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ADMINISTRATION SUPPORTS HIGH FOOD PRICES

In case you didn't know, the food prices on campus have risen 'slightly' since last May to an average tune of 67 per cent! The reason? The rising cost of food. It is funny to note though that the Prices Review Board, a Government body, have released figures stating that since August 1974, the retail price for food has risen by only 11 percent. A difference of 56 percent. This seems to be unjustified.

Let's add a few facts to this interesting story. On May 8th, 1975 a motion passed by BCIT'S Board of Governors directed the Administration to increase prices in the Food Training Centre and Bookstore by 10 percent. This is not an unreasonable increase as inflation is a fact of life and we all have to compensate. The increase that followed however, turned out to be nearer 60-70 percent in the student areas of the cafeteria while the staff had an 80 percent increase imposed. Upon receiving a notice of the increase, on August 29th 1975, I immediately wrote to the Campus Food Advisory Committee and the Board of Governors protesting the increase.

At this point, I would like to bring to light another interesting fact. The motion by the Food Advisory Committee to increase the food prices was passed at a meeting of that Committee. There was no student representative (that is myself), nor a representative from the Staff Society was present. This would appear to be strange considering that between our two groups we represent 90 percent of the entire population on this campus. I think if we had been there that the outcome would have been different.

To get back to my original protest I will use the following excerpt from my letter to the Committee and the Board.

"The Student Executive on behalf of the Student Association objects to the increases on the following grounds:

1. As this is a revenue producing service it should be turned over to the Board of Governors, Finance Sub-Committee for their investigation and approval. This, as yet, has not been done and it would appear that the Administration are overstepping their authority by commencing with increases before Board approval.

2. Students this year have already been faced with a 100% increase in fees, at least a 10 percent increase in books and supplies and now a substantial increase in food prices. This burden is becoming too great for those students in residence who must rely on our facilities for food.

The Administration after receiving the letter then requested a meeting with me. At that meeting Cliff McAdam, Executive Director, Administration, tried to make me believe that he and the Administration were merely following the motion that the Board handed down. He claimed that what the Board really meant by the motion was that prices were to be raised to full cost recovery level plus 10 percent. This I have checked out with members of the Board who claim the motion reads and means exactly what it says: Prices in the Bookstore and Food Training Centre are to be raised by 10 percent. The motion says nothing of Cost recovery or any other figment of anyone's imagination.

this whole question of cost recovery makes you wonder how it has come to pass that when the budget was made up and approved, the Administration happened to overlook a meagre \$432,000 in operating costs for the Food Training Centre, which they are now

trying to recovery by picking your pockets with increases larger than they were directed to by interpreting a motion to meet their own requirements.

The next step in this whole question came about on Sept. 11 1975, at the Open Meeting of the Board of Governors. I asked the Board to investigate my claims against the Administration and to make a ruling on the controversial motion of May 8th, 1975, before we came into a full head-on confrontation between Students, the staff and Administration. I was then asked by a member of the Board if I had the capability of stopping the confrontation. My answer was NO! My reason, I then stated, was because I did not have the authority to reduce prices to a reasonable level. The Board then moved that the situation be discussed in their "In Committee session" (closed door). During that session it was moved that any further discussion on the subject be delayed until September 22, 1975, when the Board met again.

The following day, Friday, Sept 12th, 1975, I attended a special meeting of the Campus Food Advisory Committee. Here a couple of significant things happened.

First, we were informed that the Pace Services Contract had been extended for one more year. However, this contract was not thrown open for tender, a strange situation to say the least when at the Student Association offices we have been approached by other companies to bring their vending machines on campus. To make matters worse, Pace also increased their prices during the summer (when nobody was around) and now again prices are going up 12-16 percent on most food items in the vending machines.

