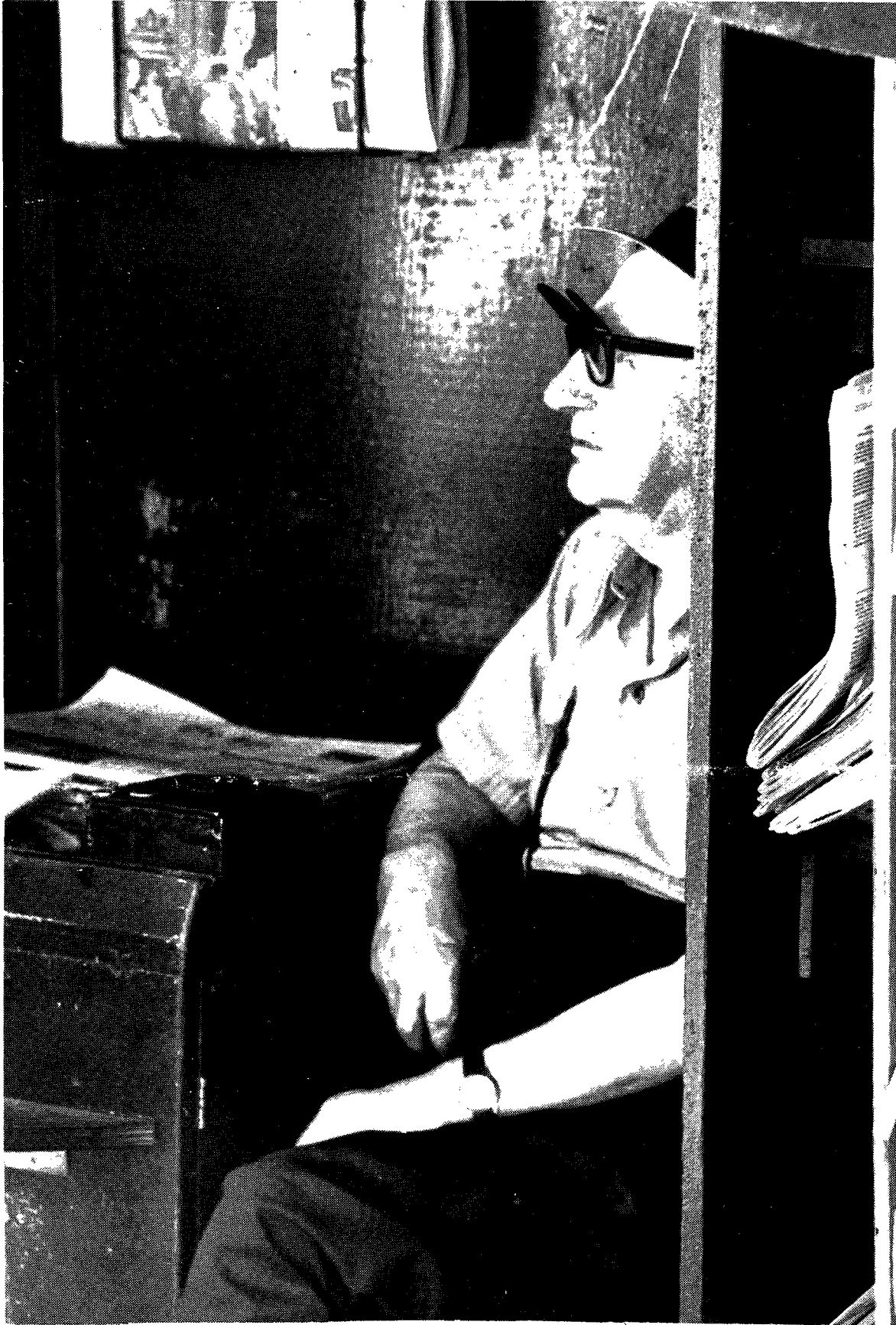

VIEW FROM THE HOT SEAT

DEAN GOARD'S VIEW

The issue of the dress regulations and the wearing of ties at BCIT has been hashed over often this past year. However, the complete views of the administration and Mr. Goard have never been presented in the Link. In order to ascertain the administrations stand on the school's dress code, this reporter interviewed Mr. Dean Goard. Mr. Goard was extremely willing to talk to me and voiced his opinions on many facets of BCIT, including, mainly the dress regulations.

We started by talking about the administrations view of the dress code. Mr. Goard stated that the first thing we must realize is that BCIT is not a university where the arts and humanities are taught. BCIT is a business oriented school. Most of the people who come here have a specific goal in mind. For instance, if someone comes to study X-ray technology, they are going to be an X-ray technician, when they're through.

Because we are business oriented it is the job of the school to prepare the students for the business world, where the tie and sports jacket or suit is the common dress. For the engineers this is not entirely so. They, however, have accepted the tech. jacket as a substitute for the sports jacket. Still, they must be neat and clean while at school and the tie is an integral part of their dress.

