News In Brief

B.C's Unemployment Rate on the Rise

ull-time job openings are on the decline causing increased competition between new graduates. B.C. lost 68,000 full-time jobs in January, according to labour force employment numbers compiled by Statistics Canada. Even though the province created 33,000 part-time jobs in January, there is a serious lack of full-time employment. According to Statistics Canada, B.C.'s unemployment rate rose from 5.3 percent to 6.1 percent between December and January. Approximately 18,000 jobs lost were in B.C's manufacturing industry. The national unemployment rate is not doing much better. In December 6.6 percent of Canadians were unemployment, that rate rose to 7.2 percent in January.





HSBC Celebration of Light fireworks festival cancelled

The province has decided to give B.C. Place a \$365 million makeover. Funding will go towards revamping stadium facilities, including interior upgrades and building a retractable roof. Much anticipation has been placed on upgrading B.C. Place as it will be used for the opening and closing ceremonies of the 2010 Olympic Games. Interior upgrades are anticipated to be the first project beginning this year, and are expected to be completed before the 2010 Olympics. Construction on a retractable roof won't begin until after the Games wrap up. Aspects of the makeover will add a new art gallery and housing, retail and business space to the area.


Company may have knowing sold salmonella tainted peanuts

he American Food and Drug Administration (FDA) have announced that a Georgia peanut company may have sold peanut products knowing they were laced with salmonella. FDA officials say the Georgia company did not wait for a second test to clear peanut butter and peanuts that initially were positive for salmonella. The Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) has listed over 200 products to be recalled. Popular foods from companies such as Atkins, North Star Ice Cream, and Safeway's Honey Roasted Peanut Butter are on the list. The salmonella outbreak has caused at least eight deaths and 575 illnesses in the U.S. No confirmed illnesses have yet been reported in Canada. A full list of the recalled products can be found on the CFIA website.



New driver's licenses will make ID's harder to fake

n March, drivers renewing their license will receive a new high-tech license designed to prevent identity theft and fraud. Holographic overlays, laser-engraving, and raised elements are just some of the new security features to be included on the new licenses. The B.C. Provincial government says new facial recognition technology embedded into the licenses will allow ICBC to correctly identify people before fraud can be committed. Facial recognition technology analyzes facial characteristics that do not change, such as the size and location of cheekbones. The government says the new cards will also have the enhanced driver's licence feature, which will allow people to cross the border as an alternative travel document to a passport.





Bee Trouble

Fraser Valley Farmers are already concerned about crops months away from sprouting in their fields. The reason?

Bees. The farmers rely on bees to pollinate their plants so that Blueberries, Strawberries, and Raspberries can be brought to markets.

ast year the industry was 2000 bees short of what was needed to get the tough task of pollination accomplished. While it's still too early to tell, indicators are that the bee shortfall could be much worse his year

John Gibeau runs the Honey Bee Center in Surrey and a significant part of his business is hiring out his bees to the farmers. He summed up the unique triple threat facing the

bee population.

"What we have here is a Varroa mite infestation and we have a fungus called Nosema and then we have unpredictable changing weather patterns like an unusually cold winter or a wet spring. The three together creates a problem because bee keepers colonies die off when they shouldn't."

With our unusual cold snowy winter the bees, already

dealing with fungus and Varroa mites, are taking a triple hit. Beekeepers all over the lower mainland are anxiously checking their colonies hoping against hope that they haven't lost to many of their tiny charg-

Chris Bright runs Chris' Honey yard in Surrey. Admittedly a small operation compared to most, but Chris has been in the bee colony game for years. Owning 50 or so hives on which he relies for honey and wax, he stocks his shelves with different products.

With some beekeepers reporting 25 percent hive losses already, Chris walked through his hives checking to see how they fared after months of bitter cold. Some were buzzing with activity while the ground around others was littered with tiny frozen bee bodies.

He says while the cold winter is a local twist to the bee problem as a whole it is actually a global issue. "It is of huge concern to every bee keeper anywhere in the world; there isn't one part of the world where this isn't a problem."

Chaos, some would consider this to be an extreme choice of words but when you consider that 30 percent of everything we eat is only there because a bee pollinated it, the situation makes itself a little clearer.

With the economy's downward spiral already making headlines, consider the ramifications of food shortages due to the lack of bees. Or closer to home, Fraser Valley farmers suffering shortages of needed berry crops. Abbotsford, the Raspberry capitol, relies heavily on the little red berry for its summer economy.

World honey supplies have already taken a hit with a world honey shortage driving up prices off and on since 2002.

