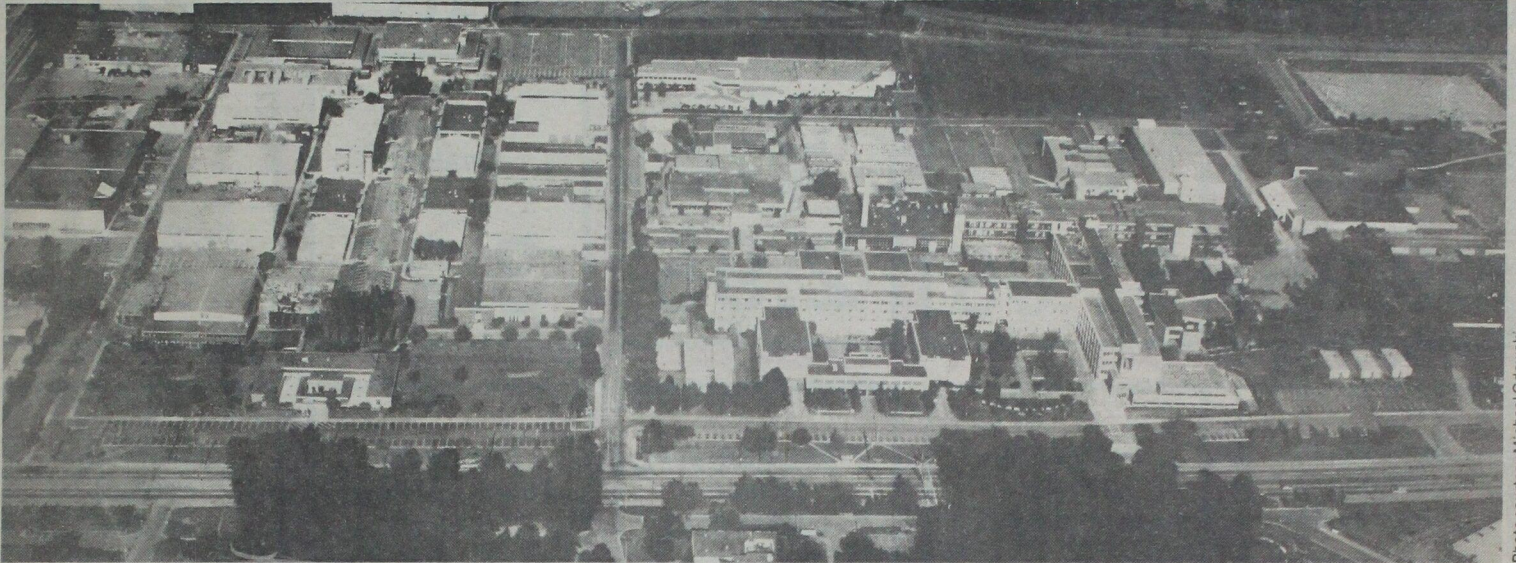

Transit petition organized by S.A.

Over the summer B.C. Transit raised the cost of bus passes and this has students in the lower mainland quite upset. Some college groups

have even advocated 'laying down' in front of buses, however, according to V.P. Public Relations Dave Cox, the BCIT Student Association has chosen a less dramatic way of protesting the transit fee hikes. He has organized a 'Bus Fare Petition' students can pick up during orientation/registration. The one-person petition form, which has room for individual comments, will be collected by the Student Association and forwarded to Grace McCarthy, minister responsible for transit.

Cox said students can only claim \$40.00 a month for bus travel, but the new two and three zone bus passes cost \$54 and \$70 respectively.

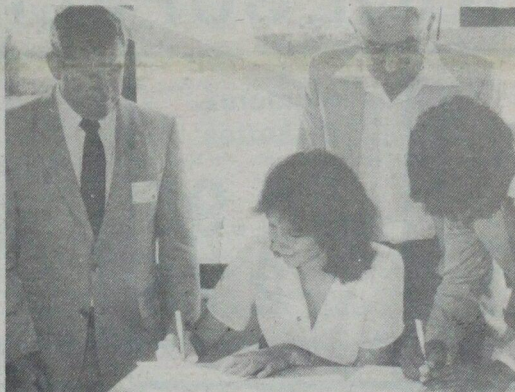
'I think that when students get back on campus, they'll realize how expensive the (fare) cards are,' said Cox. He is hopeful students will take the time to fill in a petition form and drop it in an S.A. Suggestion Box.

'The more petitions, the more Grace McCarthy will notice. Other colleges and universities will be sending out petitions, too.'

Cox said other members of the BCIT community are welcome to fill in petition forms as well.

The petition reads: Dear Honorable Grace McCarthy, The increase in bus fares which took effect June 1, 85 - ranging from 17 to 40 per cent, depending on the number of zones travelled - severely worsens the financial crisis students face. I believe that Post Secondary students deserve a concession fare rate for buses.

