

Government to sponsor overseas study

and Technology Minister Bruce Strachan recently announced the province has created scholarships for British Columbia residents who wish to study in an Asian Pacific country.

The scholarships, known as the British Columbia Asia Pacific Students' Awards, are designed to allow students in B.C. universities, colleges, and institutes, to conduct part of their studies in an Asian post-secondary institution.

The Minister also announced that awards will be made available to B.C. post-secondary instructors, professors, and professional staff. To be known as the British Columbia Asia Pacific Scholars' Awards, they provide a professional will development opportunity for B.C. educators, who at the same time will contribute their expertise to an overseas institution.

pattern "The new international trade today means British Columbians must be familiar with the languages, customs, and social and economic needs of the Asia Pacific region," said Strachan. "Living in a foreign country and working with its citizens are invaluable ways of enchancing cultural understanding."




