It's Flu Season

The 'flu' vaccine has arrived at Medical Services

Yes - the vaccine is effective.

The vaccine reduces upper respiratory illness (25%) and related absenteeism (43%) inn healthy adults. It prevents 70 percent of pneumonia and influenza-related hospitalization among the community-residing elderly. Among elderly nursing home residents, the vaccine reduces illness by 30-40%, hospitalizations and pneaumonia by 50-60% and deaths by 85%.

You cannot get the flu from the vaccination.

Influenza vaccination cannot cause influenza because the vaccine doenot containlive virus. The most common side effect is arm soreness lasting up to two days.

The influenza vaccine (flu shot) provided by the Ministry of Health will be available free at Medical Services to the following:

A. People at high risk:

1. Adults with chronic heart of lung disorders severe enough to require regualr medical follow-up or hospital care.

2. People 65 years or older.


3. Adults with chronic conditions such as diabetes and other metabolic diseases, cancer, immuniodeficency, immuniosuppression (including that of recent transplant patioents), kidney disease, anemia, etc.

B. Care Providers: Individuals potentially capable of transmitting influenza to those at risk should be given the vaccine. This refers to health care and other primary caregivers who have extensive contact with people in the high risk groups, including students and Instructors in the Clinical areas.

If you do n ot qualify under the above guidelines, you may get the vaccine at Medical Services.

Students pay back loans faster than corporations

Students are more likely to repay government loans than some of Canada's leading corporations, government figures show.

This past spring, the Canadian Taxpayers Federation, a conservative lobby group, released a study examining Industry Canada grants and loans between April 1982 and October 1997.

The study-based on ministry figures the group obtained through an Access to Information request-reveal that during this period

Industry Canada dished out \$3.2 billion in repayable, and conditionally-repayable contributions to businesses.

Conditionally-repayable contributions are loans with repayment schedules based on royalty or sales agreements.

According to the group's report, only 15 per cent of all these loans have been repaid.

One of the worst offenders was aircraft giant Bombardier. A Consulting and Audit Canada report made public this summer showed that by 1996, the Montreal-based company had repaid a mere five per cent of the millions of dollars it had received in loans and grants over 21 projects.

In contrast, the latest federal government figures reveal that 80 per cent of students pay back their Canada Student Loans without incident, while 13 per cent repay their loans after defaulting at least once. In other words, 93 per cent of students eventually repay their Canada Student Loans.

Some opposition members of parliament expressed outrage when informed of the discrepancy in repayment rates between corporations and students.

"If [the federal government] were as stiff on industry as they were on students maybe we wouldn't have a debt," said Libby

Davies, the New Democratic

Party member of parliament and education critic. "This is the type of information that (Finance Minister) Paul Martin must be faced with, to show the government's hypocritical policies."

Student leaders say the federal government is being tough on students while letting business off the hook.

They site recent changes to the Bankruptcy and Insolvency Act intended to combat student loan defaults as an example of the Liberals' new tough approach. The revamped legislation prohibits students from declaring bankruptcy for the first 10 years after they leave school.

That policy is especially unfair in light of the fact that students repay their government loans more than corporations do, students say.

"It's upsetting, to say the least, that there is this level of deferential treatment," said Elizabeth Carlyle, head of the Canadian Federation of Students.

The organization last week said it is preparing to launch a

charter challenge to the bankruptcy legislation on the grounds that it imposes discriminatory limitations on students' banking procedures.

But government officials say comparing Canada Student Loans to Industry Canada loans is problematic. And the Canadian Taxpayers Federation report is flawed on several grounds, says John Banigan, an assistant deputy minister at Industry Canada.

"The federation took one snapshot in time and didn't take into account future royalties we are going to get," Banigan said, adding that Industry Canada loans would be paid through future sales.

The study also focuses on problems that have already been solved, he added. Most of the money outlined in the report came from the now defunct Defense Industry Productivity Program, which was replaced in 1996 by the Technology Partnerships Canada program.

While Banigan says some corporations using the old program

didn't meet repayment targets, the new program has solved these fiscal problems.

Banigan also said programs that received Industry Canada money which failed, thus eliminating royalty potential, would be offset by success stories that can bring returns of 150 to 200 per

But Walter Robinson, executive director of the Canadian Taxpayers Federation, cautions about using the numbers.

"These guys make up figures all the time for political purposes," said Robinson. "Government officials are misleading Canadian taxpayers." He says the government can not accurately estimate royalty potential or guarantee a project's success, nor can it assure taxpayers their money will be returned through future sales.

Robinson also dismissed government assertions that the Technology Partnerships Canada program has solved the problems of the Defense Industry Productivity Program.



Grants help more people, Petter says

Vancouver
The BC government and the
Canadian Federation of
Students (CFS) shared a
podium Thursday to pressure
Ottawa to distribute Millennium
Fund money as grants rather than
scholarships.

Speaking at Douglas College in New Westminster, Andrew Petter, minister for advanced education, training and technology called on the federal government to commit BC's share of the Millennium Fund to a federal grant program that would benefit a broader percentage of BC's student population.

The Millennium Fund, announced last winter by Jean Chretien, is expected to provide about 100,000 Canadian students with \$3,000 a year, starting in the year 2000.

Petter estimates the Millennium Fund will benefit only about 20 per cent of BC students while the BC student grant system currently benefits about 80 per cent. By spreading the money out, Petter said, more students will see their debt reduced.

"It's about time we heard from the federal government that they have a committment to reducing debt. Here's how they can do it without spending a penny more," said Petter.

