THE NATIONAL CRISIS AND THE INTERNATIONAL STUDENT

editorial

It was gratifying to note the swift action of our Student Council in sending two cables to Ottawa and Montreal supporting the government and democracy in this time of National crisis. BCIT has had a dubious reputation of isolating itself from the rest of the world. The break with tradition is welcome — and certainly in the right direction!

If only some other institutions would follow our example. While almost everyone in Canada condemned the obnoxious activities of the FLQ, it was disgusting and disappointing to note that there were still a few principally the young — who chose to stand by the FLQ. Students of Montreal University (we know not what percentage of the whole) voted their continuing support of the terrorist organization. Groups in Vancouver and elsewhere showered similar support. It is sad and sickening!

While we are the first to support self determination of any people anywhere and do recognize that violence is sometimes the only means possible, we cannot agree that it is necessary in a free and democratic society like Canada. Only fanatics, only those who love revolution for the sake of revolution, (and that perhpas is one way of describing the FLQ) could justify violence with their warped way of thinking.

The sad things is that there is such a tendency (not to be confused with responsible dissent) and worse, that it is increasing among students. The significance is not the huge potential for destruction and anarchy that this implies for the world but the fact that it is being used as yet another arguement to back up the Establishment's case against the young. We hasten to add that we are no Agnew-type, and in fact consider it good that there is much healthy dissent in the world as well as a constant and continuing look out for encroachments on individual freedom. What we are suggesting is that if dissent and the young are to make the impact both intend — and deserve — then dissent must not be overdone (as it now is) or be irresponsible (as much of it is).

Let's face it. We HAVE to work with the establishment if we hope to accomplish anything. We can only get them to believe in us when we are not afraid to support them when they are right - no matter how infrequent that is!



OBJECTIVES

- We want to answer the challenge of the statusquo. We want to answer the challenge of the businessmen, who believe they can maintain the current political and economic system by sowing the fear of change among the population.

To the threats of the Royal Trust we oppose real bombs.

All we are doing is answering their violence with counter-violence.

We are defending ourselves against the constant attacks of the anti-worker anti-Quebec forces that make up the financial institutions, the big companies the Chamber of Commerce, etc., who are all maintained by the Liberal party and Trudeau-Bourassa.

We are attacking the economic organization that use puppet politicians who speák French (like Trudeau-Bourassa-Drapeau) to protect their interests, and with whom the people periodically have "dialogue" in that phony exercise of democracy -elections

We are fighting this clique of exploiters who make up the capitalist bourgeoisie that is dominated by Anglo-American financiers, and which some ambitious Prench-Canadians have been collaborating.

- We are fighting all forms of exploitation, the most blatant being linguistic segregation: the necessity to seek two languages because we are Quebecois. Our colonialist bosses are responsible for this.

There are few occasions when the entire population of a country shares a single emotion and senses a deep unity in the face of events. This is one of those occasions.

Canadians have witnessed in the past two weeks a series of events which was conceived in treachery and has been executed with cowardice. We have watched in horror as a small band of twisted men set in motion events designed to turn Canadian against Canadian. Their scheme has been a deliberate provocation of hate.

The men responsible for these crimes are not representative Canadians. They are members of a hard core devoted to a single purpose — to inspire within all of us fear and hatred and in this atmosphere to destroy our nation. They are beneath our contempt. In this moment of shock and

grief, I know that all Canadians are deeply conscious of the benefits that flow from a

The following is a translated version of the manifesto of the Front de Liberation du Quebec. Written in May, 1970, it was discovered among captured FLO documents by police last August.

We are fighting all sorts of racism, discrimination and segregation. We are in solidarity with all struggles being waged by people who are victims of American imperialism. We support the struggle led by those first exploited on this continent, the Indians. We are in solidarity with the American blacks and Puerto Ricans who are fighting yankee capitalism.

We are with all workers who immigrated to Quebec and with whom we want to fight our common enemy: Anglo-American capitalism.

- While supporting all trade union struggles, the FLQ hopes unionized workers will throw themselves vigorously into the second front. As soon as possible worker's representatives must replace the people's phony representatives in parliament. When a real workers party is created, the FLQ will no longer have a reason to exist.

