Basketball and Volleyball for Men and Women will be part of the 1970-71 Athletic Program at B.C.I.T.

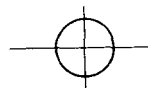

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COULD IT HAPPEN HERE?

At this moment there are over one hundred and fifty colleges and universities in the United States that are closed as a direct result of the policies of the Nixon Administration. The policies that I refer to are; the decision to invade Cambodia and the apparent policy of crushing dissent on the campuses by any means possible.

On Monday, May 4, four days after President Nixon took it upon himself to invade Cambodia, the students at Kent State University in Ohio decided that their President had made a mistake and decided that they should exercise their democratic right to protest this move. As we know, the demonstration ended in tragedy. Four of the Kent State students were killed, and eleven others were wounded as a result of shots fired by the National Guardsmen on duty at the Kent campus.

I remember the days, not so long ago, when there was disorder on campuses around the world. And we read of students being killed in Mexico and Japan and Argentina. But never in our wildest dreams did we imagine that the day would come that students would be shot down by the military right here in North America. We were the mainstay of Democracy, a land of free men where dissent is accepted as the right and even the obligation of the people. Our's was the society where governments were truly the servants, not the masters for the people.

But now it seems the times have changed in the United States, 'LAND OF THE FREE, HOME OF THE BRAVE'. The time has come when the government does not value dissent and in fact suppresses it at the point of a gun. Four people dead. Four people who happen to have been students just like you and me. And it is a fact that the people who are dissenting are no longer the fringe radicals and Maoists, The straight, middleclass students, who five years ago wouldn't have crossed the street to join a protest march, are now very much involved in the struggle. The Massachusetts Institute of Technology (M.I.T.), the epitome of American Scientific conservatism, is one of the campuses that have been closed in the past week. They are as straight as we are baby and they have closed the campus.

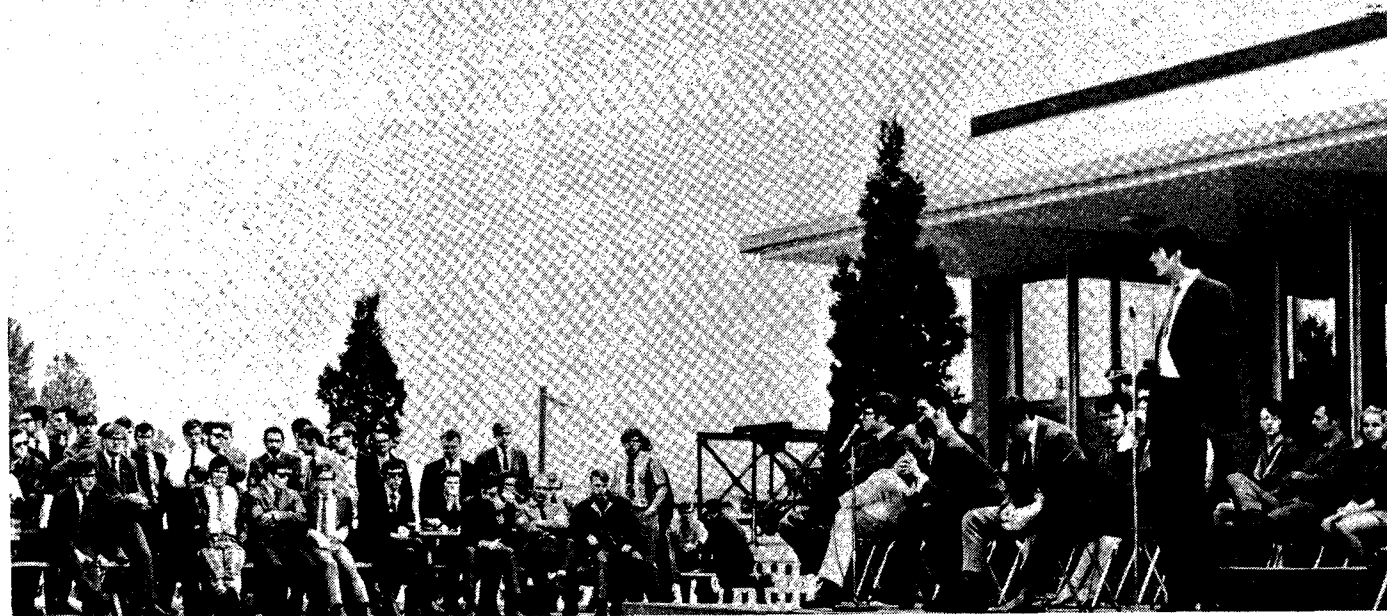
But we say that it couldn't happen here. Or could it? Isn't it true that we, as Canadians, follow fairly closely the lead of our American neighbours? They had their Kennedy before we had Trudeau; their Haight-Ashbury before our Fourth Avenue; their Columbia before our SFU. Why is it inconceivable that we may be next to have armed troops on our campuses?

