

editorial

Once again it is the time of year when students pat themselves on their backs, the walls become covered with posters, and the student body is asked to elect into office someone who they haven't seen, haven't heard, and in all probability don't know of at all.

As is the tradition here at BCIT, half of the offices available are being filled by acclaimation. Why this is has always been a puzzle to observers, but perhaps it is that there are so few students here with enough initiative to run at all, that they are the only ones possible for the post.

For example, the Engineering Technology has managed to nominate two candidates, one for V.P. Internal, and of course the Engineering Society President. Health fares slightly worse, nominating a grand total of one candidate, to the Health Society Presidency.

Last weekend BCIT sponsored a province -wide competition of community colleges in debating. The team scores are as follows:



The present holder of this position, Roy Hynd has done an admirable job in these fields.


Should the student body elect me to this position, I will do my utmost to maintain, and further increase communications and technology funding, for the business society.