Mr. Goard feels that ideally students would discipline themselves as to their dress. Another problem is the fact that BCIT is actually 3 schools in one; Health, Business and Engineering. Mr. Goard stated that Health students wear white lab coats a great deal of the time and this is a suitable form of dress. Business students, for the most part, dress well because they are preparing for the business world. Engineering students, are preparing for a different line of work entirely and as such do not relate to the dress regulations as strongly. However he said that spokesmen from the industry tell him they feel a student who isn't willing to conform to an organizations objectives and norms will not make a good employee. Consequently, their adherence to the dress regulations may well show their willingness, or lack of it, to conform to a company's regulations and objectives once they graduate.

I asked Mr. Goard about the enforcement of the dress regulations by the administration. Mr. Goard said the first mention of improper dress to a student is the job of the teacher. At this point the teacher should advise the student about his dress and ask that the student adhere to the regulations. If this fails, the student should be sent to the department head. If the student remains adamant, the department head may go to the division head and request suspension of the student. However, said Mr. Goard, this should be a final resort and only if the student absolutely refuses to accept BCIT's dress code. Usually the department head will try to counsel the student as again, we must remember we are a scholastic institute. Another form of action is to allow the student to continue but refuse to recommend him for a job. Although this may not appear to be too serious, it is usually the "kiss of death" for those students seeking a career once they leave BCIT. Many prospective employers contact the department heads, he stated, and a bad report often means the student won't get the job. The dress regulations, he said, are in the students' interest and no one else's. This is what many students fail to realize. Also, this is why strict enforcement of them should come as a last resort.

Residences — death of a dream

It appears that this year's concerted effort by the Student Association, BCIT administration, Advisory Council and help from BCVS in promoting residences for our school campus will die a slow death. The Cabinet of the provincial government does not appear to be favorably inclined to our wishes. We have not sold the idea to Hon. Mr. Brothers and his staff.

Why have we failed? In my discussions and listening to the distinguished and learned gentlemen who head our Department of Education, I sense the feeling they think BCIT is a special extension of "high school". They will not admit that BCIT is on a par with universities in its operation.

Three other provinces in Canada have established a separate department for university affairs which include colleges and technological institutes. Alberta, Manitoba and Ontario acknowledged that post secondary education is so vital and important that a separate Cabinet minister should head up a department. I can sympathize with the Honorable Minister for his heavy overload of work--his present political fracas with the teachers, the Campbell River high school principal problem, the controversies over new public and high school curriculum, certainly add up to a heavy caseload. How can we expect to receive any attention for our residence proposal?

Dear Sir:

After reading Laurie Jack's article "A Fifth Wheel Controlling BCIT" I get the impression that he fails to understand not only his responsibilities as the current BCITSA President but also Mr. Jack White and the BCIT's position within the provincial education system. We all realized though that the Residences might not be approved during our terms. But none the less, we all worked hard to convince the Government of the need for Residences at BCIT and Jack White was consistently doing all in his power to expedite our case to the Government as well as presenting the Government's case to us.

Rome wasn't built in a day. BCIT won't be built in a term. Laurie Jack's responsibility is not to himself nor is it to the students of BCIT; past, present or future nor to the staff and administration of the BCIT nor to the Dept. of Education or even to employers. Laurie Jack is responsible to all those concerned with the future of BCIT.

Laurie, try negotiating responsibly, with an open mind. Go to Victoria prepared to plead your case with documented facts, not just words. Meet with Messrs. Bennett, Brothers Chant, Webb, the Social Credit caucus or anyone in a position to expedite BCIT's needs. Always however, keep men like Messrs. Carey, Goard and White informed. Remember, BCIT is only a pebble on the beach when it comes to getting money from the Provincial coffers, so work together with Jack, not against him. You need all the help you can get when it comes to getting money from the Government, so, despite your personal views, without Jack White behind you your fight will be much harder, lend him your support. I met with success then, no reason for you not to meet with success now.

I am a female, which may interest you, as you displayed a great interest in many other females last Thursday afternoon. Knowing Jesus, I have learned that Love is the only answer for a world that is going mad--but we cannot live together in love when we don't see all people as human in the fullest sense of the word. You may think that this IS how you see all people, but I saw very little evidence of this last Thursday afternoon at the judging which took place in the south foyer.

Women are not cattle with sets of measurements to be judged by men on some arbitrary numerical scale. What is the teacher's & department heads reaction to this? There are 250 teachers at BCIT. Many favor the dress code although some feel it isn't their responsibility. If any teacher decides to take action, Mr. Goard stated, they will get the complete support of the administration.

Finally I asked Mr. Goard about his personal views on the issue. He feels that if dress regulations go down and the faculty and administration offer no support for them. BCIT will end up like any other community college and our placement record will not be near as good.