There is, in the Western world., a strong undercurrent of change. Youth is pushing society to change the standards that they feels are outmoded and irrelevant in today's world. This pressure for change has manifested itself more in the United States than it has here in Canada. But it does exist here and it will inevitably become apparent very soon.

Will our government fight this change? Will they suppress youth's dissent? Or will they work with the young to build a better society? The combination of youth's idealism and the government's experience; youth's impatience and government's methodicalness; youth's anger and government's patience could surely be used to better the society in which we all must exist. Surely we can work together to ensure that we never have a situation in which innocent people are shot down.

STUDENT COUNCIL MEETING

The final Student Council meeting was held on Monday, May 4. The executive gave their final reports to Council and Mr. Russo chaired his last meeting. One thing that seemed missing from the meeting was an indication that it was indeed the last meeting of the year. No one said goodbye, or thank you or anything. Perhaps it was felt that a council meeting was no place for emotional and tearful goodbyes and so they were deleted.

It was discovered at this meeting that the motion passed at the last meeting, to form the Engineering Society, was out of order. It seems that only a General Meeting of all students has the power to form such an organization. There was a good deal of discussion on the subject and President John Leech of the Engineering Society seemed rather at a loss for words when he was told that his Society was unconstitutional. The high point of the discussion came when Len Vaness, former Mining Chairman, and Tom Hudson, Social Chairman, had a rather unfriendly exchange of insults. The discussion centered around a certain excretion found around horse stables. However, Len and Tom were seen drinking together in the Villa, so it seems that they have made up.

Edgar Rhomberg has informed us that the memberships for the BCIT Whistler Lodge are now on sale at the campus bank. They are \$10 apiece and will entitle the holder to drastically reduced prices for accommodation. For example, student members will pay only one dollar per night to stay at the lodge.

The second year Mechanical Technology were at the meeting to air grievance that Mechanicals have had for some five years. Their complaint centered around drafting instructor. Mr. Allen Hazzlewood. It was alleged by Mechanical Tech that Mr. Hazzlewood is not a competent instructor and should not be on staff at BCIT. Some of the allegations were that Mr. Hazzlewood is constantly late; is generally a poor lecturer; is usually unprepared for labs and lectures; gives ridiculously hard term assignments; etc. These allegations were supported by members of other technologies. who had Mr. Hazzlewood as an instructor. A motion by Council to support Mechanicals' bid to have Mr. Hazzlewood dismissed was almost put on the floor. However, the Executive felt that his motion was too strongly worded and finally agreed on a motion to set up staff-student committee to investigate Mechanical's complaint. This watered-down motion was passed 32:14.

A motion was moved by Paul

Kopinya to honour Mrs. Grace Verrier with an honorary membership in the Student Association. The motion passed unanimously, and rightly so.

STUDENT ASSOCIATION ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

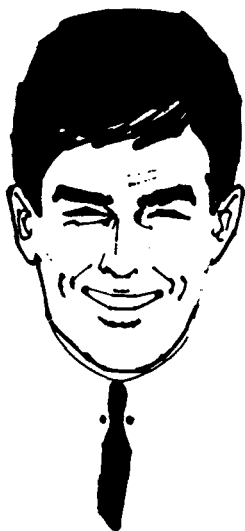
The Annual General Meeting was held on Wednesday, May 6, and for the first time in our history there was a quorum. That means that better than ten percent of the student body were present.

