

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

SA Elections hotly contested

the 2002 Student Association Elections are officially over and in many ways they were the most unusual BCIT student political race in recent memory. First, a huge number of students turned out to vote — 25 per cent of the student body compared with only 5 per cent last year. Second, the race for Student President was the closest race BCIT has seen for years. So close in fact, that a recount had to be held to determine the new President.

BCIT's current VP of Finance & Administration, a recount was requested by one of the Presidential candidates after the initial results were released. Only thirty-six votes separated the top two candidates. After a recount was held, it was officially announced that Samantha Yeung is BCIT's new Student President with 577 votes, 35 votes over her closest opponent.

Yeung was surprised by the close race. "It as a really, really close race. It was tough. It could have gone either way." But, Yeung says she is thrilled

with the results. "I haven't had time to really react to it. It's great. The people I'm going to get to know are excellent people. I'm excited at the opportunity, she said.

Halfnights says the procedures of a recount are not in the Student Association Constitution, but they felt the tight results deserved a second count. "We counted because one of the candidates requested it. But the results were within 10 percent of the total vote, so we felt we should recount it," she said.

Other positions were also decided by a close margin. John Alexander won the VP of Student Affairs position, beating his opponent Will Heller by only 111 votes. For the position of Chair of Business & Health Sciences, Christina Roman beat Craig W. Clark by only 55

Not all of the races were so close. Jay Selinger will be the new VP of Administration & Finance. He beat his opponent, Bruce McTaggart with 1024 votes to 529. Also, Daniel Boffo got the nod to act as VP Campus Life with 571 votes, beating his closest opponent by almost 200 votes

Three of the Executive positions were uncontested. Patricia Stefani will be the new VP of Public Relations & Marketing with a yes vote of 1320 and a no vote of 177. The Chair of Electrical, Electronics and Computing will be filled by Jeff Patton who received 198 yes votes and 35 no votes. Finally, Winston Tong won the Chair of Transportation & Construction seat with 190 yes votes and 44 no votes.

SA grants BCITMA funds for conference

SA Council Notes Cameron Rankin

he newly elected, incoming BCIT Student Association executive and a large contingent of members of the BCIT Marketing Association attended the Student Association council meeting this past Monday. The incoming SA executive was there to observe the present council at work and the BCITMA to request \$3,000 to assist 15 of its members to attend a week long conference in Orlando, Florida.

The meeting began with a presentation from the BCITMA explaining why they needed the funds. Their fundraising efforts came up short of the required funds needed for all 15 to make the trip and each person attending the conference had to pay \$425 each towards airfare and they also ate up the budget needed for start-up costs for next year's executive and they wanted the council to help defray the costs to the members and to help them with start-up costs for next years BCITMA. The council considered their request and granted them \$1,000.

- Brent Morris President of the SA reported that he had a meeting with Tony Knowles President of BCIT and Tony Tanner Vice-President of Education and they informed Brent of proposed timetable changes to begin September 1, 2002 BCIT administration wants to decrease the three hour Wednesday break to two hours and to have all classes end at 4:30pm with the last class on Friday ending at 2:30pm.
 - It was pointed out that there is an existing agreement between BCIT and the SA that there can be no modification to the three-hour break without the SA's permission.
 - Council voted against supporting the administrations proposal.
- Holly Cunningham Vice President Campus Life reported that the blood clinic at BCIT was a success with 130 people donating a total of 84 units of blood which will help save 385 people.
- Marie Halfnights Vice-President Finance and Administration and Jessica Jensen Chair of Electrical, and Electronics and Computing reported that the Cut For The Cure 1 raised \$9,125 and the Cut For The Cure 2 raised \$ 1,573 for a total of \$10,734 raised for cancer research. There was a total of 20 participants who had their hair cut or shaved. Jensen and Halfnights hope that this will become an annual event on the BCIT Burnaby campus.



Another student, Eric Ruttan of Electronics Engineering, volunteered on the spur of the moment.



The donations for Ruttan raised \$562.37.



Jensen and Halfnights hope that this will become an annual event on the BCIT Burnaby campus.










