# What happened?

Sunday morning's gun-shoot-ing incident follows closely on the heels of last week's violent outburst in the SAC. Stemming from that incident the Rugby team was banned from the Pub the rest of the year for

fighting.

But there is conflicting evi-

But there is conflicting evidence from several sources on just what that ban meant.
Food and Beverages Manager, Richard The, says the entire team of 25 guys was banned 'generally' with four specific players singled out. The four received letters notifying them of the ban.

But some of the rugby players weren't sure of their status. There are reports that anywhere from 5 to 15 players were at the

Saturday night Engineering dance.

One thing is certain. The Pub

One thing is certain. The Pub did not have a list of the rugby players until Monday morning.

'We requested it. I guess it was just overlooked,' says The. 'I also requested pictures from the Athletic Department but they haven't got them back from the photogra-

With no list of players and no photos the Pub was in no position to ban the rugby players.

As far as the violence on the team itself several of the players made reference to the fact that the team wasn't rowdy.

'Everybody gets to play and everybody has a good time,' says one player, not wanting to be

identified.

But Richard The disagrees.

But Richard The disagrees. 'When there's a pack like this they cause problems,' he says. The player adds that, 'it's a good way to be sociable. It breaks down a lot of barriers.'

The says 'the Pub is closed down as of today.' He wouldn't say when it might repoen. 'We would have liked to have closed it down today ourselves like last year,' he said on Monday.

'We thought what we did last week (ban) would hit home,' he says. 'We sort of took a gamble on this dance.'

on this dance

The feels that the Pub might repoen but under different rules. One of these might be to open as an afternoon pub because he says that's all the students can handle.

An 18 year old man was shot early Sunday morning near the SAC.

Steven Wood is in Shaughnessy Hospital with a 22 calibre bullet lodged in his right hip.

Wood didn't realize he'd been shot until the following morning. He woke up, found blood on his sheets and said, 'Mom, I think I've been shot.' He was taken to Shaughnessy Hospital where he is in satisfactory condition.

Fighting broke out near the entrance to the SAC. The RCMP were called in after gun shots were heard. They found no shells in the area and left.

A 19 year old BCIT student has been charged with possession of a fire-arm dangerous to the public peace. Charged is first year Building Administration student Ronald Watton of 3890 - Emerald Drive, North Vancouver.

# Thom closes pub

**BCIT President Gordon Thom has** closed the Student Pub on Campus pending a 'full investiga-tion' of a reported shoot-ing incident there early last

unday morning.
Student Association President, Michael Deane supported the administration's move, and said he was considering similar action.

Thom said the events of the night are not clear at this time, 'however, because of the very serious nature of the incident I am

# Sears disagrees

Gord Sears, Vice-president of Public Relations for the Student Association, is not happy with the decision to close the Pub. 'I would say the students won't like it... (the incident) did not happen on Pub premises and it took place outside, after Pub hours.' Sears said more facts about the incident should be known before administration close the Pub.

public image, Sears say the Pub closedown comes at a very bad time. Plans for the Beerfest, one of BCIT's major yearly events, scheduled to take place on November 14 and 15, are in a

turmoil. Sears says the SA stands to lose money 'in the thousands' because of money paid out to a band and beer steins that were bought for the event. Sears is trying to salvage the Beerfest by shifting it to another location.

further course of action.'
Thom said that he was appointing a three member investigation team to determine the event that led to the shooting and was also asking the team to review the general operation of the pub.

'The internal investigation, of course, is quite apart from any action by the RCMP.' said Thom.

In supporting Thom's action Deane said he deplored the incident as a terrible reflection on the way the majority of BCIT students who conduct themselves in a mature way in the pub. Director of Public Relations, Dick Director of Public Relations, Dick Melville told the Link that although the members of the investigation team have not yet been appointed they would be 'high profile people, dean and director level'. Melville said that it's necessary to appoint high profile people to indicate the seriousness of the incident and the concern of BCIT generally.

## Rugby team, a bad image?

BCIT's rugby players say they're concerned about the incidents at the SAC the past two weekends. Some rugby players were involved in a fight at the SAC last week that resulted in the entire team being banned from the SAC. And there are reports that a BCIT Alumnis was stabbed in the hand.

