The first planetarium in BC is tight here on campus, straight from the 60's

hink you've seen everything there is to see at BCIT? Think again. One of the school's best kept secrets is now open for the public.

Did you know that BCIT has a planetarium? Most people (students or faculty) are unaware of the room in the basement of SW3 (room B732, for those interested) that has housed British Columbia's first planetarium since 1964.

Bill Burnyeat, Community Astronomer at the H.R. MacMillan Space Centre, and employee of the Vancouver School Board has been asked to begin a series of programs at the planetarium.

"What really makes the planetarium at BCIT special is that all of the equipment is still the original analog gear, first installed in 1964. With equipment this old, it can cost a lot for upkeep and repairs, so that's why we'll be charging a small fee for viewers - to keep this place running smoothly," commented Burnyeat, adding that the fee for replacing the projector's light bulb is in the area of \$800 US.

Burnyeat, who has been part of an Astronomy Outreach program on and off for the last 15 years is set to offer a continuing education course here at BCIT.

"The idea is that we put on a general interest program in astronomy, something with a little less math than a geomatics course," he said.

Local elementary schools and community groups will be charged at a group rate, but the presentation is also available to BCIT students for a cost of only \$3.

"We're hoping to attract a lot of people with our retro appeal. There are only three or four planetariums like this in Canada, and this is the only one in B.C."

In the past, the room has only been used for BCIT's Geomatics program. Now, in combination with the new programs, Burnyeat will be teaching a night school course in general astronomy.

"We're not trying to compete with the MacMillan Space Centre, obviously, but we are hoping to get thousands of people through here."

Part of the planetarium's appeal is in the extremely rare condition all the original machines and interiors are. The orange seats, complete with creme-coloured cushions have springs in them to allow for comfortable reclined viewing of the overhead dome. The projector is made by the Spitz company in the US and they still have a technician who can come out to service the projector if anything should happen.

Bill Burnyeat will be running 45 minute programs for students of BCIT from Monday to Thursday at 11:30 am. Come out, support the planetarium and enjoy the show.

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Women In Trades

Getting practical, hands-on experience in 20 different trades

The machine shop in NW6 is a noisy place full of machines designed to cut and melt various metals. Everyone is outfitted in green coveralls, steel-toed boots, and protective eyegear. It's easy to spot the 18 students in the Trades Discovery for Women program: they are the only women in the room.

"Women are definitely under a spotlight when they're here," says Tamara Pongracz, the Program Co-Ordinator of Trades Discovery for Women. "They don't go unnoticed." BCIT initiated this program in 1995 to introduce female students to trades, technologies and blue collar work. Women are seriously underrepresented in these areas, barely reaching 2% of the national workforce. That fact, combined with predictions of skilled labour shortages coming from both industry and government, make programs such as this one good news for many people.

The Trades Discovery students get hands-on experience in the 20 different trades programs offered at BCIT, spending anywhere from a day to a week in areas such as aviation, auto repair, carpentry, security alarm installation, sheet metal and welding. Halfway through the program, which runs from September to January, and again from February to June, the students complete a 3-week 'job shadow,' where they get workplace experience in the trade of their choice.

"Sometimes it cements what they want to do, and sometimes it makes them realize they're not interested," says Pongracz. Heading into week 3 of their program, the Trades Discovery women are in the machine shop, making hammers from blocks of steel using various machines. They've already spent a week in carpentry, where they built 10 foot high miniature houses, and a week in plumbing, where they learned to weld. "Welding is such fun," says student Starr Vickers, 26. It's a far cry from the psychology degree she started a few years ago, before losing interest, traveling, then deciding to pursue a trade. Like most of the girls enrolled, she has nothing but praise for the Trades Discovery for Women program: "It's an amazing opportunity to get hands on experience in all these different

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trades," says Vickers. "I didn't want to jump into anything too soon-and some of it you realize is not your thing."

Natalie Louke, 21, from Powell River, agrees. She had worked in a pulp and paper mill for 2 years before she was laid off. She knew she enjoyed working in an industrial setting, and wanted to see what her options were.

"I chose this program so I would know exactly what I want to do, and make sure I'm mentally and physically capable of doing a trade."

Instructor Greg Wahl, a machinist working with the Trades Discovery students this week, says they are more than capable. When asked about the difference between teaching men and women, Wahl says his female students are much more attentive to detail: "They want to know what they're doing before they do it, and they're much more calculated in their approach. Guys tend to be a little more cavalier," he says laughing.