The second event at that meeting and probably the most important, was a motion that I made, and which I will quote here. "I move that all food prices be reduced to the prices charged for food on this campus prior to September 2nd, 1975, until such time as a ruling be made by the Board as to their directive to Administration to increase prices for food services." This motion was defeated by a 7-6 vote.

Now I'm going to tell you how the voting went just to illustrate the capability of Administration to manipulate committees on this campus so they can carry out their business as they want to. The six votes for the motion to reduce the food prices until a ruling be made by the Board, were BCIT Staff Society, BCIT Student Association, BCIT Hotel-Motel Dept. which had 2 members because of their involvement in Food production for their courses. The six votes against the motion, that is to continue on with the present prices, was as follows. Manager, Food Services, Assistant Mgr, Food Services, Head Instructor, Food Services, BCGEU Representative (Employed in the Food Training Centre and answerable to the first three gentlemen mentioned), the BCIT Bursar (Administration), BCVS Administration, and the tie breaker - Cliff McAdam, BCIT Administration and Chairman of the Committee. This vote might not seem to be too slanted but it is interesting to realize that the first three people mentioned are answerable to, and employed by the BCIT Administration. The fourth, as mentioned before is answerable to the first three, the fifth is part of Administration, the sixth is Administration from BCVS and as he said in the meeting, he and his Bursar had put their heads together over this issue.

Ladies and gentlemen, the final count - Administration, representing one percent of the population 7 votes - everybody else 6 votes.

Just to add insult to injury, to this whole situation, an Administrator afterwards said that he was not worried about what was happening because he did not think the Student Association would do anything about it.

With statements like that I feel it reflects the Administration's attitude towards students. You're only pawns in their games. Your education, welfare and happiness at BCIT are only secondary so long as they can continue to build their own little empires around themselves, find ways to outmanoeuvre the Board of Governors. If you are still in doubt about the attitude of Administration to students come and talk to me about what happened to the Student Services part of the BCIT budget.

I would like to close this article by asking for your hundred percent support on a boycott of the food services on campus. This means everyone bringing their own sandwiches until we get a settlement with Administration. You will all be contacted later on further action. Anyone wanting to help organize further protestive action should contact me or leave their name and phone number at the Student Association Offices in the SAC Building.



LINK CONSTITUTION

THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS OF THE STUDENT NEWSPAPER OF THE B.C.I.T. STUDENT ASSOCIATION

This constitution was written by the 1974-75 LINK editorial staff in conjunction with the 1974-75 Publications Chairman.

1. The name of the B.C.I.T. student newspaper shall be **THE LINK**. This name will reflect the fact that we are a vital and important method of communication at B.C.I.T..

2. The object of **THE LINK** shall be to provide the students of B.C.I.T. with factual reportings of the issue on and affecting campus.

3. The operations of **THE LINK** are to be carried on at B.C.I.T. in the Student Publications Office in the Student Association Centre.

4. **THE LINK** is a medium for communication between the B.C.I.T. Governing Bodies and the students of the British Columbia Institute of Technology. Because **THE LINK** is the students only thorough communications method, **THE LINK** is responsible to the students of B.C.I.T..

POLICIES

1. The student newspaper is responsible to present and future student bodies at the

British Columbia Institute of Technology. The editorial staff is duty bound by the nature of their job to present all facts in a fair and unbiased manner.

In doing so, they and only they must be prepared to decide whether or not to report or delete stories in the best interests of the students at B.C.I.T..

2. All opinions on any subject matter reported in **THE LINK** shall be written in editorials, open letters, or letters to the editors.

3. No libelous material shall be printed and the editorial staff shall be free to consult a lawyer if they are uncertain as to possible liability of the material submitted.

4. **THE LINK DOES NOT** necessarily represent the views or opinions of the B.C.I.T. Board of Governors, the B.C.I.T. Administration or the B.C.I.T. Student Association Executive.

5. All censoring is to be done only by the Editorial Staff of **THE LINK**, keeping in mind that **THE LINK** and they themselves are responsible totally to the student population at B.C.I.T..