- The FLQ is fighting the owners of the means of communication (moyen information) who are trying to make us believe that the current government serves all of society. The current government serves only those who finance it

We are fighting these capitalists who

tolerant, compassionate and free society. We recognize that if we permit hatred and violence to grow and spread, these benefits will disappear.

We recognize that Pierre Laporte was a man who had devoted his life to the betterment of the people of Quebec. His adult life was dedicated to the attainment of social justice, of economic benefits and of individual liberties for his fellow citizens.

His record of struggle and accomplishment sounds out like a trumpet in comparison to the whines of self-pity and the screams of hatred which have poured forth from the FLQ. Yet this was the man the FLQ murdered in cold blood.

We must expect that these vicious men may attempt again to shake our will in the days ahead. I speak for all of you shall fail.

monopolize all the major means of information, and who are trying to make it seem that we are the enemies of the people of Quebec. It is up to the free intellectuals to denounce this monopoly of information.

The FLQ is in solidarity with all Quebecois movements that are militating for real economic liberation of Quebec workers and are fighting for the political emancipation of Quebec. It will be independence or destruction.

MEANS (MOYEN D'ACTION)

To right the reactionary forces who are effectively working against the Quebec people it is urgent that we form a common front of all the progressive forces in Quebec. It is necessary to end our isolation which plays into the hands of the establishment. We must continue the fight together. The enemies of our enemies are our friends.

This common front will reunite the numerous movements, committees and popular associations that are currently militating in favour of a real democracy, real economic liberation, cultural revolution and for independence and socialism in Quebec.

The leaders of all these movements in coordination with the political committees of the trade unions must meet together to establish a base together to participate in the publishing of a manifesto and to elaborate a total strategy (stategie globale) that will respect the particular characteristics of each of the movements.

Canada grieves for Mme. Laporte and her children. On your behalf, I offer them deepest sympathy. They will know that the name of Pierre Laporte will be repeated by school children for generations as a symbol of steadfast oppositon to division. disunity and hatred in Canada.

Those who recognize the need for change in Canadian society will be reassured in their quest by the knowledge that in this land there are many men who share the dedication of Pierre Laporte, a mere few who follow the FLQ.

Those responsible for this crime will be found and will be dealt with in the calm and dispassionate atmosphere of Canadian courts. The FLQ has sown the seeds of its own destruction. It has revealed that it has no mandate but terror, no policies but violence and no solutions but murder. Next on the agenda was official recognition of the fact that the BCVS strike was affecting BCIT and in several important areas including supply deliveries. The President indicated that he was in consultation with the Principal who himself was doing his utmost to keep BCIT workings normal. It was announced that scholarship presentation would place on October 29th. take Invitations have already been extended to the Minister of Education and other important dignitaries. Edgar also announced that the operation of the cafeteria service in the multi-purpose

building (SUPPOSEDLY to open on the 20th next month...) had been awarded to OLY'S Catering Service who have provided great food and a wide choice.

Under Executive **Reports:** Vice-President (EXT.) Bill Rodgers announced another S.P.E.C. protest (against contemplated flooding of the Skagit Valley). Bill also advised that so far student interest in Open House (March 26-28) was not verv encouraging. The treasurer reported a bank balance of \$2,500 and an investment of \$40,000 in 61/2% term deposits. The athletic centre has \$2000 received and Evangelos Photography \$2600 (grad pictures). The Clubs Chairman mentioned his . impending trip to Montreal to attend a CUSO meeting. (Good luck, Clair...) Horbatch announced John the appointment of a Photo Director

(Randy Charles) and two Nucleus '71 co-editors (Tom Westmorland & Ralph Schiefke)

The Council approved BCIT membership in the Western Student Services, and organization which provides many facilities to students at reduced cost. (example: student charter flights to Europe). Presently we are negotiating to find out if it is possible to come up with an alternative solution to the tow away problem (watch out for parking sign).

ON RESIDENCES:

According to the architects, the building will be ready for use on November 20th. The building features a double size gymnasium, lounge area, cafeteria, student executive offices and the health unit. Due to the all too familiar money crisis the question still remains who will maintain these grounds. In a time of financial crisis it is our responsibility as mature students to co-operate and bear with the administration in very difficult administrative times.

