# Convocation 92: the highlights

onvocation ceremonies are a mix of pomp and circumstance, tears and joy, long speeches and sore backs, beginnings and endings. And this year's BCIT convocation ceremonies were no exception.

Thousands of friends and family members witnessed just over 1,200 students receive their certificates and diplomas during four separate ceremonies June 17-19.

Some of the highlights included the standing ovation offered to Peter Legge, the president of Canada Wide Magazines who gave a keynote address to the School of Business using the story of David and Goliath and the five stones.

Then there was the acceptance speech of Louise Routledge, a mathematics instructor, who was the recipient of the School of Engineering Technology's Distinguished Achievement Award.

Many remember the BCIT Top Ten List by Sean Fitzsimmons in his valedictory speech to the School of Business along with other speeches from Broadcast Communication's Tracle Clark, Power Engineering's Jason Little, Occupational Health and Safety's Chris Knox and Civil and Structural's Graham Watson.

Best dressed award goes to Phil Goulet, an Electronics Technology grad who wore his RCMP uniform to receive his diploma. Phil is heading back to his job in Montreal where he hopes to work in surveillance.

The most emotional moment was when parents of Building Technology's Rudy Stadig accepted the diploma on behalf of their son who had died tragically just prior to convocation.

George Bedwell's singing of "O Canada" was great as usual but we wonder how so many people can sing along so quietly.

And who can forget vision impaired Angus MacKinnon, the winner of the Board of Governor's Citizenship award, and his steady climb to the podium to receive his award.

needed by Sea Island who had to use "student power" to move many of their planes. This was the answer if only it was running. The Heavy Equipment Group was asked if they could help. Students in Commercial Transport took on the project under the watchful eye of their instructor Keith Whitter.

The unit was checked over by four of Keith's students: John Meyer, Dana Traff, Manpreet Grewal and Tim Richards. They found the propane system missing, the engine compression very low, no brakes, missing lights and the electrical system in extremely bad shape.

These students did about 75% of all the repairs to the unit including changing the electrical system from 6V to 12V. The biggest problem they had was the unit was powered by a 6 cylinder Chrysler Ace flathead engine with a broken camshaft. Several of our suppliers looked but could not find a replacement cam and we finally obtained one from a antique car dealer for \$75.

The class had changed by now and three new students had to finish the job. They are Jasveer Ghuman, Bill Raymond and Darren Shmels, and after checking it out, they presented the keys to Charles Torrey of Aircraft Maintenance. Power Engineering receives ASTTBC technician accreditation

# Telephone tips ... from the Customer Service Committee

A caller begins to measure the quality of an organization before they hear a voice by the number of rings it takes to get an answer. The next impression comes with the voice that they hear.

Here are some guidelines for answering the phone:

1.Four answering courtesies

- · Greet the caller
- State the name of the organization or department
- Introduce yourself
- Offer your help

Example:

Good morning, Accounting, Kelly speaking. (May I help you?)

2.Be enthusiastic when you answer. Help make the calling party feel welcome.

A tired voice lacking in enthusiasm is unappealing and boring!

- 3.Remember to smile as you pick up the receiver. Tape the word "smile" on your receiver.
- 4.Never eat or drink while talking. If your mouth is full when the telephone rings, wait a few seconds before answering.
- 5.When you place a caller on hold to answer another line, ask the caller for permission and **wait for an answer.**

# New OLA/BCIT B.Tech degree in Technology Management

The academic council of Open University approved this degree proposal on June 11. It now goes to their board for ratification; this is normally a formality.

The package is BCIT (or equivalent) 2-year diploma in Engineering Technology, plus BCIT advanced diploma in Technology Management, plus 15 units of lower level english, humanities and social science subjects. The degree is a B.Tech.

This degree option will be open to all grads from engineering technology diploma programs in the country that are recognized or accredited professionally. They will have to complete the ADP component at BCIT.

Congratulations go to Sandy McGechaen and Lu Curran for a great job of preparing this proposal and shepherding it through the OLA approval process. We have 40 students already taking courses in the ADP program.
