WHAT'S HIS JOB: Registrar

Responsibilities: he is reponsible for ALL student services at BCIT: admissions, counselling, formal examinations, all forms of financial aid, statements of marks, evaluation of course credit, health services, student organizations, internal tours and ceremonies, liaison with secondary schools and rehabilitation and welfare agencies, and the new athletic co-ordinator.

Background: Born in West Vancouver (1921) and went to school at Kitsilano High School and West Vancouver. He joined the RCAF in 1940 as a pilot for 5 years. During this stint he was a prisoner of war for 2 years in Stalag III. After the war he married a girl he had known from high school and now has 4 boys and a girl. He received a Bachelor of Commerce degree and then formed his own contracting business. He rejoined the RCAF when the Korean war broke out and left again in 1956 to take over an air charter service and flying school on the West coast of Vancouver Island for 3 years. He then became interested in teaching so to find out if he was fit he taught at St. George's school for 6 months. He then returned to UBC and received a teaching certificate. He taught at Burnaby South senior secondary school and became senior boys counsellor for 3 years. He left there to become registrar at BCIT 9 months before it opened, and is now the last remaining member of the original "pioneering" administration. He also taught history and broadcast communications here for a while,

The future of BCIT: The institute will become even more liberalized because of the natural development of a post-secondary institution from its originally structured purpose. There will be a greater possibility of course credit and consideration of other institutions to accept credits. Graduates will be able to branch off into other pursuits, that is, BCIT will become an integral part of the BC educational system. The school has developed a uniqueness and respect in the business community and therefore BCIT will continue to grow, and more BC institutes will develop.

Dress: If the institute had not started with a consideration of dress we would not be in the favorable position we presently hold. Industry and the community are immeasurably impressed by the young men and women attending this school. This has been verified by monthly calls to his office from a parent or business man stating just that.

Interests: As a young man he was active in sports and politics and this turned into an interest in his sons' sporting activities. He is now constructing a family camp on Indian Arm.

A Council Comment by Roy Wood

A question became apparent at the Student Council meeting on Nov. 3, that I think deserves airing. The question is whether Technology Representatives are accurately representing the students who elected them. The issue was raised when Mr. Craig Walker of first year Hotel-Motel suggested that a large number of students do not agree with Council's 29-2 decision to reject a motion of sympathy for SFU's PSA department. The representativeness of Student Council is also open to question regarding Monday night's defeat of a motion suggesting that the Student Association urge the Administration to institute a system whereby student names do not appear on final examinations. I have spoken informally to several students regarding this and they agree almost unanimously that names should not appear on exams.

It seems fairly obvious that there is a serious lack of communication between Representatives and their constituents. I suggest that Council members should make more of an effort to communicate with the people they represent and should indeed represent the ideas of their constituents and not their own opinions.

THE PSYCHO-EPISTEMOLOGICAL* SIMILARITY OF RACISM AND XENOPHOBIA

The St. Francis Xavier letter was soliciting our support in their struggle to have their dormitory regulations liberalized. Again no action was taken.

Mr. Stone also mentioned that the Student Association is forming an External Affairs Committee. This committee will exist for the purpose of involving BCIT in matters concerning our society at large. I think it is a damn good idea, not only because it will make students here more aware of social problems, but also because it may help to eliminate the unconcerned, stuffed-shirt image we have acquired.

The Traditions Committee was also mentioned at the meeting. The students on this committee, Mr. Ray Stone and Mr. Sheldon Wells are trying to convince the Administration that BCIT students are old enough and mature enough to make their own decisions regarding dress. GOOD LUCK!!!

One member of council dared make the suggestion that perhaps our Sports Chairman does not have enough to do. Mr. Seabloom quickly assured the Council that he was indeed a very busy man. Glad to hear it Ken. We would hate to see any dead weight on the Executive.

As Secretary-Treasurer my duties entail among other things, keeping the students informed as to where their money is being spent. But before I do this I would like to stress one main point. Many students were unhappy about the statements published regarding last year's expenditures and income. IT IS UP TO YOU TO INDICATE TO YOUR COUNCIL REPRESENTATIVE YOUR VIEWS. If you do not agree with paying for items such as Open House or the Nucleus please bring it up at a Council Meeting. Always remember we, the Council members, are trying to handle your funds in your best interests.

On October 6, 1969, \$45,000 was received from the Provincial Government re: student fees collected. \$40,000 of this was invested on October 20, 1969 in 30, 60 and 90-day notes. By doing this we hope to gain approximately \$2,000 in extra revenue through interest received.

So far our only major expenses have been to the Athletic Council, namely \$4,500 for operating expenses during the September-December period. This money supports such extramural sports as ice hockey, grass hockey, football, etc.

The Scholarship Ceremonies held on Thursday, November 6, 1969 were in everyone's eyes a great success. I would like to extend my thanks to all those who attended as spectators, staff and students. After hearing the many favorable comments from the donors I would like to pass on to you the comment which was expressed over and over again by the donating companies – The students of BCIT are unique among post secondary institutions, being exemplified mainly by their neat appearance. Three cheers again for that old tie and jacket!!!

Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid: Paul Newman, Katherine Ross, Robert Redford

The best movie to enliven the screen for a long time – don't miss this one! As it's stated in the credits, most of what happens is true, believe it or not. Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid rocket across the screen in the best Western style, but some times they run out of bullets, sometimes they make mistakes, and they even voice admiration for the opposition. The day of the straight, dead-pan, all-white hero playing against the blacker-than-black and equally inhuman villain is over.

The day of the outlaw is over too. As the sheriff points out to Butch and Sundance, "them days is past... and one of these days you're gonna die." The end is inevitable, and this knowledge balances and counterpoints the action. Sundance and Butch are hounded out of the States, and head for Bolivia, and even there they find they can't escape.

They have a really good run for their money, though, punctuated with some of the funniest episodes in the history of Westerns. When Butch finds his leadership of the gang challenged, he reasserts it with neither knives nor pistols, but a quick kick to the groin followed up by a chop to the jaw. During the marathon chase across the states he is forced to make a hasty and undignified exit from a brothel, and in Bolivia their depredations on the local populace reach a peak of versatility, expertise and farce. "You just go on thinking, that's what you're good at," Sundance tells Butch - with telling results! Too, there is an episode in which Butch takes Etta for a bicycle ride, a scene of lyrical beauty which is a delight to view. This is carefully led up to by the bicycle salesman and followed in the scene where he discards the bicycle. A touch of irony shows when Butch and Sundance decide to go straight and get jobs as payroll guards which result in their killing Bolivian bandits.

Acting by Newman, Ross and Redford is uniform only in its sustained excellence. Supporting roles were also most proficiently handled – two that stand out are the marshall pleading for a posse and the unfortunate payroll guard on the train. The actors put a depth and believability into the characters that is rarely seen on screen, and the lightness and sureness of their performances was a pleasure to watch.

Director George Roy Hill's technique is faultless. The use of filters, faked old movies and stills is perfectly timed to establish and maintain the atmosphere and to give the whole an air of authenticity. The transition into color is expertly managed and jars not at all. Too, Mr. Hill exercises discretion and good taste in avoiding the use of either dubs or subtitles in the Spanish sequences. Combined with a sparkling script, the result is a first-class movie.

If you miss this picture you'll be sorry.

This we hope will calm the liquor situation in this province.
