Tuition up 25%

CUTS FINALLY COME

Forty-five jobs will be axed at
BCIT and tuition will be up 25 per
cent as a result of BCIT's new
budget for 1982/83.
The Board of Governors met

The Board of Governors met Tuesday, April 20 to decide on a final budget for next year which now must be approved by the Minister of Education.

The Board agreed to cut 25 faculty positions. Eleven instructors will be cut from the business division.

By reducing math labs to one hour and by converting one lab

hour and by converting one lab of English to one lecture hour of English, the Board has agreed to eliminate four math and eight English instructor positions.

English instructor positions.

The health division will eliminate two additional faculty in general nursing as a result of last year's reductions.

A group of concerned students presented the Board with a petition of about 700 names of students who opposed the cutbacks of lab time. But the petition was not enough to change the Board's mind.

One concerned student, Trevor Moat, said he felt "the Board ignored the voices of 700 students."

President Gordon Thom said.

President Gordon Thom said,

"The Board heard what the stu-dent delegation had to offer and say but there weren't any other alternatives available to the

Board."
Ten positions will be eliminated in the Resources and Development group. This will mean a reduction of services in the computer department and in the library.

The Board also decided to eliminate nine positions from the administration and finance divisions by reducing cleaning and construction services.

The BOG chairman, Donald Rix, said, 'although several positions are being eliminated, the institute will minimize the impact on individual employees by allowing attrition and non-renewal of temporary contracts to absorb the majority of re-quired reductionss."

The institute is still waiting to

hear how much money the pro-vincial government will grant BCIT. BCIT's grant comes from three funding sources: Manage-ment Advisory Council, Academic Council, and Occupational

President Tnom said if BCIT receives an average amount from the three councils there will be no problems with the budget. but Thom said "if we receive less than average amount, BCIT will be in trouble." be in trouble.

Day school tuition will be up by 25 per cent, increasing the present fee of \$690 to \$860. Continuing education fees will be up 20 per cent and the student activity fee is to be increased from \$59.00 to \$65.00. The SA will charge Continuing Education students \$2.00 per student per term.

Although the Board approved these increases, it will not be final until the Minister of Education approves the fee increases.

The Board expects the Minister of Education to quickly approve the tuition fee increase as the student government has endorsed the 25 per cent fee

endorsed the 25 per cent fee increase. If the tuition fee increase is accepted this will mean BCIT has increased its tuition fees by 47 per cent in the last two years. On the optimistic side of the budget, BCIT plans to take in 131 more students into the engineering division as a result of

gineering division as a result of employer demands. More students will be accepted in

electrical, survey, mining, and civil and structural options.

The Board also agreed to have

two more houses built on the BCIT campus which will provide 96 more beds. The Minister of Education must also approve this decision.

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

SA tightens belt over budget

Tough economic times and a loss of a special grant from the BCIT administration has forced the SA to propose a budget that demands severe cutbacks in

Last year's budget of \$288,000 may be decreased by as much as \$70,000, which would mean a decrease of about 24 per cent. The profits from the SA bus-

inesses are down this year. SA Business Manager Phil Henderson said the "TNT won't make anywhere near the money it made last year."

Many of BCIT's construction programs have been "put on

According to Construction Programs Manager Larry Taylor, the only projects not being put on the back burners are the three already being built:

The SA proposes to reduce the

social programs budget by \$13,500. Another \$11,500 will be knocked off the vice-president of public relations' budget. This will mean BCIT will not donate \$10,000 to the Variety Club Telethon as it has done in the past.
The SA proposes to slash its

grant budget by about \$13,000. Last year's budget allowed the Alumni \$8,000 but the proposed budget for next year would leave the Alumni without any money from the SA.

Intramurals would receive \$8,000 less. Henderson said the BCIT administration is expected increase funds to the

intramural program.

The proposed budget allows for an increase in administrative expenditures by about \$11,000. Most of this increase will go to salaries and benefits. Henderson said postage and telephone rates will also increase the

administrative costs.

Many educational institutes have been forced to make cutbacks this year. Tuition fees have gone up and instructors have been laid off.

BCIT is another institute caught without enough funds to cover next year's expenses. So the Board of Governors have remedied the problem by cutting 45 jobs and raising the tuition fee by 25 per cent.

Now who is to blame for this financial dilemma?

We can blame the capitalist society for the evils of a cyclic economy. But really, that should be left to Marx and the nineteenth century.