Additional forms may be obtained from the S.A. Office in the SAC.

Student groups sign letter of intent

One month after the government announced the amalgamation of BCIT and PVI, the BCIT Student and the Burnaby (PVI) Student Unions announced the intent to merge as well.

A signing ceremony was held July 15 in the Campus Centre, with students, staff and administration in attendance.

Signing for the BCIT Student Association was VP Public Relation Denise Sankovich and signing for the PVI Student's Union was president Balvinder Atwell.

Atwell said that as soon as the amalgamation was announced, the two student groups formed a committee to 'act in the best interests of all students.' He said that provision would be made for fair representation on the board of directors of the new larger association. He added that students attending BCIT and PVI will have equal access to each others facilities and service in the transition period.

'PVI students and staff are excited and looking forward to the future of new dynamic supertech BCIT,' said Atwell.

Bill MacPherson, reading a statement from S.A. President Troy Nagy, who was in South Africa at the time, said both student organizations were very excited about the new BCIT.

He welcomed PVI students into the BCIT Student Association's fold, which will now represent 7000 day school students.

He said the S.A. was also looking forward to working with the board on several issues, including getting student involvement in internal decisions that affect student life, services, counselling and fees. He added that the S.A. was also looking forward to working with the new administration to ensure that BCIT remain the 'flagship of technological education, in not only B.C. but the country as a whole.'

The letter of intent lays the groundwork for the amalgamation of the two societies, including the formation of a 'Joint Transitional Committee.' The letter states certain conditions the two sides will strive for prior to and during amalgamation and introduces the need for student activity fee changes.

BCIT/PVI merging

A 'new' BCIT, offering more flexible options and enhanced high tech training was unveiled during the summer by Education Minister Jack Heinrich.

The new school will be an amalgamation of the existing BCIT and the Pacific Vocational Institute with programs drawn from other colleges and institutes and new post-diploma high tech courses added.

Heinrich said the new BCIT will bring together programs of an advanced technological nature that can be enhanced through association. In addition, post-diploma courses will be added for students seeking to further their education. The Minister said the new BCIT will achieve this while realizing administrative savings.

Brought in to run the new BCIT is Roy Murray, most recently President of Lakeland College in Lloydminster. Gordon Thom, former president of BCIT, resigned two days before the amalgamation was announced.

The Minister said he was very pleased to have attracted Murray, 'an experienced and successful educator', to British Columbia to lead the new BCIT in its 'unique role during the 1980's and beyond.'

'British Columbia's economic and industrial structure is in the midst of rapid change to keep pace with the technological advances of our competitors throughout the world.'

'The challenge facing our colleges and institutes is to turn out journeymen and technologists equipped to excel in this environment.'

Heinrich added that the amalgamation of the two institutions would enhance technological and vocational training and make it 'more responsive' to rapidly changing employment and market patterns.

John Leech, president of the BCIT Alumni Association, said the amalgamation could be a 'positive development' for BCIT. 'The minister has promised more flexible career options and enhanced Hi Tech training. He also emphasized that the Business, Health Sciences and Engineering schools will be retained and strengthened under the new organization.'

S.A. President Troy Nagy said the merger was 'great' news. He agreed that the province will be better served by the new BCIT. 'I think it

could be because the new institute will be better focused.' He thought students could be more highly trained if just one institution took care of certain technologies, instead of scattering them throughout the province. He also thought it would help employers, because they will know where to find those graduates.

Nagy said he was also happy with the ministry's interest in making transfer to and from BCIT easier. He noted that Eastern universities

V.P. forced to resign

On July 23, V.P. Finance & Administration Bill MacPherson resigned from that position as he had failed three courses. The S.A. constitution does not allow students to serve on the executive if they have failed two or more courses.

According to S.A. President Troy Nagy, the executive had three choices in replacing MacPherson: hold a general



election, wait for full council to be formed, or appoint a new V.P. themselves. Nagy said that because the resignation took place during the summer, the executive decided to appoint Lorraine Reiger, who had been elected Business Chairperson. In her place, the executive appointed Len Hartley, runner-up for the position of Business Chairperson during the election last spring.

S.A. meeting

Dew was still on the grass at 7:30 Monday morning, August 26th, as the Student Association executive trooped into the Student Activity Center for a brisk one-hour meeting. Everyone was on time, and each executive's report was crisp and succinct. These people take their jobs seriously. There were many light moments but this reporter was impressed by the businesslike action orientation of the group.

The lets-get-at-it pace carried forward through the week as many executives put in a full week of meetings and preparations for Orientation Week. The executive (President, V.P.'s and division Chairpersons) met formally again Wednesday morning. Both meetings consisted largely of minutiae related to the many events the SA is organizing and the services the SA maintains on campus.

