Worker dies in fall

A construction worker was fatally injured while working on the new PVI building last Wednesday.

Twenty-two year old Harvey Craig of Surrey fell two storeys through an opening that was to be sealed the next day. Ambulance attendants and a doctor who arrived at the scene were able to get a heartbeat, but Craig died later in the Royal Columbian Hospital of massive head injuries.

Workman's Compensation Board Officials closed the construction site the following day for inspection, and ruled the cause of death as accidental.

Harvey Craig was a graduate of the Civil and Structural Technology at BCIT.

THE FLOWER POT

Are your plants POTBOUND? If the roots of your houseplant are coming out through the drainage holes, then it's definitely time to repot.

Here's all you have to do:

1. Water your plant thoroughly.
2. Select a new pot that is at least one inch or more larger than the old pot. (But don't go putting a 2½ inch plant into a one-gallon container--the increase in pot size must be a gradual one.)
3. Put a handful of broken crockery or clean gravel in the bottom of the pot for drainage.
4. Fill the pot part of the way with sterilized houseplant potting soil. You can buy this pre-mixed at all plant stores and most grocery and department stores.
5. Tap the old pot on the table, hold the plant with one hand,

the pot with the other and invert the pot. The plant should slide out of its pot. If not, try gently loosening the roots by sliding a knife around the inside edge of the pot.

6. Loosen the root ball with your fingers, or give it a light pruning with a sharp knife.

7. Stick the plant in its new pot. If it looks too low, add more soil; remove soil if the plant sits too high in the pot.

8. Fill the pot up around the edges, tapping the soil down firmly. Make sure that you don't fill the pot to the very top--leave space so that the pot doesn't overflow when you water it.

9. Water your plant again. Keep it out of direct sunlight for several days, mist the leaves if they look wilted.

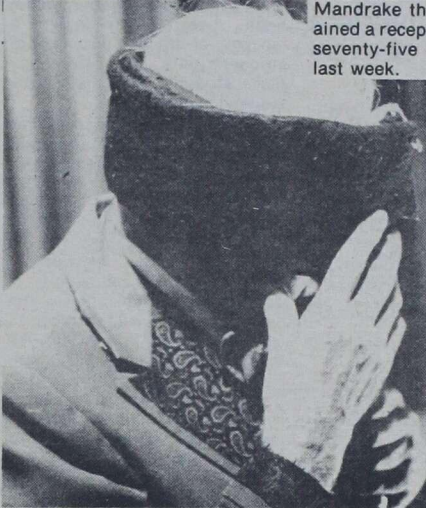

Mandrake the Magician entertained a receptive crowd of about seventy-five people in the SAC last week.

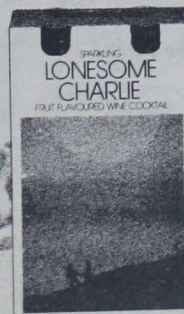
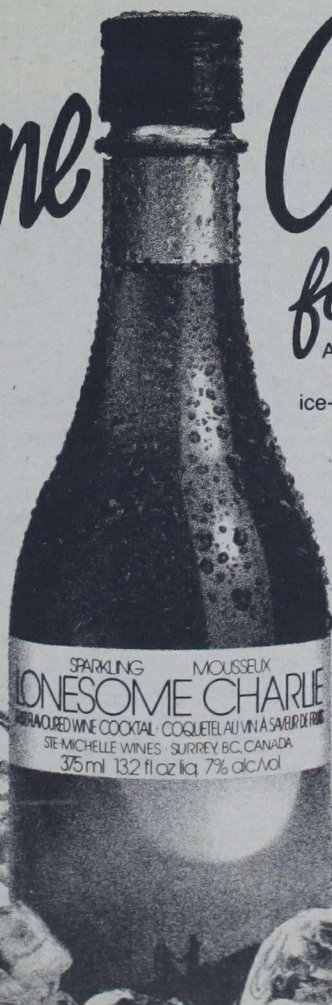

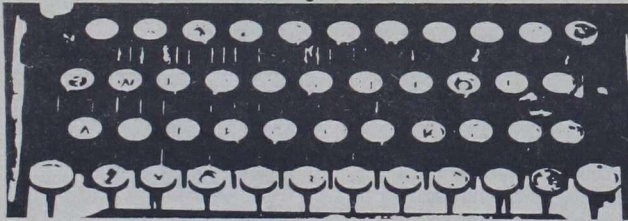
Well, everything happened this weekend - there was nobody around, we ran out of supplies, and some of our equipment broke down.

