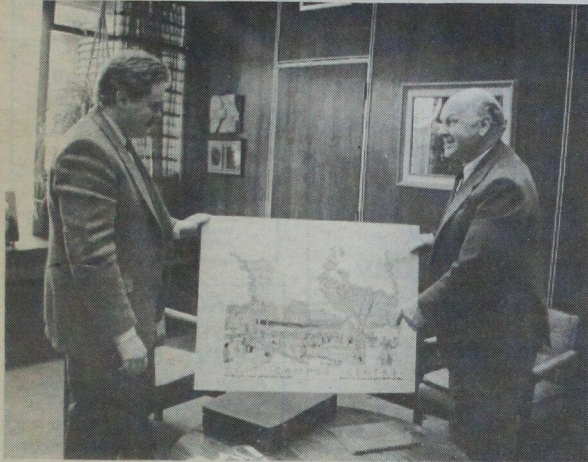

## Illegal suites under fire

A Vancouver city council committee agreed last week to start cracking down on illegal suites.

But the crackdown will only put the squeeze on a large number of students and other people and cause rents to rise across the city, warns Canadian Federation of Students executive officer Steven Scott.

Vancouver City Council

plans to step up enforcement of single-family zoning but Mayor Campbell says it does not mean city hall will send an army of people seeking to find illegal suites.

Nevertheless students representative Steven Scott says the crackdown will affect a large number of students, many of them are now living in illegal suites he charged.

"We will have to make a

representation to council. Maybe the thing to do is to make the suites legal and rezone some neighbourhoods to multiple dwelling units."

Scott says students should be concerned because students are always trying to make end meet, especially those students who live on government loans which allot \$220 per month for rental costs, while Scott says the real cost is higher.

## S.A. commits another \$7000 to proposed Campus Centre

The BCIT Student Association moved another step closer toward a sod turning ceremony for late spring that will mark the beginning of a \$5.2 million project. Campus Center coordinator Troy Nagy received approval from the S.A. to borrow \$100,000 to pay for architectural fees and money owing to date to the private fund raiser currently under contract.

The cost of the loan will be about \$7,000 and the total amount will be paid back within a year from money which will be received when next year's students pay their student activity and building fee levies.

Nagy told the student ex-

ecutive that BCIT President Roy Murray had approved the loan with a "letter of comfort" which will insure the bank charges a reasonable rate of interest. Nagy also sought and received approval from the executive for the fund raising plan which will include a request from the provincial government for \$1.4 million and donations from private industry totalling \$610,000.

Nagy had no difficulty receiving support for his plans and promised his next effort will be to seek approval of his plans on behalf of BCIT students from the Board of Governors on February 23.

## AIDS information available at BCIT Medical Services

Medical Services on campus is prepared to answer more questions about AIDS and are hearing from more students since the subject of AIDS education hit the front pages of Lower Mainland papers, according to Registered Nurse James Morrow.

Saying inquiries have increased ten-fold over the past week, Morrow notes that one of the main reasons for heightened concern about AIDS is the fact that people are beginning to realize AIDS is not a "gay disease".

Most inquiries to Medical Services have focussed on the question "What is safe sex and what does it mean?", said Morrow.

Morrow says all students inquiring about AIDS and safe sex are referred to the doctors on duty and are free to chat about the issue: students are also given a pamphlet produced by AIDS Vancouver which outlines "Guidelines for Safer Sex".

The pamphlet says safe sex includes, "kissing (without exchange of saliva), massage, hugging, petting, using your own sex toys, masturbation and fantasy."

The pamphlet says, "possibly safe sex" is, "tongue kissing, fellatio (blowjobs) with or without condoms, watersports (urine contact), vaginal intercourse (with a condom), anal intercourse (with a condom) and cunnilingus (oral-vaginal contact).

"Unsafe sex" is said to be, "vaginal or anal intercourse without a condom, blood contact of any kind (including menstrual blood and sharing needles or syringes), oral-anal contact, or sharing sex toys."

