Hair salon will go, says Swain

SAC manager claims that administration will ignore council, not consult students

According to a definition of the SAC building which, as a point of interest, was built and is presently maintained by the administration, it's designed to meet the needs of the therapy services will go into that area regardless, at the Athletics Department and the Student Association's social

Unfortunately, and this will be evident when the hair salon is ousted in May of this year to be replaced by the expanded physiotherapy services, the administration has the ultimate say in designating certain areas of the SAC for the purposes of either the SA or the Athletic Department. Only SAC expansion will ease dance crowding

If your dances are crowded then do something about it. Put some pressure on the right people and you might be lucky to get a reaction to the problem. But who do you talk to?

Well, if you talk to the Student Association, they will probably tell you it is the fault of Student Services for not allowing the use of the gymnasium for the dances. If you talk with people from Student Services they will tell you it is the fault of the Student Association for not affecting a working relationship with the Institute to get the SAC Cafeteria expanded.

Whose fault is it? The people at -Student Services have a good reason for not allowing the use of the gym for dances. The reason is that a gym floor can only be resurfaced three times in its entire life. This involves sanding the floor down to the extent of wear or damage and applying a varnish coat, and when the floor gets too thin, it has to be replaced. The replacement cost of a hardwood floor of similar quality could cost as much as \$100,000-\$200,000.

With proper care the floor should last many years. The floor in the War Memorial gym at UBC has needed only one resurfacing in the space of twenty-five years, and it gets a lot of athletic use. However, the floor in your gym has already had two resurfacings in ten years. This is because the floor has had a lot of abuse in the past. This came in the form of exams held in the gym, floor hockey, and dances.

The main causes of damage were from grit on street shoes ground into the floor, drinks spilled on the floor, and cigarettes dropped on the floor. Another area of damage is to the rubber underlay. With a great amount of use this will lose its elasticity and athletic injuries will increase. There are about four hundred people signed up to use the gym and possibly twice that number who just use the gym for recreation, so an increase in the risk of injury would affect quite a few

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



In the offing is a SAC Management committee, which will have an equal number of reps from the SA and Student Services and will be chaired by a member of the administration. In the event of a split vote over an issue such as the one concerning the hair salon and the physiotherapy services, the chairman will cast the deciding vote. The chairman is none other than Derek Swain, and you can guess which way he'll vote.

The agreement for such a committee, already drawn up by the administration's Student Liaison Officer Graham Fane, is yet to be signed by the student council. In this matter, the council has two alternatives—to put up or shut up.

All of this is very distressing to Louise Talbot, manageress of the Total Emage Hair Salon, who considers her establishment a convenient and well-used service to the students here. She feels that she serves a broad cross-section of students whereas the physiotherapy facilities serve only the jocks on the campus.

On the other side of the coin, Sherri Clark, who will operate the new facilities, thinks that she serves just as broad a cross-section of students since anyone requiring physiotherapy is referred to her by Health Services. The main reason why sine wants the hair salon area is because the athletics department has purchased a lot of new equipment, a whirlpool bath in particular, that won't go into the room that Clark is presently using, mainly due to the lack of plumbing there. An interesting point here is that the plumbing she would be using in the hair salon was installed by the SA at a cost of between four and five thousand dollars.

It seems strange that no one has asked the students on the campus what they would prefer. Derek Swain says that there isn't enough interest amongst the students on this matter and there's no way of getting their opinions anyway. Louise suggests that a petition be held through the LINK and the campus radio station to find out what the students think.

And that's not such a bad idea. What do the students here think? If you want an improved physiotherapy service on the campus, fine. But if not, it would be a good idea to let someone know. If you feel strongly about it, put it in writing and send it to the LINK.

Job service here on campus

This article is about jobs and a place where you might just find one. The place is the BCIT On Campus Manpower Office in Room D204. Their main purpose is to assist BCIT day school students locate work related to their technology.

Last year, through this office, 631 people found permanent full-time jobs, 217 students found summer work, and 55 students found part-time jobs. That ads up to 903 students finding work and it could have been more as there were 1,533 jobs listed.

From now to next May, keep an eye on Manpower's job boards, you own technology bulletin boards, and the Link for notices about employers coming into the placement office and interviewing students for summer and permanent work. The Manpower Office encourages companies to conduct interviews on the campus. This On Campus Recruiting Program might enable you to find work before the summer or before you graduate.

What this article boils down to is that there is an On Campus Placement Office at BCIT. It's operated by a friendly staff that are anxious to help you find work and it seems that they are reasonable successful at doing so.

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EDITORIAL **SAC Expansion**

The battle over SAC Management has just begun. Student Services (SS) and the Student Association (SA) don't appear to see eye to eye on a number of items. Mainly who should be in the SAC, and how much space each service deserves.

The problem appears to be that the SA wants to retain all the services presently available in the SAC and expand the building to adequately house any new ones. Student Services, on the other hand, feels that a couple of the services presently offered are not required and thus expansion is not needed.