Greg is assisted by Joanne Little, a BCIT graduate who works full time in the industry. Little takes a week off every term to work with the Trades Discovery for Women students when they're in the machine shop, acting as a mentor and role model.

"It's great to see so many young women interested in trades, and fun to see them progress so quickly," she says. "A couple have already said 'machining is not for me,' which is fine. Much better to know now, before they've dumped thousands of dollars and years of their life into a trade they may find they don't really like."

Most of these women, however, will find a trade they like. Over 70% of Trades Discovery for Women graduates go on to begin their apprenticeships and/or technical trades training at BCIT. Starr Vickers is pretty sure she will be one of them. "I think everyone should have a trade," she says. "Something to fall back on." She points out that with many employers obligated to hire a certain percentage of women to make up their labour force, being a woman with a trade puts you at a strong advantage. Natalie Louke agrees. She worked with a mostly male workforce at the pulp mill, but is enjoying this program.

Students, Faculty Save Lives

S tudents and staff recently had the opportunity to help save lives when Canadian Blood Services came to BCIT.

A blood donor clinic was set up in the Great Hall complete with registered nurses, all the necessary medical supplies, and cookies and Tang.

113 donors came forward to give a unit of blood on the 26th of September, and they were able to collect 85 units of blood, which will help save up to 340 lives of patients in need of blood and blood products.

"The process of giving blood is quite simple," said Donna Scott, Community Development Coordinator for Canadian Blood Services. "After meeting eligibility requirements, donors have their fingers pricked to check their iron levels and then they can give blood."

The entire process of actually giving blood only takes between

five and 20 minutes, but the registration part is the most time consuming.

"People are often apprehensive because the pamphlet says that it takes an hour, and they think 'I have to be on a machine for an hour?" but it is quite a bit shorter," commented Scott.

Al Rempyl (see inset photo), a Metalab Science Instructor here at BCIT donated for the 14th time.

"I've done this over a number of years," he said, "It's a good thing to do."

Each day in BC and the Yukon 500 units of blood are needed.

Donna Scott would like to urge students and staff to please come to the next blood donor clinic on Thursday, November 21st in SE6 and encourage your friends and colleagues to join you so they can meet their goal of collecting 113 units of blood. The present to you a checklist. If you answer yes to any two of these three questions, you are most likely to enjoy the new Reese Witherspoon movie, Sweet Home Alabama. Number one: are you female? Two: are you between the ages of ten and seventy-nine? Three: did you enjoy Bridget Jones' Diary, the book or the movie?

If you nodded, think about setting some time aside for next Tuesday. Like most romantic comedies, this movie features the 'decision factor' as I like to call it. Fashion designer Melanie Carmichael (Witherspoon) has to choose between sticking with her engagement to her New York fiancée Andrew (Patrick Dempsey) or, staying married to her Alabama ex-but-not-quite-ex husband Jake (Josh Lucas). New York City seems to pump out about 20 of these bands a day who perform at art galleries and put on often elaborate artsy stage shows. Still, the best electro-clash comes from Europe, led by **Miss Kittin**, **Felix Da Housecat** and England's greatest contribution to the scene: **Ladytron**. turns depending on the mood of the song. There are tracks for the dance floor (the leadoff single Evil, Black Plastic), and songs more suited to an evening sitting around playing Atari with your loved ones (Flicking Your Switch, Nuhorizons, and the title track). Evil could very well be the best single of the year depending on whom you ask.

Ladytron's second album, *Light and Magic*, takes the sound from their first, 604, and finely tunes it. The lineup of the band remains the same, two dudes and two female vocalists. The two vocalists, DJ Mira and Helen, take

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Don't Drown in Your Hockey Pool

Jay Selinger reveals his picks and predictions for the upcoming NHL season



ell, the air's getting cold, the sun's going down and halter tops are turning into turtlenecks. It's that time of the year again. Yup, it's time again to pull out your crystal balls and make your hockey pool picks. A last place finish in last year's pool made you look pretty sad and probably cost you a few beers. Perhaps taking the tough guy on Columbus' fourth line wasn't such a great idea, nor was picking goons in your first round. There are a few things to remember when making your choices, so here's some guidance to perhaps lift you up to your personal holy grail, second only to a Stanley Cup, first place in the hockey pool.

