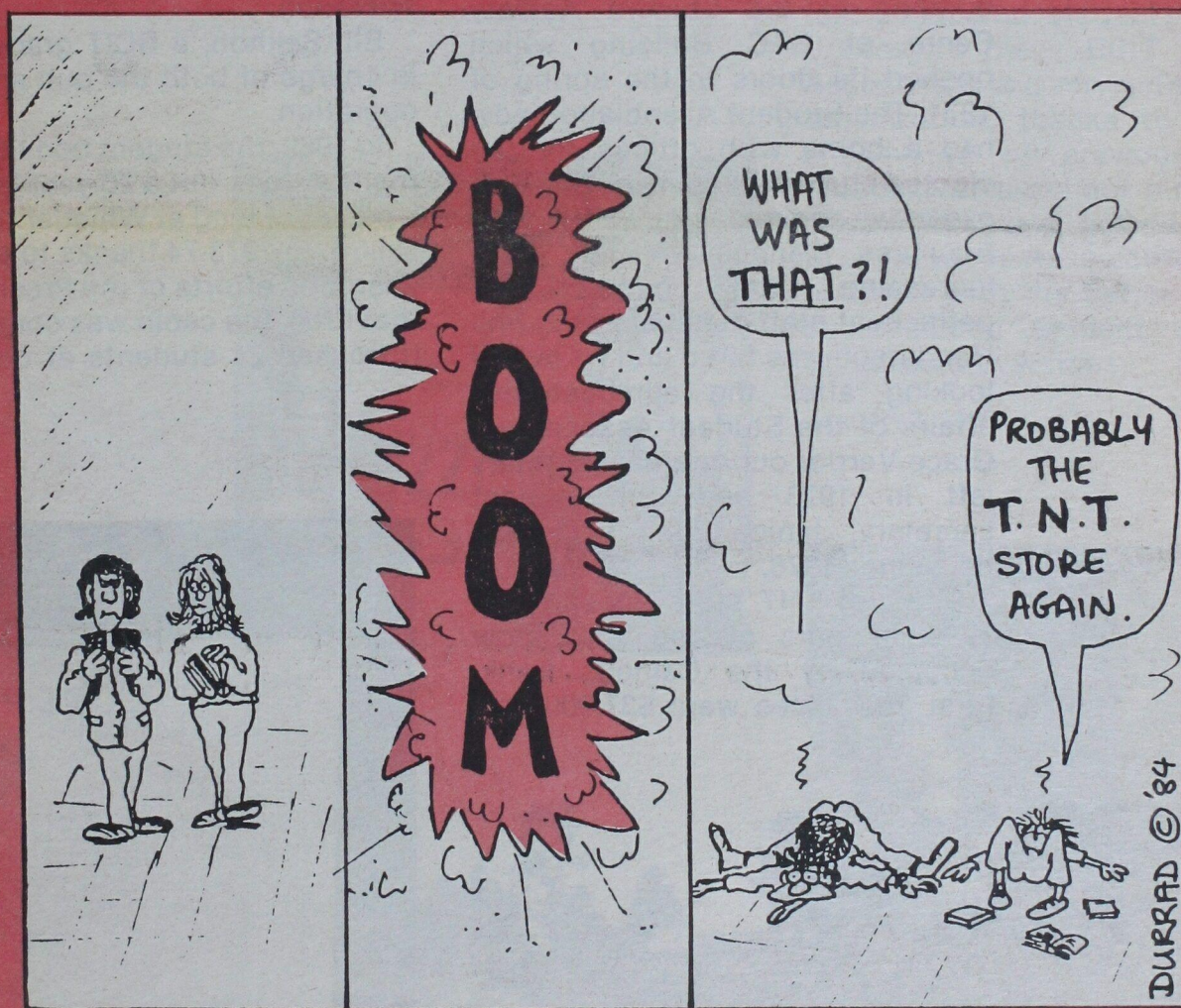

## A history of the Student Association

BCIT opened its doors to eager students in September, 1964. It did not take long for the student body to organize themselves for social and sports activities. At that time the campus had a 'Butler' type building which was used for dances and socials. In 1966 energetic students started to publish the 'LINK' student newspaper. Annual yearbooks started to appear in 1968.