These events and services described elsewhere in this LINK. In my reporting I'll be focussing on decisions the SA faces that are likely to interest students. That category currently includes these issues:

Alumni money - The Alumni Association has requested SA support and a \$500 contribution to a fundraising breakfast they're planning for October 31st. The SA also has to decide whether to approve or oppose an across-the-board fee of \$30 per student which the Board of Governors has already agreed to charge, in January, on behalf of the Alumni Association. Their decision hinges on whether

the Alumni Association comes out with a 'satisfactory marketing plan' to sell the idea to the students. You'll read more about this.

Basic documents - Student Affairs VP Dave Cox has several major projects on the go including the preparation of a student Bill of Rights, and helping mold a constitution appropriate for the amalgamation of the BCIT and PVI student associations.

There's also a personnel change to report. Bill MacPherson, who last year was Engineering Chairperson, and was elected to this year's executive as VP of Administration and Finance, ran into academic problems that prevented him from serving in that capacity. Lorraine Rieger, elected as Business Chairperson, has taken over his position, and Len Hartley, first runner-up, has become Business Chairperson.

Fee deferrals

In order to save money, the Institute's Financial Services are allowing fewer fee deferrals this year. Students in certain categories of hardship are still getting deferrals but in general students cannot have their fees deferred while waiting for a student loan to come through, as was formerly common. There is one loophole, but it's expensive. If you get permission from the Department Head, you can attend class. But when your money comes through you have to pay a \$50 reinstatement fee on top of everything else.

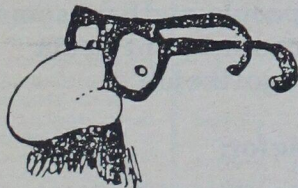

more readily accept grads from BCIT and give them credit for their diplomas, whereas UBC currently does not.

Nagy said he is not worried that the introduction of more three year programs would dilute the two year diploma. 'through the different societies, there is an accreditation program that states, in engineering, a one year graduate is a technician, a two year graduate is a technologists, and then a three year graduate will be something else. It's just

another step up. If you're a technologist, you'll still be a technologist.'

Heinrich said some restructuring will take place to provide an 'optimum level of service.' A transition board has been formed, made up of former BCIT and PVI board members, led by former BCIT Bard chairman Malcolm Wickson. The new board has already announced some structural changes, including the addition of two new vice presidents, one for Student and Educational Support, and one for Administration.



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'Youth for Freedom', an international conservative youth organization, held a major conference in South Africa during the summer, and S.A. President Troy Nagy attended on behalf of Canada. According to Nagy, the conference was held in conjunction with the United Nations Year of the Youth, and run at the same time as the communist bloc's youth festival. 'There were 35 countries altogether, with over 150 delegates in all,' said Nagy.

Nagy got to go when local conservative youth leaders invited him to represent Canada. They could not select anyone from a political organization, said Nagy,

because of Canada's statement against apartheid. 'I went as an independent entity - it was all paid for, it didn't cost the students of BCIT one dime.'

He said they wouldn't tell delegates who paid for the conference, which Nagy estimates to have cost \$200,000, but he believes the U.S.A. Foundation was the major contributor.

Nagy said the basic theme of the conference was the discussion of how communism is working in the world, and how subversive and terrorist organizations are 'winning.' He said the conference featured many 'high-powered' speakers, political and government officials. 'This was such an

education,' said Nagy, 'we came up with a mission statement (reproduced here) that declares we believe in liberty and the right of the individual to make his own way.' Nagy said he was against apartheid in all shapes and forms. However he added that it was 'not as bad as the western media portrays...blacks can do everything but vote.' Nagy admitted this exception was contrary to the mission statement adopted by 'Youth for Freedom'. He said it was the only thing about apartheid they could not support.

Nagy said the reason the conference was held in South Africa was because that area is high on Russia's list of priorities. 'If Russia gets its hands on South Africa, they'll control the world's gold market and the precious metals used in the space programs.'

He added that South Africa is not U.S. controlled, but that there was a lot of U.S. investment.

Near the close of the conference, Nagy said delegates had an idea the situation of unrest in the country was getting worse. Just a few days after Nagy got back to Canada, marshal law was declared in South Africa.

Student aid changes

Some like it, some don't

Two new student aid programs, a loan remission program and a scholarship program, were announced over the summer. The new programs, which the government says will total \$4.6 million in the first year, will reward scholastic achievement and assist students in overcoming 'geographic difficulties.'

Universities minister Pat McGeer said the programs were an 'investment' in British Columbia's future, and Education Minister Jack Heinrich said the programs will 'make a major contribution to helping post-secondary students finance their education.' He said the government believed that 'reducing the indebtedness of students through loan remissions and creating incentives...will help those students to concentrate on the educational challenges before them.'