While it is too soon to tell how this spring will shape up and affect summer crops, the concern is definitely already in the air for many.





n Friday, January 30th, I had the pleasure of watching 'Bye, Bye Birdie' at Langara College's Studio 58. 'Bye, Bye Birdie' is a 1950s style rock-and-roll musical that follows the life of megamusic-star Conrad Birdie. This teenage heartthrob has just been drafted into the US army, and before he goes his manager has set up one last publicity stunt; Conrad Birdie will give a farewell kiss to one lucky girl. The recipient: Kim McAffee of Sweet Apple, Ohio.

Studio 58 did a superb job with the limited space they had. With a small and intimate studio setting, the cast and crew used every last bit of space to bring this romping classic to life. A bird's eye view of the stage, designed by Pam Johnson, would show the audience that it was a record turntable. There was even a spinning record that spun the stage around. Brilliant! The back drop

was simple; two tiered and plain white, with four doors and windows that opened and closed to indicate different places in the play. The visual effects used on the backdrop via projector were very clever. They even managed to superimpose an actor's mouth on Ed Sullivan's face! In keeping with the 1950s theme, costume designer Marina Szijarto did a remarkable job of bringing the audience right into an old fashioned sock hop.

From the top, co-leads Rachel Aberle and Ben Elliott, who played Rosie Alvarez and Albert Peterson, stole and carried the show. With their first song, "English Teacher" these two set a high tone for the rest of the evening's performance. The chemistry between the pair was electric and left the audience wanting more.

In terms of the ensemble cast, they took a while to warm up. When they finally did, they brought life to the sometimes lagging plot, but there were spots where they could have expelled more energy. One stand out performer in the ensemble was Andrea Yu, who played Ursula, friend and neighbour of Kim MacAfee. Yu brought the part of hysterical teenage fan to life with her physical comedy. Another favourite was Genevieve Fleming who brought comic relief to the show as Mrs. Mae Peterson. She made you feel sorry for a 'poor ailing Mother.'

I was disappointed with the performance of Kirsty Provan who played Kim MacAfee. There was no spark in her performance and as the girl who was to receive Conrad Birdie's kiss, there needed to be more passion. The only member of the MacAfee family that was worth listening to was Mrs. MacAfee played by Alisha Davidson. She was the perfect '50s housewife with a beautiful voice. Rhys Finnick who played her husband was trying too hard and wanted too much attention.

One of my favourite songs from this show has always been 'One Boy'. While Provan was pitchy and hard to listen to, the other girls, Joy Castro and Marlene Ginader, sung in perfect harmony and managed to make Provan look better than she deserved for someone who was playing a secondary-lead character. The reprise of this song done by Rachel Aberle was outstanding; she definitely stood out on top of this cast and Studio 58 will have a hard time replacing her when she graduates this spring.

Overall, the show was extremely entertaining and I recommend it to anyone looking for a fun, inexpensive and cultural night out.


Luc Besson lends his manic action touch to the film, which has shades of his other action heavy franchise Transporter in it.

Skate 2

Video Game Review

hen Skate was released, it was the up and coming Tony Hawk killer that tried to add more realism into the sport by diving deep into skateboarding culture. With Skate 2, we get more of the same, which is definitely not a bad thing. While the first iteration was about innovation, this second version is all about polish and expansion and while it still has its flaws, it delivers big time on the fun factor.

The story takes place five years after the first one and you've just been let out of jail and are ready to get back into the scene. People will still recognize you, but you've got to earn your way back up to the top which means that you really don't need to know anything about the first game in order to follow the story.

The game plays out in a very free roaming sense where if you don't want to do any story or events, you don't have to and can simply cruise around the huge city looking for places to board. You're able to set markers to warp you back to any spot you've chosen this time around too, so there's no more skating back to the start to try and make that jump or grind again. Another addition to the sequel was the ability to get off your board allowing you to access remote locations and move objects and ramps around to create sick spots that can be shared with friends. The controls are pretty clunky while off your board, but it's a skateboarding game, not a walking around game so it's forgivable.

The events available are numerous and varied. As you progress through the game, more and more options become available from doing photo shoots where the end results look identical to the kind of photos you'd see in skate magazines, to competitions involving mega ramps and some extreme air. If you're not into that at the moment, there's always the other side of skating and you can try and take the nastiest fall you can and see how many scrapes, broken bones and fractures you can accumulate.



The controls are based off of flicking the right thumbstick in certain directions to perform ollies and heelkicks. It's kind of like a tech deck on your controller. It has a very high learning curve, but after a few hours, you'll find that you'll be able to get the moves you want to happen actually happen. It adds a nice dimension to the game that feels like you're actually getting better at skating because your skill is getting better, instead of simply raising stats.

The online component is well done with lots of options to choose from. You can simply skate around the city with your friends or you can enter into events for the highest score, most painful fall, fastest time or play a HORSE type game against 5 other people. The one downfall here is the inability to kick people you've been grouped with. So if someone is away from their controller, you're going to have to watch them stand there for 30 seconds until their time expires. Since you're automatically entered into the next event, this has been a pretty common experience so far. There's also the option to upload your videos you've made and spots you've created.