In October 1968, the BCIT Student Association was officially chartered as a registered B.C. Society. We are a society in good standing as we always file an annual return together with the audited financial statements.

Continual lobbying by students to the government of Hon. W.A.C. Bennett finally resulted in the building of the Student Activity Centre or SAC Building which opened its doors in the spring of 1971. The Student Association now had a home with offices for the elected student executive. The 1971 executive decided to hire a full-time Business Manager in July 1971 increasing the number of permanent staff members to 2. Phil Henderson was hired and he is still looking after the administrative affairs of the Student Association. Grace Verrier our original secretary left in 1973 and our present secretary, Janice Eden has been here since 1976.

The first TNT store appeared in 1971 in part of the area now occupied by the Campus Bank. First year sales were \$37,000. We

now have 3 stores on campus with a total sales volume of \$900,000. Linda Field is the manager of the TNT operations.

Pubs have always been popular with BCIT Students. In 1971, we commenced having pubs in the SAC by use of the occasional permit system. In 1974, we finally obtained a year-round license which still serves us today. We are the only college or institute in B.C. to have this privilege - only UBC, SFU and UVic have full-time licences besides BCIT.

The students were unhappy with the food operation in the SAC so in 1977, we opened up 'Growlies' run by the Student Association. At first we featured only a salad bar and a sandwich operation. In the past 2 years, we have added a hot food operation.

Bill Sekhon, a BCIT graduate, is in charge of both the pub and food operation.

In 1969, the student body through the S.A. took out a 20 year lease on a parcel of land at Whistler near the ski lift. In 1973-74 thanks to the very energetic efforts of the President at that time, the cabin was completed. It houses 24 students at one time

and has proven very popular with the student body.

Another BCIT graduate Donald Wright is in charge of our publications Department which looks after the weekly 'Link' and an extensive variety of print shop services.

A good source of income to the Student Association is the video games room. This room was remodelled in 1980 and the S.A. now realizes about \$40,000 annual income.

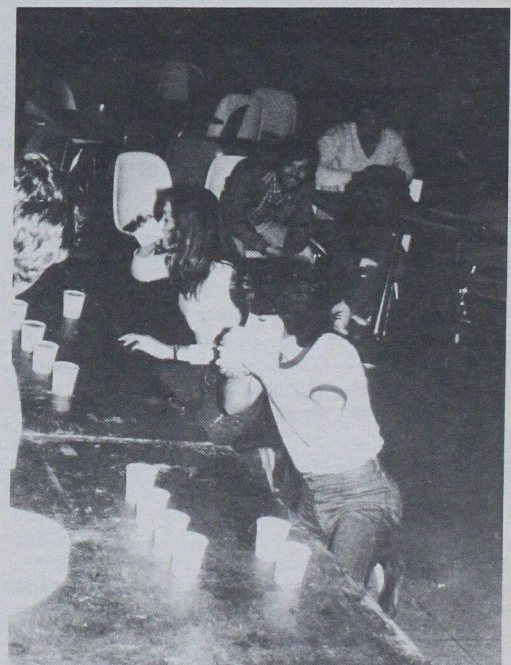
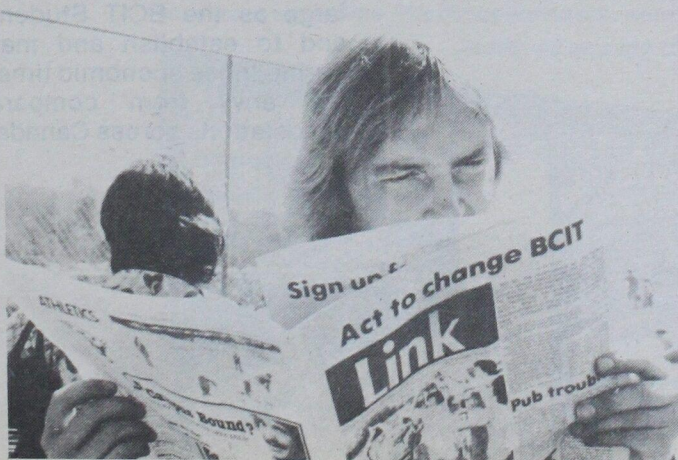
The Student Association certainly has expanded into business areas but it has also been active in the political arena. Always looking out for the interests of the students, the student body has been responsible for many benefits

