


The executive makes decisions on spending and school activities and services and runs several business opera-tions, including TAPS, including Growlies, SAMS, the TNT

## **Changes expected in** student aid money

Some of the harshest critics of the provincial government's policy on stu-dent aid are saying they expect more money will be put into the aid program and changes will be made by next fall

Canadian Federation of Students researcher Suzanne Moran predicted an an-nouncement by the minister responsible for Post Secondary Education, Stan Hagan, slated for February 28, will

"We're certainly hopeful there will be a lot more em-phasis on needs based student assistance and that there is going to be some kind of funding increase for student aid," said Moran.

BCIT Financial Aid advisor Kathy Schweers aggrees that the tone of the government in-dicates there will be changes following a review of submis-sion made to the minister via and advisory committee set up last fall to look inmto student aid.





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## S.A. wants to clean up

With a new president and one new executive member student executive met the Monday evening and are look ing forward to next year wondering who will run in the spring elections to replace. this year's group.

While Pat Carroll is just settling in at the president's position and Carol Hess is learning the job of v.p. stu-dent affairs the v.p. administration, Andrea Bartlett, reported that there are only three people signed up to run positions this spring. for Bartlett promised an ad cam-paign will appear in the Link newspaper and she urged members of the executive to get the word out to prospective politicians who may be willing to take on the always rewarding and sometimes dif-ficult challenge of running a student society.

Remembering difficulties, the name of past president Grant Sidnick was raised at the meeting in connection with money owed to the S.A. Sidnick has promised to pay back just over \$300 to a discretionary fund and now owes another \$107, the balance due back from an exthe pense account he received to attend a meeting on behalf of BCIT students. Sidnick will be notified by S.A. business manager Phil Henderson and asked to return the money as soon as possible.

Henderson reported to the recutive that the deadline to the provincial govern-tent for the S.A. to take adexecutive set ment ment for the S.A. to take ad-vantage of money offered to needy students is now the end of March. Under the pro-gram the B.C. government is willing to match funds col-llected by the S.A. up to a maximum of \$14,000. The S.A. has been using several methods to collect money for those students on campus who find themselves in severe financial difficulty. Currently the S.A. collects Scholars Dollars, holds special pub nights and turns some video game revenue over to the

fund, and there are plans to place specially marked cans around campus asking for donations. All money col-lected will be distributed through Financial Aid.

In other news, the ecutive plans to make changes to the constitution and those changes will be published in The Link for a second week (this issue) then be voted on by council on February 23, Students with concerns are urged to speak with executive members prior to next week's vote.

Students seeking work on campus next year may have more to choose from if a proto take over some posal the janitorial services on campasses S.A. and ad-DUS ministration approval. A first year Administration Management student will present his idea to the S.A. Business Liaison Committee this week. Executive member Steve Neil says the student is serious about the proposal which injobs student in cludes janitorial work on campus.

S.A. president Pat Carroll urged the executive to think about ways that students can get involved in the campus cleanup. He said it's impor-tant the S.A. develop a good working relationship with the senior administration on campus who "wants us to feed them some ideas".

Athletics and recreation chair Ray Richard offered to chair kay kichard offered to chair a committee on the campus cleanup and health division chair Terry Gaetz of-fered to work with the committee committee.

Executive members complained about the state of the campus, saying "the janitorial service in the 1A building seems to be non-existent". Richard said he had attended an alumni meeting last week where one alumni rep said, nobody will support the proposed new campus center if they see what a pigsty this place is". Richard added, "We need publicity on this thing, it's student garbage.

## New computer store opens

By Jon Ferebee The Student Association's computer store is now open. The store, funded by the Stuis designed dent Association, to make computer software and hardware accessible to BCIT students at reasonable rates.

Store manager Dan Brunt says students and faculty alike have been very suppor-tive of the new store. He adds that the library foyer location has proven ideal and the prices unbeatable.