The B.C. Government Loan Remission Program will reward students who complete a diploma or certificate in a credit program, or graduate with an undergraduate university degree. Students completing a college University Transfer program are not eligible until they complete an undergraduate degree. Either twenty-five or thirty-five per cent of their B.C. Student Loan principal will be repaid by the province. Students whose permanent residence is more than fifty kilometers from their institution are eligible for the higher remission. Students whose permanent residence is within the GVRD (or the CRD) and who attend an institution within that region are not eligible for the special allowance.

The B.C. Government Post-Secondary Scholarship program rewards the top thirty per cent of students who have completed a year of study and will return to continue their program. The top ten per cent will receive a contribution toward their subsequent year's tuition, or \$600 for university students and \$400 for college and institute students. The next twenty per cent of the students will receive \$300 and \$200 respectively.

Troy Nagy, S.A. President, said the new programs are a 'step in the right direction.'

however, he is unhappy with the fact BCIT has been lumped in with the colleges for purposes of the scholarship program. He said BCIT should be 'at a par with the universities.'

'We pay higher fees than college students, and if we're the flagship of technological education, we should be treated as such.'

He said that the tuition rebate was a good incentive for achieving academic excellence, but that he will be pushing for the loan rebate program to be available 'across the board.'

The NDP took issue with the programs, claiming that B.C. student aid was 'still the worst in Canada.' MLA Lorne Nicholson said the scheme may cost \$4.6 million, but that it represents less than a quarter of the government grant allocation in 1982. Education debate leader Mark Rose said that a student graduating with a bachelors degree could still owe \$19,200...over \$14,000 more than an Ontario student with the same financial need.'

According to the on-campus counselling/financial aid office, students do not have to apply for benefits under the scholarship program, which is based on academic performance and available to students continuing the next year in a full time program.

Students do not have to apply for the loan remission program either - students who qualify will have 25 per cent of the B.C. loan cancelled automatically. However, those from out of town who wish to claim the higher 33 per cent loan remission will have to apply for the extra amount. However, the Counselling department has not yet received information on the exact application procedure.

Statement

YOUTH FOR FREEDOM

We the representatives of the free youth of the world commit ourselves to working for the principles of liberty and democracy, believing as we do that all human beings have an inalienable right to live in societies which promote individual self-determination and freedom of expression.

Respecting the integrity of the expansion of Soviet imperialism and international terrorism, we recognize that the ideological tenets of Communism and Fascism pose the greatest threat to liberty, peace, democracy and economic development. We give our full support and solidarity to those who seek to liberate their countries from those regimes which violate the life, liberty and property of their citizens, fundamental human rights which should never be breached.

The structures, Organizations and individuals which constitute Youth for Freedom state that our main and unrevocable goal is for a universality of free and democratic societies, recognizing the principles of liberty and equality before the law; accepting the only economic system to guarantee the fundamental rights of life, liberty and property, as being Free Enterprise.

That democracy is a political system ruled by the law, sovereign and representative, that guarantees individual freedom, with neither coercion nor privilege thus guaranteeing equality before the law. That this system is characterized by the full joy of liberty, in all its manifestations: freedom of expression, organization, of worship, of mobility, or enterprise, of education, and all those in human nature.

We are committed to those ideals of a free and democratic society, recognizing that free elections, whilst indispensable to attainment of democracy, in allowing for the alternation in the exercise of power, does not necessarily lead to the provision of respect to human rights and liberty, which is indispensable to the existence of democracy.

The fundamental principles of freedom and democracy are inspired by the following, we hereby declare:

1. That individual freedom is the indispensable condition for the attainment of a satisfying life, ensuring the fullest development of human beings in society, thus guaranteeing equality before the law. That this system is acquired through the voluntary exchange of resources through the interaction of individuals with society.

2. That equality in a free society is recognized as the equality of all citizens in and before the law, without laws discriminating against persons on the grounds of race, sex, national extraction, social origin, religion, political opinion, or non violent opposition to the government.

3. That we conceive justice as equality of all citizens before the law without discrimination or partiality. The Rule of Law is fundamental to assurances of justice, with everyone, including governments and their agencies, being equally subject to that law, as this principle protects the individual against arbitrary interference.

Finally, we pledge that the links of solidarity that we have forged will remain forever at the service of the struggle for world rule of liberty and democracy. We hereby guarantee that our struggle will be ever present, with our support in any place of the world with (sic) freedom and democracy are suppressed.