6. Any censoring that is done will be done at the discretion of the Editorial Staff if they feel that the article will be damaging to the STUDENTS of B.C.I.T..

The Shinerama, held this past week, was promoted as an embodiment of school spirit, channeled into a good cause.

Last Friday, classes were cancelled so that the energies needed to make it a success, could be properly put to use. Over five hundred people signed up to be shoe shiners out of a school population of three thousand. Such a pitiful percentage would be bad enough, if it weren't for the fact that only 350 people actually showed up to help. Perhaps everybody was gearing up for the drinkathon that night, where 1200 made their appearance.

But before the student body is held up as the main culprit, it should be pointed out that a large majority of the faculty were nowhere to be seen, and probably wouldn't have turned up unless they were forced to, or it was pay day.

Such a performance, by both groups, cannot and should not be tolerated. It is obvious to even the most detached observer, that B.C.I.T. cannot function as a community, unless the community spirit is there. Last Friday it was not.

People with cystic fibrosis are fighting a serious and often fatal disease. They need help immediately. Judging by Shinerama Day at B.C.I.T., it will be a long time before that aid is forthcoming.

Mr. R. Wilkinson, C.E.T.* 1,600 to Prince Edward Island with 50 members. Many of the associations are, therefore, experiencing growing pains that other provincial associations went through several years back. It was resolved then, that a concerted effort would be made to assist developing associations with their problems.

The Presidents of all ten provincial societies/associations/corporation met in Toronto on May 28 and 29 to review the role of the engineering technician and technologists, of the provincial associations in industry, and in this regard, to consider avenues by which appropriate recognition can be achieved. The most significant recommendation of the delegates was that **RECOGNITION IN LAW MUST BE SOUGHT FOR OUR MEMBERS.**

In opening the two-day discussions, the chairman, Mr. R. Wilkinson, C.E.T. President, S.E.T.B.C. called on each delegate to review the developments of each association.

It was very evident that the associations are operating at various stages of general development which can be appreciated when one reviews the membership statistics - Ontario:8,000, Quebec:5,000, Alberta:2,000, British Columbia:

A second recommendation emanating from the meeting was that all associations should undertake to implement the standard of training inherent in the C.C.E.T.T. Profile and Syllabi. British Columbia, Alberta, Ontario, Quebec and Newfoundland have already adopted the C.C.E.T.T. Profile and the others are very much in agreement with the publication and expect to adopt it shortly. In addition, most of the provinces are utilizing the C.C.E.T.T. Syllabi in the accreditation of provincial institutes of learning.

EQUALITY OF SEXES IN CREDIT DIABETIC BIKE-A-THON

More than 4,000 credit-granting agencies in British Columbia are being told that a woman's access to credit should be as good as a man's.

This is part of the message in new guidelines for the agencies announced recently by Consumer Services Minister Phyllis Young.

They have been prepared by the Credit Grantors Association of Vancouver and although they are not binding, Ms. Young says she hopes they will be widely followed.

Her announcement came at a speech given at the B.C. Institute of Technology.

The highlights are:

- No married woman should be denied credit in her own name if her earnings and property are such that a man possessing the same name would get credit.
- Similar standards should apply to an unmarried woman.
- Credit reporting agencies should provide a credit history of each spouse and the joint accounts if this information is on file when requested.

Credit grantors also are being asked to refrain from refusing credit to women in their own names, refusing to consider a wife's income when a couple applies for credit, refusing credit

to newly divorced women and holding men and women to different standards for credit.

Also, credit should not be refused to a recently separated or widowed woman solely because of a change in her marital status.

VALID SOURCE

Alimony and child support should be considered valid sources of income according to the merits of individual applications for credit, and stricter standards for credit should not be used when the wife is the principal supporter of the family.

