Recent raids by the Burnaby RCMP, both uniformed and undfercover, have forced the campus pub to take a closer look at the Liquor Control and Licensing Act. The RCMP have admitted that they are after the pub's license, and, according to the officers who raided BCIT, have the power to revoke the license entirely if the pub does not strictly adhere to the act.

Although the Liquor Licensing branch confirms the Link's suspicions that the police do not have that all-encompassing power, they do have a substantial influence in licensing matters. After the first raid on Friday the 26th of October, the pub security was instructed to check the ID of all patrons entering the pub, regardless of personal recognition. One purpose of the tightened security was to make sure that no underage people were in the pub area, but a second, somewhat more importent reason is brought to light by Ross Duncan, the BCIT pub Manager.



which means entrance to mem-bers only. We are supposed to ask for 'club' ID. We ask for student ID, which is our first choice, but a lot of students don't have ID cards, so a BCIT Library card and driver's license will do'' says Ross. "Our license is hanging by a thin thread.''continues Dun-can "We're not trying to harass the students, but the RCMP are after our license, and they'll pull it if they can. It won't be just a suspension. They didn't make any arrests, although they could have."

any arrests, although they could have." "We didn't really want to check everyone, we would rat-her just do spot checks when necessary"says Duncan. The latest raid occured on October 30th, at which time one uniformed and two undercover RCMP members checked ID of those inside. Pub security had been very successful, so that the police could make no arrests. Ross hopes that the process of checking everyone's ID will eventually be phased out, but so many pub staff members do not always recognize the regulars. Says Ross "The security staff do not work everyday, so not all not work everyday, so not all will recognize the regulars, and so they should expect to have to

so they should expect to have to produce ID." In doing this, the manage-ment hopes to not only protect the pub license, but save any thirsty underage people from a one hundred dollar fine if the

by Nancy McGeer Alcoholism is reaching epid-emic proportions on university and college campuses through-out North America.

out North America. A report from the Ubyssey (UBC's campus paper) indicates thet increasing numbers of students have a drinking probl-em.UBC medical experts and administrators agree that incr-asing numbers of students are easing numbers of students are turning to Alcoholics Anonym-ous, and are seeking psychiatric help to deal with their drinking

Erich Voght, vice-president of culty and student affairs at

faculty and student affairs at UBC, said he is also concerned about the problem. "It's a majour concern of ours. we have people on campus who are only 19 years of age and belong to the AA" Ron Cutler, former director of the Water Street Research group on alcoholism, said that alcohol related social functions contribute to poor student attitcontribute to poor student attitudes toward drinking. He went on to say that "The effects are cumulative...the students go on to accept it (alcohol) as more and more a part of a social function, and even though some students come to university with no experience with alcohol no experience with alcohol, students often join in the festivities to become part of their peer group". Experts say that youth alcoho-lism often begins in high school, and is compounded in the first

and is compounded in the first couple of years in university. Attitudes learned in university can lead to serious middle age alcoholism

alcoholism. Although increasing numbers of students are seeking help for their drinking problems, many won't admit they are alcoholics. Students say "Oh, I'm not an alcoholic, I'm too young to be an alcoholic, I'm too young to be an alcoholic

The facts speak for them-selves----while until recently most members ranged around age 50, most AA members now range from 18 to 30 years old.



Since 1970, the world has been more often than not, awe-stricken at the catastrophic situations that have existed inside the country of Cambodia. Today the world looks on again as this country finds itself amidst war, horror and a famine that has the potential of annihilating the total Cambodian population.

the total Cambodian population. In 1970, Cambodia became engulfed in the Indo-China war. Officials today still argue over figures that properly illustrate the suffering that the country was inflicted with as a result. But modest estimates suggest that between 1.5 and 2 million people lost their lives. nat between 1.5 and 2 million people lost their lives. Shortly after this in 1975, it was the Communist takeover by China backed Pol Pot and his murder-ous Khmer Rouge regime, who systematically decimated more under their bardination. under their 'purification' policy

Since that time at least 2 million Cambodians have been reported

dead or missing. Then there was the invasion that preceded the devastation that is

preceded the devastation that is so evident today. 'In 1978, Vietnam, backed by Russian support, encroached on the Cambodian capital of Pnomh Penh to successfully oust Pol Pot. The capital now reigns under the leadership of Pres-ident Heng Samrin and his army that beats two hundred them that boasts two hundred thou

that boasts two hundred thou-sand men. After the takeover, heavy and fierce guerilla warfare proc-eeded between the ousted Khmer Rouge and the new Samrin Regime, as a result food soon became a factor for both forces. In an effort to starve each side into submission, much of the agricultural land was

destroyed. Today officials esti-mate only 10 to 20 percent of their potential food supply has been harvested, which has now allowed starvation to run ramp-ant. Initial relief efforts were continuously iintercepted by both sides in order to bolster their army

both sides in order to poister their army. As the war continues many of the Cambodian refugees have fled to neighbouring Thailand's border. Here some 165,000, (suf-fering from malaria, dysentry and, of course, starva-tion) have crossed the border to

seek food and medical attention. Amid this, the sagging Pol Pot Regime has been forced to retreat. Now they too find themselves near the Thai bor-der. Here they have beaten, killed and stripped the peasants of any food or medical eventue

of any food or medical supplies they may have had. As a result a definite famine exists, and the bubonic plague seems immenent unless food, and lots of it, arrives soon.

