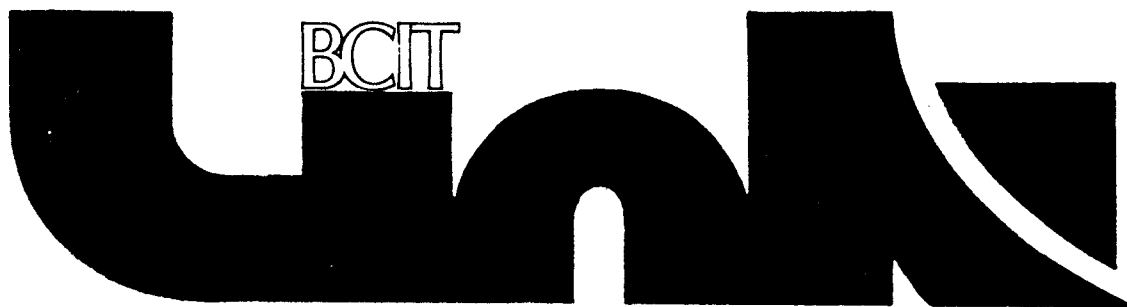


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WILLINGDON STUDENTS OUT IN THE COLD!!

Concern spread quickly over the BCIT Campus on Friday, January 16th, as the news broke that the Willingdon School for Girls was to be taken over by the Justice Department of the Government. The announcements in the January 16th issue of the Province and on the radio came as a complete surprise to our students and Administration alike.

The article in the Province by James Spears it was announced that the Education Minister Pat McGeer and Attorney General, Garde Gardom, had informally agreed that Willingdon will be turned into a new juvenile remand and assessment facility in the very near future. The article mentioned in passing that "The school is currently being used by the provincial education department and is near the B.C. Institute of Technology and other facilities". No mention was made of the 60 students who will have to find alternate accommodation in a hurry if the plan to move youths into the school in two weeks comes true.

And what about the 100 plus nurses who hope to graduate this year but who will not be able to if they are thrown out of their classrooms. There is no space at BCIT for them. It is estimated that around 1,000 people per week from BCIT, BCVS and Moscrop school use the Willingdon gym and pool facilities as a recreational and activities centre. Not to mention that BCIT student meals are cooked at Willingdon and transported to the SAC Building.

When the news broke Steve Brown, President of the BCIT Student Association, immediately tried to contact Mr. Gordon Thom, Principal, to ascertain if the Administration knew about this new development and what they were doing about it, but Mr. Thom was not on campus Friday morning.

The following telegram was then sent to Dr. Pat McGeer from Steve Brown on behalf of the Student Association expressing their concern.

TELEGRAM TO DR. PAT McGEER

We have received information that the Attorney-General's department has been given control of the Willingdon School of Girls.

On behalf of the Students of BCIT and more particularly, those who have made the School their home, I must express sincere concern over this situation. We currently have 66 student living in the facility as well as close to 1,000 student scheduled into formal recreation activities per week, not to mention the academic scheduling.

A decision to turn the facility over to the Justice Training department will have a devastating effect on our student residence situation as well as our recreation programs. This decision was made with complete disregard to consultation of these people concerned. It's hard for me to visualize how any government can unilaterally decide to abolish one of BCIT's most valuable assets. Our residence situation is desperate, our need for recreation facilities is critical and the institute's need for training areas especially in the area of patient care services is a top priority.

Dr. McGeer, I am appealing to you for a clarification of our situation. Our administration and the student executive have worked very hard to solve some of our most critical problems. We have dealt with three ministers of education on the issue of student residence and recreation facilities. Up till now, we were satisfied that the government was concerned and trying to help.

I hope this attitude will not change.