Credit grantors also are being asked not to request information about birth control practices and parental plans, in evaluating credit applications; not to alter an individual's credit rating solely on the basis of the credit rating of the spouse; not to refuse to negotiate credit with a wife and insisting instead to negotiate only with the husband.

Other practices now being actively discouraged include requiring a woman, when she marries, to return her credit cards, and reapply in her husband's name and refusing to consider a woman's past credit history even if her record has been excellent.

The guidelines are being mailed to 2,000 non-association members and to about 2,000 non-association credit grantors in the rest of the Province.

The first of what is hoped will become an annual event, the Canadian Diabetic Association Bike-a-thon will be held simultaneously in Vancouver and Victoria on Sunday, October 5th.

Seven routes have been set up to make it more convenient for cyclists to participate close to their own neighbourhood. Routes are located in Victoria, Vancouver City, North Shore, Burnaby/New Westminster, Richmond, Delta/Surrey and Coquitlam. Any and everybody who is interested in helping raise money for the Canadian Diabetic Association can start riding anytime between 9 in the morning and 2:00 p.m. Cyclists are being asked to get themselves sponsored at anywhere from 5 cents a mile up, by friends, relatives and associates and then to ride as far as they can around their course of their choice. Keeping record of their progress will be volunteer helpers from the Canadian Diabetic Association, the Pacific Region - Jaycees, members of the Kingsmen Club in Coquitlam and many, many other volunteers. Communications for the event are being provided by Amateur Radio and Citizens Band organizations as well as Taxi companies and a trucking concern. The St. John's Ambulance is providing a first-aid coverage, if they are needed and in Victoria the University sports club is helping to man the route.

The Bike-a-thon is being held in order to raise funds for much needed research into the cause and control of diabetes, a disease of serious consequences.

Diabetes is the leading cause of new blindness and is a major factor in stroke, heart attack, kidney failure and amputations caused by gangrene. It strikes more school-age children than any other major disease. The complications of uncontrolled diabetes can significantly reduce the average life expectancy of diabetics.

In Vancouver, promising research is being carried out by Dr. Tze of the Children's Hospital who has had some success in the transplanting of insulin production Beta Cells. In Victoria Dr. Walker of the U-Vic has had good results in experiments in the voluntary control of the circulatory system in diabetics through Bio-Feedback.

These men, and many others are working hard to find the cause, control and possible cure for diabetes.

The Canadian Diabetic Association branches are asking people to ride in the Bike-a-thon, October 5th in Vancouver and Victoria, so that this vital research may be carried out.

WHAT IS A BIKE-A-THON?

It's NOT a race. In fact there is no timing involved at all. It is a means of raising money, when volunteer bike riders have people sponsor them over a number of miles.

ANYONE CAN ENTER - All you need is a bike, sponsors and determination.

HERE'S WHAT YOU DO:

First obtain an entry form from any participating McDonald's Hamburger outlet. Go to family, friends and neighbours, in fact anyone you know. Ask them to sponsor you for so much a mile for as many miles as you can ride - minimum 5 cents a mile, maximum - you name it!

When you have at least five sponsors you are eligible to enter! Go to a MacDonald's or any other designated starting point (you'll find them listed on your entry form) any time between 9 AM and 2 PM on the day of the Bike-a-thon. You'll be given a route map, a list of instructions and the location of check points along the way. Remember, each course is between 20 and 25 miles

long. Then - off you go!!!

As you call at each checkpoint your route sheet will be stamped to verify the mileage you have already covered. Carry on to as many check points as you can - every mile you cover means more money you have raised.

If you cover two thirds of the course, MacDonald's will have a FREE food and soft drink voucher for you. You can cover the course as many times as you like, each time around means another MacDonald's voucher for you.

Take your route sheet to your sponsors to verify the miles you've ridden and collect the money they have pledged. Then send a cheque or money order to the Canadian Diabetic Association. You will become eligible to win one of the grand PRIZES.

