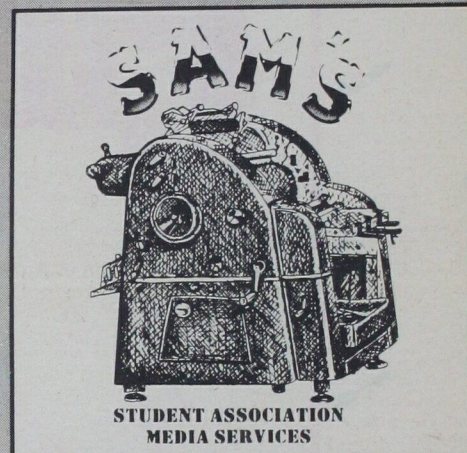

Student aid up this year

Statistics released by the Ministry of Post-Secondary Education (now the Ministry of Continuing Education and Job Training) show that Victoria almost quadrupled the amount of aid offered to students this year over last.

However, this year's total of \$17.8 million is still just over half the amount distributed in 1982/83, when \$33 million was available. In 1983/84, B.C. dropped its contribution to \$14.9 million, followed by an 83 per cent tumble to \$2.8 million in 1984/85. Last year, the figures show Victoria provided \$4.6 million for student aid, almost all of that in the form of loans.

Canadian Federation of Students researcher Rosanne Moran said that while the amount of aid is increasing, there are still serious defi-

ciencies in the B.C. student assistance plan. Moran complained of the current emphasis on achievement-based aid and employment programs dressed up as student aid.

Moran said of the \$17.8 million, \$5.9 million is poured into job-related programs like Work Study. Another \$4.3 million is slated to be lent to students, with \$4.9 million to be distributed in scholarships. The remainder falls into a potpourri of categories like loan remission and adult basic education assistance. She said before April 1, 1984, the bulk of government student aid was in the form of grants.

The government eliminated the grants April 1, 1984. Some 17,000 students had received grants in 1983.

Moran said B.C. student assistance plan should

eliminate the provision which requires students to borrow the maximum federal loan (\$100/week) before qualifying for provincial assistance.

Some financial aid officers at B.C. post-secondary institutions have made biting comments on the current plan. Catherine McNeely at Cariboo College suggests the least the government can do is make the interest on student loans tax deductible. Maria Gomes at Malaspina College

calculated that in 1983/84 students there received \$428,768 in aid from the province, compared to \$122,900 in 1986/87.

Nels Grinewall at the University of Victoria has complained of the government's lack of aid for single parents and rural students. Grinewall estimates \$607 a month is needed by rural students, but they are provided with a maximum of \$552 a month. Grinewall also op-

poses the government's policy of refusing welfare to students. Jennifer Orum, BCIT financial aid officer, was unavailable for comment on the B.C. student assistance plan.

In B.C., students now about 15 per cent of the cost of their university education. Economist Michael Walker at the Fraser Institute however, has suggested 50 per cent would be an 'ideal' amount for students to pay.

Provincial enrollment stable at colleges

Despite the wild fluctuations annually in the amount of student aid made available, B.C. government statistics indicate enrollment at colleges and institutes has not dramatically shifted from 1983/84 to 1985/86.

Since the April 1, 1984 elimination of student grants, the 1985/86 B.C. post-secondary enrollment report issued by Victoria shows full-time equivalent student enrollment in non-vocational programs has increased by almost 500 students prior to this year. There was a drop of 200 in 1984/85, from 22,998 to 22,798. Part-time enrollment showed an increase from 1983/84 to 1985/86, jumping from 33,709 to 35,141.

But the report also shows a drop in full time enrollment in non-vocational programs at BCIT from 1984/85 to 1985/86. BCIT full-time enrollment dropped 0.4 per cent from October 31, 1984 to a year later, with part-time enrollment diminishing by 9.4 per cent. Provincially for colleges and institutes, full-time numbers increased three per cent and part-time went up 0.9 per cent.

Mario Mazziotti, BCIT registrar, told the Link in November that the government bases its statistics on full-time equivalents, which do not always equal the actual number of students enrolled. BCIT also makes regular changes to the programs it offers.

At the university level, Statistics Canada figures show B.C. bucking the national trend since grants were eliminated. Up until 1983/84 B.C. full-time university enrollment almost mirrored the national statistics, with increases recorded annually for more than a decade. But after 1983/84 B.C. full-time university enrollment dropped slightly every year. Nationally, full-time enrollment since 1983/84 has increased every year to its current level of 470,330

students.

According to the Canadian Association of University Teachers, B.C. and Texas are the only two states or provinces which have reduced operating grants to universities during the period 1983/84 to 1985/86.

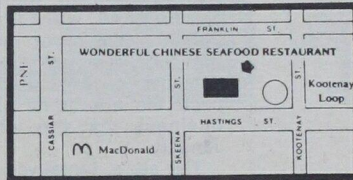
Over that period, Victoria slashed operating grants to universities by 9.7 per cent. Every other province increased university funding. The lowest increase was granted by Prince Edward Island, which provided a 4.7 per cent increase in operating grants to its universities.

