And thus set up, he went on his quest. He advertised in the Vancouver Slum newspaper, asking for applicants to come to an interview session the next day.

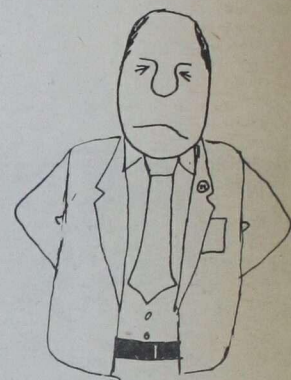
Now you should know, before

"I own the Socrab party," said J.D.

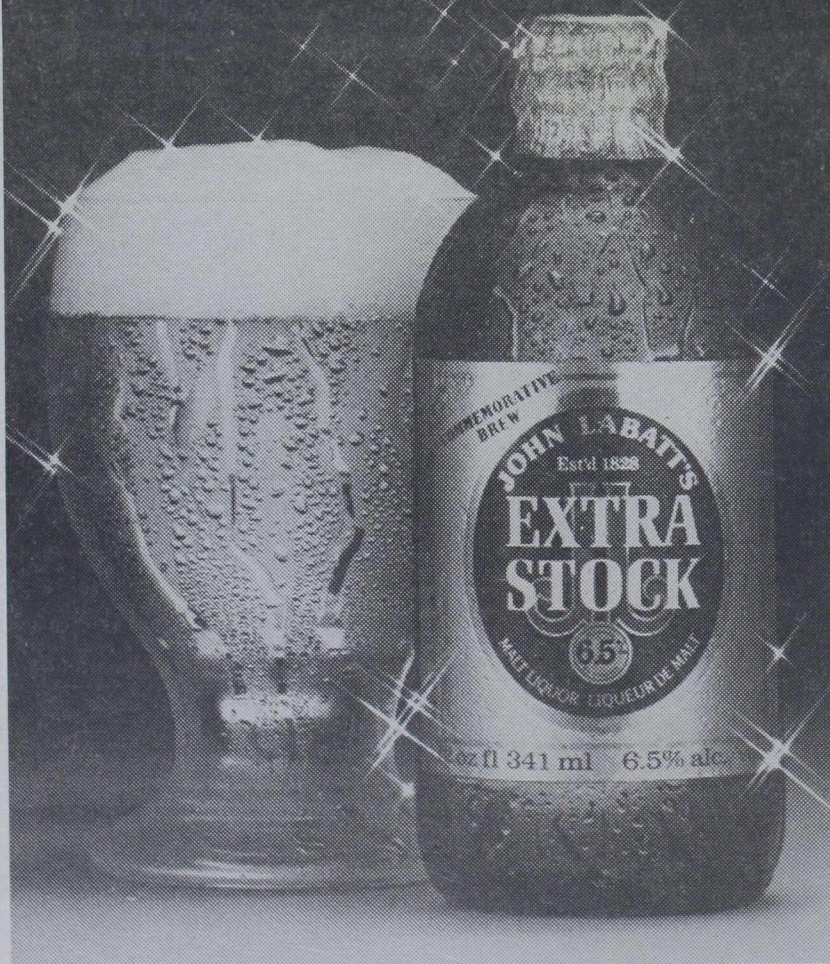
"Gosh," said Brothers, impressed. He didn't bother asking him the question about education...he was kind of bored with that one.

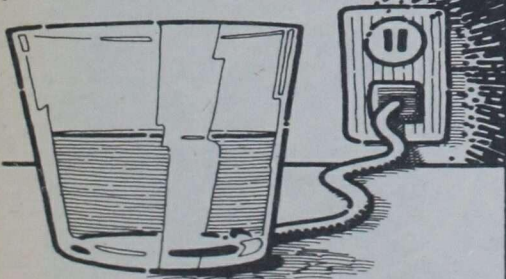

Stalling the start of construction of the new electrical building is prohibitive from a cost standpoint, amounting to several hundred thousand dollars over the contracted price.

