Bartlett began last year as a member at large and moved up to the vice president's position this (school) year. She says her two years on council have been rewarding and practical as her interests include the administration and finance fields.
The executive makes decisions on spending and school activities and services and runs several business opera tions, including TAPS Growlies, SAMS, the TNT
stores and the new computer store. It is also responsible for such programs as Shinerama and a soon to be initiated campus cleanup campaign.
During Monday's executive meeting Bartlett, who acts as Chief Returning Officer for the elections, appointed Engineering division chairperson Jack Nelson as Deputy Returning Officer for the upcoming vote.

The positions available are those of president, vice president for administration and finance, vice president for public relations and marketing, vice president for student affairs, campus recreation chairperson, business society chairperson, health society chairperson, and engineering society chairperson. Nominations will be accepted until 11:30 a.m. March 4th. Nomination forms may be obtained from the S.A. general office in the SAC building
The elections are slated for March 26th and 27th.

## Changes expected in student aid money

Some of the harshest critics of the provincial government's policy on stu dent aid are saying they expect more money will be put into the aid program and hanges will be made by next fall.
Canadian Federation of Students researcher Suzanne Moran predicted an announcement by the minister responsible for Post Secon dary Education, Stan Hagan slated for February 28, will provide more funding.
"We're certainly hopeful there will be a lot more em phasis on needs based stuhasis assistance and stu ent assistance and that hind of foing to be som ind of funding increase fo tudent aid," said Moran.
BCIT Financial Aid advisor Kathy Schweers aggrees that the tone of the government in dicates there will be change to the student aid program following a review of submission made to the minister via and advisory committee set up last fall to look inmto student aid.
"The tone seems to be good. They are reviewing all
the submissions and they seem to be supportive to a lot of the recommendations," said Schweers.

The predictions came shortly after a report released by Simon Fraser University Financial Aid director Vern Loewen. Loewen predicted the student debt problem will grow worse unless im-
provements are made to provements are made to B.C.'s aid program.

Saying the average debt load being carried by SFU students ranges between nine and thirteen thousand dollars Loewen said future grads will owe more money because they have been in college or university at a time when there were no grants offered by the government.
A student aid advisory force has reported to Minister Stan Hagan including recommendations from student councils, student aid advisors and other education community people. The Ministry of Education has in turn approached the Treasury Board for money and the results of the money and the results of the request are expected to February 28.

## S.A. wants to clean up

With a new president and one new executive member the student executive met Monday evening and are looking forward to next year wondering who will run in the spring elections to replace this year's group.
While Pat Carroll is just settling in at the president's position and Carol Hess is learning the job of v.p. student affairs the v.p. administration, Andrea Bartlett, reported that there are only three people signed up to run for positions this spring Bartlett promised an ad campaign will appear in the Link newspaper and she urged members of the executive to get the word out to prospec tive politicians who may be willing to take on the always rewarding and sometimes dif ficult challenge of running a student society.
Remembering difficulties the name of past presiden Grant Sidnick was raised at the meeting in connection with money owed to the S.A Sidnick has promised to pay back just over $\$ 300$ to a discretionary fund and now owes another $\$ 107$, the balance due back from an ex pense account he received to attend a meeting on behalf of BCIT students. Sidnick will be notified by SA. business mana Phil Henderson and manager Pyil Hendarson and asked to return the money as soon as possible.
Henderson reported to the executive that the deadline set by the provincial govern ment for the S.A. to take ad vantage of money offered to needy students is now the end of March. Under the pro gram the B.C. government is willing to match funds col llected by the S.A. up to a maximum of $\$ 14,000$. The S.A has been using several methods to collect money for hose students on campur those find diemselves in sever who find thertivelves in sever financial difficulty. Currently the S.A. collects Scholars Dollars, holds special pub nights and turns some video game revenue over to the
fund, and there are plans to place specially marked cans around campus asking for donations. All money collected will be distributed through Financial Aid.
In other news, the executive plans to make changes to the constitution and those changes will be published in The Link for a second week (this issue) then be voted on by council on February 23, Students with concerns are urged to speak with executive members prior to next week's vote.
Students seeking work on campus next year may have more to choose from if a proposal to take over some of the janitorial services on campus passes S.A. and administration approval. A first year Administration Management student will present his idea to the S.A. Business Liaison Committee this week. Executive member Steve Neil says the student is serious about the proposal which includes student jobs in janitorial work on campus.
S.A. president Pat Carroll urged the executive to think about ways that students can get involved in the campus cleanup. He said it's important the S.A. develop a good working relationship with the senior administration on cam pus who wants us to feed them some ideas
Athletics and recreation chair Ray Richard offered to chair a committee on the campus cleanup and health division chair Terry Caetz of fered to work with the committee.