accruing to the students. In 1972, the student executive forced the abolition of the dress code (ties, jackets, etc.) at BCIT. In 1976, we were successful in assisting students having problems in the Health Division. The 3 hour Wednesday break is another Student Association initiative. The Student Association has always maintained a good relationship with the BCIT Administration. Unlike most university student groups, our attitude is never one of confrontation.

The financing by the Student Association of the Racquet Court Complex demonstrates the willingness of BCIT students to assist in the improvement of life at BCIT. This venture, costing over one million dollars will be fully paid for by 1987 from student money.

Today the BCIT Student Association is a very active student organization, thanks to the past endeavours of previous student groups. For a school our size the organization and activities of the BCIT Student Association puts us on a par with the better and more sophisticated student unions in Canadian universities.

#### Good News!

A Canadian Government survey reports that graduates in 1985 will have an easier time finding employment. In a survey of 89 major companies, 59% stated that they planned to hire more Canadian post-secondary school graduates than in 1984. They plan to hire a total of 1364 students at an average wage of \$1686.00 per month. This compares to 466 hired in 1984.

#### Information Services

A new information booth will be appearing soon in front of the SAC Building. Numerous services will be offered to students including a mail box, message service, dance ticket sales, lottery tickets, and many others.

### The activity fee

The BCIT Student Association is a large and diverse operation with annual sales transactions slightly over \$1.9 million. The Student Association is run as a non-profit organization where net revenue derived from activity fees and business subsidiaries are channeled back to the students through an array of services and student government.

Each year the BCIT Student Association collects a \$65 fee from full time students. The activity fee is allocated to various cost centers as follows:

\$30.00 of the activity fee is earmarked for capital projects such as the existing phase one - Racquetball Court Facilities. An allocation of \$6.00 is set aside for Special Institute Projects, which include the leasing of IBM PC and APPLE IIE Micro Computers. This fund also provides the large scale information map situated by the library. Other projects include student employment during the school year and summer months. For the purchase of capital equipment, \$5.00 is levied for assets, furniture in the racquetball courts and student pub area, for example.

Administration and other labour costs account for another \$5.00. Of the remaining \$19.00, \$5.00 is used for the ever-expanding Intramural/Extramural Sports programme. The Student Association uses \$3.00 for the operation of S.A. Media Services, including publication of The Link newspaper. Student social services are allotted \$3.00, as is Public Relations/Charity Donations, and special grants to your Division Societies. Finally, \$2.00 is used for the BCIT Whistler Lodge operations, covering maintenance, wages, light, power, heat, and other operational costs.

In the 1983-84 fiscal year, the BCIT Student Association paid out \$97,000 in student wages, and average of \$1500 for the students who worked for us. This year we anticipate students will receive \$110,000 in total wages, an average of \$1600 per student worker.

The ability to run an organization as large as the BCIT Student Association and to establish and maintain growth during these economic times has aroused the envy from comparable student associations across Canada.

