New "priority" budget model in place

A new "priority planning approach" model budget and planning process is being instituted at BCIT.

The new process was recommended by an institute task force established by the president several months ago.

Task force members worked toward two goals: better integration of planning with budgeting and a more justified and co-ordinated allocation of budget.

In a written submission

explaining the task force's recommendation, Norah Andrew, budget accounting manager, said "During the past few years much more sophisticated planning and budgeting data has been required from all sources — externally from the ministry and councils, internally from our Board, budget units and all levels of administration.

"To add to these requirements, deadlines have changed for submissions to the ministry and most important, the impact of inflation has eroded our financial base considerably."

The priority planning model adopted by the institute is one that has been installed successfully in a great many industrial and non-profit environments.

Andrew added that a further task force recommendation is that the best place to begin would be with the 1981/82 budget allocations.

"The selection of a place (division) to start is always difficult and in this case unusually so because of the short time available to plan, design and implement a system tailored to BCIT needs.

"However, in a financial climate of diminishing resources, it was obvious that all revenue sources must be allocated to best achieve institute priorities," she said.

"Given this climate, a careful examination of all institute activities, with priorities set for each one, provides the best chance of ensuring that those activities which best support institute goals and objectives are funded," Andrew added.

Several explanatory management meetings have already been held to discuss the new system.

"The process calls for a thorough ranking and review of activities and levels of service from the budget unit managers right through to the Board of Governors," said Andrew.

"The justification put forward at each level of ranking will strengthen the allocation process with the emphasis on rationality."

Andrew concluded that the new approach "provides the best means of making the best uses of the resources we have, whatever that resource is — people, buildings or equipment."
