

Physical Plant: Summer Projects

Among the many projects that Physical Plant has underway are two which will have a major visible impact. The first of these is the exterior and structural upgrading of four Trades Workshops on the North Campus; the second will provide improvements to Kyle Creek and adjacent areas on the South Campus.

Buildings 5 (Carpentry), 6 (Plumbing), 21 (Automotive) and 25 (Small Engines) will undergo replacement of exterior asbestos cement cladding, roofing with insulated metal cladding, and structural work to meet current seismic stability code requirements. Sprayed on asbestos will be removed from Building 5 which will require closing the building for a time. Work on the other buildings will continue while they remain occupied, except for roof replacement which will be done outside of normal hours. Work will commence in mid-May and continue through September.

The Kyle Creek (correct name is Quichon Creek) project will provide a much needed improvement to the southwest corner of Campus. The pond adjacent to the Student Activity Centre will be dredged to reduce the chances of flooding and to enhance its environmental value. The area South of the SAC will be improved to proved a more comfortable area for relaxed activities, while the path running alongside the Creek to Kyle Street will be widened and repaved. Improved lighting for personal safety and security will also be added on the creekside path and to the south of the SAC. This path will now form part of the Burnaby trail system for cyclists and pedestrians.

These projects have been scheduled for the summer period to minimize inconvenience to the Institute community. They form part of the overall Campus upgrade program undertaken by Physical Plant -- a program to build a better Campus for ALL.

Sexual Harassment: Part 1

"Sexual Harassment doesn't exist here, you say!"

Well we all know that statement is WRONG. It does exist and is doing well.

Here are a few facts about academic sexual harassment.

- 1) Men as well as women are sexually harassed.
- Sexual harassment is known to occur in all combinations male/male, male/female, and female/female.
- 3) Sexual harassment is primarily a problem for women, with more than 95% of reported cases occurring when a male of greater power harasses a female of lesser power. About 3 - 4% are cases of men harassing other men.
- 4) One estimate states that only 5% of all men are harassers.
- 5) In surveys which have been made on US college campuses, 33 to 42% of all women have reported experiencing some form of sexual harassment; some recent studies indicate the incidence may be over 60%. Within this group, 5 to 8% report serious harassment.
- Sexual harassment is at least as severe for women faculty members and support staff as it is for students.

- 7) Men and women perceive sexual harassment very differently. Women often see it as threatening, offensive, humiliating or inappropriate, while many men believe it to be flattering or friendly.
- 8) Reports of sexual harassment are almost never false, or made out of a desire to harm or embarrass someone. In fact, in a majority of cases the harasser verifies the account of what happened. Failure to report is a much greater problem, complicating institutional efforts to end harassment.
- 9) Harassers often repeat the same pattern of behaviour, using the same approach and words with successive victims. Understanding and interrupting these patterns can deflect potentially harmful, even dangerous, situations.

In 1990, BCIT published a policy against sexual harassment.

The Green Column Cardboard recycling goes campus wide

If you are wondering what to do with all the cardboard boxes piling up around the campus and filling up the garbage dumpsters, you will be happy to know that the Recycling Department and Physical Plant have teamed up to expand the cardboard recycling program to all offices and classrooms around the campus.

Under the new program seven white cardboard only bins have been installed on the campus for the collection of corrugated cardboard boxes. Boxes that are flattened and left by wastebaskets will be collected from offices and classrooms by the custodial staff and deposited in the cardboard bins. All staff, faculty and students are encouraged to participate in the new program by flattening their waste boxes and leaving them for collection by a waste basket. Waxed boxes are not acceptable.

If BCIT is similar to other large institutions then cardboard represents about 10-15% of the total waste stream. Last year BCIT sent over 800 tonnes of waste material to the landfill. Flattening boxes and depositing them in the cardboard recycling containers could easily reduce waste on campus by as much as 75-100 tonnes per year.

In addition to the new recycling containers on the Burnaby Campus, both Sea Island and Kaslo campuses have received cardboard only bins. Both campuses also participate in the paper recycling program.

Cardboard is good material for reuse. Print Services reuses most of their waste boxes for packaging print jobs for delivery on and off campus. If you or someone you know is moving, the cardboard only bins will be a great source of boxes; everyone is free to help themselves.

Cardboard will be collected by BCIT's waste hauler. BFI, and recycled into new cardboard boxes. As with other materials collected in the recycling program, preparation is critical if the program is to be successful. Boxes must be flattened. Waxed cardboard and other garbage is not accepted for recycling.

"What's new in the library: CD-Rom goes high-rise"

The latest advanced information technology has been installed in the reference area of the library. Two CD towers are connected to personal computers and loaded with the following databases: Academic Abstracts, Medline, Outlook (the new catalogue of B.C. colleges and public library holdings); Nursing and Allied Health Literature, Agricola, and Occupational Health and Safety.

The menu-driven system is a hit with students and faculty who find accessing it easy and very userfriendly. For example Academic Abstracts which cites articles in 539 periodicals includes a summary of each. Journals that are popular with our library users are: Time, Maclean's, Newsweek, Byte, Canadian Business, Business Week, Scientific American, Popular Mechanics, National Geographic, Psychology Today, and Health.

Another technological first for BCIT users is a CD providing full text articles. Computer Select indexes 100 journals in the computer field, providing full text copy of the articles of 50 journals.

Prior to installation of a CD network, other CD's are available from Circulation: Canadian Business and Current Affairs, **Biological and Agricultural Index**, Compendex (Engineering Index on CD) etc.


Horticulture Homecoming