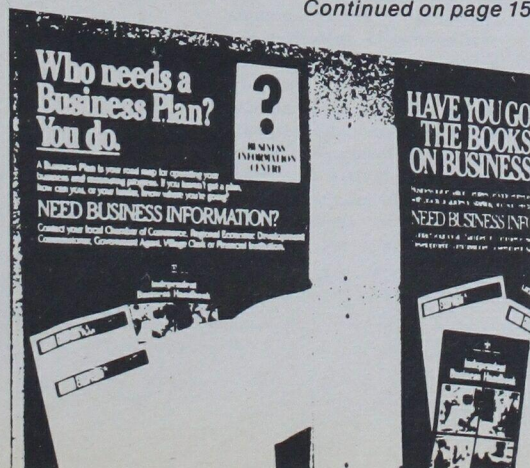

### Engineer rivalry encouraged

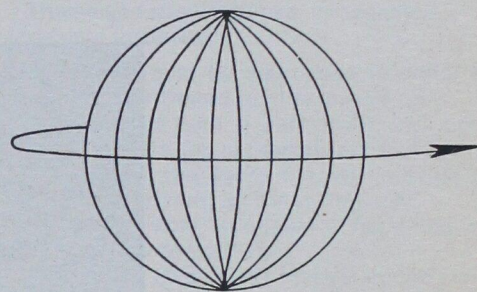
I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for supporting the Engineering Society in the Fall term. Looking forward, keep the following dates in mind for the Spring term:

The Engineering Society also presents 'The Engineering Careers Days Exhibition', the first in what we feel needs to be an annual event. The date for the Engineering Careers Day is March 22 and 23, 1985. The purpose of this exhibition is to bring industry and the graduating Engineering students together. Any Engineering technology interested in displaying their wares at this exhibition are invited to contact me.

The Engineering Society is also currently organizing a big bash. It will take place early in the Spring Term, and promises to be the best party Vancouver has seen in a long time. Watch The Link for further details.

The Engineering Cup has been re-established this year in order to encourage tech rivalry on campus. While you were walking through the halls of BCIT last term you may have noticed some unusual posters or goings-on. These spoofs and gags are for points toward the Engineering Cup. Points are awarded on a scale from one to ten for gags or events done to rival technologies. The Engineering Cup is a prestigious trophy and monetary prize awarded to the technology with the greatest number of points at the end of the school year.

Some of the events to date have been: the theft of the C&S Concrete Tobaggan, the interception of the Link newspaper before distribution so that it could be SOLD to a rival technology that had important information in it, several posters spoofing other technology dance posters, and several ads in The Link spoofing rival technologies.

There will also be a number of workshops and seminars offered this term. Watch The Link sports page for details every week.

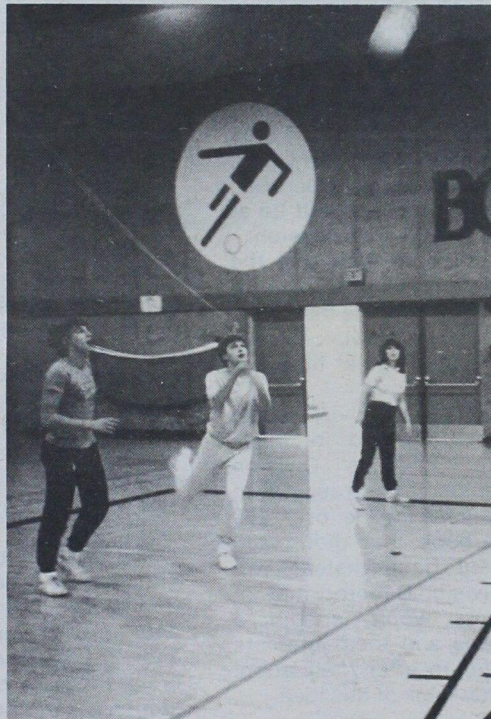

### Executive

The Student Association is the collective voice of the students of BCIT. About 25 students act as the board of directors of the association. They are known as the Student Council. It is comprised of nine campus elected executive members, who meet every other week on their own, and 16 members at large representing the three divisions who meet, together with the executive, every other week.

The executive members are elected in April of the school year preceeding their term of office (they actually take office June 1). It includes the four 'signing officers' - president, vice president of administration, vice president of public relations and treasurer. In addition there are the society chairpersons, one each for Business, Engineering, Health, Sports and Activities.

The remainder of council, as representatives of the three divisions, are elected at an early meeting of each society.

Each society is comprised of the first and second year technology presidents of that division. Anyone can run as a member at large through their society, as long as they intend to attend the meetings and are accepted by the chairpeople present at the first meeting.

