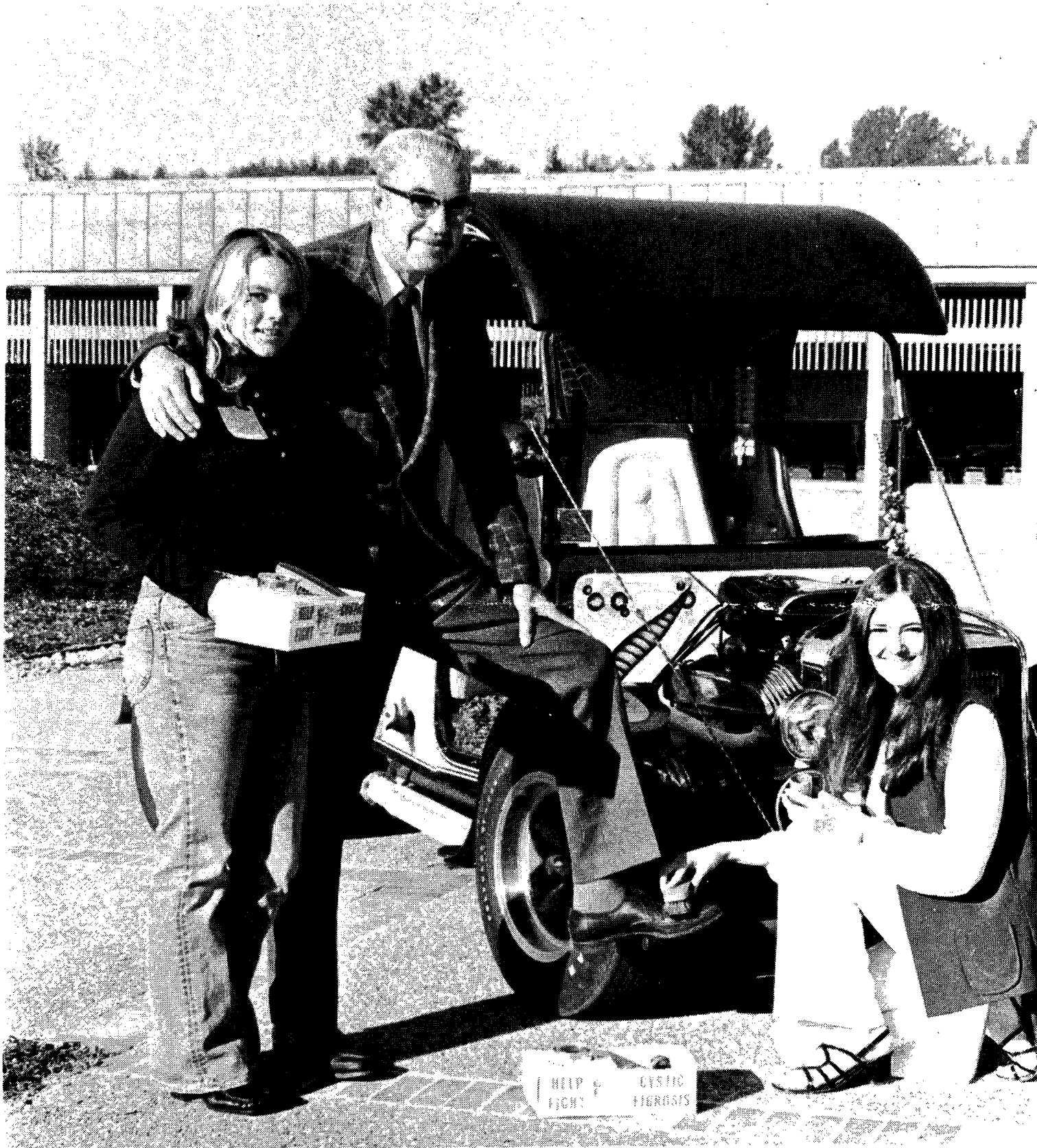

This year BCIT again took its position as a campus which is involved in community activities by holding a Shinerama on Friday, Sept. 17.