The store carries a line of IBM compatible computers

called JMI (Jackel Micro computers Incorporated). The line was designed by former SFU computer student Gary Jackel upon request by that university for a cheaper but reliable IBM compatble com-puter for use at SFU.

Brunt says SFU found the computers to be of the highest quality and are now using more than one hundred JMI units in their computer department. Simon Fraser University and Malaspina Col-lege in Nanaimo are also sell-

ing the JMI line in stores on their campuses. Brunt says the JMI is roughly half the price of an IBM personal computer. He also says his store offers software at about twenty per cent lower than average prices.

Director of Computer Resources and Systems Morven Wilson is pleased there is a store on campus to help supply student demand for computer products. He adds that technologies are students changing and students should be aware there are other products on the market.





> THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS OF THE STUDENT ASSOCIATION OP

THE BRITISH COLUMBIA INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

- CONSTITUTION
- 1. The name of the Society shall be the Student Association of British Columbia Institute of Technology, hereinafter referred to as the Association.
- The object of the Association shall be to promote, establish, nd control a balanced program of extra-curricular and co-curricular activities, and to act as an agent in bringing student problems before the administration of the Institute.
- 3. The operations of the Society are to be carried on cheifly at the British Columbia Institute of Technology at the District of Burnaby,
- in the province of British Columbia.
- 4. The society shall be subject to the Societies Act and the Robert Rules of Order.

- j. have the power of binding interpretation of this Constitution or any of its Bylaws;
- To review the student activity fee in January and adjust the fee as they see fit by not less than 75% (percent) majority of the council quorum;
- The approved fee increase shall commence in September of the following academic year.

## BYLAW 3 - GOVERNING BODY OF THE ASSOCIATION, MEMBERS AND ELIGIBILITY

- 3.1 The name of the governing body of the Association shall be the Student Association Council hereinafter referred to as the Council.
- 3.2 Council quorum shall be no less than 75% of the total council membership: if council quorum is not met, then the meetings will be considered an Executive Council meeting.
- 3.3 The members of the Council shall be:
  - a. The Student Association Executive, (See Bylaw 4)
    - b. The duly selected representatives (hereinafter referred to as Members at Large) of the following division councils:

      - Business Division Council
         Bogineering Division Council
         Bealth Sciences Division Council
         Vocational & Trades Division Council
- 3.4 COUNCIL SELECTION
- 1. The student of each division shall be represented on the Association Council according to the following method based on enrolment figures as of September, 15th of that academic year.
  - a. Each division shall be represented by one Member at Large from that division: i) for each 300 students in that division;
  - ii) if the number of students enrolled in any division should
  - exceed 200 over a multiple of 300, that b. each Member at Large shall be selected by the resident council nd be responsible to the resident council.

#### Bylaw 3.7

3.7 Act as a Committee on Student Discipline in the following capacities: i) On its own initiative or on the written request of the Administration or five members of the Association, appoint committees to investigate matters of student discipline and specific misdemeanors. Before any decision is reached by the investigating committee, the person charged with the misst be heard by the investigating committee and by the council;

- ii) the Association shall have the power to impose a fine not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50) on any member who has contra any Bylaw of the Association.
- iii) exclude any member of the Association from any Association activity or all student activities;
- Active members only, may vote at meetings of the Association. Honorary members may not vote but may partake in discussion. Voting by proxy at meetings of the Association shall not be allowed. The show of hands vote shall be used at all general meetings of the Association. Voting by secret ballot at a general meeting shall be performed only on specific request by a member of the Associatio quest must be upheld by a majority vote, or by general vote
- n. Fifty Current Members of the Student Association of the current sion shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Association. The requirement for quorum satisfied, a decision of the Association may then be brought about by a majority vote of the mbers present, unless as otherwise stipulated in this Constitution nd its Bylaw

#### BYLAW 1 -MEMBERSHIP

The Association shall be comprised of active and bonorary members 1. The active members shall comprise all students (including full-time day students and Career Programme students who hav paid the required Student Activities fee for the current year).

