ROYAL COMMISSION ON EDUCATION TO VISIT BCIT WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 18 10:30 a.m. TO 2 p.m.

The Royal Commission led by Barry Martin Sullivan, Q.C. was appointed by the provincial government in April this year to enquire into and report on education in the province by April, 1988. This week the commissioners are coming to BCIT to hear our views on the subject. One area of interest is the relationship between secondary and post-secondary education, specifically, entry requirements; curriculum development; program advisory committees; co-op education and placement rates for graduates.

Because the work of the Commission has such wide appeal from both a personal and professional point of view, President Murray has decided to make the BCIT meeting open to staff members.

A written submission from BCIT to the Royal Commission is in the process of being prepared and is expected to be delivered during public hearings scheduled early in the new year.

BOARD CHAIRMAN RESIGNS

Malcolm Wickson, who as chairman of the BCIT Board of Governors, helped guide BCIT through the challenging years of the merger, resigned his position November 2 citing health reasons.

Calling him, "an outstanding chairman of the Board," President Murray said his contributions to BCIT have been of immeasurable value.

"He gave the Institute direction and assistance that have helped us achieve many things, including removal from formula funding and improved liaison with the federal government. His support of management by consultation rather than management by confrontation has also helped us in achieving one of our corporate objectives, that of improving climate."

Mr. Wickson will continue to give BCIT the benefit of his knowledge and influence as a member of the Board. He will be succeeded as chairman by former vice chairman, Fleming Sondergaard, general manager of Collins Manufacturing in Langley.

Mr. Ed Taylor, who has been a member of the Board before and since the merger, is the new vice chairman. He is comptroller of Crestbrook Forest Industries in Cranbrook.

MORE VIDEOS AVAILABLE AT THE LIBRARY

Common Ground (VC 2325) 20 min.
Discusses the future management of British Columbia's forests for the mutual benefit of the province's government, industry and people.

CPR for Rescuers (VC 2335) 30 min.
Presents basic life support skills designed to supplement CPR classes. Follows standards and guidelines for cardiopulmonary resuscitation as published in the Journal of the American Medical Association, June, 1986.

Expert Systems: Automating Knowledge Acquisition (VC 2331) 54 min.
Explains the difficulties currently facing those involved in building expert systems. Presents techniques based on rule induction which help to circumvent the Feigenbaum bottleneck in knowledge acquisition. Also illustrates the application of rule induction techniques in a wide range of current and future commercial areas.

Future of Industrial Relations in Canada: A Lecture (VC 2323) 120 min.
Robert White, president of the Canadian Auto Workers Union, presents a lecture to students and faculty of St. Francis Xavier University on the role of trade unions in modern society. Discusses, among other topics, free trade, Japanese management style and investment in Canada.

How to Design a Flower Garden (VC 2320) 48 min.
Shows how to select the best site for a healthy garden, how to evaluate and prepare the soil for superproductive results, and how to choose the right flowers and foliage for an interesting variety and a full season of blooms. Discusses the use and application of drip irrigation, organic mulch, and compost.

How to Manage: the Process Approach and Henri Fayol (VC 2326) 12 min.
Explains Henri Fayol's concept of management functions and illustrates how training helps managers to improve job effectiveness.

In Search of Excellence (VC 22328) 88 min.
Examines examples of successful management in large and small companies. Focuses on the three major themes of innovation, productivity through people, and shared values and tells how companies have benefitted from their use.

You are the Game: Sexual Harassment on Campus (VC 2334) 59 min.
Presents dramatizations of two types of sexual harassment found in the academic setting, followed by a panel discussion featuring national experts.

Your Health: It's Your Responsibility (VC 2329) 43 min.
Places the concept of wellness in historical perspective and defines its major dimensions, highlighting the major preventable causes of illness and pre-

mature death that exist today. Stresses the importance of self-responsibility in health matters.