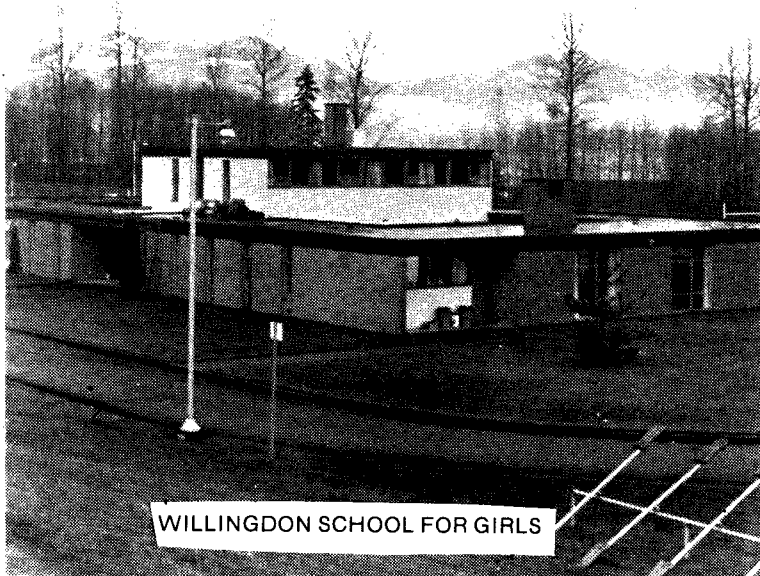
Things had been happening on the 2nd floor Administration Offices prior to the news breaking in the Province. On January 15th, after a meeting, Richard Smythe, Planning Officer, sent a memo to Mr. Thom expressing his concern that the fate of Willingdon School was being decided without any input or representation by BCIT Administration. Mr. Thom telegraphed the Department of Education expressing his concern. All this after the fact!

The weekend edition of the Sun dated January 17th, made the public aware of the true implications of the re-allocation of Willingdon by giving front page coverage to the plight of our students resident there. The article told of the distress felt by the students at their imminent eviction. Many said they would fight to stay there as this was their home and was so close to BCIT.

LINK interviewed Willingdon resident, Rod Grant, a first year Hotel, Motel student to find the general reaction to the news. LINK asked Rod if he felt he would be able to find alternate accommodation easily, his reply "No, there is an acute housing shortage in and around Burnaby I looked for other accommodation last September but they were either too far away or too expensive. I want to stay in residence for the two years I am at BCIT, it is now my home, and I can't afford the time and money right now to go elsewhere."

"How do you feel about the statement in the press?" was our next question. "I think it is completely unfair of the Government to do this, they don't seem to care about those they represent, they haven't given BCIT a chance to put its point of view forward."

"Are you willing to fight the decision if it becomes formal, we asked? "Yes, I think we all feel this way, whatever we can do to get some action, we will."

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The front page story outlines the events of the past few days with the reallocation of the Willingdon School for Girls imminent. The fact that it is unofficial at going to press, gives B.C.I.T. Administration and students a chance to stir up some action to try to get the decision reversed.

It seems that the Government has acted without consulting the people who would be most affected by the changeover of the Willingdon complex to a Juvenile Remand Centre. It seems the Government just doesn't care that students will lose their homes and that nurses will not be able to graduate. Whatever the outcome of the situation, it has only re-emphasized the desperate need for a residence right on campus. A residence that would belong to, and be run by,

BCIT so that the threat of mass eviction of students would never occur again.

The Student Association has for many years, tried to obtain the land and the mortgage necessary to start building. Plans have even been drawn up by an architect and each year they are brought out and then shelved as the S.A. meets opposition from all sides. Yet year after year the student intake rises and also the expense of building such a residence.

Perhaps some good will come out of this political wheeling and dealing if only to bring to the public's attention that the acute need for housing for our students is a reality and that your Student Association is trying to do something about it, to no avail.

Dear Sir -

Students will be interested to learn that all full-time BCIT students may now borrow materials free from 7 libraries in Greater Vancouver if they acquire a library card from the Burnaby Public Library.

They are eligible for this free card on presentation of identification, to any branch of the Burnaby Public Library.