DATING

SERVICES

DIAL AND HANG UP

Dating services are a new thing and most people tend to fear them. They are an unknown. Some are out for the buck only while others who may charge a bit more provide 100% plus service.

Those that call the service are curious. They want to know about it. Some have taken ten years of courage to dial the number, and then hang up. Those that do make the telephone contact are fearful of going in for an interview. Let me put your mind at ease. Behind the service are warm and courteous people who want to help you. Those that have been around for some time are here because they provide a good service. If they didn't they wouldn't be in business for long.

THE ROUTINE

All services require that you come down for an interview, for which there is no obligation. The reason for the interview is to find out what you are like and what you would like. It is a get acquainted chat that is very informal. They put you at ease. Their offices are discrete, they have no big signs and they in no way try to embarrass anyone. After the interview they decide if you are a suitable member, the reputable ones will not accept member unless they can find matches in their files. The person then decides if he wants to join the club or not and this is where the fees come in.

Once you are a member you can use the service as per the membership agreement and this varies with the clubs.

THE CLUBS

The dating services in Vancouver are varied. Each one is unique and it depends on the individuals tastes as to which one will suit him. We recommend that you shop around for a while. Get to know them first, don't be afraid to ask questions and don't sign up unless you are sure of the facts.

PYC

The PYC (Personally Yours Club or Company) is a personalized dating service. This service is very reputable and recommended highly as a personalized service.

Renee, who runs the service is a very amiable person who won't sign up anyone unless there are people available for dates. It's not a fly by night fast buck service. It is one that is expanding rapidly.

They established their business seven months ago (on Kingsway) and now are opening a second office (on Broadway). They try to sincerely help their members.

They presently have a membership of 500 all the membership have been screened carefully. Keeping the good one and eliminating any bad ones.

They provide protection (you know something about the person before you go out), a means of widening your circle of friends and a system whereby you can be matched up with the type of people you would like to meet.

A divorced and separated service for females is now being established with babysitting being provided by club members at a reasonable rate.

This is a very friendly service. Renee was formerly with Lola's Dating Service before she went out on her own and therefore is familiar with the wants and needs of people. Her record to date is 5 weddings and a large percentage of members going steady. She gets to know the membership personally and there are very few who don't have a date for the weekend.

CAROUSEL

The Carousel dating service is a personalized service. Lorraine, the date maker is formerly from Lola's Dating Service and is skilled in this line of work. Her personality makes the members feel at home.

Carousel opened up in November 1969 and to date has between 350-400 members. Included in the membership are college professors, dentists, lawyers, accountants, tradesmen widowers, airline stewardesses, nurses, secretaries, models and students.

The membership fee is \$60 per year or \$40 per half year. A special student rate is offered at \$50 per year and \$30 per half year. A twenty-four hour time notice is required as is an interview before any dates are arranged.

Their record now stands at 4 marriages and 2 engagements.

The service is now applying to open up a branch in Victoria. The business is Vancouver based and does not use computers for matching. They are a personalized friendly business, who want to help people meet others.

LOLA'S

Lola's in Vancouver is a branch of the Lola's Dating Service bureau, headquarters Ottawa.

They provide personalized service with introductions every week. This is a membership service with fees of \$170 per year (computerized), \$100 per year without computers and \$75 per half year.

They have a wide variety of members with approximately 500 on the present lists. Of their membership 10% are married (because of the service) and 75% are going steady.

Their slogan "What ever Lola Wants Lola Gets" should not be taken literally. It is not a lonely hearts service. They do have doctors, lawyers, nurses and teachers as members. Most of these people have no time for meeting people socially.

During the past year over half a dozen dating services have been established in Vancouver. We were curious as to what these new organizations are and do. This is a brief report on their services:

FEAR

We all have built within us automatic protectors. Society has built onto these their "no no" devices and when the final package is finished you have a shell of a man that just is not natural. People want to be gregarious but some are for unexplainable reasons hold back. The loneliest place in Vancouver is Granville and Georgia and yet this is the busiest. The West end apartments are another haven of loneliness.

Vancouver is a big city with all types of people. It takes time to get to know them and after you do you may find that they are not your type.

ENTER DATING SERVICES

This is where dating services come in. They try to help these people. We would like to state right now that most of these services are not lonely heart organizations for people who are incompatible but are for everyday people and in some sense for the above average class.