While the student turnout was not as good as had been expected, the 400 students that did come out on Friday were enthusiastic and did a real bang up job. This year, with only half the number of students involved as there were last year, it would appear that we will meet and hopefully surpass last year's total of \$12,500, so the students taking part this year must have worked twice as hard as last year.

We raised \$10,000 on Friday and have estimated that we should receive roughly \$3,000 or more in pledges. So you can see that it is important that those of you who signed out pledge sheets should collect from your pledgees and turn the money in to the S.A. office as soon as possible. For convenience in handling, we ask you to turn in your money in a sealed envelope with your name and student number on it. We must have these pledges in by Sept. 31 to surpass last year's total.

I would like to thank all students who came out to shine on Friday, those who helped with the transportation and organisation and to publicly give recognition to the other members of the Shinerama Committee; Robert Simmon, Physical Co-ordinator, Grant Crittenden, Publicity and Chris McCrone, Financial, and especially to Phil Henderson, S.A. Business Manager, for the great deal of assistance he gave us in making sure we got the transportation, food, and equipment we needed.

Next year I hope all those in 1st year who participated will continue to support Shinerama and to encourage next year's students to take an even more enthusiastic part in the campaign.

RAISE THE F(L)AG?

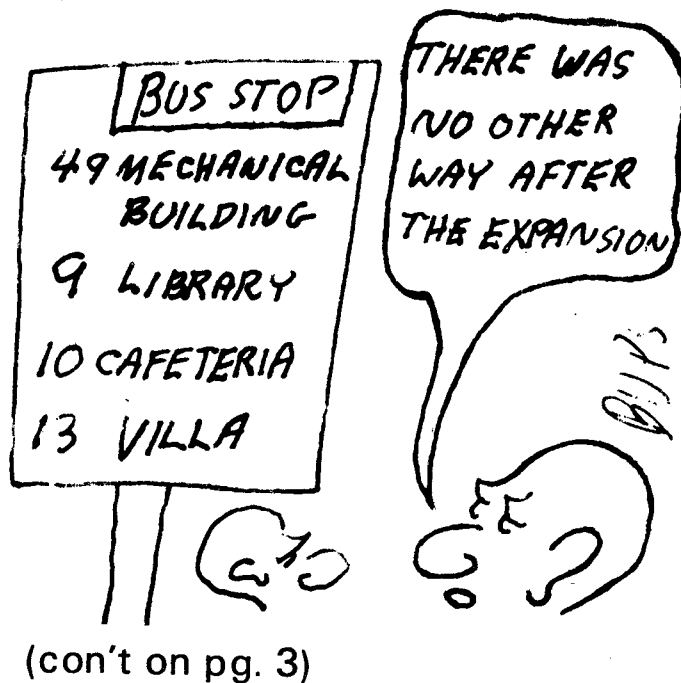

EXPANSION PLANS FOR BCIT

There were over three thousand five hundred students applying to attend B. C. I. T. this fall. Of this number only one thousand five hundred and ninety-nine were accepted, a staggering figure of more than two thousand were turned away-- Hold on there's more.

The four technologies having the greatest number of applications were Broadcasting, Data Processing, Forestry, and Hotel-Motel and Restaurant management. As an example there were two hundred and fifty students applying for thirty-four seats in Broadcasting.

Yes, many thoughts come into mind when I review these figures. The foremost is that expansion of B. C. I. T. is unquestionably necessary. Thank God--both the Administration and the Government recognize this problem and have decided to alter or more precisely to supplement it. Recently it was decided that a new classroom block

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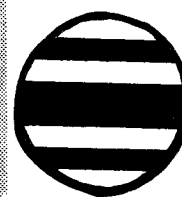
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Expansion Plans for BCIT.

will be built in the grass field north of the library and east of the Mechanical Building. The size of the structure is to be 100,000 square feet and the cost is presently estimated to be \$25 per square foot. This building will contain classrooms, laboratories, and staff offices. Sketching of plans for the building is to begin "As soon as possible."