This weekend at the

Engineering dance at least five rugby players attended. Mem-bers of the team say the fighters from last week were not at the

Engineering dance, but admit some team members did attend. Team members say the club is being singled out as scapegoats on campus. 'Everyong is so quick to blame the rugby team when

something goes wrong' said one team member (who asked to remain anonymous).

remain anonymous).

Rugby coach Gary Miller says it's unfair to condemn the whole rugby team for the actions of a few players just as it's unfair to blame a whole technology be-cause an offender is one of its students.

Players say they're concerned Players say they're concerned all the adverse publicity will cause their team to be disbanded. With only one game left to play and the Cougars in first place, 'disbanding the team will ruin our whole year' one player said. 'We think it's wrong to blame all of us because one or two guys do something wrong' said another player.



## Malakoff supported

More than 100 faculty members showed up at a special meeting last Thursday to debate the fate of Walter Malakoff. Malakoff has been fired from the institute as of Oct.1 for 'making and publishing numberous false allegations, innuendos and insinuations of misconduct on the part of Instinuendos and insinuations of misconduct on the part of Insti-tute employees, officials and a certain advisor at the institute."

The Nov. 5 meeting follows two previous meetings with Vice-Principal Drug Svetic and the Staff Society about Malakoff. The meetings were to discuss the Gillespie report which recommended that Malakoff be let go.

On Thursday's meeting it was

On Thursday's meeting it was decided by the Staff Society to give a loan to Malakoff for the next three months and fight the issue to arbitration if necessary. Some figures are being bandied about and even Staff Society spokesman, Patrick Thomas was not sure. But Malakoff will be getting somewhere between \$7,000-8,000.

Thomas says it's not the first

Thomas says it's not the first time the Staff Society has loaned its members money.

Some of the faculty members at the meeting were thought to protest the way the Staff Society handled the whole affair.

One member said the Staff Society went beyond their jurisdiction in giving Malakoff financial support without the consent of the union as a whole.

Thomas disagreed. When asked whether the constitution needed changing he said it was a 'phong issue.'

Thomas was more worried about Malakoff.

With respect to the Physics instructor he said 'I'm confident enough after this meeting today.'

At stake are the issues of academic freedom and free speech, says Thomas.

## **Open House budget** cut, says Sears

The funds for BCIT's Open House have been cut back. The original budget of \$10,000 now stands at \$8,000.

Gordon Sears, VP Public Relations (SA) says, 'the quality of the diplays could suffer unless more

money is raised, and I would be very reluctant to open the doors on an underfunded Open House.'
At 7% inflation, 70% of the purchasing power has been lost over the last ten years, so the situation is even more serious now that the budget has been cut.

# Satellites- BCIT is part of it

About one hundred years ago the teleghone was invented. Then in the '40's came the television. Combine the two of them and you have what is coming next: two way television.

way television.

The communications industry is exploding and BCIT is already part of it. You have probably noticed by now there's a satellite dish sitting up be the industrial education building. From that spot education programs are relayed via satellite to over twenty communities throughout B.C.

An instructor standing in front of a camera here at BCIT can broadcast his lecture simultaneously to students in Dawson Creek and in Cranbrook. Sounds a

bit Buck Rogerish doesn't it?

But there's more. A lot more.
Bill Robertson, the manager for Bill Robertson, the manager for this system says that starting in September of next year BCIT, UBC, SFU, UVIC, Vancouver, scourtroom and the teaching hospitals (like VGH) will all be linked up be two-way television.
So, if CBC president, Al Johnson speaks at UBC, students at BCIT and SFU will be able to see him as well, Or if a murder trial is going on downtown, UBC

trial is going on downtown, UBC Law students will be able to see it

Education through electronics.
That's what it is all about.
And it comes down to wires.
But not your average wires.
We've got fibre optics now:
incredibly fine wires used in the
transmission of images. No film,
itst instant reproduction. transmission of images. No film, just instant reproduction. You can see them and they can see you. (Of course, this only applies to the Lower Mainland. Images going over the Georgia Straight will travel by microwaves. And don't ask me what microwaves are. I hardly know what a radio wave is.)