BYLAWS

- 2. The Honorary members shall comprise all persons upon whom honorary memberships may be conferred by the Association or by its governing body.
- 3. The rights and obligations of the members of the Association shall be as stated in the Bylaws of the Association.
- 4. Active membership in the Association shall cease a) on a member ceasing to be registered student of the British Columbia Institute of Technology.

- 7.3 The committee shall meet on a regularly scheduled basis(every two weeks) to discuss any business related problems/opportunities. At which time, necessary policies or actions will take place by the Committee or the most appropriate member.
- 7.4 The Committee shall work by co-operation and consensus and not by vote, and when a resolution cannot be made at the Liaison Committee level, the Council should be asked to make the necessary decisions.
- 7.5 The Vice President Administration and Finance, with the aid of the manager, will report at Council Meetings, following the Liaison meetings any appropriate information.
- 7.6 The Committee shall be made up of he VP Administration and Finance, a member of the executive nd a lst year council Member at Large; and the senior business manager(s) and one operation manager elected by fellow operational managers.
- 1.7 The council shall elect the Business Liaison Committee first year Member at Large at the first full council meeting of the academic year.

If he/she was the sole candidate for the office in question, the office shall be left off the ballot and a special election shall be held no earlier than two weeks following the general election;

Any Member of the Association is eligible to run for any executive position if and only if they are attending full time program with a minimum course load of 60%, for a minimum of 75% of the term of office (See Bylaw 2 section 2A) and they are willing to make a commitment to fulfill their executive duties until the term of office has expired.

8.3 Campaigning

a. The last full week plus the school days prior to elections shall be designated by the Vice-President Administration, Pinance & Secretary as "Campaign Week". No manner of campaigning shall commence until 5:30 p.m. on the last school day preceeding the campaign week. Campaigning shall cease at 5:30 p.m. on the day prior to the first day of balloting.

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b. The use of lewd, indecent, or suggestive material or the defamation of campaign materials, irrespective of the form they may take is prohibited. A candidate using such materials or acting in such a manner shall be disqualified upon decision of the C.R.O. and shall not be eligible to run for office in the Association for the full academic year mubsequent to the offence.

- e. The campaign expenses incurred by any one candidate must not exceed \$75.00 (seventy five). The use of club funds or Association Funds is prohibited. All Campaign expenditures are to be accounted and submitted to the C.R.O. after date of elections.

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- 8.6 Newly Elected Officers The newly elected officers shall attend all regular meetings of the out-going Executive and Council and familarize themselves with their new offices with the guidance and advice of the current office Bolders. They shall be entitled to participate in the deliberation of meetings but shall not be entitled to vote.
- 8.7 The Vocational and Trades seat will not be an elected position. However, the Vocational and Trades Division Council will appoint a chairperson or designate either via election or Vocational Division Council Movement. This seat will be open on a rotating basis and must be filled by the Vocational and Trades Division chairperson or designate.

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BYLAW 9 - CONDITIONS OF OFFICE AND IMPEACHMENT 1. The officers of the Association shall be required to resign

- c. The Polling Clerks shall present the ballots for inspection. The Deputy Returning Officer or Chief Returning Officer shall inspect the ballot boxes before and after the casting of ballots.
- d. The ballot boxes shall be constituted of metal or wood and shall be equipped with a lock and an appropriate seal.
- e. Each voter must satisfy the C.R.O. that he/she is a member of the Association. Each member of the Association shall
- The voter shall mark his ballot, fold it and place it in the ballot box.
- f. A voter who inadvertently spoils their ballot shall return it to the Polling Clerk in exchange for a new ballot. The Clerk shall immediately destroy the spoiled ballot.
- g. While voting is in progress, access to the polls shall be limited to the following:
- i. Chief Returning Officer
- ii. Deputy Returning Officer
- iii. Polling Clerks
- iv. Staff Advisors to the C.R.O.