Students at BCIT can be very fortunate that we have an administration who works for the student, informs us on the latest developments between government and administration and asks for our advice when needed. At the same time we will do everything possible to co-operate with them to make the best out of the present situation.

But not ust for the songs, a melody or two. The music has become a major communicator of ideas, and the pervading idea is revolution. Rubin said in Do It:

"The new left sprang ... from Elvis gyrating pelvis ... Rock and roll marked the beginning of the revolution."

Revolution against the System. Against a system that preaches "Thou shalt not kill - anyone on our side". and punishes those who refuse to kill those on the "other side". Against a system controlled by commercial interests, masquerading in the guise of democracy: a system that perpetrates the charade of the "free society" while actively repressing those who refuse to go along with the establishment ethic. People who are black. People who dress the wrong way, say the wrong things. Those who are not imbued with the "team spirit" and refuse to go along with a group they disagree with. People who are poor.

This is what the revolution's all about, and rock is its medium of communication, its medium of expression. "Music to free the spirit, Music to bring us together." (Rubin). You can see the revolution too in the spurts of violence around the world. Paris 1968. Mexico. Chicago. Rome. Berkeley, Calif. Montreal. Germany, Rhodesia, Italy Britain. Demonstrations. Sit ins, involvement. Dissent. Look around you.



'A MILLION TEENAGERS . by Mary Bodo

After a hearty lunch, Dr. Kennedy and party went to the lecture theatre to witness the presentation by Mr. Goard to John Kuo. The presentation was a cheque for ten dollars for the best suggestion to help solve the traffic congestions on Campus. After the presentation. SEEK, and FIND

What would you see if you tried to picture God? Reflect a moment and think. Doubtless most of us conjure up visions of an old man in a flowing white beard. Yet to some He is a great judge, or something just for sissies, or some kind of remote emperor; and to others He does not even exist. Though His character is supposed to be "all good" to have such contradicting images? The answer is, that because God by example of His son Jesus Christ, has removed our excuse of ignorance, man is on the spot.

"If I had not come and spoken unto them, they had not had sin: but now they have no cloak for their sin." John 15:22

The message is perfectly clear, until Jesus came along we could point to some other guy saying, "I'm really not such a bad guy; at least I'm better than him." How often we have thought this, but it is a cheap easy cop-out from facing reality. The only alternative to this false pride however sounds equally as devastating. It would mean first admitting total depravity and second, trusting God with your life to run it His way. What a spot to be in!

Obviously most of us would not keep on deceiving ourselves by looking at others if we didn't have to, but giving yourself "no strings" to a stranger is a serious matter. What does your concept of God look like... could you trust Him. Probably not, but if you care at all about your life its worth finding out who he is.

To the Christian, God is a real, living person. You can't look up in the sky and see Him, or even in a church; God lives in people, not things. Jesus once said to the early Christians, "Yet a little while, and the world seeth me no more: but ye see me: and because I live, ve shall live also." (John 14:19) This is because the very nature of man is in opposition to God; we could not understand Him even if He were visible. You can't hold Him at arms' length and try to rationalize Him to the size of you own mind. Until you reach out to Him as a stranger, you'll never know Him as a friend. He loves you, have faith in that love; He has even given up the life of His son to be with you, meet Him half way.

One's brain is supposed to be made to reason, question and to accept what is found to be wise; or be sensible enough to determine what is most suited in the given circumstance, the answer; and finally to learn from past mistakes, and eliminate the possibility of repeating them. The trouble is that many of us have been brought up to think in one direction, and our minds have become closed to accept anything which is different from what had been taught, even when the solution is put right before us to see. For instance, it was taken for granted that matters of same volume, but different mass would fall at a rate proportional to their mass because some famous person said so. For decades this was believed to be the fact and anyone who questioned or disputed this idea was considered to be out of his mind. Even when it was shown before their eves, it took quite some time for people to recognize who was right. In religion we are taught of an existence of a supreme being in which men are to worship as the creator and ruler of the universe. (Anyone who doesn't believe in God is considered to have committed a sin). When the question is put before us as to whether there really is one, we say that we must have faith, which means nothing more than as Voltaire quoted by saying:"If God does not exist, men have to invent one." Whether this nonexistence was

by J.K.F. so didn't seem to matter. Another one of our remarks would be that there must be some creator to produce the first of anything. (Evolution is out of the picture). This dogmatism prevails in so many things. Just because some crazy nut(s) want us to believe in them, and by giving an answer that nobody knows anything about, they expect us to fall for them; since it would be pretty difficult to dispute what no one yet knows. People seem to have such a fixed mind for old ideas which are dubious; and anything which points out these ideas to be wrong, quite sometime passes before they are taken sometimes never.