Premier Cable of Vancouver (owned by Canadian Cable Syst-ems of Toronto) will be building the network. A minimum of six two-way channels are to be made. Each channel will be a closed circuit and the signal will be scrambled. Only medical students can watch a televised operation and only law students can see what goes on in the courtroom. The rest of us will just get static.

The rest of us will just get static.
This set up can work well in the
Lower Mainland but for all of
B.C. it would obviously be
unsuitable. So, that's why we
have that satellite dish on campus. Sitting up in the sky, way up
there at 23,000 miles above us, is
the ANIK B satellite. And that
satellite dish is pointed straight at


A teacher gives his lecture A feacher gives his lecture here, a camera sends his image to the dish, the dish sends up to the satellite and the satellite bounces it back to 23 different communi-ties in B.C. A round trip of 46,000 miles completed in the time it

Right now this goes on for about 45 hours a week. When it began in September of 1979, the

total was about 8 hours a week.
Starting in January, about 100 hours of live lectures and programs will be going over the air.

The whole thing is gathering

Like i said, two-way television networks are on their way. No one can be sure where we'll be with this business in even 5 years but whatever it all means, BCIT is part of it.

'You know the law that what goes up, must come down? Well, for dancers it's just the opposite: what comes down, must go up.'

If you have never seen professional dance companies live in a theatre, I think the above quotes describe very well what you would be in for.

theatre, I think the above quotes describe very well what you would be in for.

I don't mean dancing cheek to cheek 'at the hop', or 'pogoing down at the Student Activities Center'. I mean modern dance, jazz dance and ballet.

From November 13 to April 11, the Queen Elizabeth Theatre is holding its seventh 'Dance Spectacular' series with the following schedules:

But some of the best dance companies on this list don't separate jive and ballroom danc-ing from classical ballet. The Twyla Tharp Dance Foun-

dation has used elements of Rock'nRoll, jazz and classical music, such as the Beach Boys' 'Deuce Coupe', Jelly Roll Morton tunes, Scott Joplin rags, Haydn and Mozart. Tharp had choreographed for John Curry, the olympic skater, 'Hair', the movie, Lynn Swann, wide receiver of the Pittsburgh Steelers, in a TV special and Mikhail Bryshnikov of American Ballet Theatre.

Dancers often believe that, 'Dancing should be a requirement for all people'. I recommend seeing some of the dance companies on the list when they come into town for the experience of their strength, coordination, energy and emotion. But taking the classes yourself would be even more useful.

Athletes, particularly at college and professional lovel tyte elege

the classes yourself would be even more useful.

Athletes, particularly at college and professional level take classes to stretch out properly and in the case of Lynn Swann, to pick up moves that will get a first down. Learning the 'path of least resistance' is better than getting crunched by a defenseman.

I suggest going to Louise Preiswerck's Jazz Dance class in the activity room in the SAC, whether you're male or female, to watch and see what I'm talking about. Or go to any dance class. The ability to move easily and express emotions with movement is something which many people miss, often without being aware of it.

## The Elephant Man-new variation

Graham Stone In the Nineteenth Century, the In the Nineteenth Century, the Beauty and the Beast fairy tale was adapted for variouw theatrical forms. In the recent movie The Elephant Man, Director David Lynch used the smae theme with a new variation of Twentieth Century cinematic techniques. He creates a sensitive film that is creates a sensitive film that is

worth seeing.

The film is shot in black and white and attempts to be realistic and underplay the element of sensationalism. With the use of black and white the atmosphere of Nineteenth Century London is clearly established.

clearly established.

The movie makes the distinction of being based upon the novel of the same name be Sir Frederick Treves and not upon

the Broadway play.

The story of the Elephant Man comes from the writings of Sir Frederick Treves - a physician in London during the Nineteenth Century. The novel is based upon Treves' observations of a young man - John Merrick (the Elephant

man - John Merrick (the Elephant Man), who had been physically deformed since birth.

