Mr. Goard embarks on retirement

An innovator in the organization of training course for the work force in the lower mainland since 1939 when he was teaching at the Vancouver Technical School, he was the first principal of the Vancouver Vocational Institute where he was responsible for designing the training programs in line with business and industrial trends.

After 12 years there he became Assistant Director of Adult Education and Assistant Director of Vancouver City College for the Vancouver School Board, and the Board's main liaison with the business and industrial community.


He was appointed Principal of BCIT in 1967.

Born in Vancouver, Mr. Goard graduated from UBC with honours in Chemistry, worked as a metallurgist with Vancouver Engineering Works for six years, and with the federal Department of Fisheries for four years before he entered education.

Mr. Goard's extra-curricular activities have been numerous and he is past president of many organizations including The Association for Continuing Education, B.C. Natural Resources Conference, Canadian Vocational Association (B.C.), Canadian Association for Adult Education, American Society for Metals (B.C.), Native Indian Service Council, Vancouver Citizenship Council, Children's Aid Society (Vancouver).

Athletic awards presented

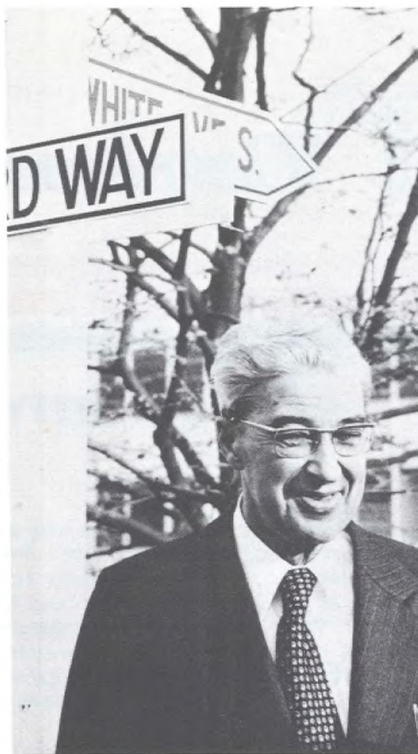

Coordinator of Health Services at UBC and Chairman of the Educational Committee of the recently established B.C. Medical Centre, Dr. McCreary is a strong proponent of the team approach to health care delivery.

The academic procession will be led this year by Miss Pat Rogers, chief instructor, Department of Radiological Technical Services.

Special efforts are being made to enable members of the graduating class in health technologies to be freed from hospital duties for the occasion.

Alumni return, honour Mr. Goard

Two hundred graduates returned in April for the Institute's first official Homecoming, the largest function hosted by the Alumni Association since being activated three years ago.

A reception was followed by an evening of Monte Carlo (winnings used to bid in an auction) and dancing, highlighted by presentations to Mr. Goard on his retirement.

The Society of Engineering Technologists chose Homecoming to have president Doug R. Duncan present Mr. Goard with an honorary membership in the Society for his

outstanding years of service to technical education, the Alumni Association paying tribute with a power tool for wood working.

Every graduating year was represented at the gathering, with a heavy turnout from early years and many coming from outside the lower mainland.

Success of Homecoming and enthusiasm generated by those attending, says vice-president Toto Miller, is encouragement to the Association to play an even more active role in the future.