Students rights a new issue

Dear Editor,

I think you misunderstood the intent of the workshop on student rights that was offered by the Human Resources Division to faculty during Shinerama Day. Specifically, in your last paragraph you say that the students should write a bill of rights 'before the faculty and administration have a chance to seal our collective fate in some unrealistic, unworkable document, before they make a mockery of the whole concept of student rights, and before any more students get shafted by student policies'.

Student rights in educational institutions, is a relatively new issue. In fact, student rights have only very recently been tested in courts of law, although it has been determined that the student, as a consumer of the education product, has rights as much as any other consumer of any product has rights. The seminar was offered in recognition of the fact that BCIT, like most other post-secondary institutions, has not until recently had to answer a question regarding the rights of a student. The objective of this seminar was to inform faculty and administration that these rights exist and that in order to avoid a legal situation we must create procedures that protect those rights.

I agreed that it was obvious that the institute has been remiss in terms of developing policy that would respect those rights, but that's the precise reason that the seminar was called. The four panelists were lawyers who have a vast amount of experience in the areas of student rights and their objective was to assist us in policy development, not to tell our faculty how to go about protecting their 'rear-ends'.

I am very much involved in the areas of rights for the students on a daily basis, and this seminar simply reinforced things that I have been saying for some time now-- that students have rights as consumers and that faculty and administration, suppliers of the product, must respect the rights of the consumer. It should be clear, however, that a faculty member has rights, too, and that both the student and the faculty member have the responsibilities that are directly associated with those rights.

The seminar made clear the rights of students and the responsibilities of the institute

in ensuring that those rights exist. You can be sure that any policy that is developed by the institute which will affect the rights of students will be developed in full consultation of your Student Association. Nobody that I know of wants to take any rights away. In fact, our panel of experts made the message clear that these rights exist and they belong to students. Hopefully, the institute can now recognize those rights and develop academic policy that cannot be questioned from

a students rights point-of-view.

We desperately need a student bill of rights. You must identify your rights and your concerns so that the institutes policy makers can take them into consideration while they develop academic policy. The only way an unrealistic or unworkable document could be developed is to have it developed without student consultation.

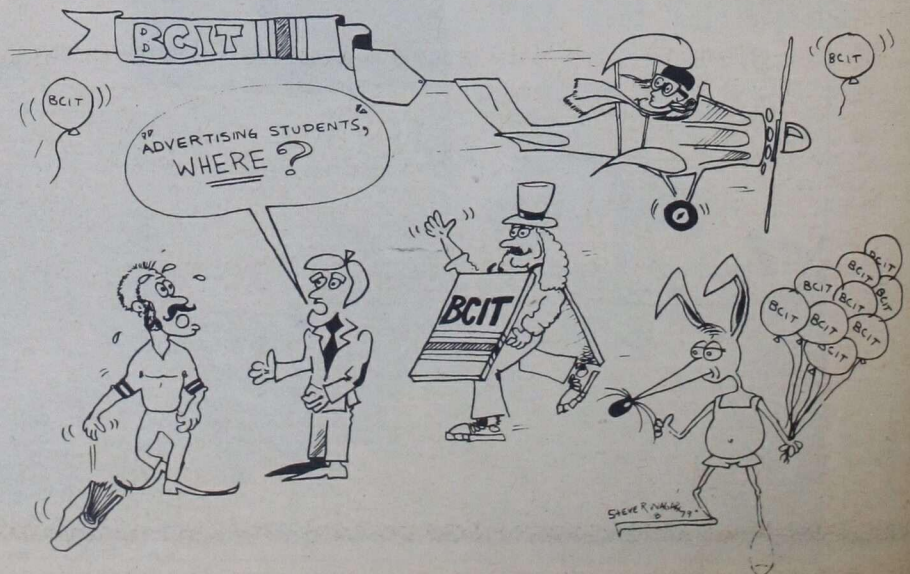
I've written this letter to express my opinion and maybe generate some constructive criticism about the pub.

Are BCIT instructors really qualified to teach?