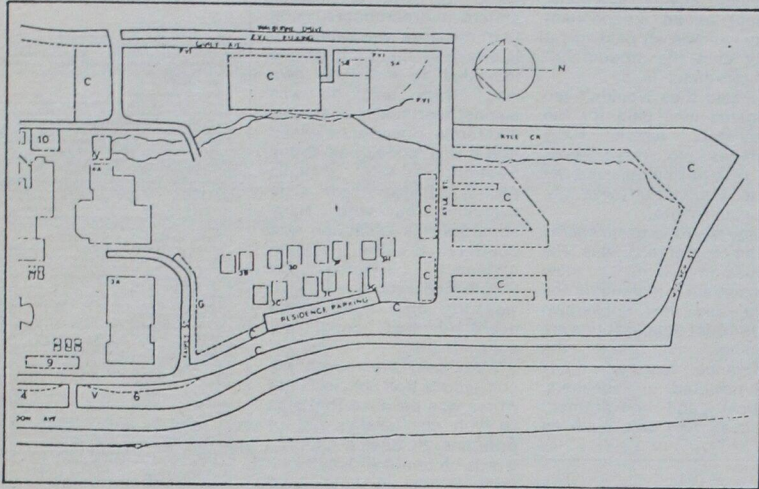

Parking on campus



GENERAL: There is a policy of overall paid parking and all parkers must purchase and display a valid permit at all times while parked on campus. Day school permits are only valid in student lots designated by letter C. Parking applications are received on a first come first served basis. Everything possible will be done to accommodate parking demand. For those left waiting, announcements of vacancies will be made from time to time through the campus media.

WHERE TO APPLY: Between 7:45 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday to Friday at Parking Office, Building 2T located off Roper Avenue.

PARKING FEES: C Zone \$35.00, Motorcycle Zones \$17.50.

FEE PAYMENTS: Cash or cheques. Credit cards NOT accepted.

REFUNDS: Where a person wishes to cancel parking allocation prior to expiry date on permit, refund for balance may be applied for through the Parking Control Officer, Building 2T, local 8719.

NOTE: All permits must be purchased and appropriately displayed by the FIRST week of classes in September. Vehicles without a valid permit are subject to tow-away off campus at owner's expense.

PARKING AREAS: The campus map above shows the various parking areas. To avoid having your car impounded off

campus at owner's expense day or night, please note the following restrictions:

The following violations are subject to vehicle impoundment off campus day or night all year at the owners risk and expense:

- (a) Parking along yellow curbs, on roadways or in the aisles of parking lots.
- (b) Obstructing fire hydrants, fire hose outlets and parking in fire lanes.
- (c) Exceeding 15 minute time limit in loading/unloading zone
- (d) Parking in spaces or lots without proper permits.
- (e) Failure to display a valid permit while parked on campus.
- (f) Parking a vehicle overnight without notifying parking control.
- (g) Obstructing rubbish containers.
- (h) Blocking off another parked vehicle.
- (i) The fraudulent use of parking permits.
- (j) Parking in areas not designated for parking or parking anywhere that impedes traffic and pedestrian safety.
- (k) Failure to park properly in all lots either within the headers surrounding the parking lot or within the white lines of each space.
- (l) Parking meter violations, 0800-1700 Monday through Friday all year. Statutory holidays excepted.

OTHER NOTES: If your vehicle breaks down contact control personnel who will assist if possible. Be sure your vehicle is locked and valuables kept out of sight.

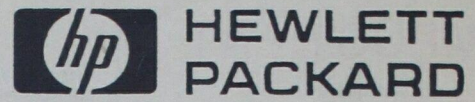

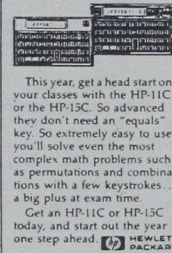
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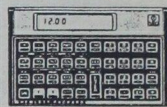


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Have You Got It?

Shine on!

Over the next few weeks you'll be hearing a lot about Cystic Fibrosis and Shinerama.

CYSTIC FIBROSIS

Cystic Fibrosis is an inherited, life threatening disease. CF is second only to cancer in taking the lives of children.

CF occurs when a child inherits two genes for the condition, one from each parent. Presently there are no tests to detect carriers. You could be a carrier and not even know it. The result of CF is that certain glands don't function as they should. Cystic Fibrosis affects the functions of breathing and digestion, as well as the production of fluids within the body. Thick mucus clogs the bronchial tubes, making it difficult to breathe. Digestion is also hampered in CF children and some children have to take as many as 30 pills with each meal to aid digestion, provide vitamin supplements and help ward off lung infections and disease.

A child with CF does not have an easy life. Each day is a day filled with rigorous therapy programs, just to keep alive. The median age of survival for a CF patient was under 4 years. Through research, this has been increased to over age 20.