PRIZES WILL BE AWARDED FOR:

1. Participant covering the most miles
2. Participant collecting the most money
3. Participant having the most sponsors

There are forms lying around the cafeteria that you can fill in and hand in to Beverley, the Student Association secretary. We'd like some feedback!



As the Student Representative on the Board, I have to work closely with the Student Association to get a good input into the Board.

The Board of Governors is a group of fifteen representatives of interest groups at BCIT. Through the enactment of the BCIT Act they assumed autonomous control of BCIT on July 15th 1974. The BCIT Act empowered the Board to act as advisors to the operation of the institute subject to restraints defined and becoming of a Crown corporation. The Board assumed the responsibility previously held by the Department of Education.

The principal advantage of this structure is that the governing body is in close association with the institute.

Our meetings are divided into two sections. Open sessions where anyone is allowed to attend. At these sessions presentations are made from the students and the staff. The other part is in-committee sessions which are closed to the public.

At our last meeting Steve Brown made six presentations to the Board. The staff had one one. This is a good indication of the amount of work the Student Association is doing. Steve, along with the rest of Council, is doing an excellent job keeping administration on the ball.



FINANCIAL AID B.C.I.T.

B.C.I.T. EMERGENCY LOAN FUND

This limited fund is available to students with exceptional circumstances. The loans are interest free and repayable on a prescribed date. These loans are normally not available in 1st term. The amount of a loan usually ranges between \$50.00 and \$200.00.

B.C.I.T. PRIZES AND MEDALS

Awards to graduating students in the form of prizes and medals are presented each year in conjunction with the Convocation Ceremonies in June. For more information regarding the nature of these awards please consult the appropriate section of the B.C.I.T. Calendar.

STUDENT BUDGETING

The wise student plans his financial resources and expenses as far in advance of classes as is possible. Should he or she have any questions concerning student financial planning the Counselling Services would like to invite drop-ins at any time for free advice and discussion. (Room 207A).

MISCELLANEOUS BURSARIES

There are a number of miscellaneous bursaries available to B.C.I.T. students which are not allocated through the auspices of the B.C.I.T. scholarship and Bursary Committee. A list of these bursaries may be found on page 64 of the B.C.I.T. Calendar.

In addition scholarships relating to Forest Products students are now available. For more information on these please contact the Forest Products Department, Local 279.

NEW STUDENT AID PLAN

A new student assistance programme has been announced by Education Minister Eileen Dailly.

The programme expands benefits for students in need based on an existing departmental plan.

Students requiring assistance will be eligible to receive up to \$3,300, up \$400.00 from 1974 and up \$1500.00 from two years ago. Eligible students will be able to receive up to \$1500.00 in an outright Provincial Grant and a Canada Student Loan of up to \$1800.00.

The aim of this revised programme is to give the most assistance to those with the greatest need, said Mrs. Dailly. In 1974, 14,600 grants were made compared with 8,600 in 1973. Spending on grants in 1974 reached \$10 million, up from \$2.3 million in 1973. The programme is available to full-time under-graduate students enrolled in post-secondary schools. A separate assistance plan is available for part-time students.

Every now and then a poor beleaguered student wanders into the Counselling Offices (after asking three students and two instructors where they are) and asks when the B.C.I.T. Scholarship applications are available. B.C.I.T. Scholarships do not require application and normally are not available to 1st year students. The point of this little anecdote is simply to illustrate the need for effective communication between the student and Student Services at B.C.I.T..

Financial Awards are described in some detail in the calendar but additional information is also outlined in the brochure entitled B.C.I.T. Financial Awards Guide which was included in the Student Registration Day package. Copies of this brochure are available at the Counselling Offices, Room 207A.

Effective September 8th, 1975 the Financial Awards Officer for B.C.I.T. will be Mrs. Jennifer Clemmons who comes to the Institute with an extensive background in Student Services at the University of British Columbia.

