a central resource to integrate synergistic functions such as purchasing, shipping and receiving, and printing.

It was the opinion of the working group that a collaborative environment existed among the departments concerned in Phase I to support moving to implementation. The Executive agreed with this assessment and asked Terry Milligan to lead a small group to begin this implementation process. Terry's group will consult with managers, staff, and unions who are impacted by the services and functions that would take place in the "Distribution Centre". The goal would be to have the plan finalized by April 1, 1999.

In addition, other groups will examine opportunities for integration and convergence of media creation, design and production functions throughout the Institute (Phase II in the diagram above). Considerable thought will need to be given as to how improvements in the coordination and streamlining of this area can be realized.

A TRANSFORMATION INITIATIVE IN MEDIA SERVICES AT BCIT

For the past four months a working group comprising several service departments ⁽¹⁾ has been exploring opportunities for bringing together processes and functions for BCIT media and production services where common interests and goals prevail.

Scope of the Project

These media services embrace a wide range of functions from the planning and design of curriculum, websites, and software applications, to the production of printed and electronic communications, and finally to warehousing and inventory control of materials for distance education, A/V equipment and promotional displays.

Because the Institute has grown in size and complexity, many of these functions reside in different departments, often resulting in overlapping and duplication of effort. For example, support for desktop publishing, multi-media, and website development flourishes throughout the Institute. Storage and distribution functions for media and promotional items occur in a number of departments. In addition, the growth of technology has meant that many service areas provide real time customer service, on demand, and often through remote access. This creates a need for better integration and coordination of the services.

Principles and Outcomes

In its investigation the working group was guided by a set of principles and desired outcomes:

- alignment with, and support for, Institute goals and strategic directions.
- enhanced learning opportunities for students and BCIT faculty and staff.
- enhanced communications and interactions among students and with faculty and staff.
- creation of synergies among departments and greater group interactivity that would lead to new ideas and improved ways of doing things.
- improved processes and systems that enable people to do complicated tasks more easily.
- the emergence of a "centre of excellence" where convergence of media and production services would deliver improved quality and customer service.

Above all, the group searched for ways in which the needs and expectations of customers for media and production services could be better served by improved coordination and access. From an Institute perspective there was a need to ensure utilization of facilities and equipment was improved, overlapping of function minimized, and service enhanced with the same or less resources. It was especially important to ensure that any integration of functions occurred in a spirit of collaboration and cooperation.



Computer Technology Rollout

Project Update for September 1998 — We are nearing the end of the Computer Technology Rollout (Phase 1) project and it is on target to be completed by the end of the year. The areas listed below represent the last remaining groups to be serviced. The computer standards have all been increased to reflect the new available technology and increasing requirements with planning for the future. The desktop operating system remains as Windows 95 but is under review with a new standard targeted for January 1999.

Minimum Upgrade Standard - Revised

The minimum standard for an upgradable computer has been increased to a Pentium-75Mhz. Any computer at or above this level will be upgraded to 32MB of RAM and a 2.5 GB drive.

New Desktop Standard

Our new desktop standard has been upgraded to a Pentium II 300Mhz MMX, 160MB of RAM, 3.2GB drive, 24x CD-ROM, and multimedia support. Our current brand until the end of the year will be a Digital PC3500. Please note that due to the Digital/Compaq merger, we will be evaluating several manufacturers and deciding upon a new desktop computer standard.

Unsupported Computers

Computers remaining in a department that fall below the Minimum Standard for the Technology Rollout are not supported by CR (i.e. HelpDesk). This means that once the team has completed all departments by the end of the year, anything on campus at the level of

486/33 (and some 486/66) or below will not be supported by Computer Resources and may NOT be connected to the network "backbone" (i.e. Internet, Notes, Banner, etc.).
