
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

# Executive adopt new dance profit sharing plan

The September 16th caucus secured several events for Growlies and Taps, and also announced several student services the SA will be undertaking. presentation to the SA each week. The purpose of the presentation would be to form a greater liaison between the SA and the powers that are at BCIT

and the powers that are at BCIT, whether Administration, Staff Society or other area. Business Manager, Phil Henderson, though absent from Monday's sitting, submitted a number of announcements which were included in the member reports. The SA is currently looking into setting up a cheque-cashing service, as Phil has learned BCIT's Bank of Commerce is not cashing cheques for people even with two pieces of ID and on amounts as low as ten dollars. He also has devised a plan

As low as ten dollars. He also has devised a plan whereby technologies can earn money for themselves by having socializers at Taps. Most events so far have raised about \$300, so his plan from now on is to split any amount made aver \$200 fith. any amount made over \$300 fifty-fifty between Taps and the sponsoring technology. After considerable discussion for clarity, the motion was passed unanimously.

Other plans for SAC center include a TNT-sponsored

fashion show for Wednesday, Nov. 7th at 12:30 in Growlies, a blood donor clinic in the SAC, likely to be October 30 and 31st, and a dance for Shinerama participants unable to go to the Commodore. The dance will be in Taps on the same night as the Commodore bash (September

In Campus Rec news, representative Troy Nagy reports that the Health Division is not participating in sports events, which, he says, leads to less enjoyment for the other participants. He urges Health students to become more involved. Troy also reported that intra-mural vollevabilits now full involved. Troy also reported that intra-mural volleyball is now full, and there is a little space left in ice hockey and flag football. He then moved that the S.A. donate \$150 to the upcoming curling bonspiel. The Institute has promised to match the S.A.

promised to match the S.A. donation. The SA will also don a new logo this year. The committee voted 4-3 to accept the new symbol, which, they feel, incorporates BCIT's spirit, symbolizing the three divisions, group studying and fellowship.

## **Medical Services** explains plan

STUDENTS WHO ARE COVERED BY THEIR PARENTS Students who are between 19 and 24 inclusive will be removed automatically from the Medical Services Plan, unless their parents have either informed the Plan in writing that they wish to retain the student as a dependent while he or she is a full-time student, or the parents have returned the printed slip sent out by the Plan, duly completed. The parent, not the student must deal with this. OVERSEAS STUDENTS Overseas students who are

Overseas students who are studying on student visas and have qualified for and are now on the M.S. PLan (after 12 months in Canada), should be aware that their documents from Immigration only last for 12 months. They should receive new documents from new documents from Immigration during the period May to August, and these new documents must be re-submitted to the Plan, or the student will automatically be removed from the Plan.

PREMIUM ASSISTANCE

PREMIUM ASSISTANCE (Canadian citizens or landed immigrants only, who have been resident in B.C. for 12 months). These students may be eligible for a reduction of up to 90 percent of their Medical Services Plan premiums, depending on their previous year's taxable income. 



# New pub rule: BCIT students first

BCIT's Student Association held it's third September '84 meeting in the Boardroom on Monday the 24th. As promised last week, a senior BCIT employee attended the meeting in an effort to answer questions about BCIT policy. This was the first in a series of scheduled administration-Staff Society-S.A. encounters. Following a administration-Staff Society-S.A. encounters. Following a question period, the financial status of the new racquet courts was discussed, and several new policies for the pub were formulated.

Bill Bruce, the Student Association's auditor, was Monday night's guest speaker. He briefly outlined changes in accounting procedure that will be introduced this year, and answered executive questions for twenty minutes. Don Rippon, S.A. President, summed up the auditor's report by indicating "Duffy's is showing it's potential, Growlies should be looked at, and the TNT is reflecting the (dedicated) efforts of manager, Linda Field and of manager Linda Field and staff."