The four services offered in the building are: the pinball machines, which take up the space previously occupied by the TNT store (these machines provide about \$10,000 revenue per year which goes toward supporting intramurals, covering 3/3 of its \$15,000 budget. If the pinball machines are removed intramural fees will have to increase drastically); a barber shop, located in the east end of the SAC across from the pinball room, which services 450 students a month at reduced rates, while bringing the SA \$1,900 in revenue annually; a physiotherapist (Sherri Clark) who treats all injuries sustained by both intramural and extramural players, with both whirlpool and ultrasonic sound therapy to be offered as soon as space is made available; fourth, and probably the most important, is Health Services, helping 1,200 students per month, and offering the services of two doctors and a

More space is obviously needed for both Health Services and for the physiotherapist in order for them to properly service the student body. With the space presently offered not being adequate to support these four services one can only imagine what will happen once residence opens in September.

Student Services feels that both the barber shop and the pinball machines are unnecessary and not worth the space they occupy.

We feel that all services are valuable to the students, and should be maintained and improved. Nobody appears to be worried about expansion, which is inevitable with the residence being built on campus.

Make sure they get an idea of what YOU want in your building. Drop in to either the Student Association or Student Services and bend their ears. Or write us a letter. Don't let them decide without consulting you.





Save a record buck

If you read my last column you will remember me bitching about the great price differences between various record stores. I also mentioned that the only way to make sure you don't spend too much on records is to trade in your turntable on a good FM receiver. Well, after writing that column I got an idea that would help you save on albums without having to scrap your turntable. My thought was to go back to the Granville Mall area and make up a list of ten albums, then record the prices being asked at the different record stores. I chose the Mall because it seems to have the greatest concentration of record outlets, and the less wandering around I have to do, the better. I hadn't decided on which albums to put on the list yet, so I went into A&A Records and Tapes to write one up and list the prices.

Before I had completed listing the prices a big clerk came over and kicked me out. "I'd rather that you not do that," he said, or words to that effect. After that traumatic experience (I'll probably have nightmares the rest of my life), I headed over to the Kelly's store across the street. Half expecting to be given the boot once again, I kept one eye on the lookout. No such harassment. The rest of the afternoon continued without any trouble at all.

As it took a week to sort out my list, the prices are not necessarily current. However, they are a good indication of who generally has lower prices than the rest. A&B Sound seemed to be the most competitive, as well as having one of the better selections. People I've talked to usually agree that record prices have drastically increased over the last few years, ie., gone are the days of the \$2.00 record (you're right Mike, nostalgia's no fun). They also usually agree that A & B does have lower prices. Because of this, you'll almost always find a line up at the counter stretching down the aisle, another indication of their popularity (or is it that they just have slow cashiers?) Maybe not so surprising is that A&B is the only record store on the list not right on the Granville Mall, yet-it has lower prices. It this because rent on the mall is more than the rent one block south (east)?

The list in no way reflects my personal tastes, it is just a list of the first ten albums that semed to represent a cross section of what is available--new and older releases. The blanks just indicate that I couldn't find the album in its spot or on display. If I had more time I probably could have asked if the particular record was in stock.

You'll probably notice that the Barbara Streisand record is the most expensive one at five out of the seven stores. This is partially due to the fact that sometime earlier this year)back in the spring?) the record companies raised the suggested list price of certain albums to an unprecedented \$7.98. Unfortunately, it now seems to be the trend of many record stores (and record departments) to charge as close to the MSL as possible. Fortunately there are a few stores offering good prices on albums. Usually stores will put new albums on sale to attract customers, but be careful you don't buy any other albums or you will likely be paying too much.

Another unfortunate aspect of record prices is that if you happen to like some obscure or long forgotten artist you will be forced to pay the highest price for the album, the record not being in demand, and so not worth putting on sale. Sort of puts those supply and demand curves I had to learn in business all out of alignment.

For what it is worth, the preceding was an attempt by a lowly Engineering student to do some market research (if I may be permitted to use that term). I won't know whether I was sucessful or not until I am either assaulted in the halls by an insulted Business student, or disowned by my own technology, or both. Oh well, maybe someone will save himself/herself a dollar or two after reading this, and after all, that's what this is all about. This is starting to bore you, right! OK, I'll try to have something interesting next week. Bye.

And does Vancouver have Discos? Do birds have feathers? Discos come in all shapes sizes, colors and moods. For the young and old, simple or sophisticated, innocent or decadent. With flashing colored scenes of people ordering over-priced alcohol, unable to talk above the latest from the greatest, discos are the churches of the devout worshippers of such gods as KC and Stevie Wonder, to name but a

A concept which has combined the mobility of the live band and the sound and mood of the downtown disco is the recent appearance and growth of the mobile disco.

Like a live band the mobile disco will go wherever wanted. Like the downtown disco, it provides the mood and music for the perfect disco atmosphere.

Mobile discos may be relatively new in Vancouver, but they have been catering to London crowds for years. One of these is the Midnight Oasis Mobile Disco which, after two very successful years in London, England, has crossed continents and cultures to infiltrate the Vancouver scene. Now, two years later, both they and Vancouver have a close working relationship.