As a non-profit organization, the BCIT Student Association operates under a constitution and a set of bylaws. Student Council, as the board of directors, carries out the activities and responsibilities of the association in a manner consistent with the constitution and bylaws. Changes to the bylaws can be made by the council; changes to the constitution, which is a statement of purpose, can only be made by a vote of the full council.

Once a year an annual general meeting is held, usually in Growlies. At this time the President and Treasurer give reports, and move acceptance of a prepared financial "state of the union". Any proposed changes to the constitution itself could be dealt with at this time.

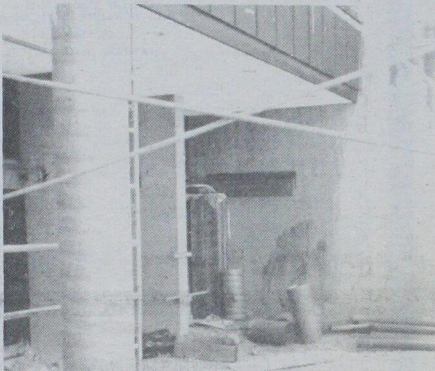

## S.A. funds variety of facilities

### Racquet Sports

The new wing of the Campus Student Activity Centre (SAC) building was opened officially in March 1983. This wing included washrooms, four racquetball courts, two squash courts and a student lounge area. The cost of this new construction was \$1,050,000, to be paid by the students of BCIT through their activity fee. \$30 of the \$65 fee goes directly toward paying off the building debt. The debt should be paid by December 1986.

The Squash/Racquetball Courts are governed by a committee consisting of 3 Student Association executive members, 1 faculty member, 1 institute administration member, and a member from the Recreation Department. The committee sets fees, budget and administration policy for the courts. All revenue from the courts goes toward their operational costs, including administration and the cost of maintaining the lounge and court areas. When the building is finally paid off, profits from the operation will be split 50/50 between the Student Association and the Recreation Department. The Rec Department currently receives 50% for administering the courts, funds which are put into the existing facilities.



The price for BCIT students who wish to use the racquetball courts is \$4.50 per booking or \$2.25 per student. This is not an exorbitant price. The committee monitors other facilities in the area to ensure that our rates are the lowest, and keep in mind that the profit goes toward paying off the building. There are lessons available for students who want to learn the game, and there is a club on campus which offers all aspects of competition, from novice to expert. If you are interested in lessons or the club, contact the Campus Rec Office.

Students are encouraged to try out the courts - this may be the game for you. Both games are good for you no matter what your age, and it's not that expensive to get involved in them. It's also a great way to get rid of that excess Christmas Turkey or even summer beer, for that matter. These are your courts, so give them a try!

### Whistler Lodge

The Whistler lodge is owned and operated by the BCIT Student Association, and by extension the students themselves, you and I. The lodge is open year round, and is located at the foot of Whistler Mountain, one of the world's finest year round recreational areas. Whistler is located about 120 Km north of Vancouver, and takes about 2 hours driving time to get to. The lodge is situated in the clubs cabin area of the resort municipality.

During the summer, spring and fall, students can enjoy the unlimited hiking, climbing, horseback riding, trail hiking, tennis, canoeing, swimming and basic relaxation that the Whistler are offers. Students could try a round of golf at Whistler's golf course (designed by Arnold Palmer). Also there are the Meager Hot Springs

and Black Tusk for students to enjoy.

In the winter, Alpine and Cross-Country Skiing is at it's best. Whistler and Blackcomb mountains offer some of the best skiing in the world, with a 1035 meter vertical drop ( the longest in North America). After skiing, it's back to the lodge for a couple of Gluweins and a quick suana before hitting the village with all it's ski bums and bunnies. (However when returning to the lodge, the noise level must be kept down as many guest like to hit the powder early)

To book the Lodge, just drop by the Student Association office and book the dates you want. It is on a first-come, first-serve basis, so book early. Students may take one guest with them when booking. The rates are \$10 a night for day school students, \$12 for staff and PVI students, and \$15 for the general public.

The lodge sleeps 24, with guests supplying their own blankets (so bring a sleeping bag or equivalent). There are kitchen facilities, so bring your own food if you'd like to. There is a sauna in the lodge, so don't forget your bathing suit.