Skate 2 offers so much more to the franchise than its

predecessor so that if you haven't played Skate just skip straight ahead to Skate 2. The visual style is beautiful with the camera looking through a fisheye style lens that focuses on the board rather than the skater. The additions they've added only enhance an already great game. EA Black Box managed to keep the game play fun and though it may be a steep learning curve for casual gamers, it is an excellent game and is a recommended buy.

Skate 2 is available for PlayStation 3 and Xbox 360 and is rated T for Teen. This review was based off the PlayStation 3 version.



Acres of Lions play the Media Club February 12th.



There are mixed feelings among Canucks fans; some think the acquisition of Mats Sundin was a complete mistake, and others think he is one of the greatest assets to the Canucks as of late. The first time we saw Sundin suit up as a Canuck, we saw the team blast their way to a 4-2 win over the Edmonton Oilers. Although Sundin didn't show up on the scoreboard, I remember his very first shift; he made a hard hit, and it was exciting. It made the Canucks' future look fantastic.

Nine games later, and you know the story. The Canucks picked up five of a possible 18 points after Sundin's first game, which had some Canuck fans thinking Mats was a big mistake, that the team was in need of a makeover, and that the season might as well be a write-off. There are many excuses available; one being that the Canucks' best defense and number one man Roberto Luongo was out with an injured groin. But many people were convinced that Sundin was just not pulling his weight. To date, in ten games he has three goals, two assists, and 16 penalty minutes, during which some game-winning goals were scored against the Canucks.

All that being said, my view is that it is too early to make a judgment about Mats Sundin. First of all, look at his history. In the early stage of his 18th season, Sundin has 1,326 points to date. He has averaged about a point

per game, even when he was playing for a perennial playoff-missing Toronto Maple Leafs team. Yes, he's getting a hefty \$5-million or so for his portion of the season, but he has barely had an adequate amount of time to get in game shape. It is like the beginning of the season for him when every other NHL player is in mid-season form; and if he can be in top condition for the playoffs, I think we're going to see an amazing leader and player in Sundin. He is second on the team for physical conditioning after all.

If the Canucks happen to actually make the playoffs this season, I believe Sundin will be a good investment to the team. His timing may be rusty right now, but his leadership qualities are not. Other Canucks players have not said anything bad about the new star. What's more, Sundin was the first Swede to be drafted first overall (in 1989 by the Quebec Nordiques), which adds to our faux team Sweden roster.

Canucks fans should hold on to their horses; I do not think it's fair to judge Sundin so early, and I have faith in the expertise of the judgment calls coming from GM Mike Gillis and his staff. Canucks fans be patient – I don't think we've seen the best of Mats Sundin quite yet.

Fewer young people may come into his store but Khera says his sales are still doing well. He does admit though that he sees more and more people checking their cell phones for time rather than their wrist.

The wristwatch isn't giving up without a fight though as

it continues to evolve to meet today's tech demand. A new Bluetooth wrist watch is set to hit the market complete with an ear piece, where James Bond-like, you can tell time and chat with friends.

It should be interesting to see if companies like Timex can indeed take a licking and keep on ticking as both the economy and technology give it a double whammy.

So while the days of the wrist watch being a status symbol or a sign of adulthood are over, the venerable timepiece is far from vanishing all together.

The BCITMA How-To Guide to Public Speaking

You may not be Barack Obama, but you can still captivate that audience.

hear a voice introducing my name over the speakers. It's time. Everything's a blur as I run up onto the stage. I avoid tripping over the steps: so far so good. The lights are blinding me in the eyes as I try to position myself in the right spot. My palms are sweaty, holding the microphone in a death grip. As the applause dies down, I look over the crowd. They look back at me. Watching. Waiting. What do I do now? Picture them all in their underwear?

Public speaking is the most common fear in North America, affecting 75% of the population. I am no stranger to the stage. I've delivered speeches, presentations, and performances in front of thousands of people. However, I have a secret: public speaking scares the life out of me. Nobody knows this, because I am actually a fairly good public speaker. On the surface I appear calm, cool, and collected. On the inside, however, my heart feels like it's in my throat.

This being said, I couldn't help but feel a little anxious when asked to host the BCITMA's fashion show event, Swagger 604. Of course, for students in BCIT's School of Business, presentations are a fact of life. Like it or not, good presentation skills are not just an asset in business, but essential. So whether you are hosting a fashion show in front of 300 people or presenting a marketing plan for Durex condoms, use these tips to blow your audience away:

Begin with a bang. A great introduction is very important, so do something that will grab their attention. Don't be afraid to have some fun and be unique, so long as it's appropriate. Once you have their attention, all you need to do is hold on to it.