AIDS Vancouver's pamphlet also suggests people understand "basic condom sense" about how to use a condom, while James Morrow of Medical Services says, "We do receive some

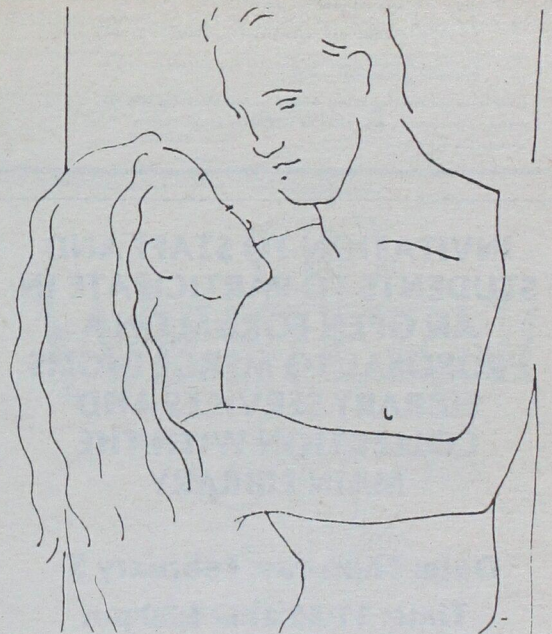
samples of condoms and the pill," which are given to students who ask for samples.

Said Morrow, "Some people shut themselves completely up with fear but when they come here they do chat with the doctors."

Morrow believes the education of recent media attention

to AIDS will help prevent the spread of the disease and that use of condoms must be included in the education programs, which must start as early an age as possible.

Asked about recent criticism of AIDS and condom use education Morrow says it is too bad religious beliefs do interfere.

A four per cent hike in student fees was approved last week by UBC's board of governors raising a first year Arts student's annual fee to \$1380.

Administrators at Simon Fraser University have proposed a 4.4 per cent hike

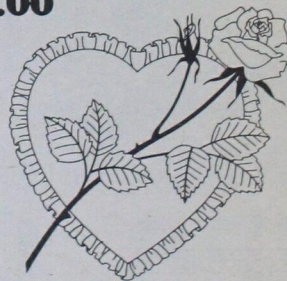
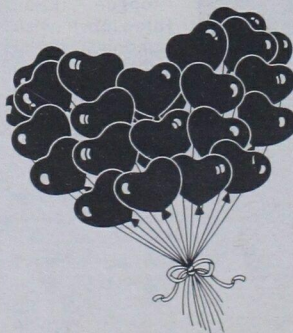

## S.A. sends two to Chicago

At its general Monday executive meeting the student association decided to support wood products manufacturing students on their way to Oregon, send two executive members to Chicago and collect more money for needy students on campus.

The executive accepted a proposal from two wood products manufacturing students that called for \$400 to support eight students who will attend a computer simulation competition in Portland Oregon. BCIT students have won the competition in the past two years and they've won big: last year local students defeated representatives from 75 companies in the wood products industry.

Said one executive member, "the publicity the school receives from this event is great and it proves we're producing top quality graduates."

Cheryl MacNaughton, V.P. P.R. and Marketing and Andrea Bartlett, V.P. Administration and Finance, will attend a young entrepreneurs conference in Chicago. The trip will cost the S.A. \$830 for air tickets.

Health Society Chairperson

Terry Gaetz questioned the proposed journey asking why MacNaughton and Bartlett had not attended a young entrepreneurs conference recently held in Vancouver.

Bartlett said the federal Development Bank had organized the local conference and it was not a student conference. Both MacNaughton and Bartlett will be required to report to the student society on their trip when they return.

Business manager Phil Henderson reported the Needy Student Fund is 'underway' and has collected almost four thousand dollars. Under a program sponsored by the provincial government funds collected by the S.A. will be matched equally by the province to a maximum of \$14 thousand. The S.A. plans to donate ten cents per drink from Tuesday pub nights to the cause as well as money from pinball machines and scholars dollars which students can donate in the Student Activity Centre.

All money collected is distributed by the Financial Aid office to BCIT students who are in difficult financial situations.

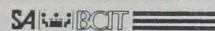

## Thrill of his lifetime

If Thrill of a Lifetime or the latest rerun of the Vietnam war, Platoon, rank highly on your entertainment calendar then the current live drama "Mulroney in Africa" main seem less than sexy. But how wrong our perception may be!

A recent vote at the University of B.C. campus has proven our attention is not exactly focused on African affairs: a paltry 15 percent of UBC's worldly undergrads showed up to vote last week on the South African issue, and those who did vote turned down an option to ban the sale of South African related products on campus.

At BCIT, arguably a less worldly place - it's fitting the South African question has barely been raised - students who have shown support in the past for Brian Mulroney may have to lift their next glass of ale in a toast to a meeting between their political mentor and the leader of the African National Congress, President Oliver Tambo.

As we rush to buy our next glass of Carling/South African related beer we might consider the following: among the conservative student body the ANC is perceived to be a Marxist band of guerillas waging war on racist South Africa whose government, it is argued, is trying hard to achieve democracy in the face of an impending communist (ANC) victory.