Often, it takes still longer for us, who know the problem, to go about overcoming it; and, like a decayed, tooth, it goes from bad to worse. As in pollution, society problems and many others which would require a full page to list them all.

More people should ask themselves what they could do to improve the situation, and if "one" could not handle it alone to attack the problem as a group sensibly. There should not be any difficulties or impossibilities in solving problems this way especially when most of the troubles of yesterday are repeated today and are man made. If nothing is done about it, the problems go on into the future – worse.

BCIT began in fine style and scored the first goal of the game, R. Epp heading home a nice goal. At this point the Huskies began to swing the ball around and on a breakaway and goal-keeping error scored an easy equaliser. Almost immediately BCIT defence gave away a corner and the winger scored a beautiful goal direct from the corner kick. This put Huskies: up 2-1. The artificial turf was very wet and very fast. The quotations, drawn from the past, will be as close to those spoken as memory permits. The incident itself a bigoted English-speaking concerns Canadian; however, the folly that comes with this nation's bigots forms on both sides of this nation's language lines.

Before getting to the incident itself, let me first point out a few facts about me. I was born in France during the war-years while the nation was under the occupation of the Nazis. Ironically, my last name is common in English but stands as a novelty in France During the war, my mother served as part of the Maquis (an arm of the French underground) while my father was a prisoner of-war, being captured as part of the Polish contingent of the French army when the nation fell. In 1951, when nearing the age of six, I moved with the family directly to British Columbia where we took up residence - at first in Burnaby and a year later in Surrey where my parents reside to this day. Our entire family chose the Canadian nationality with pride and the knowledge that here was a proper place to build our future.

During those years of establishing ourselves in this province, we met our share of bigots who ruthlessly practiced their prejudice on the grounds of an accent and made it known that we were not welcomed in English-speaking Canada. We faced these tormentors and outlived their abuses until we firmly became established in this part of the Canadian stream of national life. Though these incidents of prejudice were far-and -in-between, they still did cut deeply into my maturing mind. When I questioned why such a bigoted attitude of prejudice did exist, my parents always offered the same sound reasoning - a small minority does not establish the character of the majority.

Today, the only one in our family who still holds on to a noticeable French accent is my mother who, incidently, sits on a school board, elected by the majority who have no such accent and the minority who

do. The reason I now bring forward the following incident is that I'm presently worried about a backlash against our fellow Canadians who stand accused simply because they originate from Quebec and that their native tongue is French. Needless-to-say, such a backlash would only provide ammunition for the terror of the FLQ and their supporters on both sides of the linguistic line and the separatists who work towards a split of our federation through the provincial ballot box, something no true Canadian wants to see. Surely, we must guard ourselves against the bigots who wish to fire the flames of discontent to give some twisted form of stature to their egos which are laced with their personal insecurity and displeasure with their own faults.

I met this bigot who spoke with a dangerous, fool's tongue while a friend and I were at a beer parlor. This friend, Bob, who formerly was a BCIT student and whose descendency roots itself from English stock, and I were exchanging light conversation when this bigot, who sat alone brooding with the effects of downing a number of beers noticeable evident in the slur of, his speech, forced himself into our prompted conversation. What the interrupting, I don't know since we did not make the effort of drawing him into our discussion. Still, it didn't take him long to voice his prejudice, forcing us to discuss the problem of English and French speaking Canadians and "their place" in this country.

"They're all a bunch of ungrateful bastards," he assessed coldly. "Give me fifty of us and some guns and we'll clean up the whole cowardly lot in Quebec."

I said nothing but saw that my friend, Bob, was ready to pounce on him with a verbal deluge of reason.

" I can see you both are English by the way you speak – intelligent. Not like those Frogs." I don't know how he had assumed we were intelligent or English since we had had little opportunity to voice any comment on his statements, and if anything the discussion was one-sided – his.