Look sharp. If you are going to be the centre of attention, then dress the part. Look like someone people will want to watch. For business presentations, a well-fitting suit and good grooming are essential. Plus, when you look good, you feel good. Be careful to avoid drawing attention away from your words, so no short skirts or neon polka dot ties.

Know your stuff. Be sure you know your subject matter inside and out. This doesn't mean rehearsing your lines so many times you can recite them in your sleep. Know what you are talking about so that you sound natural and not a robot reading a script.

Slow down. It's true that the faster you talk, the quicker it will be over. However, unless you're an auctioneer with a gavel there is no need to race through your presentation. Just find a comfortable pace that feels natural for you. Don't be afraid to pause, think, or breathe.

Keep going. Forgot what you were going to say for a certain section? Keep going. Pronounced something wrong? Keep going. So nervous your hands are shaking? Keep going! If you mess up, the worst thing you can do is draw attention to it. Correct yourself and keep on going; the audience will barely notice.

Be professional, yet personable. It's important to be professional so that your audience takes you seriously, so dress the part and use a polite tone. But unless you are delivering a eulogy, there's no need to be overly formal. Don't be afraid to be yourself and show some personality.

Make eye contact. Your audience will not believe or listen to you if you are talking at the floor. Scanning the room and looking people in the eyes will engage your audience and build your credibility.

Videotape your rehearsal. Do you look like a bobble-head doll when you present? Or play with your hands? Or end every sentence with "um?" Chances are you don't know, unless you've seen yourself present or received feedback from others. Nobody likes to watch themselves on camera, but it's a good way to see what needs to change.

Involve the audience. Tell a story, make a joke, or ask them a question.

Avoid presentation ping pong. When delivering a

group presentation, try not to switch back and forth between presenters 50 times. Give each person an equal amount of time, because it takes three to five minutes for presenters to get comfortable and find their groove. Plus, it minimizes transitions and awkwardness

SMILE! To ease your nerves, engage your audience, and show confidence, never underestimate the power of a smile.

So don't stress about your next big presentation. The more you present, the better you will become. Just walk in there with confidence and make your audience love you!

Edit Flags Would Cripple Wikipedia

Early last week, Wikipedia founder Jimmy Wales pushed forward a plan to further protect the infamous online collaborative encyclopedia from vandalism.

he concept for the flagged revisions system was born after vandals edited the pages on U.S. Senators Ted Kennedy and Robert Byrd, falsely proclaiming their deaths.

Essentially, flagged revisions would enable Wikipedia's administrators to add an extra step to the editing process for certain controversial articles; any edits made to an article protected by the system by anonymous or new users would be put into a queue, which trusted users would review, and either approve or deny the changes.

Of course, vandalism is nothing new on Wikipedia, and any change towards making the site a more accurate resource is generally a good idea. While flagged revisions seem like a good plan in theory, there are some major issues with the implementation of such a system.

The main issue is that the flagged revisions plan doesn't scale to a website the size of the English Wikipedia. With over 2.5 million articles, even enabling this process on a minority of the articles would be prohibitively time-con-

suming for the site's current volunteer staff.

The flagged revisions process is currently in use on the German-language edition of the site (which is host to around 800,000 articles), and so far, delays as long as three weeks have occurred in the review process.

The review process also creates further delays as a result of staffers having to review multiple changes to the same article. Unlike the current system, under flagged revisions, multiple users could make changes to the same version of an article, leaving it up to the unpaid staffers to sift through the revisions and merge them together. Having such delays in an online encyclopedia, where the main benefit is providing the most up-to-date information, effectively destroys the utility of such a resource.

More issues come about with the selection of reviewers for the new system. Wikipedia currently has a fairly rigorous and time-consuming selection process with regards to who gets chosen to be an administrator. These administrators have the power to protect and unprotect articles from edits

There are roughly 1,600 of these administrators on the English version of the site. Leaving only them in charge of

approving or denying revisions would make the site grind to a halt.

Proponents of the flagged revisions system suggest that a new rank of users, called surveyors, be created. The criteria currently proposed by Wikipedia users basically amounts to giving surveyor rights to anyone who's been continually using the site for over a month.

While I'm not necessarily opposed to this, the fact is there are not many people out there who will actually care enough to weed through the hundreds of edits per day made to the site and meet these criteria.

While Wikipedia currently boasts over 8.8 million users, only 150, 000 of those have made at least one edit in the past 30 days. It's more than likely that only a small percentage of those are editing on a regular basis, and even fewer would be willing to put in the work that flagged revisions requires. Quite simply, there's not enough unpaid manpower to keep a system like this going.

Wales is obviously looking out for the best interests of the encyclopedia, but I'm afraid that in its current state, I'm flagging it for further revision.