BCIT prides itself with the fact that the instructional staff are carefully chosen members of industry. For anyone who has worked in a particular field for 25 or 30 years, and is looking to get out of the 'rat race', BCIT is a great place to put in a period of semi-retirement. No doubt you've heard that before. In selecting individuals from industry, BCIT believes that the potential instructor's practical experience will greatly enhance the validity of the courses offered.

This is true to a point. Sure the person is well acquainted with the industry, and subsequently knows what is like out in the fabled 'real world' they keep warning of. It then follows that they are the best people to effectively prepare the BCIT student for employment in that instructor's field of expertise.

It all sounds like the ideal situation. Students have at their disposal instructors who have worked for the same companies many students will approach for

here at BCIT, the 'flagship of technological education', there are no such requirements. It is fine to have an instructor who has worked in a shop or business for the last three decades, but how can this wealth of information be adequately taught by someone with no teaching skills.

Underline the word skills. It is ridiculous to presume that putting a person from industry in front of a class of 250 restless students automatically turns one into an instructor.

Now, ask any high school teacher what makes a good teacher, and they will likely list a number of desirable personal characteristics and qualities as well as a minimum amount of training in education. This sounds very reasonable. Suggest that someone off the street could do the job just as well and you will be laughed out of the room or kicked out. They consider teaching a profession and they are proud of their skills. Tell them that BCIT instructors are hired straight out

approach the department head, thinking they will bring the problem to the attention of the person they figure is in a position to bring about change. Because of their small numbers, the students are often passed off as troublemakers, and not truly representative of the overall class feeling.

Department heads are a difficult group of people to talk with anyway. They listen to your comments, tell you they back their faculty 100 percent, then send you on your way. One wonders what they do for a living.

Somewhere along the way, someone may actually suggest that you should talk to the instructor yourself. That makes sense, but try to find someone who will, and then take your chances. If an instructor invites constructive criticism, then there is no problem. Though usually, the ones who invite comments probably have done so for years and are already polished educators.

Approaching many instructors is a massive problem. It goes against the human nature of both the student and the instructor. Once again, if only a few students do approach the instructor in question, they are usually passed off as troublemakers.

Unfortunately, organized attempts at arriving at a class consensus ultimately fail due to the inherent unwillingness of most students to be involved. Often, any petitions that are circulated take on the appear-

ance of a vendetta against the instructor and are rejected by most students as an unsatisfactory means of expression.

There is also the problem that students do not feel at ease or in a position to criticize an instructor. Sympathizing with an incompetent instructor and using the 'he's a nice guy' cover up defeats the whole intent of those who try to be objective about an instructor's ability. Nice guy or not, if someone can't teach, they shouldn't be there.

The problems associated with an untrained instructor go far beyond the obvious teacher/student conflicts.

When it comes time to collect and mark assignments and exams, how can an instructor who can't teach, fairly mark papers which may directly reflect that instructor's ability to relay to the students the information being asked for. As a result, the marks will generally be low, or artificially scaled upwards.

In this situation, the students don't worry, because they know there is no way that an instructor who can't teach will fail anybody. And they are right. Nobody fails a course given by an instructor who can't teach because then the instructor might be asked to justify the decision, which is not a position a person without teaching skills is equipped to be in.

Through this process, standards are lowered and lowered to the point of non-existence. This rather destroys the myth about the quality of graduate BCIT

produces. If students can obtain a diploma just because the instructors are afraid to uphold any standards, it does not look good for BCIT. Eventually there will be enough of these 'sub-standard' graduates in circulation to give BCIT a bad name. Then it won't matter if BCIT provides the only four year program this side of Toronto or not, nobody will want a BCIT graduate.

You might suggest the system is not perfect. In fact, it is far from perfect. However, nobody likes to disturb a sleeping dog, and BCIT will remain a haven for those ready for semi-retirement for a few years yet. The administration and the faculty will ignore the problem for as long as they can. Any response might result in a change, and remember, working at BCIT is as good as retirement.

And the students? They are also hoping nothing will change around here. Twenty-five years from now when they get tired of the 'rat race', they'll want to work here too. Meanwhile, subservience is the order of the day as they all sit quietly accepting all the shit that is going down...

(none of my instructors, past or present, should consider this personal, it is a critique of sorts dealing with a system I find extremely difficult to accept, and would like to see change...I invite any and all comments on this article or the subject...a change has gotta come...)

employment upon graduation. The connections with industry some instructors maintain is just incredible. No doubt this is one of the reasons for the high employment statistics.