SHINERAMA

Shinerama has proven to be a valuable way of raising money to help with the cost of research. BCIT students have been involved with Shinerama since 1969, and over the years, have raised over \$150,000 to help give the 'breath of life.'

Last year students raised \$6,500; this year our goal is \$7,500. I'm sure that with your help we can achieve this goal. I know that the people of Vancouver fully support Shinerama. Over the summer while I was organizing this years event, I realized how well recognized and respected our campaign is. Companies have been more than happy to donate the food we need to feed all you shiners at the breakfast and at lunch. Pepsi is going to advertise our campaign on their trucks and TV stations are going to cover the whole days events. Tyrone Crews, from the B.C. Lions, is going to be Honorary Chairperson for BCIT's Shinerama. Tyrone will also be coming to the pancake

breakfast, to be held the morning of Shinerama (at the SAC), to meet the shiners. Also appearing will be the Lions Cheerleaders, Burnaby Mayor Bill LeWarne and Elwood Veitch, Parliamentary Secretary of post secondary education and MLA for Burnaby-Willingdon.

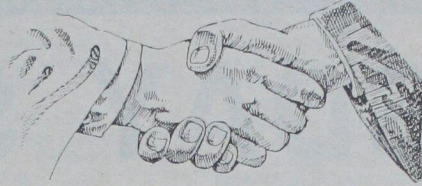

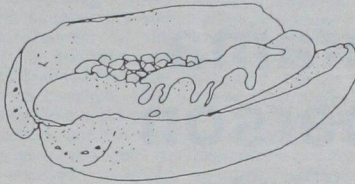

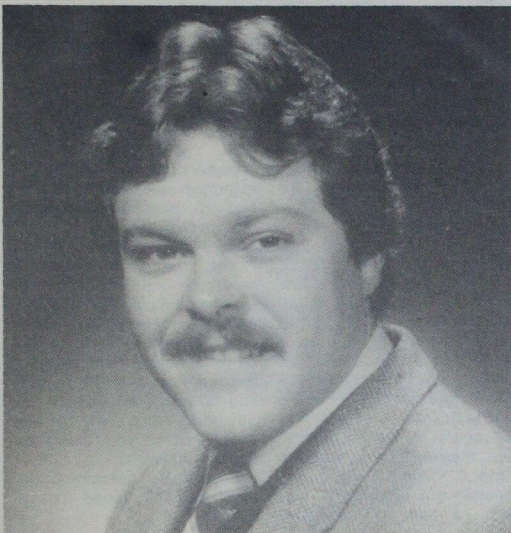

Hello to all new students and welcome back to all returning students. I would like to welcome our neighbours, the PVI student body, into the fold of the 'NEW' BCIT student union. This column will appear periodically throughout the school year. It gives students a chance to be updated on what is happening in and around the school. Columns are related to events that affect students, and should be read in order to keep on top of things. This week I would like to bring you up to date on a number of things.

PVI/BCIT Amalgamation:

If you are not aware of it, BCIT and PVI are now one institute, under the moniker of the 'NEW BCIT'. The SA feels this is a very positive step that will alleviate some of the administrative burden that both institutes were under. Possibly now the institute will operate more efficiently, not having to worry about 1000 different levels of administration.

BCIT's new president is Mr. Roy Murray. He was the principal of Lakeland College in Vermillion, Alberta and before that he was the Civil Engineering Dept. head at Lakehead University in Thunder Bay, Ontario. I have met with Mr. Murray and he seems to have student issues at heart. He has welcomed student input on all aspects of the new institute. This is a very positive move on his behalf as we tried to get student input into internal decisions all last year without success. The SA is definitely looking forward to working with Mr. Murray.

There will now be 4 vice presidents in the senior administrative level of the institute, a V.P. Education, V.P. Finance, V.P. Administration and V.P. Student Educational Support. This means that all aspects of campus life will be taken care of under a V.P. that has the time to devote to his or her area. For example, the S.A. will

now have a direct liaison with senior administration, that is, we can directly negotiate with the V.P. Student and Educational support. However, the administration had better make student services a priority or else the S.A. will not be so complacent. The S.A. will give them a chance to see if the system works, but it will be under scrutiny. Government Rebate Programs:

The provincial government has recently announced the formation of two rebate programs geared to financially help students with their post secondary education. However, these are not unilateral programs. In order to qualify for a rebate, you must be in the top 30 percent of the class.

The first program is 'the B.C. Government Post Secondary Scholarship Program'. This program awards students \$400 if you are in the top 10 percent of the class, and \$200 to students in the 10 to 30 percent range. This money is for students who have completed one year and are returning for a second year in their field of study. The second program is for graduates. Students who graduate with a diploma can get a 25 percent rebate on their B.C. student loans (not Canada student loans). Students whose permanent residence is more than 50 km away from BCIT can get a 33 percent rebate, except for those who live in the GVRD and go to BCIT.