Petter estimates the province's share of the Millennium Fund at up to \$40 million a year. By adding this money to the existing student grants in BC, the NDP government hopes to extend BC's current two year grant system to four.

Maura Parte, BC chair of the CFS, applauded the minister's announcement and criticised the Liberal government for not instituting a national grant program.

"Instead of doing what was right for students, Chretien did what was flashy," said Parte, pointing out that the Millennium Fund would only help a fraction of students graduating with debt.

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But when asked about how she felt about the fact that those students most in need would be receiving less money under the province's proposal, she said that the CFS hadn't looked at it that way.

"The proposal is short on details, we need to get those details and ensure what they're proposing is going to be best for students."


Whether or not the federal government will consider the BC proposal is also unclear. A

spokesperson for Pierre Pettigrew, Minister of Human Resources Development, said the ministry was not informed of the announcement by press time.

"It's difficult for me to answer because I want to get a little better informed," said Federal Ministry of Human Resources Development press secretary Anna Kapineari.

Kapineari did not rule out the proposal however, saying, "the negotiation process is very flexible"



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
self-titled







destruction and poachers around the world are killing an average of at least one tiger each day. With less than 4,000 tigers remaining in the wild, the tiger is one of the most endangered species on the planet. This being the Chinese Year of the Tiger makes it an especially poignant tragedy, considering that traditional Chinese medicine calls for the use of tiger body parts.

Tiger penis soup goes for up to \$500 a bowl. One tiger is worth \$65,000 to \$70,000; \$15,000 for the pelt alone. Specific body parts of bears, elephants, tigers and rhinos each contain a valuable pharmacological ingredient. The result is decimation of their populations worldwide.

In 1900 there were 80,000 tigers in India. In 1970, there were 1800. In 1990, 4,000. Now, 2,000. There were only 150 Siberian tigers alive in the former Soviet Union last year. In 1997, there were only 60 left.

Three tiger sub-species, the Bali, Javan and Caspian, have

Rivers Day marks change of course

ver 21,000 people celebrated BC Rivers Day this year. Its on the perpetual calendar as the last Sunday in September. Rivers Day is about protecting salmon, rivers, the oceans they run to, and the environment in general. It was founded by our very own Mark Angelo, head of the Fish, Wildlife and Recreation Program here at BCIT way back in 1980. This year alone, over seventy local governments proclaimed the

last Sunday in September as back into False Creek over two Rivers Day.

This year people all over the province cleaned up river banks. planted native vegetation on stream sides, marked storm drains with yellow fish and talked to their neighbors about their local creek or river. One of the highlights was Fin Donnelly's event. He's the young man who swam 1350 kilometers down the Fraser River in 1995 to bring attention to the plight of rivers and salmon. This year he swam 60 km down the Fraser River from Coquitlam, then around and days to Science World in False Creek

At the park beside Science World there was a celebration with river and water-related dances from the Russian, Iranian, Chinese and the Irish communities, a walk-through fish, an electric Porsche, solar-powered gadgets, and 20 displays from everyone from Environment Canada to the Green Pen Company. The Public Dreams Society put on a procession called the 'Spirit of Lost Streams', and ended the day off with a fireshow.

Ozone hole breaks record, says NASA

ASA says that the largest ozone hole yet has formed over Antarctica and that it has expanded earlier than normal.

The hole opens up more than 27 million square km of Earth's surface to DNA-damaging solar radiation. This is about five per cent larger than the previous record hole in 1996 when a 45 per cent depletion of the protective ozone layer occurred over one third of the northern hemisphere when record low temperatures interacting with humanchlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) were blamed as the cause. The massive size of this hole is thought to be caused by a strong polar vortex swirling in the stratosphere increasing ozone destruction by man-made chemi-

The ozone layer is Earth's protective shield that blocks out most of the sun's ultraviolet radiation (UV-B). Increases in UV-B are harmful to humans, plants and animals and affect agricultural production and the marine food chain. The trend in ozone depletion was first observed in the early 1970's.

Eco-Briefs

In the Antarctic Spring of 1995, the surface covered by the ozone hole phenomena exceeded 20 million square kilometres at its maximum spread for over 40 days. With its appearance in August to its last days in earl December, the event was the longest lasting on record.

The Arctic ozone layer is about 25 per cent thinner than it was before 1980 in lower Canadian latitudes, the ozone layer is about seven per cent thinner. More than 60,000 Canadians developed skin cancer last year; of these, about 3,200 were diagnosed with melanoma, which can

Canadians in top 12 of nature destroyers

ne third of Earth's natural wealth has been lost over the past 25 years, and Canada stands at number 12 as one of the worst offenders in the world, according to a report by the World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF).

The ratings are based on a "living planet index" which WWF hopes will become the equivalent of the Dow Jones stock index.

According to the Vancouver Sun last week, WWF researchers looked at the human consumption of forests, freshwater and marine species, carbon dioxide emissions and the use of cement in 152 countries between 1970 and

Their report showed that forests declined by about 10 per cent, and from 1990 to 1995 by 0.5 per cent a year. Fresh-water ecosystems heave been damaged by 50 per cent since 1970, while the use of fresh water doubled since 1960, now more than half the accessible supply. Marine ecosystems declined by 30 percent up to 1990 and at a rate of four per cent per year to 1995. Fish consumption more than doubled with most of the planet's fish resources fully exploited or in decline. Carbon dioxide emissions have more than doubled since 1960, far outstripping nature's ability to absorb them.





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