Executive members com plained about the state of the campus, saying "the janitorial service in the 1A building seems to be non-existent" Richard said he had attended an alumni meeting last week where one alumni rep said "nobody will support the pro posed new campus center if they see what a pigsty this place is". Richard added, "We need publicity on this thing. it's student garbage.

The Student Association's computer store is now open. The store, funded by the Student Association, is designed to make computer software and hardware accessible to BCIT students at reasonable rates.
Store manager Dan Brunt says students and faculty alike have been very supportive of the new store. He adds that the library foyer location has proven ideal and the prices unbeatable.
The store carries a line of IBM compatible computers
called IMI (lackel Microcomputers incorporated). The line was designed by former SFU computer student Gary Jackel upon request by that university for a cheaper but reliable IBM compatble computer for use at SFU

Brunt says SFU found the computers to be of the highest quality and are now using more than one hundred JMI units in their computer department Simon Fraser University and Malaspina Col lege in Nanaimo are also sell-
ing the JMI line in stores on their campuses. Brunt says the JMI is roughly half the price of an IBM personal computer. He also says his store offers software at about twenty per cent lower than average prices

Director of Computer Resources and Systems Morven Wilson is pleased there is a store on campus to help supply student demand for computer products. He adds that technologies ar changing and students should be aware there are other products on the market.

15.5 Student political clube may be organized under the Vicee President student Affairs to bear the name and to profess the politics of political parties (or comparable organizations) subject to the following resulations

15.12 Any menber of the Executive shall have right of accoess to minutes and reports of all subsidary organizations of the Association.
15.13 a. All subsidiary organizations which purpose to organize special functions, fund drive or appeals on or off the carpus shall first secure the permission of the council before organization or conducting such functions, drives or appeals.
b. In the event of a loss incurred by subsidiary organization in sponsoring such an event, the Association shall not be held 1 rable for the 1 oss.

Be forewarned, this album isn't for the squeamish. There isn't a song on the album that doesn't smack of friendships, committment, love lost, love found, or 'about being there when you're needed. Crawford reaches down to the core of her existence for this one and her existour fram and draws out every from of soulful energy from her rough-cut words, especially when she stretches out the
words "Baby Plea....se Co.....me Ho.....me" om "Christmas". I love this cut it's pure emotion.
"I'll Be Back" features a searing sax solo by Earl Seymour of the Arrows, a group whose production is similiar to that of Crawford's recordings. Both bands, the Terry Crawford Band and the Arrows, subscribe to the bigbang theory of sound: production with all the sonic subtlety of a nuclear blast. Is it any wonder "Total Loss of Control" was recorded at E-norm-us Sound in Toronto?
"I'tl Be Back" is the first single from the LP, and regardless of Can-Con regulations, it merits radio play. "One Night" is also aimed at the commercial Top 40 market and should do well on rock radio formats.

Nominated as most promising female vocalist at the 1982 Juno Awards, this pretty Montreal-born singer has plenty of talent. What's lacking in Terry Crawford's repertoire is almost forgotten by the quality of her passionate and husky voice. She"s a stylist who can turn a lyric with the best of them even the insipid lyrics on "Total Loss Of Control"

## Shelter

Maria Mckee of Lone Justice may have the greatest range and most expressive voice of any woman in rock today. This was much in evidence on Lone Justice's
sketchy, self-titled debut album. However, "Shelter", the band's second record is much more consistent and focused, demonstrating that McKee is maturing into a songwriter to go along with her vocal talent. This time some of their songs are getting airplay.

Labelling them a roots rock outfit is much too limiting, as roots rock is a generic term for a type of band that gets back to the stuff they grew up with (in most cases country rock) and in the meantime breaks no new ground, and dhesn't stray from the path they've followed for years The difference between Lone Justice's first and second records is light years. For this reason you cannot call them roots rock.
"Shelter" is basically a showcase for McKee's voice but behind that is a solid band supplying mid-tempo pop-rock that is laced (lightly with a country flavour.
However when Lone Justice and McKee decide to let go of the reins, the result is magic. She has more emotion and power in her voice than a Whitney Houston or Madonna will ever know in their Park Avenue lives.

If the improvement continues, their next album should be a huge success. In the meantime "Shelter" is highly recommended
