## New PSE minister wants university in his riding

B.C.'s new minister of post-secondary education wants the province's fourth university built in his riding.

Bruce Strachan, the Social Credit legislator for Prince George South, became minister of advanced education in the recent provincial cabinet shuffle.

He said the proposed Prince George university was "very much" a personal and cabinet priority.

"I see it as kind of a desperate attempt on the part of the government to retain Mr. Strachan's seat," NDP education critic Barry Jones said.

Jones said the government was yielding to pressure from a group which has been pushing for a university in Prince George.

"I think it's an important issue but certainly there are many other issues in post-secondary education, none of which I've seen Mr. Strachan take an interest in the past three years," Jones said.

Strachan said a northern university has always been his goal.

"It's obvious that the Social Credit government selected me for the ministry to demonstrate its support for the northern university," he said.

Strachan said Prince George was "a logical location" for a new B.C. university. He said he had helped

engineer provincial government funding from the Interior University Society's (IUS) studies into the proposal while in the environment portfolio in cabinet.

Canadian Federation of Students Pacific chair Pam Frache said there were other proposals which should be considered, preferably with more public input.

"We hope that the fact that (Strachan) was appointed doesn't mean that the model being put forth for the university of the north is a fait accompli," she said.

Strachan, the former environment minister said he is looking forward to his new post.

"I've been meeting as many people as I can, learning what I can and trying to relearn the vocabulary," he said.

Strachan has been an MLA since 1979 and was chair of the Prince George school board. He was also the public relation's officer for the Prince George-based College of New Caledonia from 1973 to 1977.

UBC student council executive Vanessa Geary hoped Strachan's appointment did not mean a significant change in policy.

"With Stan Hagen as minister we saw an increase in funding on post-secondary education," Geary said. "It is crucial that the new minister realize that this trend must continue if B.C.'s education is to be truly accessible and competitive."

## Touch-screen answers to fin aid questions

Financial Aid and Awards, in conjunction with BCIT's ARCS Lab, has developed a touch-screen Student Financial Assistance System. This computer program interacts with the user, initially asking questions about the student's situation and then providing information on types of financial aid that the student can apply for. It also includes a section that allows the student to develop a budget for their school year.

The student gets a printout of the information and/or budget when they finish.

SFAS is being used on a pilot basis until December 31 to

determine if it is useful enough to continue.

Technology students are encouraged to take 10-15 minutes out of their busy schedules to try out the program (and complete a very short checklist to give feedback on their experience).

The SFAS touch screen computer is located in the Student Services resource area (2nd floor of the 1A building, northwest corner). Students do not have to check with the receptionist - just use the machine if it is free. Available hours: Monday to Friday 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.

## CFS: no tuition would be better

B.C. students can borrow between nine and 25 per cent more this year.

But at least one student leader is calling the changes to B.C.'s student aid program a mixed blessing.

"It's bittersweet," said Canadian Federation of Students-Pacific chair Pam Frache. "It's good because in the short term students will have more disposable income over the year."

"It's bad because the consequences of the increased debt load that students will carry aren't being compensated by the financial aid system," she said.

"It's very dangerous for students who don't know what interest rates will be like when they graduate and have to start paying interest."

The spring changes will give students loans based on the number of weeks they study, not based on the number of sessions.

"This is good, especially for people in colleges and in technical programs," Frache said. "Some students' terms are longer than others, and their loans should reflect that."

"Many students are quite

surprised to find what is available," said. "I haven't met anyone who was upset about getting more money."

Independent students without children can receive up to \$200 a week and students with dependents up to \$300 per week.

"This system is far fairer," said the University of Victoria's financial aid manager Nels Granewall. "We are in a position now where we can help a student based on the time they are actually studying."

An independent student in a 34 week program available for can get up to \$6,800. Students with dependents can get up to \$10,200.

Independents in a 39 or 43 week program would receive up to \$7,800 or \$8,600, and those with dependents in the longer programs are eligible for up to \$11,700 or \$12,900.

In 1988-89 the B.C. students with kids could get up to \$8,400 and those without, \$6,200.

Students who complete their degrees without delay, and who can prove they have worked, or tried to work, in summer time can get any debt beyond \$12,000 forgiven.

But Frache said students with children and students who were worked part-time during the year

were less likely to be eligible for the loan-remission program.

