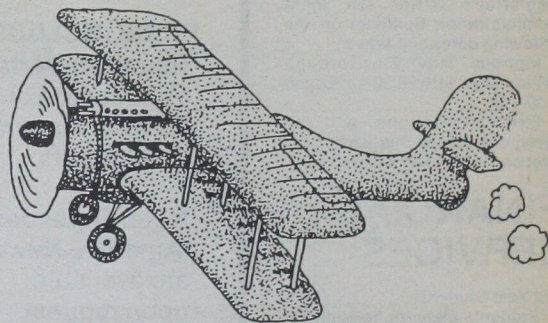

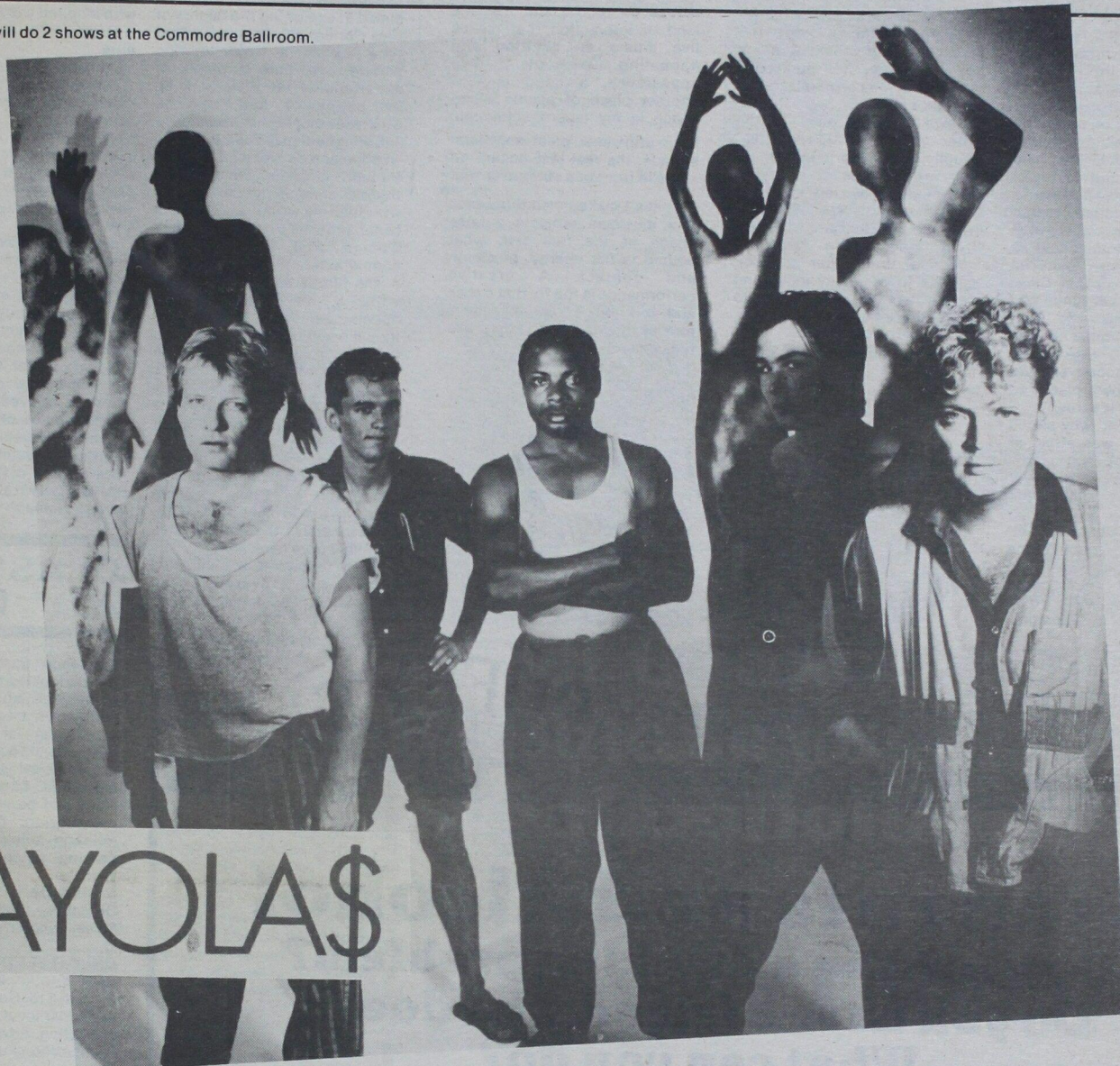

Oh no, not another review of yet another Toronto band. The presentation of the Musical Express awards held at the Hyatt a couple of week ago has prompted the invasion of several Eastern Acts including Long John Baldry, David Wilcox, and Platinum Blonde. But let's not forget one of Vancouver's favourite Eastern counterparts, Rough Trade, who played to a full house at the Commodore as part of their annual ritual. The Ballroom is lead vocalist Carol Pope's favourite local venue and you could sense she was completely comfortable in this relaxed setting. She even commented, "Vancouver and Montreal are the best places to play...I'm sorry but it's true."

I don't understand why she is sorry (unless she was afraid of offending any Eastern by-products) because Vancouver usually offers an enthusiastic audience.

Rough Trade opened their show with "All Touch" and continued with all their lusty originals, such as "High School Confidential", "Fire Down Below", "Crimes of Passion",

but one of the house arouzers had to be their latest hit, "Weapons". Providing a strong upbeat rhythm, this new song was all that was required to flex the dance floor.

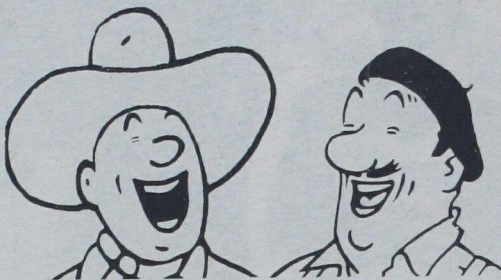
Kevin Staples, who is the other major component of Rough Trade and co-writer of their ever increasing library of outspoken tunes, led the band through a hot set. But the mystique lies in Carole Pope's fiery image. She had the audience under her control, reacting to her every move and sensual lyric. The had come to hear and see her serenade them, and she didn't disappoint.

Intense emotions never come

across on record and it's this kind of interaction that makes live music so exciting and appealing. Without a live appearance, a band is just another piece of plastic filling space in my record collection.

No matter how great an album sounds, the real test occurs on stage in front of a curious crowd.