However, even with instructors extremely knowledgeable in their fields, or with the highest connections in the province, the BCIT concept falls flat on its face.

There is no provision in the scheme for ensuring that instructors know anything about teaching. Unlike their counterparts in other educational institutions, BCIT instructors are not required to have had any formal training or experience in education.

If they are hired early enough in the summer, they are put through a quick two week training session, but this seems hardly adequate for an institute that offers such supposedly high quality education. Especially when you consider what someone desiring to teach in elementary or high school must go through.

In marked contrast to BCIT policies, those wishing to teach at the elementary school level are required to have four years of training in education, and those wishing to teach at secondary schools in this province are required to have an additional year of education. This is four or five years of learning how to teach, how to share the information you have, how to handle difficulties as they arise, and how to relate to students.

Granted, it is how one applies this knowledge that makes the difference between a 'good' and 'bad' teacher, but at least the individual is suitably equipped.

The point is, to teach in the public school system, an individual must have fairly extensive training in education. Yet,

of industry, and the look of horror across their faces tells the story.

Yet, at BCIT many if not all instructors consider themselves professional in their capacities as educators. This is fine when one accepts that a professional is anyone who gets paid for what they are doing. However, 'professionalism' connotes high standards with an accompanying high level of knowledge in the occupation. No doubt most instructors were considered professionals in their previous occupations, but to be considered a professional by virtue of being hired under BCIT's loose hiring practices is questionable indeed.

In the classrooms, a lack of training in educational matters becomes painfully obvious.

When an instructor is unable to teach at a level expected by the students, consistent with the image BCIT projects, the students quickly become very frustrated. They are not sure what they are supposed to have learned, and know not what to expect on examinations. From this frustration develops antagonistic feelings towards the instructor. This in turn frustrates the instructor, who may not realize the difficulties being created. The instructor then becomes hostile, or gives up, blaming the students for the discord.

Either way, the class has by this time lost respect for the instructor, whose lack of professionalism is the main contention. The class is now uncooperative and lacking an interest which need never have been lost. Many students will, at this point, avoid the class altogether, turning instead to the required text and hoping that it will get them through the course.

ABBA's current album is called 'Voulez Vous' and it is another masterpiece from this Swedish four-some.

By the way, I purchased it for \$3.99 at the Bay...utilizing my MacDonald's Rock Calendar coupon...and coming from a part of the province where \$7.99 is considered cheap, \$3.99 is a steal.

The current hit from 'Voulez Vous' is 'Does Your Mother Know'. Each of the three Pointer Sister is a fine singer, and when it comes to singing, each takes a turn solo-ing on various cuts. One note, tucked in a corner of the liner, says the album is dedicated to the late Reverend Elton Pointer...father perhaps? In a nutshell, 'Priority' is a good album. It is finely engineered and tastefully programmed. Pointer Sisters-Priority. Planet-XP 9003. Suggested list- \$6.99 Rating-7½

'Apocalypse Now'...worth the wait

After standing in a two block line for an hour clutching my five dollar reserved seating ticket, I was rewarded with a seat on the far left five rows from the front. That in itself was enough to give me a prematurely negative attitude towards the movie, to say the least. However, from the start to the finish it was a movie I will always remember.

The movie is directed and produced by Francis Coppola (of Godfather 1 and 2, and American Graffiti fame). It stars Marlon Brando, Robert Duvall, Martin Sheen and other assorted flesh actors.

Before writing this, I checked the Modern Dictionary which defined Apocalypse as 'Revelation of the apostle John on the island of Patmos'.

Next, I checked the bible under The Revelation of John, Psalm 1, Verse 17 which provided the quote 'When I saw him, I fell at his feet as though dead. But he laid his right hand upon me and said 'Do not be afraid. I am the first and the last, and I am the living one; for I was dead and now I am alive for evermore, and I hold the keys of Death and Death's domain.'

For the layman, it was summed up by Brando in his last words in the movie, 'The Horror, the Horror of it all.'

Coppola has created a film which brings the atrocities of war, as well as the moral quandry of the Vietnam War, to the public. This is done through a series of shocking helicopter and napalm gas attacks. To heighten the impact, music from the Doors ('The End'), and others, including a terrifying scene featuring the music of the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra.