With the expansion of classroom space many of the present facilities and departments will need to be increased. For example both the registrars and bursars departments will grow with the addition to the student body. More parking spaces will be needed and more storage space will be needed too. Also there undoubtedly are a dozen other facilities which will automatically need expansion with the additional people on the campus.

Presently B. C. I. T. is composed of three schools, Business, Health and Engineering. Business is being expanded the most, especially the Hotel-Motel technology. A technology will only be expanded if the jobs for the added number of graduating students are available. The additional jobs are there for Hotel-Motel grads, so the technology will definitely be increased. Information about new technologies or new options for existing technologies is not being disclosed at this time. What has been stated is that "Half of the expansion is planned for extending present programs and half is planned for new ones." The administration is open to any suggestions as to what new technologies or what new options you would like to see being taught at British Columbia's Institute. Seriously, the Link will publish any far out ideas you have so drop a suggestion in the Link Box in S. A. C. or give it to Grace our dependable and priceless secretary and mediator in all manner of disputes.

One further thought about this new and wonderful structure to be erected on our flag football field. The opening date is now set for the first day of classes in September of 1975. Let us hope, that this will take place as stated, that a replay of the Student Activity Centre's opening will not take place. (e. g. opening date after opening after opening date . . . and finally!!)

It's not that I'm impatient, it's that I'm concerned that the education and lives of over two thousand students may be in jeopardy.

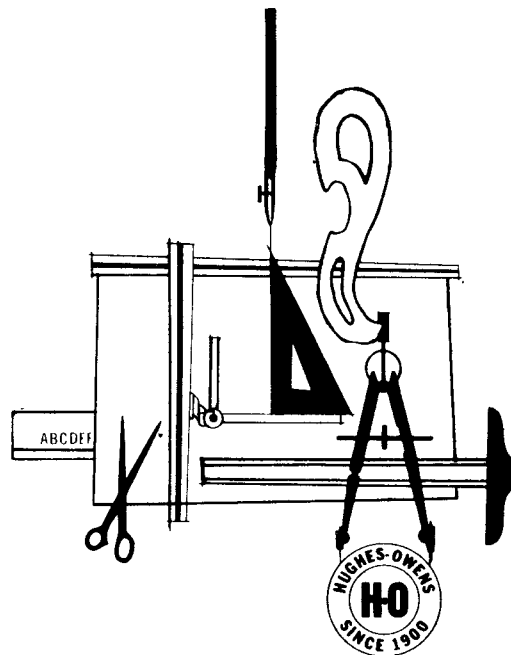
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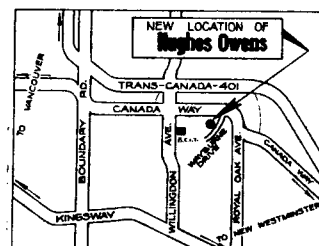

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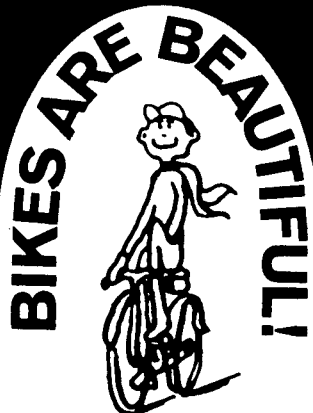


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EDITORIAL

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Shakespeare Rediscovered!

"Romeo and Juliet" took on a finer appeal when we, as students in the secondary school system, were completely exposed to Sampson and Gregory and their play on words with "the heads of maidens" and the absolute filth of the old hag, Juliet's nurse. Or there's the one, "I gave Him All, but He Demanded More." Now, there's a title that excites a filthy imagination. No need to read it 'cause you'll just get wiped out when you realize that she only gave him misery and the masochist fool wanted more. Or there's the one, "He Threatened to Kill Me when I said I Wouldn't Do It." When you read that one you feel like helping that four-foot wealking to lay that nag in her rightful place, under the sod. What this all comes down to is that these comic books and women's magazines are the only creative outlet in the filth of literature, at least in their titles. And they're a big let down after sweating over a slide rule all day. After the boredom of the day's labour, the mind craves to delve into the sin of a little imaginative filth, but these writers of today--? "(Shakespeare!) thou should'st be living at this hour: (Canada) hath need of thee: she is a fen

Of stagnant waters; altar, sword and pen,
Fireside, the heroic wealth of hall and bower,
Have forfeited their ancient (Canadian) dower
Of inward happiness. . . ."