It doesn't make much difference if a musician projects a false image of the real self; what counts is the energy, precision and contact. A creative performance is the fix that a rock and roll junkie like myself is forever striving for. Long live rock and roll!



Hard to handle

HARD TO HOLD is a movie aimed at exploiting the talents of Rick Springfield. This is his first time out in a major motion picture, and there is plenty of opportunities for Rick to sing, be happy or sad, and to otherwise display his backside.

Springfield plays Jamie Brown - a popular rock star who is going through a crisis. He's having trouble composing new songs with his co-writer and at the same time he's in love with a woman who won't give a commitment.

The film is promising at first, with a wonderfully funny opening sequence. Jamie, fresh from a concert, escapes from his dressing room with nothing on but a bath towel. He dodges screaming teenage fans throughout the concert hall. He finally gets into a friend's car and while they are driving down on of San Francisco's famous hills, they crash into another car...driven by Diana (Janet Eilber). It's love at first sight. Unfortunately, the movie goes down hill from here.

What follows is a silly story filled with every cliché imaginable. The screenplay by

Tom Hedley is awful. Take, for example, this conversation filled with inspired wisdom:

Diana: "Oh Jamie, isn't life nuts..."

Jamie: "It's scary"

Diana: "Yes it is...Oh how come you're so sure sure about everything?"

Then there is a 'tender' scene when Jamie tries to get a commitment from Diana. She says: "You know Jamie, I really, really, really...really care about you."

By this time I don't care what happens to these characters at all.

The film is spiced up with tunes by Springfield and the concert segments are fine, but Springfield should stick to singing. As for Eilber, well, the lacklustre role of Diana could have been played by any actress.

The scenes of San Francisco are nice to watch, but you can get that by watching re-runs of 'The Streets of San Francisco.' HARD TO HOLD's story line is hard to stomach!