REASONS

The reasons for using a dating service are numerous. New people into the city use the service to establish a contact of friends. The lonely (not the lonely heart) want to meet others for social purposes. Those professionals or people who just have no time during work or no opportunity also use the service. Some want decent respectable dates, they want to know something about the party before they go out with them. The dating services provide honesty, a safe way to go out on a date. A convenient and safe way to meet new and interesting people.

OTHER WAYS

Dating services are by no means the only way of meeting other people for there are many other avenues. On one extreme there are ads in the Georgia Straight, this is for one type of group. Social functions (dances, parties, etc.) are another way. Public activities (sports, beaches, clubs, pubs, etc.) are yet another means. But one thing they have in common is that it is a hit and miss basis. You never know what the other person is like. If he is married or if she is a hustler. The dating services provide a means of screening. Before they match two people, the good services, check out both parties, and if it doesn't work out they have others on their files who may fit the bill.

SOCIAL ESCORT SERVICE

The escort service is mainly for out of town people wishing to go out for a one night date. The girls that do go out are employees of the service and get \$10-\$12 for a date. The service offers complete social services including butlers, hostesses, bartenders, etc. but they are mainly in the one night escort service.

The fee for a one night date is \$25. All other costs are above this. The service is above the board (legal) and does not provide things that are offered in other parts of the continent.

The customers are mostly business men who are new in town and don't know where to go or anyone to go with. They are convention people, travelling salesmen, business men in town for a few days, etc.

The girls sent out are working girls who just like to go out for a nite on the town. They range in the 22-3- age group. They have good personalities. Included are working girls, secretaries, nurses and office girls who like to meet other people.

A time notice of 24 hours is required if possible since an interview is required of the customers. They do however arrange things in a short notice with a minimum of 3 hours notice.

This is a unique type of service that serves a certain group of people (those with money).

COMPATABILITY

This is a computerized service, we were not able to interview the business however we did understand that there is a \$300 contract involved.

The Vancouver branch is part of a national company that introduces people across the country.

CHECKMATE

This is a new service, we had no opportunity to look into it. We will have a report on this service in the first issue of the Link next term.

FIFTH DAY CLUB

The Fifth Day Club is probably one of Vancouver's largest dating clubs in Vancouver. It is an open club (you must apply for membership first) that hold a variety of functions. They do not provide personalized dating services but do arrange a wide variety of functions. Ski trips, parties, etc, etc. The fee to join this club is less than other dating clubs.

They have their own newspaper and usually provide one or two activities per weekend.

This is a real swinging club where girls usually outnumber boys. The members are varied people who like doing a variety of things like skiing, vacationing, it is in a sense a miniature playboy club (without the bunnies).

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Check more than one service.
2. Don't let price be a guideline, you get what you pay.
3. Find out yourself first, what you want, what you can give.
4. If sex is the only thing you want use pubs not dating services. The reputable one are not in this business. There are some fly by night ones that will supply this but watch it they may take you to the cleaners.
5. Be honest in your interview, people get caught in their lies.

6. Don't sign up for more than six month membership. If you can't find one in that time - forget it.

7. Computer services should be avoided. They make mistakes.

8. Go to a service that has their main office in Vancouver. Don't go to services that have head offices elsewhere they usually have hired help and provide inferior services.

9. Go to an established firm, ask them for referrals. Check them out if in doubt.

10. Before you can know another person you must first know yourself.

Note these are personal rating and the opinion of the writer only.

Good: PYC & Carousel

Acceptable: Lola's and Social Escort Service.

Not acceptable: Computerized services, fly by night services, Pimps, Inc., Georgia Straight Ads or Blind Dates from friends.

FUTURE

The future of dating service is very promising to the reputable firms. Now people are very shy about such things but they need not be. Many people see dating services as a whole new world of meeting people they could not otherwise meet.

In ten years it will be socially acceptable. The idea works and in time it will be no different to go to a dating service than tying



your shoes or going to see the dentist.

Dating service should be established in high schools. Government stated one service should be running them but I have to disagree. When governments run things they usually have so much red tape and hang-up themselves that they would take years to find a date.