"The campaign has been amazing. I have met so many people," she said



Voter turnout hits a record high

Students turned out in droves for this year's Student Association Executive Elections. The number of students voting, 1,670, is unprecedented.

Last year, 531 ballots were cast — over a third less than this year.

SA Vice-President of Administration and Finance Marie Halfnights, the Chief Returning Officer in the elections said, the turnout was a result of active promotion of the elections by the SA.

Many students said they came to vote because of the free set photos distributed by the SA to those voting in the elections.

"We don't really care about this voting. We've only been here six weeks and we're gone," said Rob Sebastian, a plumbing student, of his fellow students. "We're just here to get our set photos."

"We're in second year, so it really doesn't matter to us. We're here to pick up our photos," said Lexy Garrett of second year Financial Management.

Even students not getting their set photos recognized that the pictures of their classmates were a factor in the turnout.

"I'm voting for my friend," said James DeChavez, a first year marketing student. "I don't have set pictures or anything, so that's the main reason I'm voting."

The highest turnout of voters, as in past years, was in the business and health schools — with 866 votes being cast. The Schools of Electrical, Electronics and Computing Systems and of Transportation and Construction cast 272 votes each.

Set photos are still available at the SA Office for a \$2 charge.

- 298 students applied for financial aid through the Save Your Ass fund and 60 students were awarded a total of \$25,000.

- A draft proposal of the 2002-3 Student Association budget was presented to the executive and councilors for them to examine. The budget will be discussed at the next council meeting, watch for more information on this story in the next issue of *The Link*.
- Norm Nawrocki actor and comedian will be performing in the Great Hall on Wednesday, May 8 during the three-hour break. The total cost to the SA for travel, accommodations and the performance is \$1,800.
- The SA is investigating having more poster boards set up on campus to inform students of events happening on campus
- Council passed a motion to purchase T-shirts for a joint FSA, SA, and Simon Fraser University 24 hr relay team, up to an amount 0f \$ 250. The relay is to be held on June 15 and 16.

The next SA council meeting will be held on Monday, May 6 in SA Council Chambers on the 2nd floor of the Campus Centre.


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

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Broadcast panel debates media convergence

s bigger really better? This seemed to be the question on everyone's minds as BCIT's Broadcast Journalism class of 2002 hosted a forum on Media Convergence on April 18 at the Burnaby campus. This was the fifth annual broadcast journalism forum on media issues and entitled 'Convergence: Illusion of

The panel of four media representatives consisted of Global national anchor Kevin Newman, the Georgia Straight's news editor — a BCIT and Link alumnus - Charlie Smith, past Vancouver Sun columnist Denny Boyd and Ian Koenigsfest the Public Affairs Director for CKNW 980 Radio. David Pinton, from the BCIT Journalism class of 2002, moderated the evenings discussion with all technical support provided by fellow broadcasting students.

The discussion covered the gamut of the convergence issue with definite opinions being expressed throughout the evening. Smith was the most vocal about the negative impact of convergence. He suggested that we should all be concerned about our privacy with the evershrinking world of diverse media ownership and the way that media conglomerates collect information from their consumers. Political censorship was also a concern as was the thought that convergence could undermine the public's view of the media. When one company owns all of our news sources and needs to make a profit, are we really getting both sides of the story?

Newman countered that opinion by suggesting that in 10 years time the economics of news will be destroyed and convergence will take care of itself. People can watch what they want when they want thanks to direct television and will not watch news broadcasts that they don't consider

Koenigsfest thinks of convergence in two ways: the convergence of people and of resources, which allows for greater efficiency within a company. He makes the point that companies need to make money but was adamant that safeguards need to be put into place for the protection of journalism in the wake of takeovers and convergence.

Boyd was of the opinion that convergence takes away the competitiveness factor of journalism but Kevin Newman disagreed. He says that there's still healthy competition between reporters throughout all of CANWEST Global's holdings - print, radio, internet and television. Everyone still wants to be the first to get the

No matter what their opinion on the issue of convergence, all panelists seemed to agree on this point - no matter who owns what, when, you still have to be tough, report hard and stand your