In an effort to find out what was being done I talked to both UNICEF and International Red UNICEF and International Red Cross functionaries here in Vancouver. It was soon learned that both these agencys' efforts in Cambodia have essentially become one co-operated strug-gle to help. Both are acting channels for large food supplies. The Facts: When starvation hits an area invariably the children are affected. Reports from Cambodia say that hardly any children under five are living or are expected to live. Also 80 to 90 percent of all children alive

are suffering from malnutrition. The Red Cross estimates that there are 2.5 million people in need of assistance, 700 thousand of those being the children and old people. Amongst this travesty is the problem that there are only fifty doctors in the country and medical outposts are nearly extinct.

Both UNICEF and the Red Cross figure they have already spent 1.5 million dollars and in the next six months they hope to send at least 200 tons of food and medicine. Since July of this year they have sent 13 relief flights to Pnomh Penh where relief team officials await, to assure supplies reach the people. Other Efforts and Problems:

Many other organizations and countries are involved in aiding the plight of the refugees. In this the "Year of the Child" the United Nations is playing a very Strong part in this appeal to Cambodia. Because of a political snag the U.N., have sent rice, sugar, and other articles like fish nets ina an effort to allow at least some Cambodians to self-sustain themeology themselves

The World Food Programme has so far sent six thousand tons of supplies, and project they will need to send at least thirty thousand tons a month to be effective. And statistics re-leased has the United States³

government down for a thirty million dollar donation so far. Now as the fighting continues to get closer to the Thai border, the relief effort becomes increas-inclus ingly necessary, and increas-ingly difficult. Some families have conceded and have started to filter back into Pnomh Penh Among those that arrive, 90

percent display the swollen bellies and discoloured hair that results from malnutrition. Jour-nalists that have ventured to the area have now ominously re-ferred to the present state as the "Austwitz of Asia".

The efforts of all the organ-izations could help alleviate

much of the problem only if their

much of the problem only if their aid arrives in time. Cambodians, under their present circumstances, are dying at a staggering rate of more than 200 a day. If food is not permitted to enter, in the amounts needed, the legacy of the Cambodians may soon come to an end to an end.




I have recently received representations from the National Union of Students regarding proposed changes to the Canada Student Loans Plan. After carefully considering the arguments which they have put for-ward I would like to bring to your attention the following points. I believe that the most impor-tant change must come in the

decision making process itself. It is imperative, in my view, that the students themselves be allowed to have representation on the Canada Student Loans Plenary Group. Over the past two decades society has come to accept students as responsible accept students as responsible citizens with justified concerns in a number of areas. Univers-ities have opened up many decision making bodies to stud-ent representatives and it is time that this trend spreads to the national level so that students can be involved when decisions which seriously affect their lives are being discussed. I, myself, was the first student represent-ative on the Board of Governors ative on the Board of Governors at the University of British Columbia and I found it to be an invaluable experience.

The availability of the Canada Student Loans Program to a wider sector of the community, and the sensitivity of the prog-ram to minority and disadvantaged groups is another area which must be reviewed. I am concerned that there is no concerned that there is no provision in the present loan program for part-time students and that there are no special provisions for the handicapped students, whose costs are ob-

viously higher than those prov-ided for in the program. Furthermore, I am concerned that there does not seem to be any mechanism for student aid which addresses the particular problems faced by women. The actual distribution of the

funds and the methods used in determining eligibility must also come under review. We must, as a necessary first step, accept the proposition that once an individue has reached the individual has reached the age of majority he/she should be cons-

narosnip. Finally, we should resist the impulse to raise the loan ceiling as a panacea for our student aid problems. Such a move would

only place our young people further into a debt which they cannot maintain and would result in an erosion of the very accessibility which the plan was designed to encourage. The solution is in increasing the grant portion of the program, and I hope that you can persuade your Provincial colleagues of this point. point

I hope that you seriously take I hope that you seriously take into consideration the points which I have made and that we can look forward to some posi-tive changes to the Canada Student Loans Program in the near future.





Dear Editor. I am a member of that 2nd term,1st year psychiatric Nurs-ing class that has built up a reputation as being 'radical minitie' misfits."