SUMMARY

One you get to know dating services, and doubts are removed you too will find that they are good things. The people that join then are just like you and me. People who want to meet people. Our thanks to the services for their co-operation in the preparation of this report. Have a good summer.

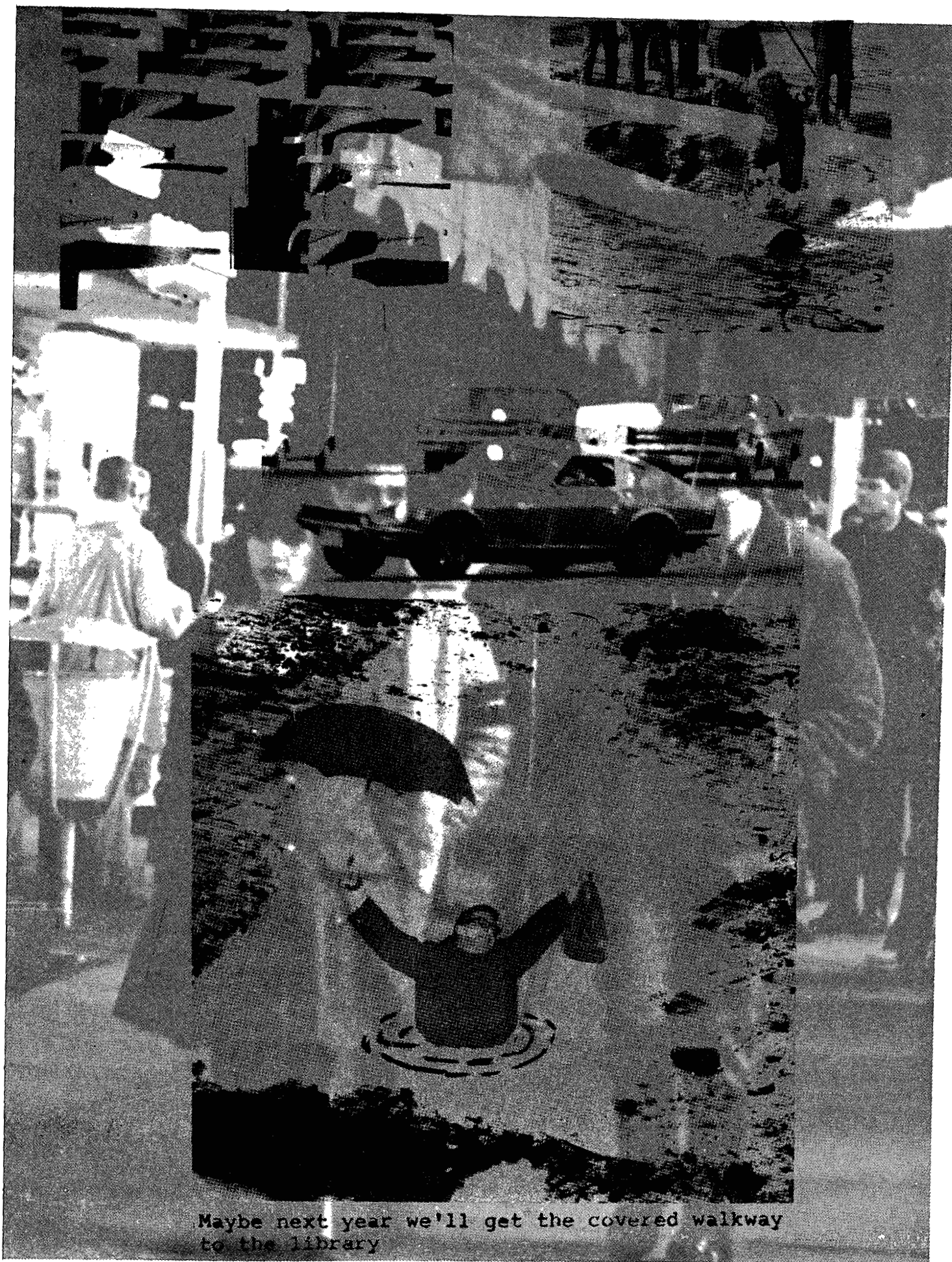