So what's Canada's Prime Minister doing calmly saying he would like to be the first western leader to meet in person with the ANC. And why does the nation's leading Tory not denounce the ANC's guerilla war against Pretoria even in the context of an electorate who appear not to support Mulroney's government

imposed sanctions?

Cynics will answer the Prime Minister is trying to upstage Three's Company and bury the Oerlikon affair in a wave of dancing, drum-beating, and cheering crowds of Zimbabwe.

A more plausible explanation may be that Brian - having imposed the most effective sanctions of any western country having reduced Canadian/South African trade by half - has come to believe what both the U.S. and Britain refuse to believe: that the black dominated governments of the front line states and the future black government of South Africa must be given legitimate status or be lost as allies to the west.

The next gulp of Carling may be bitter for some Tories as the government comes closer to supporting Marxist Zimbabwe, but the planned meeting with Oliver Tambo may be too much to accept.

Such a meeting, as a final scene in the "Mulroney in Africa" drama should really be applauded, as should the PM's comments that he understands why the ANC has embraced violence. The ANC has embraced violence in response to state violence meted out against the black population on a daily basis. Mr. Mulroney's trick will be to convince the beer-sipping television-viewing electorate that sanctions against South Africa and support for the black front-line states is a rational long term goal which will ensure closer ties between Canada and southern Africa.

For Brian Mulroney this winter's African trip may just turn out to be his very own thrill of a lifetime.

which will raise the average cost of an undergraduate's fee to \$1410. The University of Victoria is proposing a similar hike - the board of governors of both SFU and UVic will vote on increases later this month.

BCIT student fees may be discussed at the February 23 board meeting, but Secretary to the board Pat Maertz said the agenda has not been drawn up. She added the tuition fee discussion may have to wait until March.

Planned tuition fee hikes at UBC have angered students - at least a small number are lobbying Victoria for reduced student fees - Vanessa Geary of the Coalition for Accessible Education said, "the government has a responsibility to shoulder the burden."

A graduate student representative charged, "UBC tuition is among the highest in Canada."

At Simon Fraser University vice president of Finance Ernie Scott said, "From a needs standpoint we could have proposed a much larger increase, but we realize there are limits to what students can be expected to pay." He added, "Access is being discouraged by high fees...and a student aid program that is less generous than any other province."

Fee hikes come on the heels of a Canadian Federation of Students task force report calling for lower tuition fee and an improved student aid package.



## BCIT volleyballers take tourney by storm

By Christmas the BCIT Women's Volleyball team had competed half their season with a six win, two loss record. Their effort earned them a first place tie with three other colleges: Trinity Western University, Vancouver Community College and the eighth ranked team in Canada, Cariboo College of Kamloops.

Last weekend the Totem Colleges Athletic Association continued with their third league tournament of the year at Capilano College. While teams such as Cariboo, VCC and Trinity continued to lose to each other and to teams lower in the standings, the BCIT team kept rolling along. When the day was over, BCIT emerged as number one in B.C., winning all four of their games to up their season record to ten wins, 2 losses.

BCIT began the day by thrashing Douglas College 15-4, 15-7. BCIT then played their most important game of the day, defeating VCC 15-11, 5-15, 15-18. They then defeated Royal Roads Military College 15-8, 15-4, and the completed the day by squeaking out a 15-8, 12-15, 15-11 victory over upstart Capilano College.

The last tournament of the year before playoffs is at

Selkirk College in Castlegar, on February 14. BCIT will have to face Selkirk, Trinity, Malaspina and Cariboo, and only the top four teams in the conference gain berths to provincial championships, slated to be held at Capilano College on March 7th.

BCIT is expected to be placed on the CCAA top ten ranking of Canada by early next week, replacing Cariboo College in the standings.

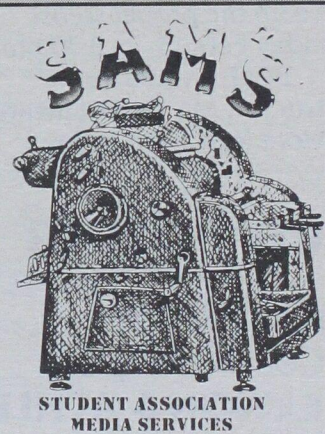
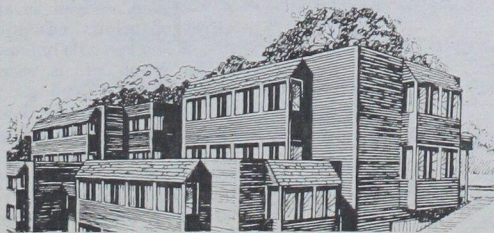