#### BYLAW 10 - REPLACEMENT OF OFFICERS

 In the event of resignation, death, or impeachment, of any officer of the Association, the following procedure will be followed:

- The auditors of the Association shall be appointed by the Executive and shall be paid such remuneration as the Executive shall determine. The Association shall be informed of the appointment at the Annual General Meeting.
- 2. The auditors of the Association shall have a right of access at all times to all books and records of the Association and all subsidiary organizations and shall be entitled to require from any and all members or officers of the Association or any subsidiary an explanation as may be necessary, for the performance of the duties of the auditors.
- The auditors shall make an annual report for the preceeding session ending June 30th, to the members of the Association, and the report shall include:
  - Whether or not they have obtained all the information and explanation they have required;
  - b. Whether in their opinion the balance sheet referred to in the report is properly drawn up so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the affairs of the Association according to the best of their information, the explanations given to them, and as shown by the books of the Association

#### Counting Procedures

8.5

a. Immediately following the final closing of the polls the Deputy Returning Officer shall convey the ballot boxes to the area wherein the counting of ballots is to take place. The C.R.O. will personally unlock and unseal the boxes.

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- b. The C.R.O. shall decide on the validity of all ballots Once a ballot has been declared invalid, it shall remain as such. Ballots shall be declared invalid for the following
  - If any mark other than "X" is used to show choices;
     ii. If more than one candidate is marked for a single
- office being contested; c. The following and no other shall be allowed inside the area
- where and while the ballots are being counted.
- i. Chief Returning Officer
- ii. Deputy Returning Officer
- iii. Polling Clerk iv. Campaign Managers
- v. Staff Advisors to the C.R.O.
- All the above except the Campaign Managers shall participate in the counting of ballots.
- Results of the elections shall be made available to the members of the Association through:
  - i. Posting on the Student bulletin boards;
  - ii. Publications in the official student newspaper.
  - iii. Public announcement after ballot counting is completed.

#### BYLAW 11 - FUNDS

- The funds of the Association shall consist of the following

   All fees for admission to the Association collected by
   the V.P. Finance of the British Columbia Institute of
   Technology at the time of payment of fees;
  - All monies (excepting special mambership fees approved by the Council) received by student organizations as a result of Association sponsored activities and Association operated business ventures;
- - b. Monies spent in excess of approved budget limits must first be approved by the Executive and reported to Council. Monies spent on operating the business ventures must be of the normal operating expenses; capital or fixed asset spending for the ventures in excess of \$1,000,00 in cost must be approved by the Business Lisison Committee and reported to Council.

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#### BYLAW 13 - BORROWING AND LENDING ROWERS A. BORROWING

- Subject to the provisions contained in Section 35 of the Societies Act of British Columbia, the Council may for the purpose of carrying out the objectives of the Association, borrow, raise or secure the repayment of such sus or sums of money in such manner and upon such conditions and terms in all respects as the Association may by resolution prescribe and in particular by the issue of bonds, perpetual or redeemable debentures, or any mortgage, darge or other security on the whole or in part of the property or assets of the Association, both present and future, including all fees or membership dues now or bereafter due or payable.
- B. LENDING There will be no personal loans granted. An advance not in excess of 1/2 the established monthly honorarius may be
- granted for no greater than a month period.

#### BYLAW 14 - INJURIES

- The Association shall carry sufficient Third Party Liability Insurance, with a minimum \$5,000,000.00 in respect of any injury sustained by any member or other person participating in any student activity. This figure shall be reviewed each year at the budget meeting.
- The Student Association shall take advantage of the Workers' Compensation Board's offerings for its exployees, i.e. student employees of the Student Association while working for the Student Association.

#### BYLAW 15 - SUBSIDIARY ORGANIZATIONS

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15.1 The Vice President Student Affairs shall control such subsidiary organizations (ie. clubs) activities as their respective consitutions may provide, and are approved from time to time by resolution of the Council.