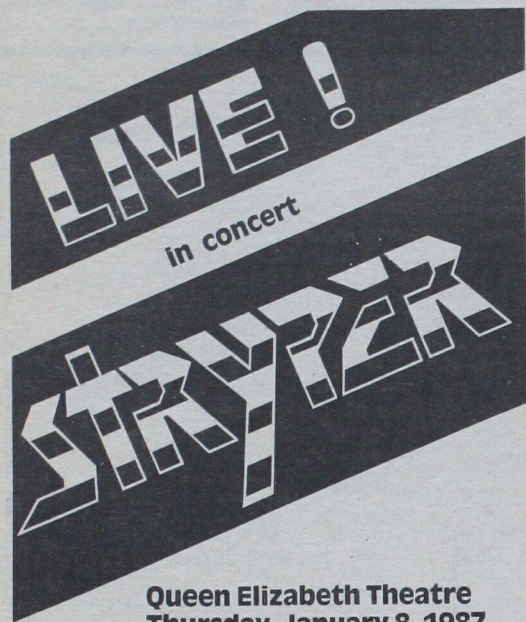

S.A. staff and executive say 'Merry Christmas from the Student Association'

Computer store in the works for BCIT

The BCIT campus will soon have a computer store of its own. The Student Association is working with the administration on the exact details, and with Physical Plant on the exact location, but S.A. assistant business manager Lorne Hildebrand expects the store to be open for business by the end of January.

The store, tentatively to be located in the foyer of the library building (in the area now occupied by pay phones), will specialize in a "100 per cent IBM compatible" computer system developed by Gary Jackle of SFU.

Hildebrand said the system is of good quality and will be offered at a reasonable price.

Hildebrand said the Student Association carefully researched a variety of computer systems with a view to choosing one to make available to BCIT students. He noted that there are a lot of "racketeers out there with systems of indeterminate quality." He said the store will serve both the "entry level" student looking for a basic word processing system, as well as the "exit level" or graduating student, wanting to leave BCIT with a full blown system and all the software.

"This store could become the most important S.A. business on campus because of the computerized, technical nature of this institute," said Hildebrand, who added that the store represented a first for a student union in B.C. "We're

making history here," said Hildebrand. Across Canada, on campus computer sales are usually conducted by bookstores or computer departments, but rarely, if ever, by a student union, said Hildebrand.

Hildebrand said he expects the most popular Jackle system will be one retailing for about \$2200, although less expensive but expandable systems will be available. The equipment will have a one year warranty on parts and labour, the store will also carry a selection of peripheral equipment as well as software and other systems.

"The S.A. executive has put a lot of effort into this project," said Hildebrand. He added that there has been a lot of support for the project coming from the administration and students, who are expected to purchase as many as 500 computers from the store in its first year alone.

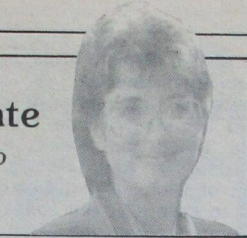


program.

With the likes of Eddie Money, Eddie and the Cruisers, John Eddie, Southside Johnny and (John) Bon Jovi, the land of Springsteen is enjoying substantial chart success. New Jersey, the Rodey Dangerfield of the United States should finally be getting some respect (musically at least, if not for creativity in names). You can make an addition to this list, the Smithereens.

The Smithereens debut record *Especially for You* is definitely one of the best releases by a new band this year. While all the names mentioned above reside in the showdow of Springsteen's style and sound, the Smithereens display the talent to transcend this. Though they will not surpass Springsteen's popularity they will find an audience all their own.

Formed in 1980, the band consists of vocalist Pat DiNizio, guitarist Jim Babjak, Bass player Mike Mesaros and drummer Dennis Diken. They combine rock, pop and folk to create a sound reminis-

cent of the British Invasion with an American edge.

There are 12 songs on this record including a fine first single 'Blood and Roses', a passionately tough song. 'Hand of Glory' and 'I Don't Want to Lose You' are songs the Romantics could have written. 'Time and Time Again' is a rocker in the vein of Roy Orbison's 'Pretty Woman.'

The playing is great, especially Babjak's gummy guitar. DiNizio's vocals are comparable to Elvis Costello's but a little stronger.

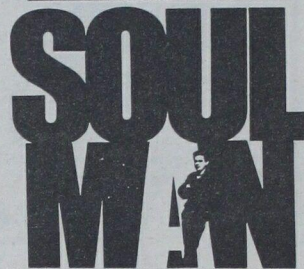
To top it all off, DiNizio is also a great songwriter.

BCIT's air goes clean January 1st

"It is the Policy of the British Columbia Institute of technology that a smoke-free environment be provided for employees, students and visitors. Smoking is, therefore, restricted to specially designated areas throughout the Institute."

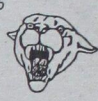