The plot of the movie is relatively simple, so I will leave that to all who see it. The movie centers on Captain Willard (Martin Sheen), who is sent on a mission to exterminate the legendary Colonel Kurtz (Marlon Brando), who is said to be insane. Colonel Kurtz has a band of mindless GI's who treat him like a god and stop at nothing to carry out Kurtz's wishes. Not unlike a few religious cults I know of.

In his search up the river for Kurtz, Captain Willard experiences everything from the grotesque and bizarre to the humorous and outright insane. It is these events that are solidly etched in the audiences' minds. The morals of war are brought right up front. You leave the theatre with a revised outlook on how safe you actually are in this country.

Take my word for it, this show may not have academy acting in it, but the technical aspects are surely incredible. Most important though, is the eerie, frightening reality this movie conveys. It could have happened, and for we know, did.

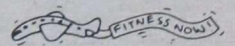

volleyball-the Building team in the 1:40-2:20 p.m. group would like to trade to an earlier time. Any team interested please contact the Campus Life secretary.

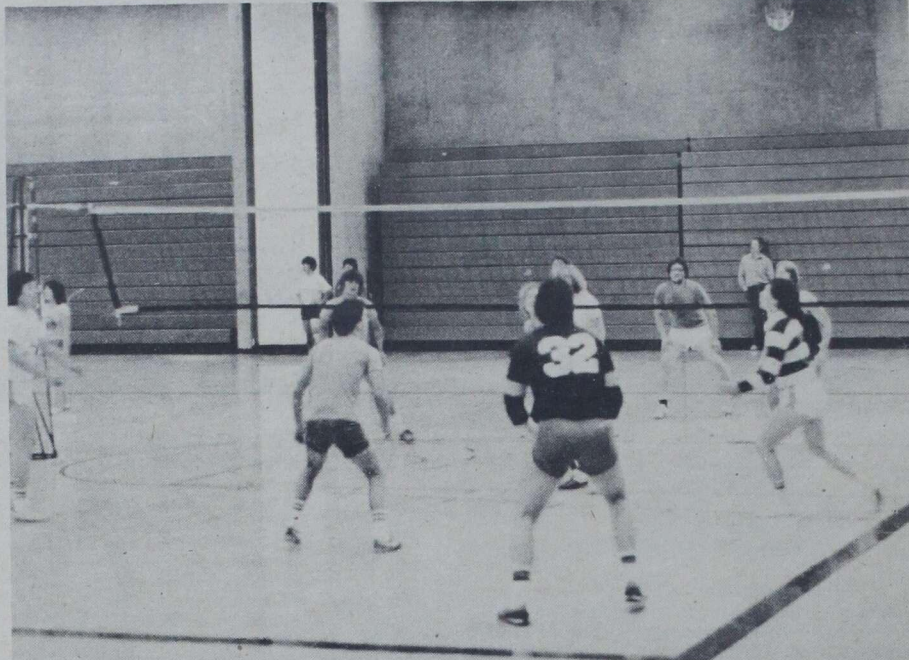
basketball-5 team league-note the team identified as 'All Stars' is made up of players who signed up on the no-team sheets. Check out the posted lists and let's not DEFAULT!