B.C.I.T. FINANCIAL AWARDS GUIDE

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this is to inform B.C.I.T. STUDENTS ABOUT AVAILABLE Financial Assistance. The various forms of assistance are defined below as presently structured. These programmes are subject to change.

Students wishing further information regarding Financial Assistance are invited to discuss their needs with the Counsellor-Financial Awards at the Counselling Counter. The phone number is 434-5722, Local 327.

The following kinds of assistance are available:

1. Loans
2. Scholarships
3. Bursaries
4. Prizes
5. B.C. Grants-In-Aid

LOANS

Loans are awarded on the basis of financial need. Loans may be either interest free or at a reduced rate of interest as prescribed by the lending agency. (See Canada Student Loans and B.C.I.T. Emergency Loan Fund.)

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships are generally awarded on a basis of academic excellence. Certain individual scholarships involve additional criteria for selection. Please refer to the following descriptions for more specific explanation.

BURSARIES

Bursaries are mainly awarded on the basis of financial need and such additional factors as may be prescribed by the donor. Bursaries are non-repayable grants of money which generally range in value from \$50.00 to \$500.00.

PRIZES

Prizes are awards for academic excellence in one or more subject or in a programme of studies. Prizes may be awarded for academic excellence combined with qualities or capabilities as prescribed by the donor. The prizes awarded may be trophies, books, medals, or other suitable awards as prescribed by the donor.

B.C. GRANTS-IN-AID

B.C. Grants-In-Aid are a form of non-repayable bursary based strictly on need. See section on Canada Student Loan for further explanation.

CANADA STUDENT LOAN AND B.C. GOVERNMENT GRANT - IN-AID

The purpose of the Canada Student Loan Plan is to assist students whose resources are insufficient to provide for the cost of full-time studies at the Post-Secondary level of education. Assistance under the programme is, therefore, granted only where the financial resources available to students from parents, summer work or other sources are insufficient to meet their estimated educational costs. Canada Student Loans are made available to eligible students to a maximum amount of \$1800.00 in any one academic year.

In conjunction with the Canada Student Loan Plan, the Province of British Columbia will award supplementary grant to those students awarded a Canada Student Loan to a maximum of \$1500.00. The purpose of these grants is to reduce the student's indebtedness. Students who qualify for a loan will be eligible for a grant. The amount of the grant will depend upon financial need.

B.C.I.T. SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES

The British Columbia Institute of Technology Scholarship and Bursary Fund has been established through private means, whereby awards are made annually by the trustees of the Fund to deserving students of the Institute. Private contributions from Commerce and Industry and

other interested persons are being received and may or may not be designated for use in encouraging study in a particular course of study given by the Institute.

B.C.I.T. Scholarships are automatically given to top academic students based on 1st year average. The Award Ceremony takes place in the Fall. Students receiving course credit during the academic period concerned are not eligible for an award. No application is required.

B.C.I.T. Bursaries are awarded primarily on a basis of need and promise and are available only to 2nd year students. Students must apply through the Counselling Department.

free health care; Spain, where he pioneered blood transfusion techniques at the front lines; and China on the Sino-Japanese front where he laid the groundwork for the existing system of peasant hospitals and where he died in 1939 of blood poisoning in the field in Yenan province. Long recognized as a folk hero by 800 million Chinese, Bethune has now captured the imagination of Canadians. Langley's BETHUNE commissioned and produced last season by Regina's Globe and Montreal's Centaur Theatres, has been hailed as a singular and remarkable theatrical experience.

The City Stage production is designed by Drew Borland, and features Ken Kramer, Artistic Director of Regina's Globe Theatre, in the role of Dr. Bethune.


RECORD REVIEW

DAVID BOWIE - YOUNG AMERICANS (RCA CPL1 - 0998)

And here he is! A man disliked by few, devoured by most. A new album and a new book. Short red hair, ear ring on the right ear and pretty. He has always been femininely beautiful, never masculinely handsome - despite his voice. Before any of his followers can catch up to him, David Bowie is into something new and so far, something different. He calls his new music 'disco-soul' - originally the black American's music - a la James Brown which has become very popular in 1975. This direction started with his 'Diamond Dogs' and should full circle with the next album.