As you can see, Whistler is *the* year round recreation area, so when you need a break, book a bed and enjoy!

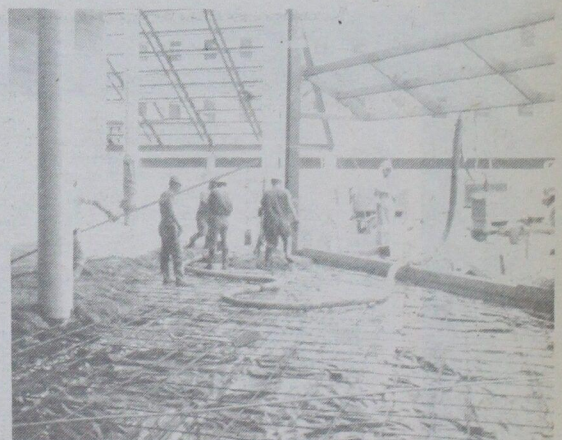
### Recreation

The Student Association and the Institute jointly fund both intramurals and extramurals. The S.A. provides \$21,000 a year for intramurals, and \$4,000 a year for extramurals.

The S.A. considers intramurals a priority because more students can be involved, and it helps the Recreation department offer a variety of activities for students, including leagues, clubs, and non-credit courses. For example, did you know that Campus Rec offers massage clinics, weight training courses, aerobics, self defense clinics and workshops? Students can also obtain very cheap swim tickets at the Rec Office, for the CG Brown Pool in Burnaby, or the Canada Games pool in New Westminster.

Intramural leagues include volleyball, hockey, curling and indoor soccer. Clubs include the Ski club, photography, scuba, skydiving, outdoors, and others.

Extramurals, eliminated over the years due to restraint, are making a slow comeback. The Recreation department, in cooperation with the Student Association, has re-introduced certain sports, ones allowing maximum participation.



Extramurals has a total budget of \$12,000, which covers a men's rugby club, the BCIT Cougars, Women's Volleyball, Squash and Racquetball team, Mixed Curling and Badminton. These sports allow 72 students to participate in an extremely competitive environment. These may not be the most popular sports, but it costs \$23,000 to run a hockey team, or \$11,000 to run men's and women's basketball. Hopefully in the future, the extramural side of recreation at BCIT can expand.

## ARE YOU AWARE?

Since this is a Student Association oriented issue of The Link, I will discuss what the S.A. offers to BCIT students. I am sure that most students are aware of our businesses but perhaps not of the little things we do for our membership.

The mandate of the Student Association is to provide a broad range of high-quality services to the BCIT community at the most reasonable prices. The S.A. also works with Institute administration and Provincial and Federal governments to protect the rights of students and the status of their diploma. Currently, S.A. President Donald Rippon and myself are working with the provincial formula funding board. We are trying to show the board that the current formula does not take into account certain unique aspects about BCIT. For example, BCIT leases its computer resources from IBM at a cost of \$800,000 per year. The formula does not cover this cost. Our latest meeting with the board was on January 3, 1985. I will keep students informed as we continue to work with the board.

This year, the Student Association expects business revenue to reach \$1.76 million. This includes sales by the TNT, TAPS, Growlies cafeteria, and other operations. Because the S.A. is a non-profit organization, net profits are spent on services for students.

Students own the S.A. businesses and the S.A. executive is the student's Board of Directors. Any student who is a member of the association in good standing (ie. their activity fee paid) is welcome to attend executive and/or full council meetings. These meetings occur every second Monday in the SAC Boardroom. Minutes of meetings are posted for students to read outside the S.A. General Office, located in the East hallway of the SAC Building.

The S.A. businesses are all geared to serve students.

The This & That Emporium features day to day student necessities ranging from newspapers to computers and accessories. All items are competitively priced to fit the student budget. Also, when purchases are made at the TNT, students receive 5% of the purchase price in Scholars' Dollars. Students can then use these Scholars' Dollars to purchase anything the S.A. sells (except alcohol).

