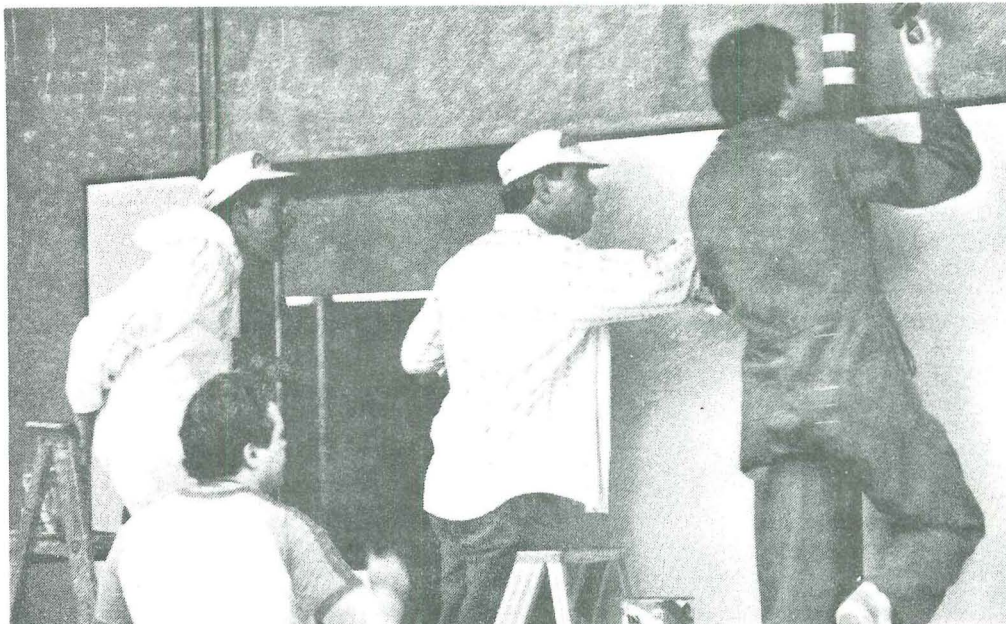
Financial Management instructor, **ROBERT JACKSON**, who has been vocal in his concerns about the condition of the classrooms, led the painting party on their campaign.