These programs are steps in the right direction. However the SA feels that the government is still thinking of us as a community college. The universities receive a \$600 and \$400 tuition rebate for the top 30 percent whereas we only get \$400 and \$200 respectively, the same as colleges. Mr. Hienrich's reply to this is that because university students go to school for 4 years they pay more tuition. The S.A. will try

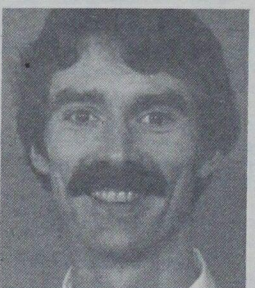
And now a bit about how and why I arrived at BCIT.

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MLA calls for action on 'tech change'

The View From The Middle

Suppose you lived in a small town just downstream from a big dam. And suppose, one day, some engineers came down from the dam to warn everybody that it was about to burst wide open and change your life forever.

You would expect your town's mayor and council to get together with you and your neighbors, to see what could be done, right?

But suppose your mayor said he was too busy planning next year's local fair. And the aldermen said they had to give all their attention to rezoning the suburbs to attract a new factory and a shopping mall.

Wouldn't you start to worry a little?

If so, start worrying now. Because something far more devastating than a dam burst is going to happen to B.C. over the next few years, and neither the Socreds nor the NDP are giving it any attention.

The problem is the impact of technological change on jobs. One job in five has already been lost in the forest industry, not through recession or slumping foreign markets, but by the introduction of new machinery.

And the experts say that's only the first trickle through the cracks in the dam. The flood will soon follow.

Tech change in the workplace is aimed at the working middle class - the skilled workers who make the good wages and are supposed to be relatively safe from ups and downs in the economy. But they're not safe any more.

Listen to Dr. Arthur Cordell of the Science Council of Canada: "The introduction of machine intelligence into the manufacturing and service sectors is leading to a division of workers into those who are highly skilled and those who are unskilled."

In other words, the new technology will mean jobs for the programmer and systems analyst at one end of the scale, and jobs for the unskilled assembly line work or cash register puncher at the other end.

For those in the middle - which is most of the workforce - there is no security. A job that required years of training and experience can simply disappear, replaced by a microchip.

In a study entitled *The Uneasy Eighties: The Transformation to an Information Society*, Dr. Cordell noted the example of a newspaper that's wrenched over to computerized typesetting.

The total number of jobs on one shift at the printing plant was cut from 52 to 29. Twelve typesetters were replaced by five video display terminal operators. Ten correctors were replaced by another five VDT operators, and seven people replaced 15 layout workers.

The jobs that were eliminated were held by highly skilled workers who earned good salaries. The low-paid VDT operators who replaced them needed only basic typing skills.

What happened at the newspaper can happen in any industry in B.C. And it probably will happen in the next ten years.

The workforce will be

restructured. There will be good jobs for the computer-literate professionals. There will be joe-work jobs for hordes of keyboard operators. And massive unemployment for tens of thousands with unneeded skills.

This is no hypothetical threat, no 'what-if' scenario from a science fiction movie. This is the future, and near future at that.

So what are our elected leaders doing about it? What plans are in the works to get us through this wrenching transition from the old economic structure to the new information economy?

The NDP have no plans. They're running for cover on the issue of tech change. They know that the new technology is going to hit hardest at the unionized workforce. So far, the reaction of union leadership to tech change is that they're against it. So the NDP have to be against it, even though it's as unstoppable as the rain.

The Socreds have no plans. Right now government's entire attention is focussed on Expo 86 and their Special Enterprise Zones. They're hoping that one or both of these whiz-bang initiatives will reate an economic miracle and put everybody back to work.

Both old-line parties in B.C. are acting as if there are no cracks in the dam. They're trying hard to believe that the

future will be just like the past.

But you and I are going to be living in that future all too soon. Thousands of jobless workers are already living there now, wondering if they will ever work again.

It's time our leaders faced up to tech change. Instead of driving our best academics out of the province, Victoria should be putting some money into research that will tell us what's going to happen to our workforce in the next few years - so we can start planning how to survive the crisis.

Instead of dithering on about full employment, the NDP should be leaning on its labor allies to develop a comprehensive enlightened position on tech change - so that industry and labour can begin to get their act together.

And our leaders in politics, business and labour should be putting this issue squarely before the people of British Columbia. It's time somebody leveled with you about what's going to happen to your job in the next few years.

Expo and SEZ's won't stop the dam from bursting. We need a plan to handle massive structural unemployment in the 1990s. And we need a vision of a new economy for British Columbia.

This time, we can't afford to do nothing until the flood waters are up to our necks.