Granewall said students who do not fit into the independent category, who live with their parents or have just completed high school, still have a great deal of difficulty getting loans.

Frache said the criteria for independence discriminate against students from low-income families and from B.C.'s interior.

The criteria, for federal loans, also used to convert half of eligible students' loans to a grant say only students who are married, have left home for two years or are legally estranged from their parents are independent.

But the loan-conversion program only applies to students in their first two years of school.

"So a student from the interior won't get a loan until third year, but then they won't be eligible for the program," Frache said.

Frache said no matter what happens to the loan system, post secondary education won't be accessible until tuition is abolished.

"Time and time again it's been shown that tuition is the major barrier to low-income earners and other groups who haven't been attending," she said.

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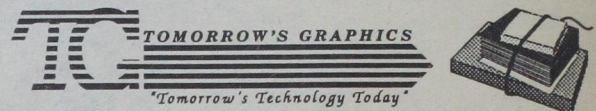

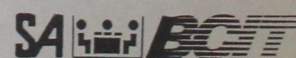

# Substance abuse: what you can do about it

What do you do if someone you know has a substance abuse problem?

Did you know that B.C. has the highest rate of alcohol and drug abuse in Canada? We consume more alcohol per person than any other province in Canada. We also have the highest rate of heroin offences, the second highest rate of marijuana offences and the third highest rate of cocaine offences in the country.

What does alcohol and drug abuse really mean? Anytime a person's use of a particular substance, drugs, alcohol, even over-the-counter medications causes personal, career, social, or physical problems, it is abuse. Eventually, a person with a serious abuse problem ends up out of control. Worse yet, it becomes increasingly destructive to everyone around the abuser.

If someone close to you has an alcohol or drug abuse problem, it can easily become "your problem" as

## Assertiveness workshop

Ever found yourself saying yes to a request when you meant to say no? If this happens often then some tips from counselling service's recent workshop on assertiveness can help.

According to the counselling department people need practice standing up for themselves. And the first step towards becoming assertive is to know your own rights:

For instance:

- 1) the right to say No without feeling guilty
- 2) the right to ask for what you want
- 3) the right to ask information from professionals (i.e. instructors)
- 4) the right to say I don't know
- 5) the right to be treated with respect
- 6) the right to change your mind
- 7) the right to make mistakes and be responsible for them

Knowing and thinking about these rights should lead to greater sensitivity and respect for oneself as well as others. If you respect these rights in yourself, then you will respect them in others.

well. It's common for people who care about someone with this kind of problem to have feelings of loneliness, despair, guilt, frustration, anger, and especially helplessness. These feelings, while powerful and perhaps contradictory, can also lead you to act in one of two ways, both of which will probably only make matters worse.

You may be tempted to pretend that no problem exists. This is emotionally damaging and simply makes it easier for the abuse to continue. Like the abuser, you are trying to deny that a problem exists. You may be tempted to try to control the abuser's behaviour. You could lecture, nag, try to remove opportunities for the abuse to occur,

even cover up or make excuses for that person to other people. You have shown that you are taking control for the abuser's behaviour and are somehow responsible for it. You can't be responsible for their behaviour but by seeming to take

responsibility for it you make it possible for the abuser not to. You become an "enabler". You enable the abuse to continue even though that is not your intention.

This doesn't mean that there is nothing you can do. Your behaviour

is under your control and you can intervene - to change the environment and make the situation better:

-learn all you can about abuse and dependency.

-Recognize that someone with an alcohol or drug abuse problem needs help, but that you cannot help all by yourself. You need help too.

-Talk with someone who specializes in this kind of problem. A province-wide network of counselling centres is there for you to call on. Self-help organizations such as Al-Anon and Alcoholics Anonymous can also provide valuable assistance.

-Be honest with others close to the situation.