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- 15.2 The Constitutions of the major subsidiary organizations and their subsidiary organizations shall not contain provisions contrary to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Association and shall be subject to the approval of or amendment by, Council or the Association. The activities of all such organizations shall comply with any regulations or resolutions made from time to time by the Association or the Council.
- 15.3 Any group of students proposing to form an organization for any purpose within the objects of the Association, shall first make application to the Vice President Student Affairs for permission to organize under that directorship and their constitution shall subsequently be ratified by the Council.
- 15.4 Any student organization not recognized by the Association shall make application in writing to the Council for permission to use the Association's name for notice-boards or those of its subsidiary organizations.

#### Bylaw 15.5

15.5 Student political clubs may be organized under the Vice President Student Affairs to bear the name and to profess the politics of political parties (or comparable organizations) subject to the following regulations:

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- a. Such clubs shall in all respects be subject to the rules of the Association;
- b. Except as specially provided by resolution of the Council, such clubs shall not receive funds from any outside organizations.
- c. No such club shall participate directly, or otherwise, in elections to any student offices outside the club itself and acceptance of any such support shall render any candidate for office ineligible.
- d. The Association in no way will provide financial assistance for a political club or be liable in any way for the action of such club.

NOTE: Violation of any of the aforesaid regulations shall render the clubs concerned liable to suspension.

#### Bylaw 15.6

15.6 Each subsidiary student organization shall be no named as to indicate that it is a student organization under the Association and in no way purports to be separate.

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15.7 Other than designated political clubs, no organization in the Association shall become or allow itself to become an instrument in partisan politics.

- a. Any such organization deemed by the Council to be or to have been improperly acting in interests of a political party (or comparable organization) shall be liable to suspension of its charter.
- b. Such charter may be restored by the Council only if and when the Council is satisfied that the organization concerned will serve the purpose and only the purposes for which it was organized.
- 15.8 The financial reports of subsidiary organizations of the Association shall be received by the Vice President Student Affairs who shall pass them on to the Vice President Administration, Finance & Secretary (14) fourteen days before the Annual General Meeting.
- 15.9 The Annual reports of all subsidiary organizations of the Association shall be received by the Vice President STCDEIT Affairs twenty-one (21) days before the Annual General Meeting.

#### Bylaw 15.10

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- 15.10 a. The proposed expenditures of the subsidiary organizations of the Association shall be received by the Vice President Student Affairs before the first week in May of the year prior to its implementation. A revised budget may be applied for no later than January 30th, and this estimate shall not exceed an increase of five percent (5%) of the May budget.
  - b. Subsidiary organizations of the Association formed during the acádemic year may submit budgets to Council and through the Vice President Student Affairs, at the time of formation for approval.
- 15.11 If any subsidiary organization of the Association desires a purchase through its budget, a request for the article(s) desired shall be submitted to the Vice President Student Affairs who shall review the request and disburse/not disburse the necessary funds.
- 15.12 Any member of the Executive shall have right of access to minutes and reports of all subsidary organizations of the Association.
- 15.13 a. All subsidiary organizations which purpose to organize special functions, fund drive or appeals on or off the campus shall first secure the permission of the Council before organization or conducting such functions, drives or appeals.
  - b. In the event of a loss incurred by subsidiary organization in sponsoring such an event, the Association shall not be held liable for the loss.

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#### BYLAW 18 2 SEAL OF ASSOCIATION

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The seal of the Association shall not be affixed to any instrument except in the presence of the President or Vice President Administration, Finance & Secretary and then only by the authority of a resolution of the Council. The said officers shall witness every instrument on which the Seal of the Association is affixed in their presence. The Seal of the Association shall be kept in the custody of the Business Hanager or such other person, as the Council may from time to time appoint.

#### BYLAW 16 - DISCIPLINE

16.1 Any form of gambling for money, or for any monetary equivalent, is prohibited within the precincts of the Institute without authorization of the Council.