Students face higher costs

Victoria - The ministry of education's move to 'rationalize' course offerings by colleges in the lower mainland could cost students more to attend post-secondary school, according to NDP Education debate leader Coquitlam-Moody MLA Mark Rose.

He said the higher costs would come in the form of increased transit expenses. Rose told the House during Question Period that the minister should be aware that by reducing the range of options at individual colleges, this will result in much greater travel costs for students.

"As you are aware, post

secondary students cannot avail themselves of the Concession Fare Cards that are available to students under the age of 20. This means that a student attending a college that requires him to use a Super Card would pay \$70 under the new rates. The student would only pay \$22 for a Concession Far Card, a saving of 40 per cent, said Rose.

Rose concluded by stating, "The minister should make representations to the minister in charge of transit requesting that Concession Fare Cards in the transit system be made available to post secondary students."

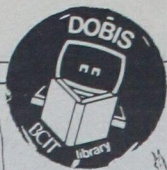

Library goes DOBIS

DOBIS, (an acronym for Dortmund Bibliotheksystem) is the name of BCIT's integrated on-line library system that operates on the Institute's mainframe. Over the past year and a half, the library has implemented the on-line public access catalogue that many of you are already familiar with. This on-line catalogue of Library holdings is also available to BCIT staff who have access to PROFS, the new office automation system being installed campus-wide. Within the next year, the Library catalogue will be available to staff and faculty from their offices.

The other major development is the implementation of the new circulation system. This function, integrated fully with the DOBIS on-line catalogue, uses barcodes and a scanner

to create a loan record. The Library staff worked feverishly in the spring to place barcodes in all items that can be borrowed. In total 150,000 barcodes were inserted in 9 days. At the same time staff carried out an inventory and clean-up of the database and collection.

All Library users will need individual barcodes to borrow materials. Full-time students, faculty and staff must obtain a photo-ID from the Student Association. This ID card will be the new Library card once a barcode has been attached to it. To obtain library privileges, everyone must fill out an application form in the Library. After this information has been entered into the Library database, a barcode is printed. The turn-around time between filling out a library application form and obtaining a barcode for the

new photo-ID should be less than 24 hours.

For Library users, what will be different? Charge-out should be faster. Instead of having to pull out a computer card from the book and pass it through a terminal, the Library staff member will scan the barcode in the book with a light pen. The borrower barcode is similarly scanned.

The system operates in real time, not in batch mode. As soon as an item is borrowed, the loan transaction is registered. Delinquent borrowers, those of you with overdue material, will be blocked from further loans until the overdue items are returned. Borrowers can ask the staff what items they have out on loan and when these are due back.

Whistler Cabin: still available to students

Over the past summer, the Student Association initiated the sale of the Whistler cabin to current caretaker Art DeJong. The main reason for the sale was monetary. If the S.A. were to keep the lodge, the costs would be astronomical. For example, the land lease costs double in 1985, to \$1880 per annum, increase to \$2750 in 1986, and finally jump up to \$3500 for 1987-89. The S.A. had the option of buying the land from the government in 1989. However, the cost of the land is \$70,000 now, and it could go up. This totals \$85,130 just for the land. Each year there are also taxes to pay, amounting to about \$1700 per year, and the building needs up-keep - at least \$4000 per year. Adding these amounts together, it would cost \$113,360 just to keep the cabin until 1989. And that does not include insurance, Hydro, caretaker's wages, etc.

The Student Association no longer owns the lodge, but

BCIT students still have the same usage privileges. There will be a number of beds guaranteed to BCIT students, depending on how far ahead students book. The further ahead you book, the more beds there are. The prices are still very reasonable: \$12 per night for day school students (including PVI), and 13.50/night for night school students and alumni, on weekends and school holidays. Midweek the price drops to \$10 per night. Art is offering an annual 'Lodge' club membership for \$25. This allows students to stay at the Lodge for \$10 per night anytime along with two (2) free ski tune-ups.

The lodge is a great place for skiers. There are kitchen facilities so you can take your own food, a suana, fireplace, complete washroom and shower facilities, and more. There are, of course, a few rules to follow. Bookings can be made at the SA General Office starting in October.

You can book for anytime of the ski season. There are no tech bookings, and you can only book for yourself and a friend. You can only change your booking date once per booking, with no less than 7 days advance notice. There are NO REFUNDS unless highway closure was in effect for over 3 hours on the day of the booking. (Lack of snow or ski area closure are not sufficient reasons.)

The Whistler Lodge services a responsible, mature adult. Partying and drunken behavior is prohibited. Lights are shut off at 11 p.m. and the building remains quiet until 6 a.m. These rules will be enforced. If you want to party go into the village, but please be quiet when you get back to the lodge.

Remember, the ski season is just around the corner, so book your space early and have a great 'Whistler' ski weekend.
