When pressed for more positive action on improvements to the student aid program in BC McGeer repeatedly referred to the federal/ provincial task force on student aid.

There is a national task force at work addressing the specific questions you have raised said McGeer "No doubt there will be recommendations that will be applied across the country. We're certainly hoping for action by the federal government.
suspect all provincial governments, including ours, will be taking specific action in the not too distant future.

McGeer was also questioned about the provincial govern ment's role in setting tuition fees, to which he denied having any influence over either the University Council or individua campuses
'It has been our policy in the past, it is our policy now, and will be our policy in the future that the institulo win determine their own fees. 'said Geer


Malcolm Elliot, chairperson of the BC Student Federation, the group that organized the day's activities, said at a news conference later that McGeer's remarks had 'circumvented' the issues, 'all of which were valid'. The emphasis he (McGeer) placed on the task force for resolving the student aid question is totally unacceptable. There have been serveral task forces in the past, no resolutions have come from these task forces, some of which have not even published their findings... others McGeer has hung onto without making changes. cont'd on page two

## Indoor plants

Starting seeds indoors paying 99 cents for six scrawny marigolds this summer? You really don't have to. For tha same amount of money you could buy two packs of seeds and easily produce many times more plants.
Right now is the time to get started on bedding plants for your flower garden as well as vegetable plants for your back yard. First you need a bright, warm spot (like on the kitchen of the refridgerator. (
Avoid a position too close to a Avoid a position too close to a sou with overheated seedlings or dehydrated soil Choose what dehydrated soil. Choose what ever seeds you desire; read the time of year the seeds are best planted and what depth the seeds like to be planted at. If the label doesn't state what the depth, then if it's fine seed, scatter on the top of the soil, press down lightly to get good seed-soil contact. Or, if its larger seed, make either shallow trenches or individual holes about two or three times deeper than the size of the seed.
The soil mixture, for best results, should not be soil from the garden. Use a commercially prepared mixture for starting
seeds, or make up your own
with equal parts sand, perlite, and peat moss. Make sure the soil has been thoroughly dampened (but not soggy) before spreading it out firmly into containers.
The container you choose will depend upon what and how many you have decided to grow A half dozen tomarily pents, for instance, could easily be started in a sour cream container Larger numbers for if they are be easier to care for if they are grown in plastic 'flats' which are inexpensive, reusable, and available at most garden cent ers. Other alternatives to soil medias are peat pots, or
ient 'Jiffy' peat pellets.
Keep the sil moist at all times while the seeds are germ, inat ing. If you are away at school ing. If you are away at schoo
most of the day, and can't ge mome to water your seeds, arrange a plastic bag over the soil to keep the moisture from escaping. Once the seedlings start popping up, remember to loosen or remove the plastic. The seedlings can be shifted into individual containers or into the garden if its warm enough, as soon as serveral 'true' leaves appear (they look like the rea thing, only smaller). If the plants are to be left for a long period in a crowded container weak solution of fertilizer
