
For those of you interested in the President's position, it has been "full-time" this year, but may be changed back to a "parttime" position. Let's hear your views!

BCIT prepares for Collins'onslaught

BCIT's Business Management Executive Committee reacted swiftly to a call from Education Minister Pat McGeer to clarify the Institute's policy on staff members performing outside consulting work.

McGeer's request came hot on

the heels of a sensational expose by Vancouver Sun Page Six Editor Doug Collins of the extensive consulting practice of UBC Applied Sciences Dean Dr. Liam Finn. Finn was reportedly engaging in massive amounts of outside work, in some cases using university equipment and personnel; the inference was that UBC was not getting full value for the \$50,000 salary paid him.

The Executive Committee here stated at its March 2 meeting that: "It is the current practice at BCIT that all consulting and teaching work outside the normal curriculum, which is carried out during normal working hours, should be done only with the knowledge of the Department Head and the authority of the Director. The Director should obtain permission for any outside activities of his own from the Executive Director, Technological Education [Ernie Brown]."

At the meeting, Mr. Mike Coltman, head of Hotel-Motel, believed that this policy should be put in writing for the direction of the staff and Mr. Ernie lannacone (head of Business) felt that Department Heads should be aware of any regular extra work taken on, as the extra load may affect the efficiency of the instructor in his responsibilities on Campus.

It was stated at the meeting that the Institute should have a written-down policy so that, if the school is questioned on its policy by a newspaper or public body the policy will be clearly defined and the school will thus be spared criticism. A similar policy is in force with regard to the use of Institute equipment — any which is authorized for use is to be charged at the current going rate, and it is the Bursar's (Duncan McPherson's) responsibility to decide what that rate is.

Rumour has it that some mem-

bers of the Committee were unwilling to consider any input from the Staff Society (the faculty's union) on review of the above. A source close to the committee told the LINK that the Staff Society members, when told of the Committee's unilateral decision, said simply "No way."

Collins is hot on the trail, regardless, It is considered that BCIT, with its close contacts with industry, is a much riper plum for Collins' plucking. UBC, by comparison, has only a few faculties (Appied Sciences-Engineering, Forestry, Medicine, Agriculture) where faculty consulting could be considered to be a problem.

Collins reportedly already has a story in the can focusing on "about half a dozen" instructors, including "one Forestry instructor who is really worried."

A rather retracted raving

Progress has been made, but...

This letter is a qualification of some of the statements I made in my letter of February 23, 1977.

The staff society as a whole is interested in a performance appraisal system and their reactions to the SIR evaluation form have been favourable. I was in error when I claimed that the collective agreement prohibited the administration from contributing to the financing of the SIR evaluation. The staff society feels that if the administration supports the the-ory of the SIR evaluation the administration should undertake to finance this evaluation for the general benefit of the institute.

There are also, in effect this year, standards of teaching ability to be maintained at BCIT: My criticism is that these standards aren't necessarily being achieved in all areas and I question the effectiveness of the appraisal system in force.

The appraisal system is presently the responsibility of the individual departments at BCIT and my criticism of these systems is that they don't necessarily provide an institute-wide standard of performance appraisal.

My final point is that of establishing a student as an official member of any institute performance appraisal committee. I hope the student association will take action to achieve this.

I have received a lot of reaction to my previous article from staff and administration of the institute, but if appears that the students are still sleeping..

During the Spring Break I had the opportunity to visit the Hot Jazz Society and talk to Ruth Risto, a member of the Society's Board. Over the din of people having a good time and the foot stompin' music of the Dave Roberts Jazzband, Ruth told me a bit about the history and membership of the Hot Jazz Society.

The Hot Jazz Society was born some four years ago (among the initiators was band leader Dave Roberts, and neither Ruth nor Dave is exactly certain of the date!) in the Scottish Auditorium on West 12th in Vancouver, where a bunch of local jazz buffs got together to jam and generally have a good time. But to make a long and undoubtedly interesting story short, it eventually became necessary to move to a larger and more permanent home. Thus, about two and a half years ago the

Hot Jazz Society declared itself a non-profit organization and moved to its present location at 36 East Broadway in Vancouver.

With the exception of manager Henry (who, incidentally, is a neat guy to talk to), the entire organization is run by volunteer members of the Society (including Board members such as Ruth). All operating funds come from membership dues, donations and sales from the bar. Starting out with less than a dozen people attending a session two years ago the Society now has some 13,000 members and is still growing

Their hours are Wednesday and Thursday from 9-12 and Friday and Saturday from 9-1.

Membership is \$3.00 Fri. and Saturday (includes membership), \$2.50 Wed. & Thurs, and is valid for one year and is available at the door or by mail. Also entrance for a Wed. or Thurs. night member is free and \$2.00 on Fri. and Sat.

The atmosphere is friendly and alive there with a mixed age group in attendance. 