Some will blame the federal government which cut back its grant money that left the provincial government with less money for the post-secondary institutes.

Others will blame the provincial government who doesn't have its priorities straight. If the provincial government gave more money to BCIT, the Board wouldn't have to make these decisions.

But closer to home we can question the agreement that gave BCIT staff an increase of 18 per cent which includes benefits. Why would a union ask for more money than the institute can afford to pay? Especially when the consequences is a loss of jobs.

But that is not as shocking as having the BOG - the leaders of the institute - voting in an increase of 10 per cent for senior administration the night Bennett announces a freeze of their salaries. An increase at a time the institute could not afford it.

I find the Board rather inconsiderate. Their remedy is to give less to the students for more money. The students will pay more and they can least afford it. It doesn't make good economic sense to me.

Letter to the Board of Governors, Re: Student Petition.

On April 20th we presented with a petition, signed by 700 students, against cutting back lab time. We thank you for listening to our presentation and discussing the issue with us. We observed the dedication and concern of the Board of

We realize that BCIT has to operate within severe financial constraints. In order to operate within the proposed budget, the Board adopted measures that would cut costs thereby balancing the budget. Dr. Rix stated that he had consulted the students before the Board adopted the proposal to increase tuition by 25%. We realize that our tuition fees pay for only 6% of the cost of our education whereas in the past, tuition fees covered as much as 20% of the cost. However, the provincial

past, tuition fees covered as much as 20% of the cost. However, the provincial government, in its clear foresight, lowered the cost to the student so that the working man's son and daughter could afford post-secondary education. In light of this increase and future probable

increases, will the aforementioned be placed in jeopardy?

We discussed the importance of the quality of education and the role of lab time in assuring a high standard of education member suggested that Math and English core courses were not as important as other courses. I responded that, in reality, technological progress is based on mathematics. I also reminded that member that without strong technical communications skills, an otherwise competent technologist would be unable to communicate his or her ideas

effectively.

We, who understand the importance of high quality education, must also look to the duture and develop long term goals. These goals must guarantee the high standard of education at BCIT in the future. One of the adopted proposals was the cutting of lab time. This is a violation of the founding principles of BCIT. This institute was founded to teach technological knowledge on an individual level. Surely, as a result of the loss of lab time, we will all suffer. The one to one student teacher relationship, in labs, is BCIT's most valued

Disappointment over cuts ...

On Tuesday, April 20 we attended a Board of Governors meeting to voice the concerns of those students who signed our petition against the cutting back of Lab time. We thank the Board for the time they took to hear

Tor the time they took to hear student opinion.

During the meeting, we duscussed several issues, including the reduction of Lab time, the boosting of tuition fees, and the accessability of student loans. Unfortunately, the influence of 700 signatures over the first less ways not sufficient to the first issue was not suffient to sway the Board's decisions, and Lab time will be lost as a result.

Having found my first year at
BCIT frightfully difficult
financially, I have looked fairly
closely at Government policy
towards education, to find out
why this is so. I didn't find any
'Policy' as such, and this made me worry somewhat about BC's future. I am well aware that education is not inexpensive for the Government, the Institute, nor, God forbid, the average

What our government fails to realize is that education is a long term investment; the money planted into education this year can not be harvested next year. But ten years from now, those seeds will blossom into bushels of jobs for BC's homegrown labourers.

I have long believed that the wealth of any province or nation is dependent on the education of its people. More qualified its people. More qualified workers will promote primary

secondary, and tertiary Industry in BC simultaneously. The key to opening the employment door is education.

Every year, BC imports about 2000 skilled tradespeople to make up for the lack of skilled labour here. Instead of cutting back financing of education because of these dire financial times, the government should increase spending to secure tomorrow's economy. A sensible, long term Government policy would practise this philosophy diligently.

