Ralph: '64 student to '84 instructor

Feelings of excitement and optimism that drew a Burnaby South High School student to a spanking new BCIT back in 1964 still remain with him today - as an instructor

Ralph Hargreaves of Biological Sciences was among the first graduating class at the Institute in 1966 in what was at that time known as the Food Technology in the Engineering Division.

"Being a student here was exciting," he remembers. "The two year program was a new concept of training and with a growing BCIT there was always something going on.

"There was a real community feeling back then. With a population of between five and six hundred students everybody knew everybody."

Ralph has seen a lot of changes over the years.

"At that time (1964) the campus consisted of the 1A building. There was no library and no facilities for extracurricular activities. We had to go off campus for student events. It was during this time that W.A.C. Bennett announced the start of the '67 building. "The federal and provincial governments placed BCIT in a priority position when it came to funding."

Recalling, with fondness, the strict dress code for students and instructors, Ralph says, "I felt that it was a good idea and everyone went along with it with few objections.'

Some things at BCIT have not changed though.

BCIT students.

"They are really great," Ralph says, "we are still getting the cream of the crop; they make my job most interesting.'

When Ralph joined BCIT as a teaching assistant in 1968 after a two-year stint with Canada Packers, he found himself working with two of his ex-instructors -Ron Hyde and Sid Andersen. "It felt kind of strange at the time," he smiles.

Teaching at BCIT is obviously a labour of love for easy-going Ralph. He has seen a lot of changes in the past 19 years and in looking to the future he comments, "we ain't seen nothing yet."

Forest Products instructor Barry McKinney received the Alumni Association award for "recognition of his perserverance and dedication in ensuring that BCIT would stand out as a learning institute" at the Annual General Meeting

Barry graduated in 1969 in what was then called the wood option of the Forest Products Technology. He travelled extensively before returning to BCIT in 1979 as an assistant instructor in Lumber and Plywood.

In 1980 Barry took on the job of trying to find and contact all BCIT grads in Lumber and Plywood. He suggested and developed the Bullsheet, a newsletter that all Alumni in his technology receive. He successfully organized several reunions and workshops. This past spring he

organized a computer quality control program in which Alumni spent one day at a mill followed by a social program.

Barry has developed a strong allegiance among Lumber and Plywood Alumni and has served the Alumni as a whole by sitting on the BCIT Board of Directors as an Engineering Rep and as Secretary from 1980 - 1982.

Out-going Alumni President Michael Deane gave a report on the past year to Board members at the Annual General Meeting

"It was basically a quiet year," he explained, "with the main emphasis on updating our mailing list which now contains 11,000 Alumni members."

He also pointed out that members were not charged a fee during this year and added that fees charged in future years will be decided on by the new board.

Constitutional changes were made this year. Beginning in May, 1984 the Alumni Board of Directors will be elected by mail-in ballots allowing all members the opportunity to vote.

An affordable life insurance package for Alumni was made available by the Fidelity Life Insurance Company.

Facility hours are subject to change. Check the weekly facility schedule posted (2 - 3 weeks in advance) outside the Recreation Equipment Office.


Facilities and Services- How to use them

All Alumni are encouraged to use the sports facilities. There are lockers, towel service and laundry services available.

Most equipment is provided on loan; current BCIT identification is mandatory. Racquet sports have a nominal rental fee for balls and birds.

There are many structured programs to participate in as well as plenty of recreation time when the gym is available for your own activity. Check the facility schedule for open and programmed time.

Guests - Alumni can bring one guest into the facility at any time. Guests cannot sign out equipment and are asked to follow all facility regulations.



How To Book Squash & Racquetball Courts

Alumni may book in person or by telephone using their recreational facility card number. Courts may be booked up to seven days in advance. Cost is \$5.50 per court booking.

Arriving To Play

All players are required to check in at the Equipment Office prior to their use of the court.

Late Arrivals

A ten minute grace period is provided for all players to claim their courts. If left unclaimed, they may be used by someone else.

Vacating Courts

Players must vacate their courts at the end of the specified booking period whether the game has ended or not. Failure to observe court courtesy rules will result in loss of playing privileges.

Procedure for Playing Badminton, Tennis Table Tennis

Bookings are made on a first come, first served basis with no charge for court time. You must check in and book the court at the Equipment Office. (No prebooking allowed, forty-five minute court time limit.)

Institution loses an institution

The institution of BCIT recently lost one of its own institutions - Director of Marketing and former Dean of Students, Jerry Lloyd.

Jerry left at the end of October to take up the duties of Principal of PVI's Sea Island campus in Richmond.

He began his career at the Institute in September 1969 as coordinator of student activities and, in 1971, was made coordinator of student affairs.

"One of my duties at that time," he grins, "was walking around at exam time with a bag of neckties - handing them out to male students who had left theirs at home. BCIT, under Principal Cecil Roper, had a strict dress code:skirts and blouses for females; jackets and ties for males. This was an attempt to market BCIT students to employers as executive material.

"I served on the Traditions Committee whose major debate focused on the wearing of pant suits by women students, a very serious matter in that they were the style of the day."

Jerry recalls with amusement the time some Mining students approached him for permission to use BCIT's recreation facility (then located at PVI) for a dance at which they planned to serve beer.

"After they received the go-ahead from then-Principal Goard and assured me they would leave the place clean I OK'd it."

"The morning after the dance I was summoned to Goard's office. 'I think we have a problem' he said.'"

"Turns out the 'dance' was the student's annual stag and a commissionaire reported seeing 200 men watching naked women dancing on stage."

He also had to deal with the crusading

Jack Smuggler, editor of the student newspaper The Link.

"Jack mounted a campaign to do away with the dress code and appeared in his publication as the centerfold wearing nothing but a great long tie.

"He also opposed the annual campus queen contest and was instrumental in having it abolished after entering it one year in drag."

Mischievous antics of the student kept Jerry busy through the years. He once had a 3 a.m. call to drive to Blaine to bail out a group who had become unruly at an Engineering Society stag. Many a night he was summoned to the old Willingdon residence to haul skinny-dipping students out of the pool.

Jerry's career at BCIT includes many proud and rewarding moments.

"One of the most satisfying to me was the opening of the Maquinna Residence, feel that we truly became a campus at that time, in line with the universities."

He has also had an excellent rapport with the students and the affection they hold for him is obvious in the many citations and awards he has received from them.

Of BCIT, he says, "BCIT is a fantastic institute, it puts great students into the marketplace, it has a solid reputation in industry in the province and has really come of age.

"I have had the opportunity to work with a great group of people and consider the Campus Life group to be among the greatest bunch I have known.

"One thing I would like to see at the Institute, however, is the return to extra mural athletics to campus, students should have the opportunity to participate in these team sports as do students in the universities and most community colleges. "Ten years down the road they may not remember the great lectures they had at BCIT but they are sure to recall that great trip to Trail."

Jerry is excited about his PVI appointment. "It's one hell of a challenge for me, I'm looking forward to getting my head back into the academic side of education. I feel that the next five years will see a tremendous growth for that campus as more and more people are seeking skilled trades.

All Jerry's friends and colleagues at BCIT, as well as Alumni who have worked with him, wish him well but in the words of his assistant/secretary, Joyce Payton "we're going to miss him."