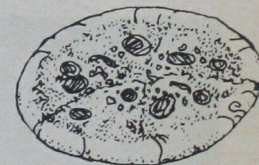

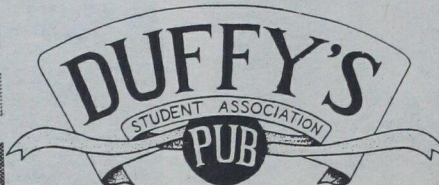

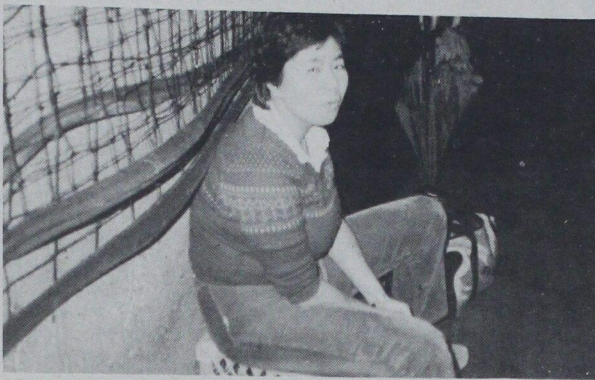

Putting together a good resume is very important

- Bev English -

The resume is designed to get you an interview with a prospective employer. The style of your resume is a personal decision and should reflect your individual skills and areas of effectiveness. Be flexible in your format.

Most resumes are up to three pages in length and look most effective when done on a word processor. Coloured paper is acceptable but good white or buff coloured bond gives a very professional impression.

The following format has proven to be popular with employers and is versatile enough to be useful in a wide range of industries.

PERSONAL INFORMATION

This information may be centred at the top of the first page. It includes name, complete address, telephone number and message number.

Do not include your birthdate, height, weight or health unless it is a requirement of the industry you work in or unless you have a health problem that could affect your employability. Also, it is no longer advisable to include your social insurance number on your resume, for reasons of privacy.

CAREER OBJECTIVE

This statement should not be longer than three sentences. It should explain the job you want and/or the kind of company you want to work for. It may also include a statement about your best

in your two year course at BCIT. A copy of your transcript of marks may also be attached to the resume.

You may also include a category for 'Special courses, projects or awards'.

It is imperative that all the

In a brief description of your job duties, note any transferable skills acquired (e.g. analyzing, organizing, public speaking, persuading, writing etc.)

Do not discuss reasons for leaving or salary earned. The resume is not intended to answer every question the employer may have.

HOBBIES, ACTIVITIES AND AFFILIATIONS

This category gives you a chance to give a potential employer some insight into your character and personality.

REFERENCES

'Excellent references supplied on request'. Do not include references unless you are sending a resume at the request of an employer. This procedure will preserve the confidentiality of the people you use as references as well as allow you to change your references for a particular employer.

If you are invited to an interview, bring a list of references at that time.

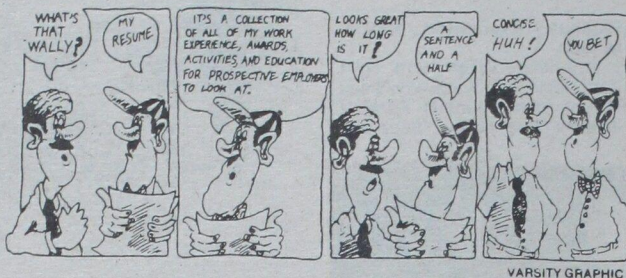
RESUME REMINDERS

1. Check spelling and grammar.
2. Have it professionally typed or done on a word processor. Use good bond paper.
3. Check your references.

THE COVERING LETTER

Mail your covering letter and resume to a particular person. Your company research will reveal who the person is that does the hiring for a particular company. The letter should include such things as:

1. The position you are applying for and/or your career objective.
2. The reason you are seeking employment with this company or industry.
3. A knowledge of the organization you are making application to.
4. Availability for interviews.



qualifications for the job you want as well as a statement about any other special skills, abilities or attitudes that will bring you the job.

Employers have stated that this is the most important part of the resume.

EDUCATION

Start with your most recent educational accomplishment first. Do not undersell your education. BCIT should be written out in full and describe your diploma as a 'National Diploma of Technology'. Also, list a few of the major courses included

information for a particular marketing page remain on one page and that any additional information, particularly Employment History, start on a new page.

EMPLOYMENT HISTORY

This category is the one that varies the most in resume design. You may choose any format that best accentuates the skills and experience you have acquired in the labour force. However, remember to highlight the occupation you held rather than the name of the employer or the dates you worked.
