

A review of student financial assistance and

significant barriers to entry into universities, colleges and other post-secondary institutions will be undertaken by an independent committee, Advanced Education, Training and Technology Minister Tom Perry announced April 8.

The minister is appointing Jennifer Orum, the coordinator of financial aid and awards at BCIT, to chair the review committee.

"In keeping with a commitment made in the budget speech, the committee will undertake a comprehensive review of the student

financial assistance program and provide recommendations for change for the 1993/94 program year," said Perry. "In addition, the committee will explore other areas, such as tuition fee levels, where barriers may exist that prevent British Columbians from entering our post-secondary system."

The committee, to be appointed shortly, may include: representatives from student organizations, faculty and administration in the post-secondary system, and underrepresented groups.

The committee is expected to present its final report to the minister by late August 1992.

PETER LEGGE SPEAKS AT BREAKFAST SERIES



Peter Legge is the president and publisher of Canada Wide Magazines, a Burnaby based company quickly becoming one of Canada's largest independent publishing organizations. He spoke to over 50 guests at the Four Seasons Hotel April 2 at the BCIT Breakfast Speaker Series. Canada Wide Magazines controls a network of 17 magazines in central and western Canada. Here are a few excerpts from his speech titled the Universal Laws of Success.

Travelling around the world and talking to many organizations... I am often asked "How do you motivate your people? How do I get them to be what I want them to be?... I think Michael Angelo said: "And yet I am still learning." and Abraham Lincoln said: "If I had eight hours to chop wood, I would spend six hours sharpening my axe." Put those two quotes together and I believe we have to continue to learn how the human mind works and how the human spirit works and to provide a platform and some character traits that people can buy into....

I find many men and women I meet are trying to be five different personalities. They are trying to be one kind of a person in the office, another person with their spouse, one person with their bridge club, one person when they are out on the golf course, one person when they are working with a charity group and then they juggle these five personalities. We need to be one personality, one individual, one somebody that you can count on. That is what leadership is.... People say to me, "You know Peter, if I had a lot of money I would really be successful." Well it is the other way around. First of all you have to be successful and then the trappings of success whatever they might be — will come....

We came to this country 40 years ago. My dad was in the merchant

marine. He travelled around the world 11 times. He ran away from home when he was 16. When he was 40 years old after the war he was living in London with one son - who happens to be me - and he said to my mom: "We have to leave London. We have got to get out of England. We have to go where there are some magnificent opportunities." And so my mom said to him: "So where do you want to go?" He said: "Well the best place I ever visited, of all of those countries and those cities. was Vancouver."

How do you determine what your values are?

How you spend your time. How you spend your energy and how you spend your money will tell you what your life's values are. And your life's values are what you think about most of the time. And what you think about most of the time, you are in the process of becoming. In other words, you become what you think about most of the time...

THE BOOKSTORE: GETTING TO THE HEART OF THE CAMPUS

At any college, university or institute, there are certain basic student services that you can't do without. The bookstore is one of these.

If you don't have a bookstore you don't have any textbooks.

At the BCIT bookstore there are big changes in the way the store orders, receives, shelves, sells and buys back its books.

As acting bookstore manager Michael Stewart will tell you there is a lot to running a \$2.5 million business which sells about 3,500 titles.

Since June of 1990 Michael has been researching, recommending and implementing the computerization of bookstore operations.

During the research phase of his work, Michael discovered PC TEXT, a specially designed bookstore automation program developed by the Nebraska Book Company.

Under the new system, all bookstore staff may access the up-to-date-data simultaneously.



PC-Text is a database of over 37,000 titles allowing bookstore staff to track any title from when the instructor selects the text to the purchase and buyback of the used book. The system prints the order, designs shelf tags, and registers receipt of the returned books.

The bookstore has also automated its on-line processing of credit card sales. The brand new programmable cash registers provide detailed receipts complete with the book title. By next year Michael plans to have completed the interface between PC-TEXT and the cash registers to achieve computerized point of sale.

The goal of the new system is to be more responsive to the customers, the faculty, instructors, students and staff.

"The staff really feel more involved with their work. They are more connected to the running of the store." Our job is not just to act, but to react and anticipate the needs of our customers. We expect the bookstore automation to help us achieve this goal" said Michael.. Michael says he has learned a lot about computers during the bookstore automation. In fact he is almost an expert now. He recently gave a seminar to members of the Western Canada College Book Stores Association at its annual general meeting in Lake Louise.