Burnaby Public Library is a member of the newly formed Greater Vancouver Library Federation and a valid card from any branch of the members of the federation entitles borrowing from all branches of all 7 libraries.

Vancouver Public Library, North Vancouver City Library, New Westminster Public Library, North Vancouver District Public Library, Port Moody Public Library, and West Vancouver Memorial Library are the other federation members.

Students are expected to use the library resources of their own school, and to use the public libraries as back-up only when necessary, so as not to put too great a strain on the public library system, and so defeat the purpose for setting up this cooperative arrangement to serve all better.

Establishing the federation was possible only after a number of years of hard negotiation and planning between local and provincial levels of government and library personnel.

HOTEL/MOTEL STUDENTS TEST KEG FOOD

In keeping with British Columbia Institute of Technology's policy of education through practical application, Hotel Motel and Food Management students enjoyed a new learning experience early in the school year.

For five weeks, the students participated in a Product Survey conducted by the fast and growing Keg and Cleaver restaurant chain, a juicy opportunity that Marketing instructor Ed Cooke readily accepted for his class.

Acting as 'Silent Shoppers', the students were able to watch theory put into practice by one of the important innovators in the restaurant field. At the same time, the students were an obvious choice to scrutinize the individual outlets for flaws.

John McKenzie, President, of the Keg chain gave the student a briefing and then assigned each a 'home' Keg for three weeks, a 'sister' Keg for one week, and a competitor for one week. After each visit, the students completed in-depth

questionnaires on the standards of the food, atmosphere and the service.

The results of the questionnaires were tabulated and presented to the respective Keg managers for their consideration.

The students received valuable insight into the dynamics of modern restaurant operation, practical knowledge of marketing procedures and image-building techniques for a relatively new and highly successful restaurant concept.

They learned never to become complacent with success, but to continue to try to obtain feedback and use it as a basis for improvement.

They also received a first-hand look at job opportunities in their chosen field.

this survey was clearly beneficial both to BCIT and the Keg and Cleaver. It demonstrated how industry and Technology Institutes can cooperate to serve one another's interests, and the public interest as well.

"Over the Holiday Season"