Until our Government deals

with Education properly, it is up to BCIT's Board of Governors to make cutbacks, if necessary, in those areas which will least affect the quality of Instruction. The issue of cutting back Lab time was the most critical of all the proposals presented to the Board, and I feel somewhat disheartened that it was not resolved to the student's benefit. Drug Svetic assured us at the Board meeting that the loss of Lab time would be of minimal consequence; however, being a student of today's teaching methods, I realize that almost all methods, I realize that almost all learning is accomplished during Lab time. One hour in Communications and one hour in Math per week adds up to a total of 62 Lab hours lost per student per year. That is nearly a quarter of a million hours of individual student teacher. individual student-teacher contact lost by all students at the institute annually. But we're going to carry that weight long

"Board Chairman Dr. Donald Rix said the quality of Education will be maintained by doubling instructors' workloads so they teach more classes..." this quote from the April 14 issue of the 'Province'. Is Dr. Rix implying that BCIT's instructors are currently working at half speed? One department head, on hearing that guote explained to hearing that quote, explained to me that few if any teachers at BCIT could double their workload without drastically reducing the quality of Instruction. Aside from actual teaching hours, instructors must prepare lectures, Lab work, set and mark reports must prepare lectures, Lab work, set and mark reports, assignments and exams. A doubling of their workload without losing quality of instruction would be inhumane apart from being impossible.

BCIT's Board of Covernors in

BCIT's Board of Governors is far from being incompetent, and I'm sure that each member holds the Institutes best interests at heart. However, in all fairness to mytself and all those students who believe in the quality of their instruction, I must say I'm not happy with some of the decisions they have come to. I am also disappointed with our Government for their shortsightedness in the area of Education. Hopefully they will come to grips with reality before its too late, and work a policy which will be of maximum benefit to the students and society of British Columbia.

that is ignorance. We entrust the this institute, the prosperity of past, present and future students and the development of this province to the Board of Governors. Please do not betray the faith we have placed in you



On the streets of Vancouver, thirty thousand march to protest the threat of nuclear ahnillation. In the Falkland Islands, the remanants of a once proud empire attempts

another Trafalgar by fighting the little guy on the block.

It's one of those rare Vancouver days. There is a brightness that I can only compare with Southern California, the result of day after glorius day of sunshine. Sun drunk Vancouverites are out in force; every convertible in town is cruising. The wind surfers are risking hypo thermia, aspiring Ted Turners are bounding the Main. Vancouver is recreating.

One of the nicest ways to be part of this parade is to take in a Sunday brunch. Too expensive you say? Nonsense. Think of all the money you save every morning. A cup of lousy coffee and a piece of burnt bread. Or horror of horrors, the dreaded egg von meadow muffin servbed up by your friendly neighbourhood mega corporation. If you are anything like me, after six straight days of this you are ready for a treat. So indulge yourself.

Two of my favourite Sunday morning sanctuaries are the Salmon House on the Hill in West Vancouver and the English

Bay Cafe at the foot of Denman in Vancouver. Forget the places like Rocky's or the Palace of Pancakes, they're like having sex with your clothes on. It gets the job done but what are you left with? No feeling. The ambience is all important in brunching. And so is the food. The Salmon House provides a very nice meal for around eight dollars, the last time I was there. The affair starts out with a large plate of various sliced fruits;

strawberries, melon, grapes etc. Along with that you get a basket of fresh danish pastry to gorge yourself on.

The entrees are the usual egg dishes with some notable exceptions. I would recommend the mushroom omlette and the Hangtown Fry. The later is an omlette done with fresh pacific oysters. Truly a magnificant dish. The service efficient and friendly, which is a wonder considering the volume of business this place does. Very popular. One thing to remember when considering the Salmon House. Go on a nice day if you can. The view is breathtaking. The whole panorama of the lower mainland lies before you. From Mt Baker in the east to the tip of Vancouver Island in the west. To get to the Salmon House on the Hill, take the twenty-first street exit and go straight through

at the stop sign. Well worth the extra effort.

The English Bay Cafe at the south foot of Denman is another consideration for a brunch site. The decor is antique brass and oak with the usual fig tree and fern flora. The view is terrific. As in any cafe, people watching is the major entertainment. If you are lucky to get a window seat, you can view the amazing flow of humanity back and forth to the beach. The food is very good too. Instead of the danish pastry basket we had a bowl of fresh bran and blueberry muffins. Again the menu is limited to the regular egg dishes and some specialty items. I had the smoked salmon and scrambled eggs which made an interesting combination. My fellow bruncher had the seafood crepes which were judged a success. Lots of seafood, topped with a ernaise sauce. The only complaint we had with the meal was the service. The waiter was going flat out to keep up with his orders. Management might be wise to add a waiter or two for those busy Sundays.

Now you've eaten you say, what now? Well the rest of the day is yours. Steal a couple of bran muffins and go to the park and feed the ducks. And don't worry about the world...Monday is coming all too soon.