It is interesting that prejudice is on the way out. Blacks used to be looked down upon, now they are being followed, the leaders of a new musical revolution: discotheque. Such is Bowie's music, directed towards the new generation, appropriately titled, the Young Americans.

The album starts off with the title tune, which on the first listening is hopeless. The lyrics are obscure and haunting. He writes about tragedies, how the young American is not aware of his environment, how he wants money, limos, fame, if only by ripping-off the society. Bowie himself must be aware of his surroundings, and the power he holds over so many fans. He must HATE IT ALL!



Bowie has used female vocals for choruses, all the way through, which are effective on songs like 'Win' and 'Fascination', but don't work on some, like 'Right'. The song drags along, as if to fill space. It tends to be very repetitive. The second half of the cut is not Bowie at all. It is the back-ground female vocalists.

The second side is where it's at. All tunes may be danceable, but the energy is not totally directed toward the discos. The time the songs are more melodic, far more meaningful, though just as haunting, better produced, and generally well-played.

It opens with George Harrison-ish guitar licks on 'Somebody Up There Likes Me'. From the first notes, the song proves to be one of the better tracks on the album. Next comes the biggest disappointment of the album. Bowie's version of the Beatle's 'Across the Universe' is totally uninspired. Even with John Lennon helping him out, Bowie has come up with a fourth-rate number. It should have been saved for 'Bowie's Work Takes'. It is a sweek imaginative song, but he sings it with unnecessary powerful vocals.

'Can You Hear Me' is one of Bowie's better ballads, if you can call them ballads. Bowie can never sing smooth and gentle. Any gentle vocalist can turn this one into a hit. Bowie has filled it with running bass line, guitar licks, heavy percussion - although these never come to the foreground - and powerful background vocals. That doesn't leave too much room for easy listening, does it?

Last on the platter comes the most rocking, most commercial cut, 'Fame'. It is definitely the cooker of the album. He deserved a hit from this one, and sure enough got it. Lennon is supposedly singing on the chorus, but it's hard to pick out his voice. It is a good collaboration by Bowie, Lennon and Chris Alomar.

The production techniques give the song a very good overall effect. As he has frequently done, Bowie dubs his own voice - I wonder why, with all the good singers he has around him.

I have tried to get into Bowie several times. I even bought his 'Diamond Dogs' L.P. but with this one, I've finally decided David Bowie definitely doesn't turn me on. I'd rather listen to the likes of John Lennon, but can I help it if he decided to play with Bowie?

'Young Americans' is not for the uninitiated, yet it will be loved by his die-hard fans. Bowie has come a long way since his 'Space Oddity' days, if only downwards. I feel D.B. is now trapped, having nowhere to go from here. He has followed numerous musical directions and come up with unpteen different images. What next?

SHORTCUTS

You must have heard - Elton John's concert in Vancouver on October 16th sold out within 4-1/2 hours. It was announced at 8:15 am on the radio that tickets would go on sale a mere 45 minutes from then. When the concert was announced 'sold out, there was still a 3 block queue waiting to buy tickets. Officials are trying to arrange a second concert for that same week. Imagine the amount of cash Elton will miss out on if it cannot be arranged.....Local group BTO are turing out hit singles every other week it seems. Their latest is called 'Four Wheel Drive'.....McCartney and Wings are planning a January '76 tour.....Albums to watch out for in the fall: 'Cold Cuts' by McCartney, 'Rock n' Roll Circus' by The Stones, and as yet unnamed from George Harrison (the single has already been released), Elton John, Edgar Winter Group, and Joe Waleh (live).....That's all for now - may God's love be with you 'till next issue.
