TUKULE 11 Groups **Submit Proposals**

Proposals are now being considered by Victoria to set up a Board of Governors for BCIT that would control the distrubution of school finances. In lieu of the present system, in which money is meted out separately by the government, a single sum would be al lotted annually for distribution by the board to departments, in proportion to their needs. This would include staff salaries, library expenses, and purchases of equipments, to name a few. Altogether eleven groups at BCIT have submitted proposals. The best features to incorporate in the system will be decided by a Task Force which will be comprised of members of the Advisory Council, Administration, Staff Society, Student A similar system, on a far larger scale, has been in practice at U.B.C. for some time. The Board would have control of all school departments, with the exception of the Student Association, which is autonomous, and will remain so, as its funds come directly from student fees. The Board of Governors will be advantageous in that funds will be more readily available for all inter-campus bugeting. Although it remains to be confirmed, likelyhood of the adoption of this system is thought to be favorable. Membership on the Board will be entirely independent of be decided by the school, and aside from theannual allotment, will be entirely independent of Victoria. It is hoped that the system will be in operation by the spring.

My job as V.P. is hard to define. The Sports Coordinator, for example, looks after Sports; the Publications chairman concerns herself with publications; the V.P. Internal must cover a broad spectrum of activities. One of the major areas in which I spend my time is as a liason between the administration and the student body. This liason includes timetabling, conflicts and problems, problems with the food services, parking, as



well as many problems that develope during the course of the year

Within the Student's Association, one function of mine is to act as a parliamentarian. All that means is that I must decide and advise on the legality of any meeting. The staff within the SAC come under my jurisdiction. Most importand, I am to serve you. Please feel free to stop me any time.

STUDENT LOANS

This is a plan introduced by the Federal Government to assist students who, without loan assistance, would be unable to pursue full-time post-secondary studies at a specified educational institution. The maximum loan for an academic year is \$1,400. Total loans to any student cannot exceed \$9,800. A loan of up to \$700 may be authorized for a single semester which is part of a longer programme of study. Borrowers under the plan are required to repay principal and interest by regular monthly instalments. Payments commence six months after the borrower ceases to be a full-time student at a specified educational institution. No payments are made while the borrower is a full-time student nor for six months thereafter. Interest during this period is paid by the Federal Government on behalf of the student. Need for loan assistance is determined by Provincial Loan Authorities in accordance with administrative criteria established for use throughout Canada. A parental contribution table is an integral part of the criteria and is applied in all cases where the student has not established financial independence as defined in The Canada Student Loans Plan. When the application is completed it must be submitted to the Financial Aid Officer of the British Columbia educational institution to be attended. Students planning to attend institutions outside British Columbia will send applications directly to Student Affairs Branch, Division of Post-secondary Services, Department of Education, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B.C.





GREENLAND ESKIMO


SCULPTURE - OCT 3 - 28 A select display of the carvings of Greenland Eskimos may also be seen at the Burnaby Art Gallery in Oct.

Feel a cold coming on? Shots and immunization are first in demand and are used



Szasz On Sex

Yesterday Dr. George Szasz, Professor of Sexology came to BCIT AND offered the students his presentation of Human Sexuality.

Dispite the face that the equipment from Audio Visual was neither set up or available for use, he went ahead with his presentation.

Verbally, he attempted to explain and present an idea of the continuity of life and sexual function as a part of this cycle. He equated the positive aspects of sensuality as in the beauty and color of nature that surrounds us; the life cycle of the human being from conception, represented by tiny perfectly formedfetuses

to death embodied in the symbol of a gravestone. He described life as viewed by the toddler exploring and peeking out at his environment from behind the branch of a tree. He described adolescents and the fireworks behind this initial experience with sexuality, the family and finally old people.

The negative aspects of sexuality were equated with the picture of a child with bloated stomach and starving in a country less fortunate and developed then ours, where human sexuality creates these kinds of problems.

DR. Szasz stated that sexual relations in our country wards procreation of the species but as a social act and a form of communication between man and women.

From this form of relating arises problems and the kind of work he is involved in.





This year \$50,000 has been granted for course unions and clubs. Course unions present a budget to the Board of Directors of the Union detailing their plans for academic projects, special projects, social functions and printing and postage. After the Board has approved the budget, the course union can go ahead and implement their plans.

SURPI also funds clubs, such as the chess club and four cultural associations: Ryerson Afro-Caribbean Association, Hellenic society, Italian society and the Chinese Students' society.

Also, each division - Arts, Applied Arts & Community Servie, and Technology has its own society, funded by SURPI, and concerned with co-ordinating projects course unions might want to co-

To handle all the accounting, coordination, purchasing and programming for these course unions, clubs and societies the Union has a staff of three: a business manager, a bookkeeper, and a project coordinator in charge of programs such as Orientation and Winter Car-

In addition, the Union has a research co-ordinator for its research program and course evaluation.

The Union is managed by a Board of Directors of nine students - three from each division; Arts, Applied Arts and Community Services, Business and Technology. The Directors, elected annually, decide what policies and programs are most relevant to the social and educational benefit of all the students and allocates funds to them.

The President is the chief executive officer of the union and a fulltime employee. He or she is elected annually from the entire student body and is responsible for implementing the policies instituted by the Board.

The report was well received both internally and in Government circles. The Committee on Universities consequently set up a subcommittee to review the situation. And although all concerned are pessimistic about obtaining hard results, this move is encouraging and

now is being pursued.

On June 15, the Union released a more detailed and comprehensive report to the Ryerson community and Public-at-large entitled, War and Peace. A sixty-seven page document, the report's stated purpose was... "an investigation of the financial status, administrative practice and Academic structure of Ryerson Polytechnical Institute" Included is six pages of wide-ranging recommendations aimed, not only at financial matters, but also the preservation of academic qua-

This report was also well re-Although its recommendations will not be, dealt with immediately, it has already indirectly affected certain internal deci-

Major changes have been planned for the Institute. The most important of these is the reduction of the number of faculty members to 446 from 489 by September, 1973 and a further target decrease to 415 (based on 7,000 students) by April 1974. To complement this, a formula system that covers faculty establishment, department by department, is being developed.

The activities of The Union are only just beginning. To the present time, most discussions and policies have been formulated with little input from the large majority of students. This practice must end and it is hoped that the students of each Course Union will accept the challenge to closely analyze and develop policy with respect to their own programmes. It is also necessary to have closer lines of contact with student representatives on Departmental and Academic Council. In this manner, students will have the ability to forward powerful, imaginative and intelligent proposals for the future development of the Insti-