At the time in London, the Elephant Man was a freak in a circus. The movie relates that Treves took the Elephant Man under his care and gave him a home at the London Hospital.

Anthony Hopkins plays the role of Sir Frederick Treves. His purpose in the film is to give the Elephant Man a home and refuge from being treated as a freak. But Hopkins in a good performance is slow to realize that he is creating another type of freak as John Merrick becomes the toast of London society.

And this reversal is the irony of

And this reversal is the irony of the film. As the story unfolds we are gradually told and shown more about the Elephant Man.

But Director Lynch is careful enough to show him first in a hooded mask, then in silhouette and it is not until halfway through the movie that we see in graphic detail the condition of this man. At this point in the film we begin to realize that the Elephant Man - John Merrick is a compassionate human being and not an animal as society would see him. John Hurt plays the role of John Merrick. His recitation of the 23rd Psalm was unexpected and makes Psalm was unexpected and makes us realize how easily we can show prejudice.
In his scenes with Anne

Bancroft as Mrs. Kendal we see the significance of the Beauty and the Beast theme. Mrs. Kendal -one of London's leading actresses befriends John Merrick. Topetriends John Merrick. To-gether they read a scene from Romeo and Juliet. This scene may seem bizarre but in context of the film it is one of the finest

John Gielgud makes a cameo appearance as Carr Gorm -the head of the London Hospital. In an all to brief performance, he shows what good acting really is as he tells Hopkins that none of us can really understand what it can

be like for John Merrick - the Elephant Man.

One other nice touch in the movie is the music of John Morris. He orchestrates a percusive score that undercuts the atmosphere of the post Industrial Revolution period in London.

The plot of the movie is a simple one but its sensitivity, performance and direction will probably make it one of the top five films of this year. For those who enjoy a movie that is moving and compelling, see 'The Elephant Man at the Stanley Theatre now.

Stardust Memories is supposed to be Woody Allen's homage to his movie hero - Ingmar Bergman. Bergman is already known for his depressing tales of the Norwegian wood. It seems as if Allen is willing to fall into the same trap.

Stardust Memories, as Manhatten before it, is done in glorious

black and white. I suppose colour movies are just too cliche these days. And anyway, as director and producer Allen can afford to spend more on a cast of characters that looks like it just walked off the set of Moses.

The one nice thing we can say about Woody Allen is that he is consistent. Once a schmuck, always a schmuck. Allen is still the same old guy. Still looking for the right girl. But now he's just getting better at it. He never quite succeeds, but it's funny watching him try anyway.

For Stardust Woody plays a famous comedian (how's that for coincidence?) by the name of Sandy Bates. Bates alias Allen is an oversexed movie director trying to direct his next comedy. So what we have here is a movie

trying to direct his next comedy. So what we have here is a movie within a movie. Allen is making a movie, and do you guess otherwise, it's Stardust. Get it? It doesn't really get any heavier than that, in spite of the pretensions to bergman.

As a famous comedian Bates/-Allen gets invited to a weeken'd of film culture to be asked questions on his movie career. As critics of films these celluloid savants are just too pretentious for Woody's blood. Typically he deals with the questions in the best way he knows. Short one-liners. We learn

nothing of his art. Yet we go away thinking we did because we're all laughing like hyenas. That is what makes Allen a genius.

what makes Allen a genius.

During the weekend he has several ladies on the go. There's his French mistress who's just left her husband for Woody's gentle joke's. There's his live-in lady with a temper as short as an airhead's attention span. And finally there's a classical violinist Allen meets while directing. For her he's willing to chuck it all. There seems to be nobody to save us from this libidinous loon. In fact someone during the movie explains that the whole point of the film is that nobody is saved. But that doesn't help at all. What saves the film in the end is the one-liners. Woody's trademark. But how funny is:'If I was born in Poland I'd be a lampshade' when taken out of context. And who really cares if his chauffeur is busted for mail fraud. It all seems so corny.

To make up for the corn Woody plays some of his favourite jazz music in the background. And for that I'd buy the soundtrack...if there was one. It's the music that really glues the whole movie together and keeps us in our seats. When we do get bored we can just close our eyes and listen.