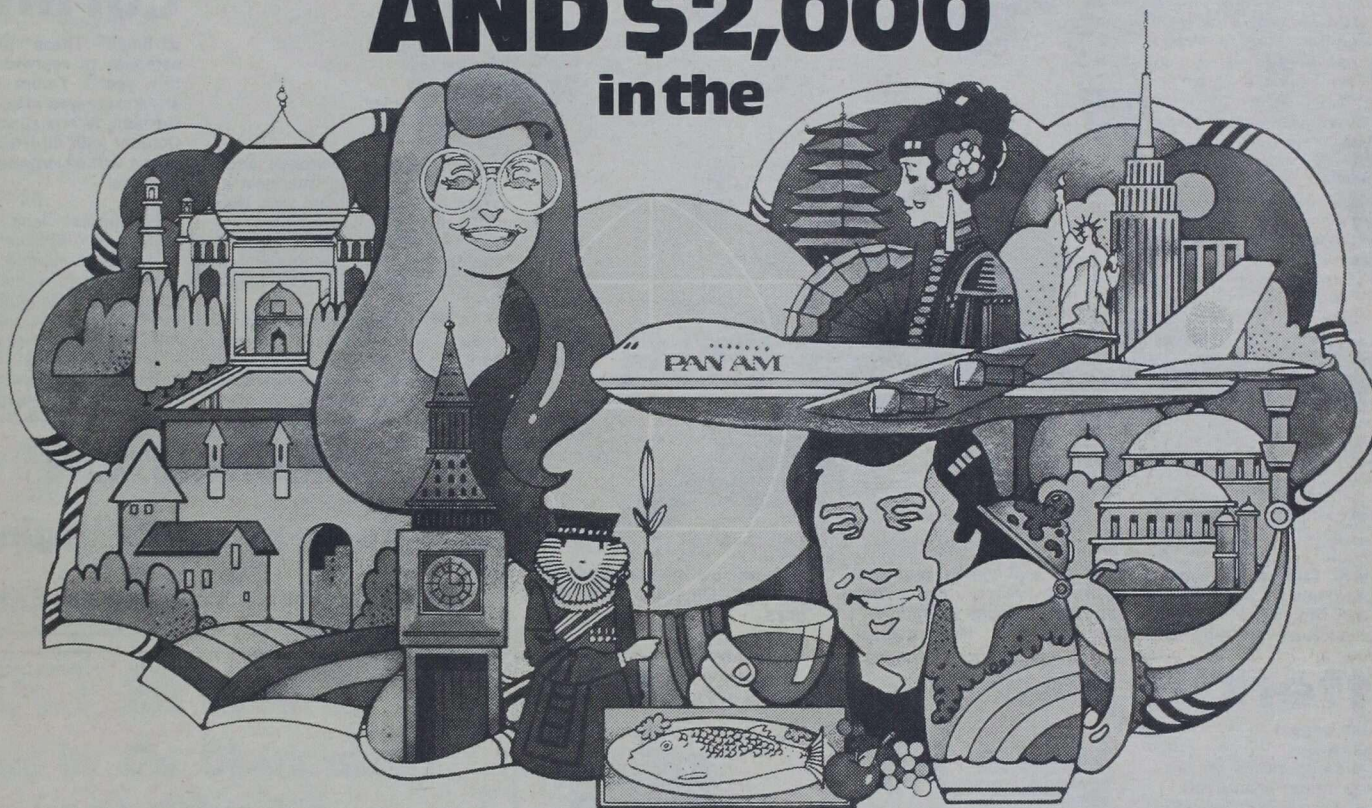

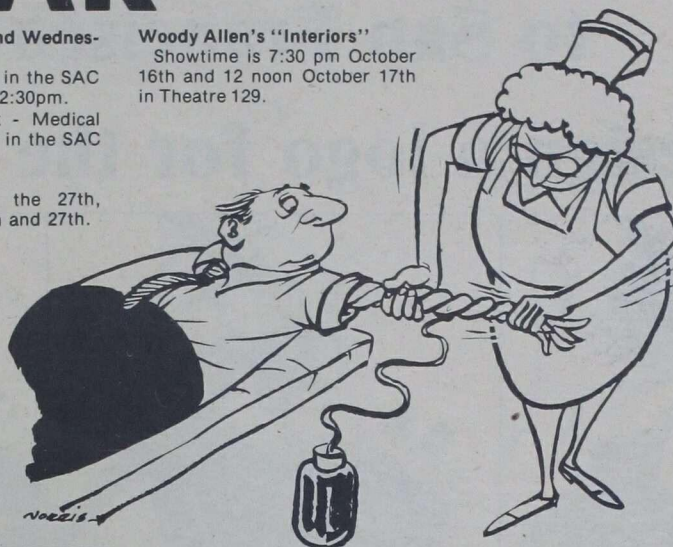

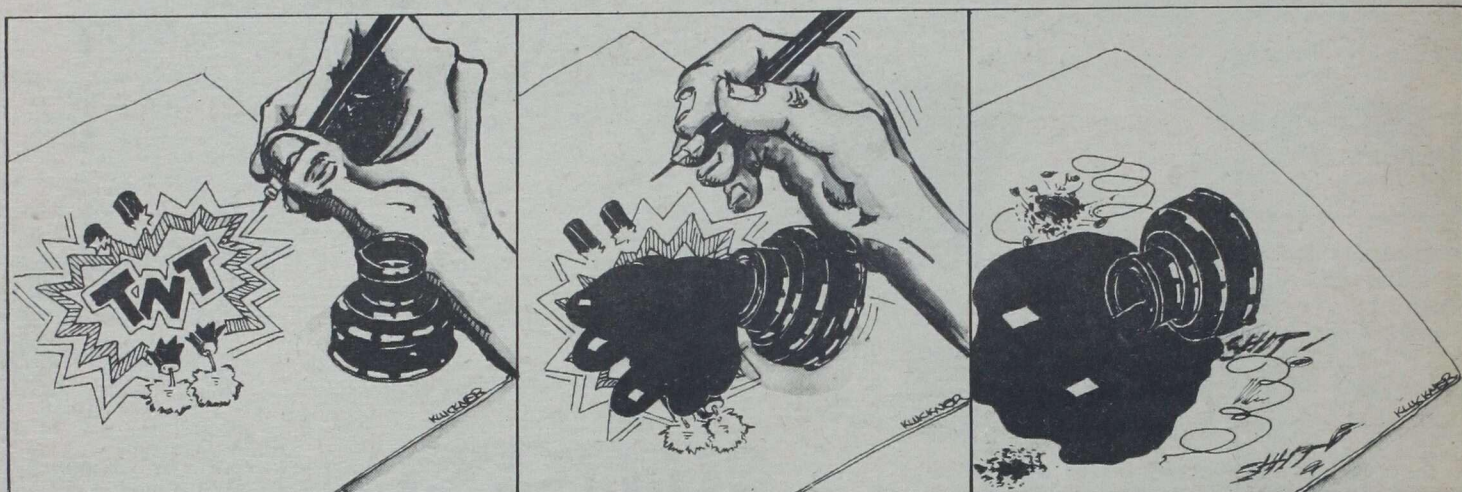

- 3) Judging will be by a panel selected by the TNT store manager. The decisions of the panel will be final.
- 4) No rule 4.
- 5) By signing the entry form and entering the contest, the entrant deeds all copyright and interest in the entry to the BCIT Student Association. All entries become the property of the BCIT Student Association as a condition of their entry, and the BCIT Student Association reserves the right to make whatever changes are felt necessary to the winning design, and to incorporate features from other entries into the final design.
- 6) The BCIT Student Association reserves the right to accept no entry as the winner and to award no prize.
- 7) Winner must answer a skill-testing question.
- 8) Arrangements for the trip are to be made between the winner and the Canadian Universities Travel Service Ltd. Amount to be awarded for this trip by the BCIT SA is not to exceed \$500; any excess amount, due to extended duration, peak travel period or more expensive accommodation, must be borne by the winner.

Advice to Contestants.

- 1) The This 'n' That shops are student-owned and operated and are centrally located on the BCIT campus. They sell a wide range of products, including calculators, clothing, personal-care products and school supplies, mainly but not exclusively to the BCIT community. The logo should attempt to communicate all of these factors, but not in such a way as to make the logo confusing or obscure to someone unfamiliar with the BCIT campus.