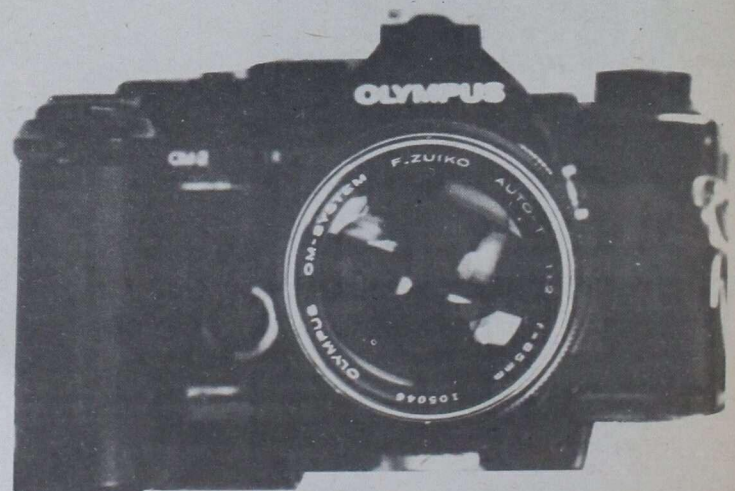

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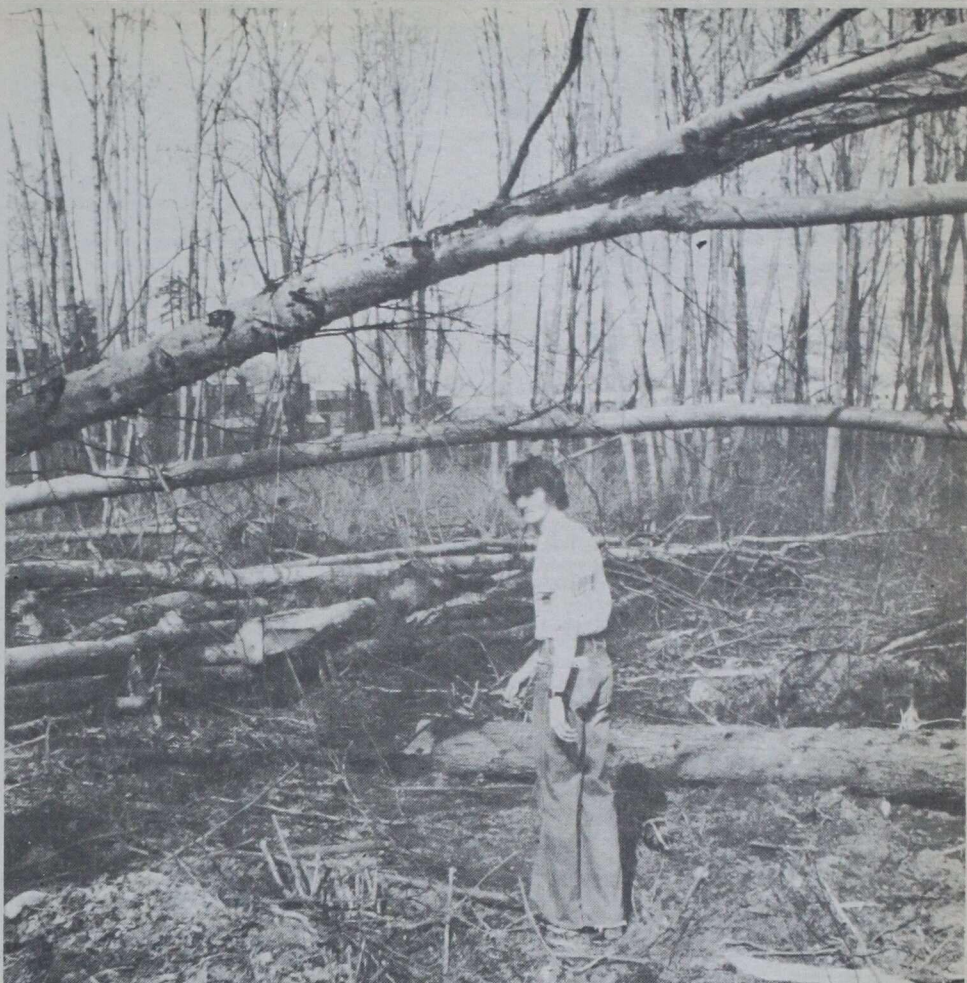