A popular place to use Scholars' Dollars is Growlies, which offers students a wide range of food items. From the salad and sandwich bar to pasta, with weekly specials to watch for. Students can also enjoy movies on a big screen while eating their lunch. And, with the purchase of a food item, beverages are available from TAPS between 11:30 and 1:30.

Speaking of TAPS, recent renovations have vastly improved the atmosphere of the pub. Open at 4 p.m., TAPS gives students an opportunity to unwind and have a few suds after class. Note the new 'DJ' booth and the new speakers installed over the Christmas break.

This is the students' pub, and technologies may book it for socializers on Mondays, Tuesdays or Wednesdays. The technology may take 100% of the door receipts and 50% of the profit from the bar. Every second Saturday is available for technologies to hold dances and techs keep 100% of the profits on Saturday nights. To book TAPS, see Bill Sekhon, Food and Beverage Manager. Bill can usually be found in the S.A. General Office.

The S.A. also provides the LINK newspaper for BCIT students. The paper is a warehouse of information and allows students to keep abreast of events, news, recreation and other aspects of campus life. If students do not read The Link they are missing out. The Link also provides a platform for students to speak out on issues that concern them. The Link office is located in the east hallway of the SAC Building. Managing editor is Don Wright, who may be contacted at 432-8757.

Next door to The Link office is S.A. Media Services, which provide students with graphic services including: photocopying, binding, laminating, typesetting and printing. Techs and other groups (ie clubs) holding events can get tickets, posters, handbills, brochures or coupons printed here, and the prices are more than reasonable.

The S.A. also operates a resume service as well. Students who need a professional looking resume prepared can bring a rough draft to the S.A. General office and our secretaries will do up an eye-catching resume for them.

The S.A. is currently looking into the feasibility of starting a used book buy back program for students wishing to buy or sell used textbooks at term end.

Other services the S.A. provides, dealt with in detail throughout this issue of The Link include: The Whistler Lodge, Intramural and Extramural sports, Clubs, free phones, the Business Information Centre, Micro Computers in the Library, video games etc. Services not covered elsewhere in today's paper include: bursaries, free set photos, cheque cashing, BCIT ID cards, International Student Cards, Carpool information, Blood Donor Clinics, Bus Passes etc.

The S.A. grants the three division societies money which in turn provide funds for such projects as the Concrete Tobbaggan and team, and the Inter Varsity Christian Fellowship. As well, the S.A. Boardroom is available to technologies to hold meetings, seminars, workshops, etc. Book at the S.A. General Office. Soon, we will be opening an information booth for students, featuring a message service, ticket outlet, lottery tickets and information relevant to students.

There are employment opportunities available through S.A. businesses as well. Approximately 35 students work for the S.A. during the academic year, and about 20 during the summer.

There are special events sponsored by the Student Association through the year, including beer gardens, dances, fashion shows, career days and orientation week. Charities such as the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation (Shinerama) and the Variety Club are supported, and every two years the S.A. and the Institute jointly co-host an open house so the students of BCIT can show the public exactly what we're doing.

The Student Association of BCIT belongs to the students. The 1984/85 S.A. Executive have an open door policy and if students have any questions or concerns, feel free to drop into any executive office and have a chat. We are here to represent you, and we appreciate any feedback you have to offer.

On a personal note, I would like to wish new and old students alike a very happy and prosperous '85.

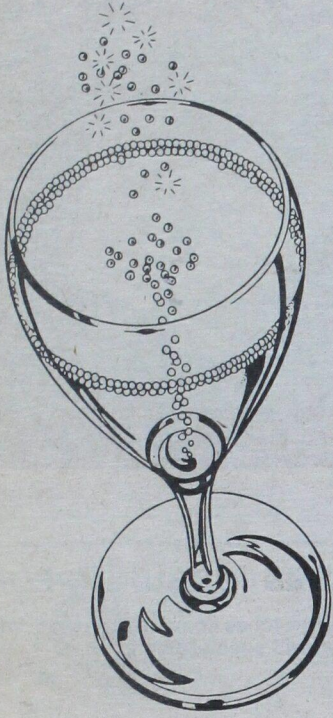