- 2) The logo should contain the words "This 'n' That," but the commonly-used appellation "Campus Shops" is potentially changeable. The design should be conceived in such a way that the inclusion of the abbreviation "Ltd." or the word "Limited" would not mar its effect.
- 3) The logo must be suitable for application in all sizes, from several-square-foot window graphics to tiny envelope and business card identifications. It must be equally effective in all sizes.
- 4) The logo should be monochrome—that is, one color—but may contain tints or shades of that color. If tints or shades are included in the logo design, some means must be suggested for adapting them to all media, from newsprint to glass.
- 5) Some effort should be put towards defining a "store color," and it is recommended that entrants note the current color scheme within the 1976 Building store. The store color could possibly become the single color of the logo.
- 6) Artistic ability will *not* be a major consideration in the selection of the winner. The winning entry will be professionally-rendered into its final form. However, as this is a logo contest, the graphic effectiveness of any submission will be a major consideration. The major criterion is the entry's success in communicating the existence and function of the TNT.
- 7) All submissions should be original. A close similarity between the entry and any existing logo or design scheme will be severely prejudicial to the entrant's cause. This similarity, of course, does not extend to the choice of a type-style for the logo.

Pick up an application form from either location of the TNT, draw up a great idea, and you could finish the decade in San Francisco!
