STREAKING FOR THE RECORD

...UBC GEARS FLOP...


Wednesday was a beautiful sunny day; the warm 50 degree weather was more than conducive to streaking. The UBC engineers, famous for their assininity in all areas, showed their asses in a different way. A crowd of more than 4000 gathered to watch about 100 brave soles dash around the Student Union Building in the buff.

The Engineering Society had billed the event as the world's largest mass streak but it fell short of its goal. Last week the University of North Carolina managed to sport about 275 bare—bottomed brethren to capture the mass—streaking title. Those at UBC had hoped to have their numbers top 700 and gain a berth in the Guiness Book of World Records for mass streaking.

The streakers all wore some sort of footwear, with the majority covering their feet with sneakers. Recently the American Safety Council issued a bulletin advising all would—be streakers to wear sneakers to avoid slipping and provide traction in order to avoid painful bodily injury.

There were no women streakers at Wednesday's event. The men that entered, however, provided thrills for the cheering crowds which encircled the SUB. The duration of the streak was about 4 minutes, and many were dissappointed that it did not last longer. Many spectators came from off campus and the crowd included students from other schools, secretaries on their lunchbreaks and even a small contingent of UBC R.C.M.P.

Here at BCIT there has been little more than rumours of scattered streaking. Last week there were scattered reports of two streakers hitting the Burnaby R.C.M.P. Headquarters but the source of this information is not too reliable.


BUILDING INSTRUCTOR PASSES AWAY

The infamous Whistler Lodge that president Graham Fane has been talking about for so long is an actual reality as seen above.



This is your lodge, so support it. There will be a ski—work party Sat. March 23 to the lodge with the following:



THIS IS THE SECOND OF THE CONTINUING ARTICLES ON THE RESULTS OF THE STUDENT EVALUATION QUESTIONNAIRE....

1. ARE YOU SATISFIED WITH THE SOCIAL AND CULTURAL ACTIVITIES OFFERED BY THE STUDENT ASSOCIATION?

Many of the answers were prefaced with the comment "what cultural activities", which was expected.

Over 68% of the students indicated that they were satisfied with at least the social activities and a further 5.5% were at least partly satisfied.

There was an unsolicited demand for more tech parties and more inter-tech activities.

The nurses at Riverview felt that they didn't have too much availability to many functions and that advertising there was virtually non-esistent.

2. ARE SOCIAL EVENTS ADVERTISED WELL ENOUGH?

A little less than 62% of the returnees felt that advertising of social events is adequate. The remainder felt it was not and suggested everything from student assemblies to an ombudsman to improve communications at B.C.I.T...

What would you do to improve communications at B.C.I.T.?

Substantially ahead of anything else, was a desire for a P.A. system over which announcements could be made at Wednesday noon and other appropriate times. The favoured location was the SAC building and closely linked with this was the idea of B.C.I.T. radio station, which was suggested by some (non-broadcast) people.

The next greatest demand was for more information from the tech reps and the idea of a weekly information letter to them from the Activities Co-ordinator.

There was a strong call for better posters, more of them and up sooner. Along with this idea is a suggestion for lockable glassed cabinets in 3 or 4 locations listing all upcoming events. These cabinets could showcase posters or list upcoming events for "this week" and "next week".

Suggestions for T.V. monitors with a message channel and newscasts, an advertising council, a director of communications and more effective use of the Link were made. The Link published once a week was also felt to be a good idea by some.

Two parts of the B.C.I.T. community that felt they were deprived of information were the TTC building and Riverview. There was also a general feeling of poor communications between council and division reps.

3. DID YOU KNOW WE HAVE A THEATRE IN THE RESIDENCE?

89% of students did not know that there was some sort of theatre facility in the residence.

Would you like to work on a student production?

20% indicated a positive response and a further 12% felt that they would like to do it if they could find the time. Lack of time was the main reason cited by those that answered no.

I found this a very encouraging response in an area that is sadly lacking in B.C.I.T.'s history. Most people had drama clubs in high school and the fact that we have a band and a stage gives the idea even greater merit.

This should prompt the S.A. to allocate some funds for a small theatre venture and do a great service to all the students, both participants and perspective viewers. This area should be looked into by the Activities Chairman.

4. WHAT DON'T YOU LIKE ABOUT PUBS AT B.C.I.T.?

This was the most paradoxical area of student response and serves to remind us that what one person likes, another disdains. However, some valuable information about likes and dislikes were garnered from the questionnaire.

The most common complaint was that the pub was too crowded. Tied in with this was, that the dance floor was too small and that there was not enough control at the door of non-students. Other students complained about small turnouts and too much hassle at the door for student I.D.

15% of students didn't like the bands usually because they were too loud. This was the second largest complaint followed closely by those who are under 19 and accordingly denied entrance to the pub

Fourth on the bummer list was "not enough girls" which was expressed in man y different ways along with suggestions for girls half price or free nights.

After that in diminishing order were the rowdy people that attended, the prices, the location, no liquor and warm beer.


What do you like about them?

The general atmosphere was cited as the chief reason why people came to B.C.I.T. pubs. Most students felt that they are well organized and an integral part of campus life.

52% of pub attenders thought that the entertainment was the thing they specifically liked about pubs. 22% felt that it's a great place for students to get together while other pros included the inexpensive prices, the people that attended and the small size.

Some of the points to be made here tie in well with other parts of the questionnair. The plight of the under 19 student, the need for SAC expansion and a larger pub preferably a permanent lounge/coffee shop/pub and the need for a place for students to gather more often than Friday nights.

Burnaby Lake Rowing Course Tops!



The development of Burnaby Lake as the foremost rowing course in North America was one of the legacies of the 1973 Canada Summer Games. A 2000 meter course that meets international specifications, a 2500 seat grandstand and a storage facility in the municipal pavilion together provide an ideal setting for both training and racing.

The federal and provincial rowing associations, in a joint effort with the Burnaby Parks and Recreation Department, have established the rowing centre to provide an opportunity for young athletes, both men and women, to train for international competition, and thereby create a greater public awareness of the sport. Sport Canada has provided an initial pool of nine boats, and the O'Keefe Sports Foundation

has provided the salary for a full-time coach.

The coach at the Burnaby Lake rowing course is Alan Roaf, who started rowing here in B.C. at Shawnigan Lake School, and went on to coach and Canadian Olympic Team in Munich. Last summer he coached the B. C. representatives in the Summer Games competition.

What Mr. Roaf has set out to do is to provide an opportunity for athletes, both men and women, to compete successfully at the provincial, national and international levels. He is also responsible for generating greater awareness of the sport of rowing throughout the province.

Next Wednesday, Mr. Roaf will be at BCIT to show a film on

the sport. Few prople realize that there are two catagories of rowing, sculling and sweep-oar, or that there are separate classifications for men, women, and youths. There are a number of competitions held each year, providing exercise, fresh air, and the spirit of competition to all those involved.

With the many facilities available right here in our own back yard, the students of BCIT are invited to meet Mr. Roaf, to learn about the sport, and to come out to the Burnaby Lake Center and try their hand at rowing. The center is located near Sprott and Sperling, by 4 Rinks and the memorial pool. Keep an eye on the notice boards for rowing posters - they'll give you the time and room number of where the film will be shown.

administration building or faculty club occupation, or a computer demolition.



That's all for now folks. Good luck from a lifetime streaker.










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

