Alice Chan Psychiatric Nursing I

In reading this story, you have shared a ''typical'' day in the lives of three psychiatric nurses who just happen to work in a group home for the emotionally disturbed. "Group home!!'' you say to yourself: ''Hey, bet I thought psych. nurses worked only in places like Riverview....deep, dark in-stitutional environments where no one goes unless they have to..but, in a group home?" Welcome to 1979! Yes, psychi-atric nurses work in group homes and in places other than institutions; we also breathe the same air, eat the same kinds of foods, play the same variety of foods, play games as any other human beings. You will find psychiatric

You will find psychiatric nurses working in group homes for the mentally retarded and the emotionally disturbed, in outpatient units in mental hea-lth centres, in infant stimulation programmes on community on programmes, on community ca-re teams, in general hospital settings, and even in conjunc-tion with the Vancouver City Police. (Car 87 does the midnight shift; it's members consist of one psych. nurse and one cop.)

Ask yourself this question and y to answer it as honestly as trv

A

you can: when you think of a psychiatric nurse what kind of mental image comes to mind? In the majority of cases, (please forgive the generalizations this writer may, on occasion, make in the writing of this article) people will conjure up the distorted image of Nurse Ratced in the movie (and the book) "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest." Unlike her, the majority Nest." Unlike her, the majority of psychiatric nurses in prac-tising their profession, play it straight. What, then, is a psychiatric nurse? We all know what a general duty nurse is--or does: the nurse helps physically ill individuals (usually in a hospital environment) to recover from illness and in the perforfrom illness and in the perfor-mance. of nursing care, the nurse attempts to alleviate any suffering of discomfort. Psy-chiatric nurses perform similar duties in their profession: the majority of psychiatric patients are individuals who have emoindividuals who have emotional psychological difficulties. The psych. nurse assists these individuals in learning more effective ways of problem sol-ving culminating in the eventual resolution of the emotional crisis

crisis. Western'society, on the whole (and who says this concept isn't changing), has a rather dis-torted, fearful conceptualization of mental illness. We can't think of mental illness in the same terms of understanding and acceptance as we can for physical illness. It's okay to say that my Uncle Baldwin is in Lion's Gate Hospital for a hernia operation but it's not okay to say that my Uncle Gershwin is in an acute psych. ward in Riverview.

The boundary between sanity and madness (and both terms are being used rather loosely here) is so exquisitely transient. Would you, as a student in a crisis situation, readily utilize the services of a campus coun-sellor if the sign outside the (ir) office door read: Psychiatric office door read: Psychiatric counsellors.? Or would you put counsellors.? Or would you put off your visit until you had attempted suicide for the tenth time, acquiring a bona fide ''label'! from a shrink, before you felt the services of a psychiatric nurse were war-ranted? ranted?

The purpose of this column Mental Notes, is to provide weekly insights and information exchanges to fellow BCIT stu-dents and to share with thw other techs. what we, as psy-chiatric nursing students, experience in our attempts to understand our profession as well as ourselves. In future, we will share with you issues such as: mental retardation, infant development, mental illness, as: mental retardation development, mental chemotherapy, forensic psy-chiatry, to name just a few. Profiles of psychiatric nurses working in different areas of psychiatry will also be included in future columns--just to rein-force the human-ness of the profession.

BCIT to join the ivy league

Not only is it traditional to Not only is it traditional to plant ivy around institutions like ours, it is also a firmly estab-lished houseplant in the north-ern hemisphere. Ivy is a tough plant. It doesn't mind being cold and neglected, which is probably one of the reasons it does so well on campus and in the homes of on campus and in the nomes of students (who are either much too busy doing homework or doing important things like drinking beer).

English Ivy Description: (Hedera helix) is a sturdy vine with dull dark green leaves on paler green stems. The leaves come in many sizes and shapes--the typical three-lobed, fan--The leaves shaped, curly, star-shaped, heart-shaped, or chicken-foot shape. Some kinds have varieshape. Some kinds have varie-gated foliage, that is , leaves that are green and yellow or green and white.

Care: Ivy can grow in low light, but the variegated vari-eties need bright light. They light, but the variegated vari-eties need bright light. They prefer low temperatures (below 70F or 21C), and may start turning yellow if too hot. Ordinary potting soil, which is allowed to go a little bit dry between waterings suits this plant. It requires fertilizing

ENGLISH IVY (Hedera helix)

about once every two months, and not all in the winter. Prune the branches back to make the plant grow more side branches. Special Pests: Mites seem to like ivies, but you can avoid getting this problem by giving your plant showers once a month or so. If you do end up with mites (you can tell by the miniature cobwebs covering the plant), give your plant a gentle sponging with lukewarm soapy (NOT DETERGENT) water. Propagation: Cut off a piece of stem about two or three inches

of stem about two or three inches ong, remove the lower leaves, and place it so that the lower end sits in a jar of water. Roots should form in a couple of

should form in a couple of weeks. Once they do, pot up your rooted cutting into a pot of ordinary houseplant soil. English Ivy is a classic, durable houseplant for cool locations. They tolerate rather poor growing conditions, don't mind being pruned, easy to propagate, and, best of all, they are easy to find at inexpensive prices. So, the next time you have a spare 59 cents in your pocket, consider adding this plant to your collection. Need to know more about Ivy?