Yes, what we need more than anything else is a little creative filth to lighten this troubled, technological world, but I don't see any promising writer coming forth to offer hope to this searching mind. As for English Departments, well, they're hopeless. They're too busy studying the old creative filth to search for or offer any new.

AMCHITKA

The planned explosion of a five-megaton nuclear warhead at the bottom of a 6,000-foot hole on Amchitka Island in the Aleutians by the US Atomic Energy Commission is indeed an outrage. This much the wave of protests by concerned citizens groups, ecology freaks, scientists, trade unions, politicians, and even, unlikely protesters, the Real Estate Board of Vancouver, makes clear.

At least in B.C., all would appear unanimous in their opposition to the most powerful underground nuclear explosion yet conceived, pointing to the potential danger of nuclear radiation leaking into the sea and air, and of seismic shock and tidal waves reaching our shores.

Even the Canadian government, never a forceful critic of American policy, has, through the mouths of its External Affairs and Environment ministers, called for the cancellation of the Amchitka blast.

If the Amchitka blast takes place, large mass demonstrations at various border points across Canada in early October, to make it clear that Canadians will no longer simply buy American defence policy second hand, would be one step towards an independent position.

Another would be vigorous protest against the Canadian and provincial governments, such as B.C.'s, whose policies integrally support the closest inter-relationship between Canadian and American capitalism, and make Amchitkas as much a part of Canadian as of American policy.

When Canada has stopped defining its defence policy in terms of supporting the American nuclear deterrent, we will be in a hell of a better position to protest.

WHEREAS, the most common form of serious respiratory disease in children is cystic fibrosis, an inherited biochemical disorder with which five hundred to one thousand babies are born each year, and

WHEREAS, at this time there is no control, despite advances in treatment that have prolonged the lives of many cystic fibrosis patients, and

WHEREAS, The Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is supporting research, care and teaching programs in centres across the country for this incurable disease, and

WHEREAS, sixty-one colleges and universities representing over two hundred thousand students have joined the fight against cystic fibrosis and will be holding a nation-wide SHINERAMA in the month of September, and

Barren's Boys will be competing in the Totem Conference and open events again this season.

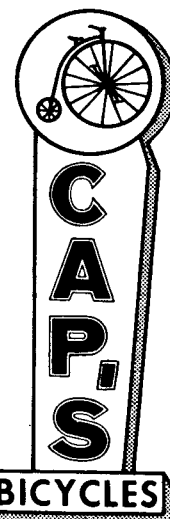

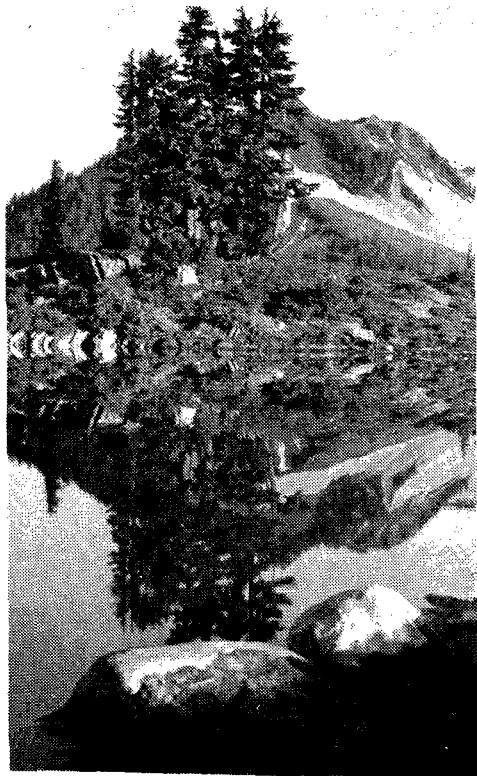

The following is a quote from an article on Shinerama in the last issue of the Link.