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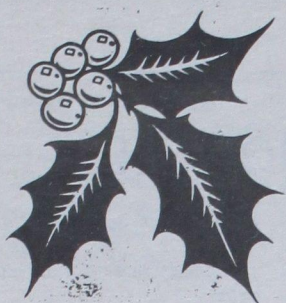
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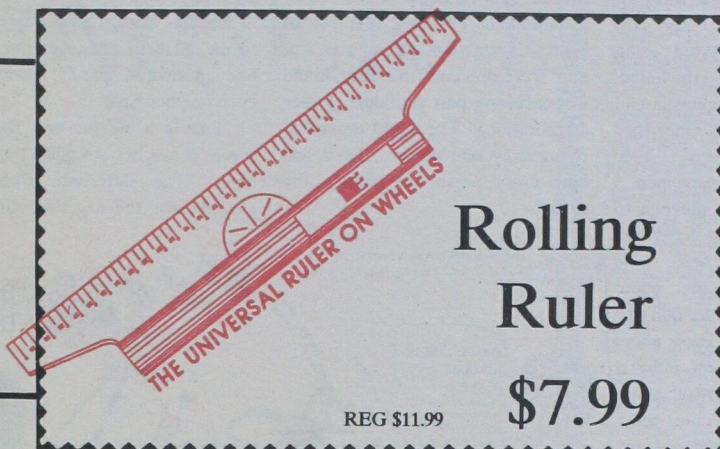






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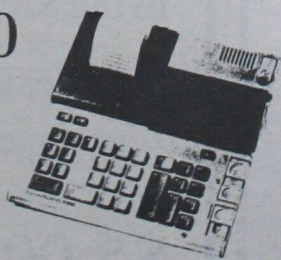
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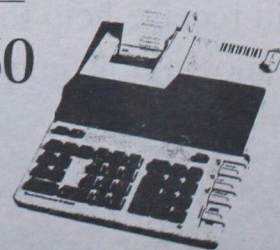
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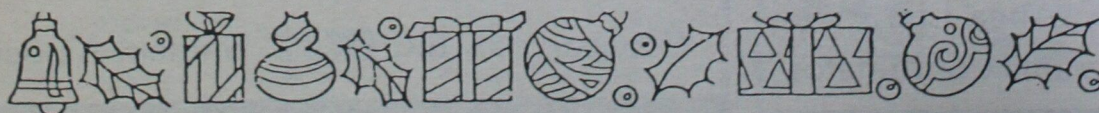
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## Environmentips

How does new knowledge of environmental degradation make you feel? Angry? Upset? If so, are you bothered enough to actually do something about it?

Being an environmentalist is quite a trendy pastime these days, but are you a true environmentalist? A recent Angus Reid poll suggests that 33% of all Canadians consider themselves environmentalists. But what is the percentage that say they're environmentalists in social circles, yet really haven't changed their lifestyles much at all? I guarantee that that number will draw the original 33% downwards. Too many people don't go the full distance to show they care. Many people have commented that our ideas on recycling are good. We thank them, then ask how their recycling is going. "Well, we haven't started yet?" When we ask why not, we usually get a litany of excuses from "It's too inconvenient" to "We don't have enough room" to "We don't know how". Well folks, we haven't heard one excuse yet that's valid.

The point here is that everyone is going to have to pitch in or we'll all be living on garbage dumps. Everyone's going to have to contribute or we'll all be breathing

God knows what for "air", wearing fancy suits to keep UV rays off us in the sun and drinking distilled water.

So what can you do? On a personal level, everyone should be conducting at least one form of recycling. Practice the other R's: Reuse and Reduce. Avoid using harmful chemicals around the home. Malathion (pesticide), Fantastik and Easy-Off are all harmful. Once they leave their containers, they eventually end up in the ecosystem.

stamped, self-addressed envelope. Acting on this serious issue may prove to be much more important than any of us presently understand.

It is imperative that we all do something. Chew on this thought from Maurice Strong (chairman, 1972 U.N. Environment Conference, Stockholm, founder of U.N. Environment Program, member of World Commission on Environment and Development (the Brundtland Commission), past president, Power Corporation): "The world cannot be changed by one person. But it will take every person to change the world".