A lot of teams look poised to hoist the Stanley Cup this year. Detroit is going to be defending their title in true Red Wing fashion. They will be the team to beat once again this year. Also looking quite strong in the Western Conference (where all the scoring happens - nudge, nudge), are the San Jose Sharks, Colorado Avalanche. and yes, even the Vancouver Canucks, who led the NHL in team scoring last season.

The Eastern Conference should be a lot more exciting this year as well. With the heralding of increased obstruction penalties, the clutch and hold method that hoisted the New Jersey Devils to a Cup will be shunned, and should add to more goals scored all around. The teams to beat in the East will be the Philadelphia Flyers and the Washington Capitals. Also challenging will be the New York Islanders and the Toronto Maple Leafs.

First picks of a hockey pool have always been the easy and predictable ones, the Yzermans, Sakics and Sundins. However, last year's NHL season ended on a high note for a whole new generation of hockey players. Jarome Iginla's scoring reign earned him the Maurice Richard and the Art Ross Trophies, and will leave him a favorite in every fan's hockey pool.

The power forward position is becoming a valuable commodity once again. Along with Iginla, Todd Bertuzzi of the Canucks had a break-out year finishing third in overall scoring even while missing 15 games. Erik Cole of the Carolina Hurricanes had a stellar playoff performance and displayed the same blend of toughness and finesse that Bertuzzi exemplified last season.

Look for players who had hot finishes last year in both the season and the playoffs. In this group you'll fight workhorses like Richard Zednick who led play-off scoring until ousted by an injury. Alexei Kovalev of the Pittsburgh Penguins also had a strong finish to last season, and if his confidence continues he will be a leading scorer this season. Couple that with the fact that if not playing with Martin Straka again, he will likely be centered by Mario Lemieux and this could turn into a career season.

Team chemistry is what builds championship teams and goal scoring lines. Markus Naslund, Todd Bertuzzi and Brendan Morrison of the "West Coast Express" line should put up some big numbers this year, after being the highest scoring line in the NHL last season.

Team acquisitions also help players when the right ingredients are brought in. Adam Oates was traded to the Anaheim Mighty Ducks and will be a great asset to Paul Kariya's stats. Oates himself had 64 assists last season, so both of these players should be great picks. Chris Drury joined the Calgary Flames last week, so he and Iginla will have lots to work with.

The bottom end of a hockey pool is where the big points will be gained. Whoever picks the good young guys and the lucky old guys will have an edge to finishing

in the pool money. Dany Heatley and Ilya Kovalchuk complimented each other quite well last year and set 5 club rookie records for the Atlanta Thrashers, while finishing one-two in team scoring. Look for Pavel Datsyuk to tear up the scoring board in Detroit, and Jaroslav Svoboda to play big hockey in his second NHL year with the Carolina Hurricanes. Shawn Bates lit himself a new flame last year playing for the New York Islanders and will be ready to build on his 52 points.

Defensive picks are just as important as forwards. Most pools have a defense quota to fill and Detroit's Nicklas Lidstrom is an easy choice. Other obvious picks are Rob Blake, Chris Chelios, Chris Pronger, Ed Jovanovski and Adam Foote. When picking defensemen for your pool, study ice time and special teams play. All the obvious choices above play many minutes and fill up the power play unit. Other great picks are Adrian Aucoin of the Islanders, Toronto's Tomas Kaberle and Dallas' Sergei Zubov.

The last section of any good hockey pool, just like a team's last line of defense, is the goaltender. Points are amassed through different criteria such as shutouts and wins. Look to the number one goalies for this section. Patrick Roy is usually the first choice, but also look at a team's defense. Sometimes a team's defense will get the goalie the win or even a shutout. Detroit's Curtis Joseph should be a standout this year because of the team in front of him. The New Jersey Devils have Martin Brodeur, as well as the best defense in the league. Other standouts are Evgeni Nabokov from San Jose, Boston's Byron Dafoe and the last year's Vezina Trophy winner, ladies and gentlemen, from the Montreal Canadiens, Jose Theodore. Pick a great goalie and build your hockey pool status.

Hockey pools aren't about the money, or the accolades... they're all about bragging rights. So lace 'em up, make your choices and may the best puck pick win. And remember if you don't finish first, there's always golf. Good luck