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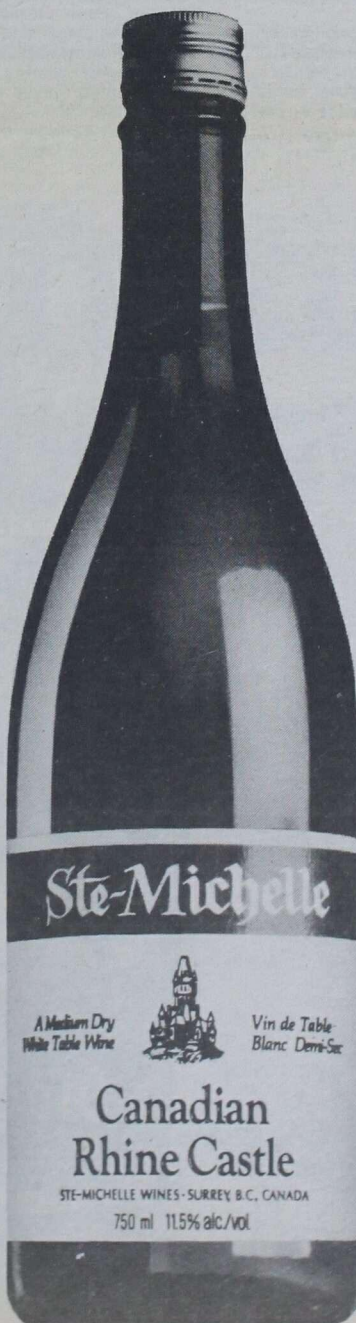