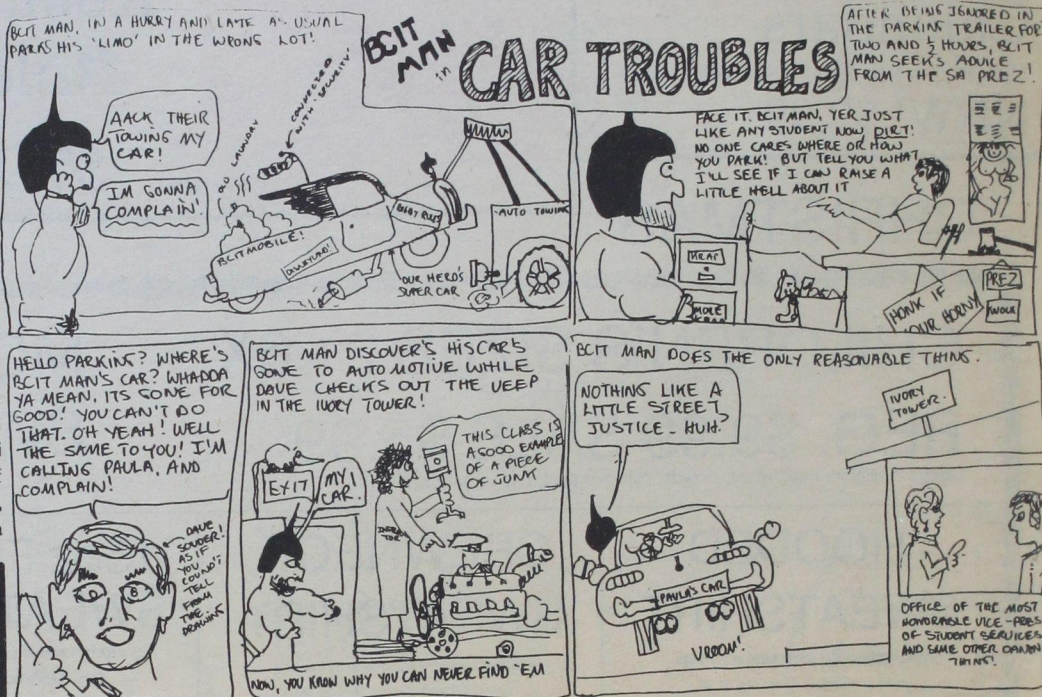

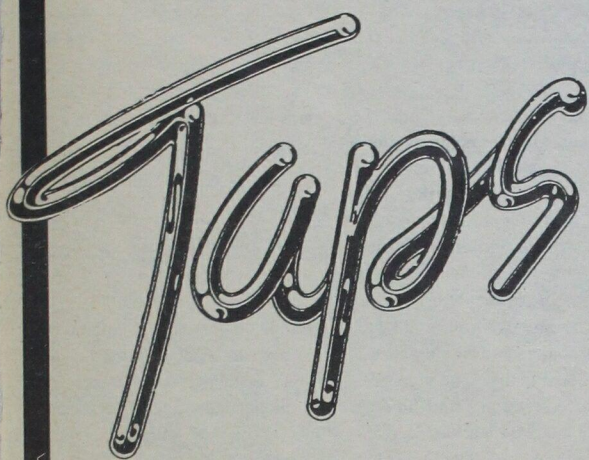

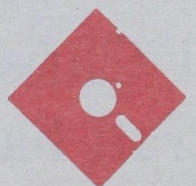

### Coors ban lift protested

Almost 600 people have signed a petition calling for a renewed ban on Coors products at Concordia University.

Students will vote on the boycott later this month.

Concordia student council voted August 22 to end the three-year boycott of Coors beer after hearing from a brewery representative that the company had changed its ways.

Concordia's Women Collective began collecting signatures for the petition two weeks later and presented them at the last council meeting.

and petition organizer Marlene Nero said she was very pleased with the outcome of the meeting.

"We were clearly facing a brick wall, and this was the only option we had. When you come up against bureaucratic barriers, you have to take the action directly to the students, and that's what we did," she said.

The council banned Coors in 1986 because the Coors family funds and actively supports groups "that are in opposition to the best interests of the poor, the elderly, students, women, visible minorities, lesbians and gay men, and other groups on the lower rungs of the economic and social ladder," according to the council's old policy.

The Coors family is perhaps best known for co-founding and funding the Heritage Foundation, a U.S. right-wing think tank. The family has also opposed projects as various as

equal rights amendment for women, distribution of birth control information at the University of Colorado and bottle recycling laws.

Molson, which brews Coors in Canada, sent regional sales manager Hugh Bray to the August meeting. Bray argued in favour of the new "young and progressive" generation of the Coors family. He said the family has changed its ways.

"The beliefs and personal activities of Coors family members are not monitored or directed by the Coors company, as they would not be for other employees of the firm," he said.

In a 1984 speech, William Coors told an audience of black business people in Denver that blacks "lack the intellectual capacity to succeed. One of the best things they (slave traders) did for you is drag your ancestors over here in chains."