S.A. Business Manager Phil Henderson reported on the financial state of the recreation facilities. One hundred thousand dollars has been paid towards the cost of the racquetball centre so far, over 25% of the total cost. The summer operating deficit of \$11,000 should be regained, said Henderson, in a metter of weeks. He also provided optimistic figures for the Pub - \$17,000 in one night, one of the highest figures ever. Don Rippon reported that the S.A. will be hiring an assistant to

Don Rippon reported that the S.A. will be hiring an assistant to work in the offices for a few hours a week. He stressed the importance of S.A. involvement in Shinerama Wednesday. He also breiefly address the problem of noise in the residences after the pub closes. Recreation chairperson Troy Nagy announced a table hockey tournament in the SAC, October 17 and 24, and also suggested a PVI team should be created to fill a vacant position left by the non-athletic health division. Socializer hours in the SAC

athletic health division. Socializer hours in the SAC will now be more stringently enforced. From Monday to Thursday, last calls will be made at 11:30, and the pub will be cleared at 12. On Saturdays, last call will be at 12:30 with the call will be at 12:30, with the facility cleared by one o'clock. After considerable discussion,

the mostion was passed by a narrow 4-3 decision. Profits from the Financial Management and Computer Systems socializers will be

shared with those technologies, in accordance with the motion passed at last week's meeting. This week, that motion was made retroactive to September 1. The problem of underage students being unable to attend socializers on licensed premesis was also discussed. Troy Nany and Wayne Spock




In a a lossely worded statement, the S.A. has also agreed to have a 'BCIT priority policy' in the Pub. This plan is meant to ensure maximum BCIT admittance to popular pub pub events, by requiring all patrons

to present student ID, and restrict guest attendance to one per BCIT student. The S.A. President defended the motion, suggesting that BCIT students should have priority, since they own the out own the pub.

The next executive meeting is scheduled for October 3, with a follow-up on Oct. 9.







### **BCIT helps** Work Study

Gordon Thom, BCIT President, has approved the immediate release of \$10,000 from a special purpose fund. The money will be used to augment the resources of the Work Study Program.

This special purpose fund was This special purpose fund was created by a previous Board of Governors to assist in special projects which would help BCIT students. In the past, money from this fund has provided start-up funds for student residence and the Racquetball Copurts. the money in the fund was raised through an alocation in student fees.

It is expected that the \$10,000 will provide more students with work through the school year.

# **ALBUM REVIEW** Springsteen

By Nea It may be a tad early, but what the heck; my money for album of the year has to go on Bruce Springsteen's 'Born in the USA'. (Sorry Jacksons, but 'Victory' will be a defeat.) a pictoral eassay in itself, with the man and his trademark white t-shirt, jeans and boots, the man and his trademark white t-shirt, jeans and boots, obviously just off the graveyard shift at the mill. Springsteen delivers the song with an almost painful exuberance, hammering out the lyric as if singing in the street on the poor side of town. Darlington County is a neat little tune about two guys looking for the big time, and settling for a good time. Downbound Train draws some parallels with 1980's The River, Springsteen sounding suitably gloomy. The mood is picked up with No Surrender, an insightful plea to the young to hold on to their dreams. On Dancing in the Dark, we hear a synthesizer for the first time on a Springsteen tune. Roy Bittan uses it intelligently, however, and the resultant mix of it and Max Weinberg's emphatic drumming have made the song a bit of a hit at the clubs. A dance remix has already been done, but REAL Springsteen fans will not include it in their record libraries. (By the way, REAL Springsteen fans will also not read the cover story on the Boss in People magazine. That should, of course, go without saying.) The album's closer is the type of faded dreams scenario that Springsteen does so well. With a casual accompaniment behind casual accompaniment behind him, Springsteen sings My Hometown, painting a picture of his formative years in New Jersey. As the song ends, we see that the singer has never really left left.

Fans who may have wavered after 'Nebraska' will be delighted at the return of the E Street band. Clarence and the boys have never sounded better, and have never sounded better, and their inspired performances are accentuated by the clearest production on a Springsteen album to date. Jon Landau once again piloted the project with help from Springsteen and guitarist Steve Van Zandt. Springsteen has his finger on the pulse of middle America (and Canada), and 'Born in the USA' is an album you must own. For those of us who aren't lucky (or rich) enough to see Springsteen

rich) enough to see Springsteen in concert at the Coliseum, it's all we'll have to wash away the memories of Michael and co. 'Born in the USA' is the true thriller.

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