This past Christmas brought to us many beautiful records we could use as gifts. Capitol Records tried to create Beatlemania by releasing new ex-Beatle records. 'Greatest Hits' packages from John and Ringo, George Harrison's new 'Extra Texture', and McCartney's 'Venus And Mars'. 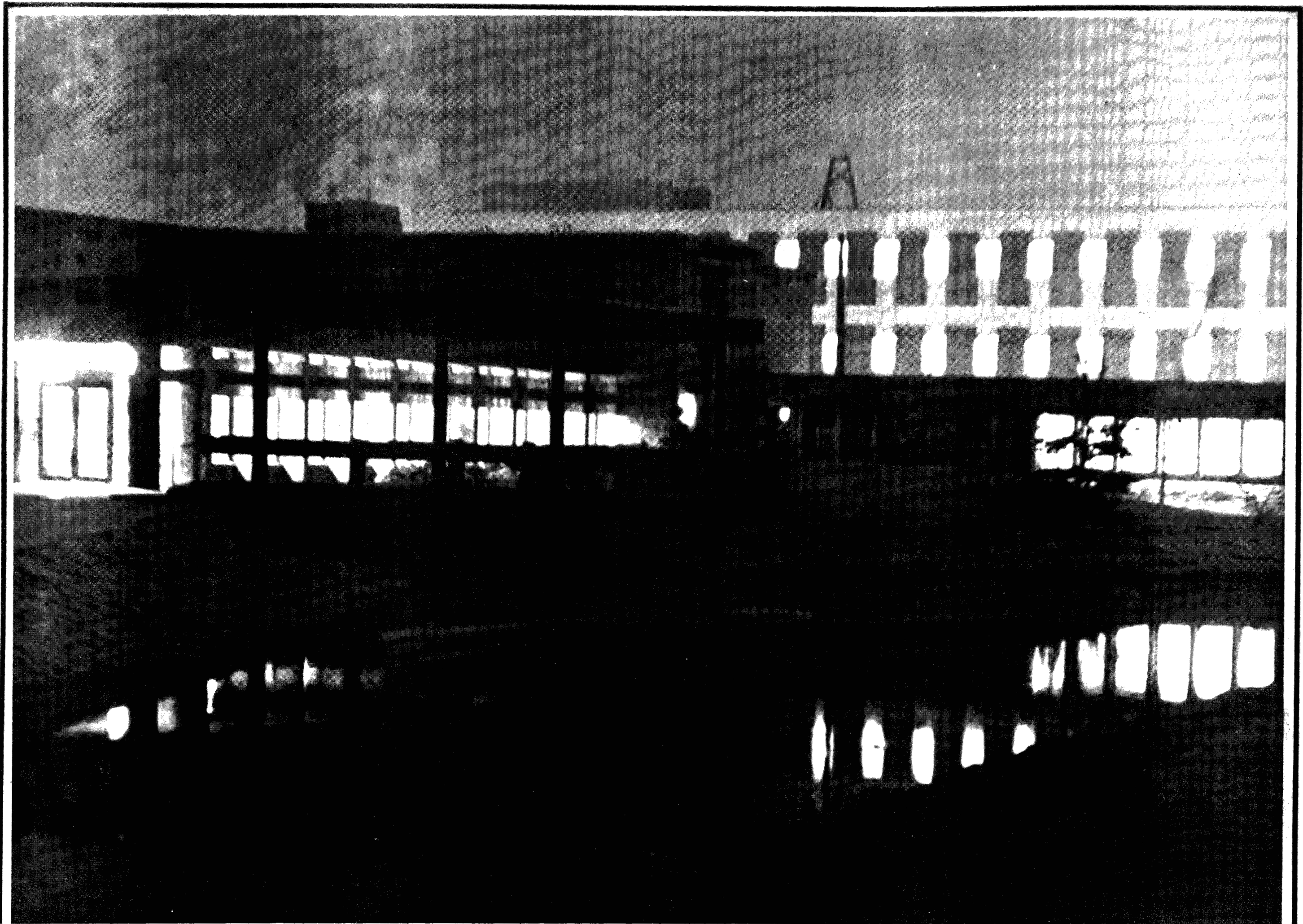

for Telethon

On February 21 & 22, 1976, there will be a 20 hr. continuous telecast called Telethon. I'm sure many of you have seen the show in previous years.

In a short period someone will be coming to your class to ask you to sign over your Caution to Telethon. For the sake of children throughout B.C. it is hoped that you will put your signature on the sign-up sheet. Variety Club is not like other charitable groups where most of the money raised goes to administration costs. Variety Club and Telethon is operated by volunteers who donate their time and energy and really care about what happens to these children who have mental and/or physical disabilities. The money raised also stays in B.C. instead of going to other provinces or countries which allows the children in B.C. to benefit from the money raised in B.C.

Where will your Caution Account money go to? This year Variety Club have decided to build a Diagnostic & Treatment Centre for children as a part of the Children's Hospital. This centre will be available to all children who need the facilities throughout B.C. There will be services available to assess and then help children with disorders such as speech defects, learning disorders, visual impairments, and many others. At present the centre is located in two old houses and two portable structures, but the demand for the services are increasing so rapidly that the centre cannot handle them and expansion is very necessary. Perhaps you, yourself, know someone with a child who is waiting to receive assessment or treatment.

Last year the Variety Club decided on an Institute at UBC for mentally retarded children which will open next month--so you can see that the money is being spent on something that can be seen and used. So, think twice before you decide that this cause is not worth your Caution Account.

If you have a few hours to spare on Saturday night and/or Sunday on February 21 & 22, volunteers are needed to work in several areas--telephones, securities and ushers. There will be a dance on Friday night, February 20th, with the profits going to the Telethon. If you wish to work on the Telethon give your name to your class President or come into the SAC office and give your name and tel. no. to someone there--your assistance will be greatly appreciated.