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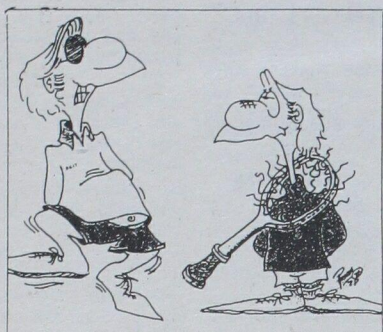

## Grouse ready for Ski BCIT

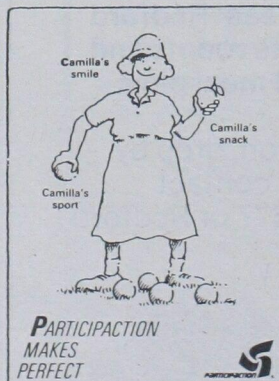

**Georgia Satellites**  
86 Street Music Hall

It's a proven fact that certain things don't mix: oil and water, religion and politics, surf music and rip-roaring country rock...wait a sec, surf music and country rock? What the hell?

Let me explain. Last Wednesday, 101-CFMI in conjunction with 86 Street Music Hall at the Expo site put on one such event. And not only that, somehow it worked. It was strange, but it worked.

CFMI was already involved with a "fun and sun" exhibition at 86 Street when the Georgia Satellites became available to do a show. Considering the Satellites are climbing up the charts with their kick-ass rocker "Keep Your Hands to Yourself", they were snapped up.

The result of this is the "Surf Kings" -- an amusing mix of comedy and Beach Boy era rock -- played a few sets of cute tunes before the Satellites came on. This was followed by a fashion show/beauty contest but, well, enough said about that. Like many folks I was there for the main event.

The Georgia Satellites were to put their boots to the stage at 11:15 but, alas, my digital said 11:38 when the boys got it going. Simply put, that was a tragedy -- the band should have gone on at least an hour earlier (some people do work y'know).

The group had a quick rise in the biz since their self-titled debut was released late last year. And considering the

A highlight of the show was cover versions of Chuck Berry and Jerry Lee Lewis songs. Best of all though had to be Eddie Cochran's "Something Else" -- you just know the guys have played it 1000 times and it just keeps getting better.

"Nights of Mystery" and "Railroad Steel" were tight. No theatrics for these guys, they just rock out.

The only really disappointing moment of the evening came when some girls in bikinis came onstage to be filmed with the band. The guys had stopped playing -- this set off a chorus of boos. ## NRBQ and Bruno Gerussi's Medallion Commodore Ballroom Thursday Jan. 29th

The New Rhythm & Blues Quartet is proof positive that you needn't know every song in a band's repertoire to have fun. If you know more than four of NRBQ's songs, you know more than I do, and I had a great time.

NRBQ is four talented New York musicians who play the most unlikely combination of songs. Yet they pull them off with aplomb. NRBQ opened with "Put Another Nickel in the Nickelodeon" featuring the keyboards of Terry Anderson. Anderson looks like a cross between Carly Simon and Todd Rundgren belting out chords on his clarinet like a crazed chimp. The group rocked and bopped through a set of originals including "When Things Was Cheap", the R&B flavoured "Get Rhythm" and the teen heart-breaker "Riding in My Car". They even launched into a

rousing rendition of "Micheal Row The Boat Ashore", much to the delight of five hundred hard-core fans.

NRBQ's good mix of jazz and rock that swings hard kept the Commodore's spring-loaded dance floor busy while their quirky sense of humour kept the tone light and the show worth the price.

Backing up NRBQ was "Bruno Gerussi's Medallion", the pet project of Vancouver rock critic, Tom Harrison. Harrison, 34, fronts the band because he says "I used to drum, but not very well". Now two years old, the band played their first gig Nov. 1984 at the Waterfront, then a haven for Latin music.

Harrison keeps a wry sense of humour on stage. Referring to guitarist Jimmy Walker's (ex of Dawn Patrol) off-the-wall pants, Harrison gibed "he was married in those pants, they've never been off".

Their set of songs conjured up images from an acid flashback. A cover of The Seeds of Time "My Hometown" opened the show, followed by the sixties nostalgia of The Kinks "Dead End Street" and The Electric

Prunes "Get Me to The World On Time". Ending the set was "Bruno Gerussi's Medallion", Harrison's tribute to the star of The Beachcombers. "What's your secret man? / How do you do it? / Scram kid, you bug me!"

Bruno Gerussi's Medallion was a lot of feedback and a lot of fun Tom, but don't quit your day job.