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- 16.2 No publication or advertisements or forms of commercial enterprises whatsoever shall be printed or displayed or distributed and no member of the Association shall attempt to sell or dispose of any publications or advertisements or goods or services on campus of the Institute without first having secured permission of the Council.
- 16.3 Any disciplinary action will be conducted and dispensed at the discretion of Council.

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BYLAW 17 AMENDMENTS OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

- 17.1 Amendments may be initiated by:
  - a. Any member of the Association may propose an amendment. Such amendment shall be signed by at least seventy-five (75) percent of the Association in good standing and handed to the Vice President Administration, Finance & Secretary of the Association.
  - b. Any member of the Council at a Council Meeting.
- 17.2 The Constitution Committee forthwith after receipt of such proposed amendments shall publish them in two consecutive issues of the student newspaper prior to the submission of the proposed amendments to the Council for revisal and ratification.
- 17.3 The Constitution and Bylaws may be altered by a majority of at least seventy-five (75) percent of the Council members present at a Council meeting.

#### BYLAW 19 - RECORDS

 The minutes of the meetings of the Association, Council, and Executive shall be kept at the offices of the Student Association in the British Columbia Institute of Technology, 3700 Willingdon Avenue, Burnaby, B.C.

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2. The books and records of the Student Association may be inspected by members in good standing at the offices of the Associationon any business day except Saturday and Sunday during the academic year between the hours of 10.00 a.m. and and 4.00 p.m.,provided such times are mutually convenient to two members of the Executive and the members of the Association making such inspection.

#### BYLAW 20 - GENERAL POWERS OF THE ASSOCIATION

The Association shall have the power to make such regulations from time to time as it may deem necessary or advisable concerning the activities of the Council or any of its subsidiary organizations and to repeal, vary, alter or amend the same in such a manner as it may deem fit. Such regulations shall be made by a resolution at a general Association meeting.



"Christmas (Baby On Page 12

Please Come Home)" originally performed by the Crawford shines Ronettes her brightest. "Gonna and deck the halls / But Gonna sing not like Christmas at all / 'Cause I remember when you were here / And all the fun we had last year'. Crawford reaches down to the core of her existence for this one and draws out every ounce draws out every ounce of soulful energy from her rough-cut words, especially when she stretches out the words "Baby Plea....se Co....me Ho....me" om "Christmas". I love this cut om it's pure emotion.

"I'll Be Back" features searing sax solo by Earl Seymour of the Arrows, a group whose production similiar to that of Crawfor of Crawford's recordings. Both bands, the Terry Crawford Band and the subscribe to the big-Arrows. bang theory of sound: production with all the sonic subtle-ty of a nuclear blast. Overall the album resembles the funk of George Duke but it isn't nearly as exuberant. The occasional guitar solos by Paul Pesco stand out. A pleasant enough effort if you tolerate this sort of pop. Reasonable background music if you must have a party.

#### Shelter Lone Justice

Griffen Records

Maria McKee of Lone Justice may have the greatest range and most expressive voice of any woman in rock today. This was much in evidence on Lone Justice's sketchy, self-titled debut album. However, "Shelter", the band's second record is much more consistent and focused, demonstrating that McKee is maturing into a songwriter to go along with her vocal talent. This time some of their songs are getting airplay.

Labelling them a roots rock outfit is much too limiting, as roots rock is a generic term a type of band that gets back to the stuff they grew up with (in most cases country rock) and in the meantime breaks no new ground, and dhesn't stray from the path they've followed for years. difference between Lone Justice's first and second records is light years. For this reason you cannot call them roots rock.

"Shelter" is basically a showcase for McKee's voice, behind that is a solid but band supplying mid-tempo pop-rock that is laced (lightly) with a country flavour.

Lone However when Justice and McKee decide to let go of the reins, the result is magic. She has more emotion and power in her voice than a Whitney Houston or Madonna will ever know in their Park Avenue lives.

If the improvement continues, their next album should be a huge success. In the meantime "Shelter" is the meantime "S highly recommended.