"A system is being worked on to discourage people from making Shinerama an excuse for skipping out. Students registered for Shinerama will be checked against class lists by a computer. All skippers beware, we have your names."

The shame of it all, however, is that the teachers just might have learned something by showing up. Culture, Tradition, all that jazz.

What is prison life like? Do penal institutions really protect the public and rehabilitate the inmates or do they provide a growth medium for crime, violence, and a hatred of society which releases a man many times more dangerous to the public than before he went to his cell?

H. J. Griswold, Mike Misenheimer, Art Powers and Ed Tromanhauser were four inmates of the Indiana State Prison who decided to write a book. Two have been released and two are still locked up. Their book, "An Eye For An Eye", published by "Pocket Books", #671-77356-9, is in print and is a hard story to believe.

Dealing with all aspects of prison life -- from religion and art to riots; from education and sports to sex and violence--the authors tell it all, leaving at least this reader with a great doubt as to just who the real criminals are. In fact, as a member of the free society (free as opposed to being in a government penal colony), I felt a little ashamed when the book was closed. Our prisons are screwing around

fellow human beings -- a lot of whom have committed no greater crimes than you and I have, or are capable of, or would if the same circumstances were to fall upon us.

The book would be exciting reading if it were fiction. The real mind-blower is that it's the truth. And Canadians cannot use the excuse that Indiana is in the U. S. Even if our prisons are more humane than those of Big Brother, that isn't saying much. Thought for the year---Criminals are still people.

Leon Russell organized and engineered a considerable amount of the Joe Cocker--Mad Dogs and Englishmen tour. And that was a tour! Naturally Cocker was no. 1. But who was no. 2? Leon Russell --a sort of heavily dressed, blank faced, but, shiny eyed cat who, without showing emotion, played a wicked guitar, a sexy piano, and directed a stage-full of choir and musicians by an invisible force of musical strength.

People wondered just who is Leon Russell? But I don't know how many people, for, when his tour, "Leon Russell and The Shelter People" was to play in town on Sunday, Sept. 12/71, it was cancelled. The reason was said to be due to sickness. However, it reminds me of the "Rascal" fiasco two or three years ago.

There was a big advertising program---"the Rascals at the Coliseum." A short time before the appearance, the show was cancelled due to sickness, a broken arm or something like that. When the Rascals finally came to Vancouver, they played in the Kerrisdale Arena. A large step downwards from the Coliseum, isn't it?

And, there was the Phyllis Diller Show. That's under-

standable, though--who's going to pay money to see Phyllis do her thing?

Maybe I'm wrong--maybe the Shelter People really did run into trouble. Possibly the show might have been packed. I don't know.

Regardless, Russell's album, "Leon Russell and the Shelter People" is tangible and it has some good sounds. It's rock gospel and country blues--freaky revivalistic Dylan, Harrison and Russell, the Russell way.

You can tell L. R. digs his piano and choir backup. The music is hard--you know it's there. A very good rock album.

The "Ballad of Mad Dogs and Englishmen" shows what the Cocker tour meant to Russell as a major experience in his life. Other good cuts to listen to are "Stranger in a Strange Land" and "It's a Hard Rain Gonna Fall."

Bob Dylan and George Harrison couldn't ask for a better person to sing their stuff.

Both directly and indirectly, I've run into a fair number of landlord/landladies who seem to think it's their right to dictate how their tenants should live. Perhaps the tenant should have the right to tell them how to spend the rent money.

I had a very good bottle of wine a few days ago. It was imported by the L. C. B. and seemed of excellent quality for its price. A tremendous find for budget-minded wine lovers, I had intended to tell you its name--but I just realized that it's illegal to advertise liquor in B. C.