Not being too great a fan of the vocals by STEELY DAN, the Pointer Sister's version of Dirty Work is about the best we have come across. The sound is crisp and clean, and is probably Richard Perry's best production job to date.

POACHED EGGS WITH HORSE RADISH SAUCE

- 8 eggs
- 4 English muffins
- ¼ teaspoon salt and pepper

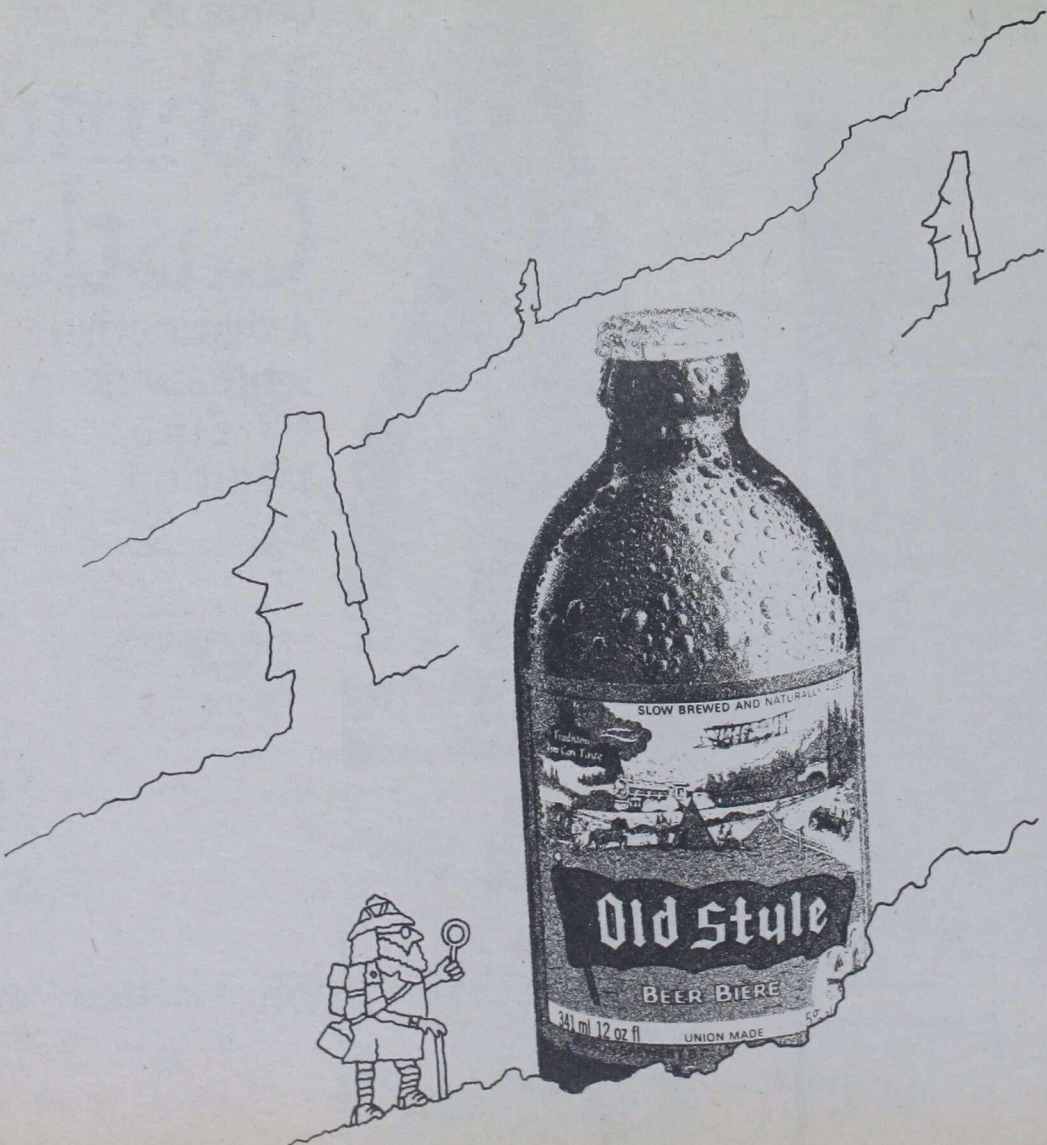

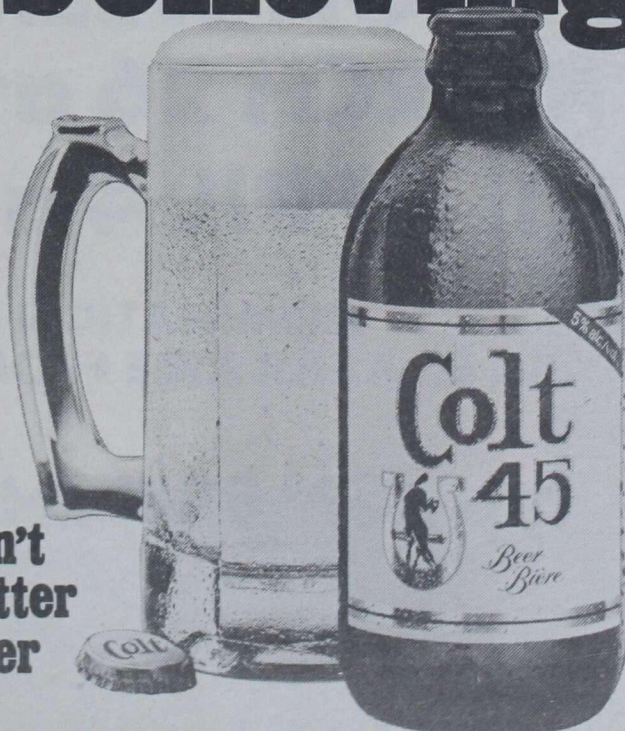