"You know what makes 'em like that? their religion; Catholics," he reasoned coldly.

''What about the English and the Spanish who also practice the Catholic faith?'' I asked.

"The true Englishman wouldn't be one of them Catholics; he's smarter than that. But the Spanish, well, he's not like those Frogs."

"You're stupid," Bob angrily barked, ready to lay a sound fist upon the bigot's eye.

"No, he's not," I allied myself with this bigot for the purpose of my own familiar grounds of debate. "There's the pearl of sound reason in him.

"Are you sure this guy's English?" the bigot asked me of Bob. "More-so than I am, but he's been brainwashed," I answered. "Doesn't know the way things really stand as we do."

"How-the-hell- can you sit there and say that when you're -?"

"Shut up!" I interrupted Bob shortly, hoping that he would catch the meaning of the wink I offered him. He fell silent as he revealed the most baffled look that I had ever witnessed on his face.

"How about Orientals, Indians and Blacks?" I asked the bigot. "They know their place too, not like those French bastards who are the most ungrateful lot that we ever allowed to stay in this country. We defeated 'em on the Plains of Abraham and had to rescue the lot of 'em from their war in '45. And now they repay us with them not knowing their place. Give me fifty men with guns and we sure-as-hell will show 'em their place is."

"But aren't you confusing the French in France and the Canadians in Quebec?" I asked.

asked. "Is there any difference?" he rhetorically questioned. "A Frog is a Frog. But when you strip the carcass of the French filth, you'll see it's the Catholic religion that makes 'em that way. Did you know that nuns get pregnant and after they deliver the priests' kids they kill 'em?" "No!" I said, forcing a false expression of shock on my face. "Yeah, they do," he pressed. "Do they eat those babies?" I queried.

"Don't be stupid," he chided tersely. "They're not cannibals. They're just French Catholics."

"Well, I'm sorry. But, you see, I'm not as well versed on the subject as you are," I explained.

"I can't take this any longer," Bob jumped in exasperated.

"You sure he's English?" the bigot sourly questioned.

"Probably a mongrel." I observed. "Has some of that foul, French blood in him."

"Well, at least it proves something about us," the bigot noted, "we don't have an ounce of prejudice in our bones. We tolerate 'em by sitting and drinking with 'em."

"That's it" Bob said. "Let's get the hell outta here before I punch this slob."

"Just try," the bigot challenged Bob coldly. "In the end, we'll get you and your type – French Catholics."

Bob sourly looked at him as he angrily rebutted, "I'm Anglican and my family history is probably more British than yours."

"If that's not a lie, then you're a traitor to the Crown," the bigot shot back. "At least your friend is true to his British heritage."

By then I had risen from my chair, ready to draw Bob away from the impending clash of fists with this bigot. "You're wrong," I informed the bigot. "Nous sommes tous Canadiens. (We're all Canadians)" My use of French shocked him, to say the least.

"You're not one of those bastard Quebecers?" he asked.

"I'm not a bastard and I am a Canadian like the Quebecers, though I've never lived there. I was born in France; but if it is a redeemable character under your twisted logic, I'm not a Catholic like the late John F. Kennedy and other figures who have been revered"

"How the hell-did-you get an English name and get rid of the filthy French accent?" he asked, still baffled by my revelation to him.

"Don't know," I answered. "But they do pronounce my name differently in France."

My friend and I took our leave after I offered the final comments "Canada pour nous, et zut pour ceux qui sont contre. (Canada for us and hell for those against "

The incident took place not last week, but over a year ago.

The point to the above is to show the bigotry that can unleash emotions and even violence. The bigots are few, like the F.L.Q. who stand as their own brand of bigots and the fool I acquainted you with in this column, but their damage can crush a nation.

Canada now stands on an uncertain crossroad, but let us hope that we who love this country refuse to take the road that leads to the disintegration of the nation. And let us further hope that we clutch justice passionately, knowing that justice means tolerance and understanding with the harmony of our various cultures building a future for the betterment of us all. It would be a bitter pill to swallow if the inheritors of our folly would read our obituary as follow: "Canada passed away prematurely because of a language problem."