### ANSWERS

- YES. PEOPLE OF ANY AGE MAY HAVE DISEASES OF THE HEART OR BLOOD VESSELS.
- YES. THERE ARE MANY DISEASES TO THE HEART AND OF THE ARTERIES AND VEINS THAT AFFECT VARIOUS PARTS OF THE BODY IN ADDITION TO THE HEART, INCLUDING THE KIDNEYS AND BRAIN. A FEW OF THE MORE COMMON CONDITIONS ARE LISTED HERE:  
CORONARY HEART DISEASE  
CORONARY HEART DISEASE EXISTS WHEN THE CORONARY ARTERIES THAT NOURISH THE HEART BECOME THICKENED AND NARROWED BY A DEPOSIT OF CHOLESTEROL AND OTHER FATTY MATERIALS IN THE INNER WALL. THIS DISEASE IS CALLED ATHEROSCLEROSIS. IF THE ARTERIES BECOME MUCH NARROWED, HEART ATTACK MAY FOLLOW.  
KIDNEY DAMAGE  
WHEN THE ARTERIOLES (SMALL ARTERIES) OF THE KIDNEY ARE NARROWED OR IF THEY ARE BLOCKED AS A RESULT OF ATHEROSCLEROSIS, THE KIDNEYS ARE NOT ABLE TO FUNCTION NORMALLY.  
HYPERTENSIVE HEART DISEASE  
HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE MAY EVENTUALLY AFFECT THE HEART AND RESULT IN HYPERTENSIVE HEART DISEASE.  
PNEUMATIC HEART DISEASE  
PNEUMATIC FEVER MAY DAMAGE THE HEART VALVES, CAUSING RHEUMATIC HEART DISEASE. ALTHOUGH RHEUMATIC FEVER IS MORE COMMON IN CHILDHOOD, MANY ADULTS SUFFER FROM THE RESULTING HEART VALVE DAMAGE.  
CONGENITAL HEART DEFECTS  
SOME BABIES ARE BORN WITH DEFECTIVE HEARTS. THESE HEART DEFECTS VARY BOTH AS TO KIND AND SEVERITY.  
VARICOSE VEINS (SWOLLEN VEINS)  
THIS IS AN EXAMPLE OF A COMMON DISORDER OF THE VEINS. IT AFFECTS THE LEGS

- YES. IN CANADA MORE PEOPLE DIE OF DISEASES OF THE HEART AND BLOOD VESSELS THAN OF ANY OTHER CAUSE.
- NO. THE MAJORITY OF PEOPLE WITH HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE HAVE NO SPECIFIC WARNING SYMPTOMS. THE ONLY WAY TO KNOW IS TO HAVE YOUR BLOOD PRESSURE CHECKED.
- YES. OFTEN SURGERY CAN HELP OR CURE THE CHILD. SEE YOUR DOCTOR.
- YES. SOME PEOPLE WITH PERFECTLY GOOD HEARTS HAVE SLIGHT MURMURS. YOUR DOCTOR WILL TELL YOU WHEN A MURMUR IS A SIGN OF HEART DISEASE.
- YES. DOCTORS CAN USUALLY PREVENT RHEUMATIC FEVER BY PROMPT AND THOROUGH TREATMENT OF STREPTOCOCCAL SORE THROATS AND CERTAIN OTHER STREP INFECTIONS. DOCTORS OFTEN PRESCRIBE REGULAR, CONTINUOUS MEDICATION FOR PATIENTS WHO HAVE HAD RHEUMATIC FEVER IN ORDER TO PROTECT THEM AGAINST STREP INFECTIONS THAT MAY LEAD TO REPEAT ATTACKS OF RHEUMATIC FEVER.
- NO. IF THE EMPLOYER CHECKS WITH A PHYSICIAN TO MAKE SURE THAT THE EMPLOYEE WITH HEART DISEASE CAN WORK AT A PARTICULAR JOB, THERE IS NO SPECIAL RISK.

- YES. SINCE OVERWEIGHT IS A GENERAL HEALTH HAZARD, YOU ARE ACTING TO PROTECT YOUR HEALTH BY LOSING WEIGHT. THE CANADIAN HEART FOUNDATION RECOMMENDS A NUTRITIONALLY SOUND LOW-FAT, LOW-CHOLESTEROL DIET REDUCED IN CALORIES. REDUCING WEIGHT MAY LOWER BLOOD PRESSURE IN SOME PATIENTS.

- IF YOUR ANSWER IS "YES", AWARD YOURSELF A MEDAL OF MERIT - BUT DON'T STOP THERE. WORK WITH YOUR LOCAL HEART ASSOCIATION TO:
  - LET OTHERS KNOW WHAT HELP IS AVAILABLE
  - IMPROVE AND EXTEND PRESENT SERVICES FOR PEOPLE WITH HEART DISEASES.