He said there will always be some dissenters but the majority of the students still favor the regulations. We mustn't oversimplify the problem he said. We must keep an open mind to change. If the business community adopts a different style of dress, like turtleneck sweaters, then BCIT should change too. On Jack Smugler, Mr. Goard said that he, Smugler, accepts the fact that his failure to adhere to the dress code will affect the em-

ployment chances of others but still holds to his own selfish viewpoint. This is an autocratic and dictatorial attitude said Mr. Goard and he hopes Jack will change. Mr. Goard's outlook for the future is optimistic, though, and he feels the students of BCIT will willingly retain the dress code as it is a distinct aid for them when they begin their careers.

MEN AND WOMEN

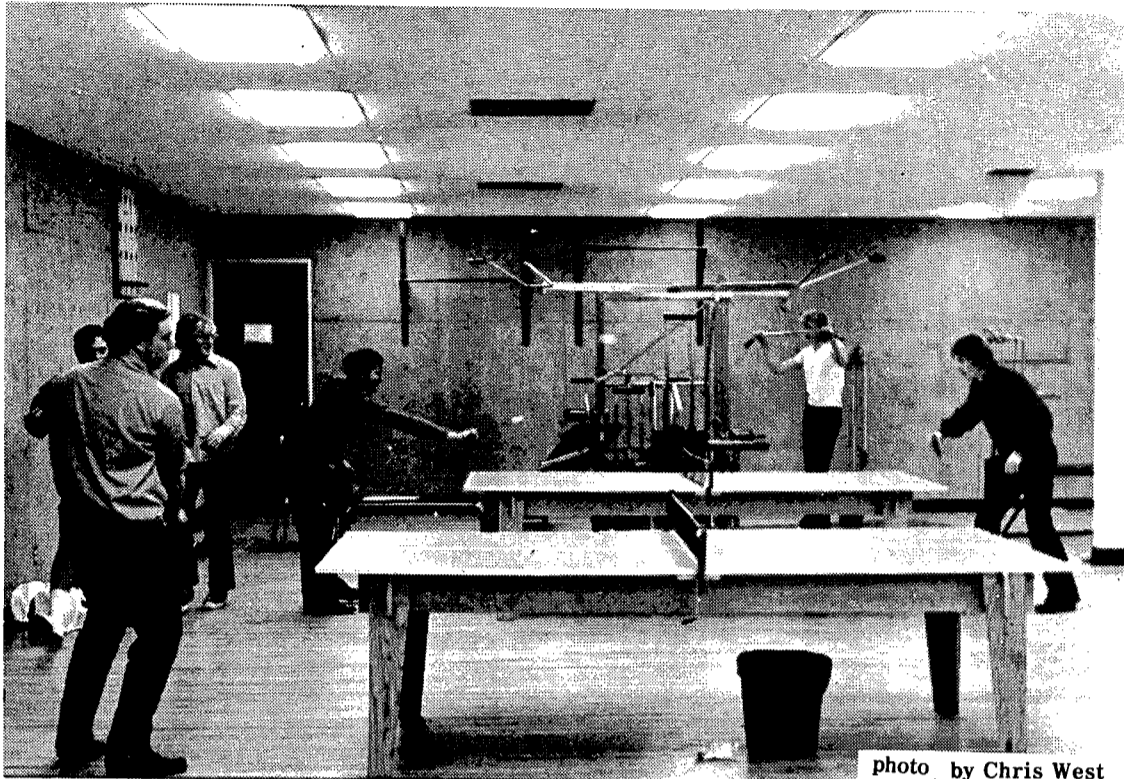

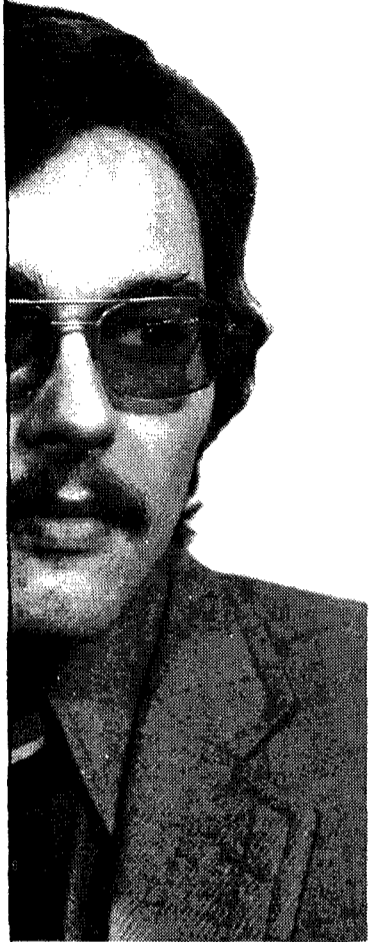

This experience included working with the present VP Internal and your next year's President Tony Shelling.

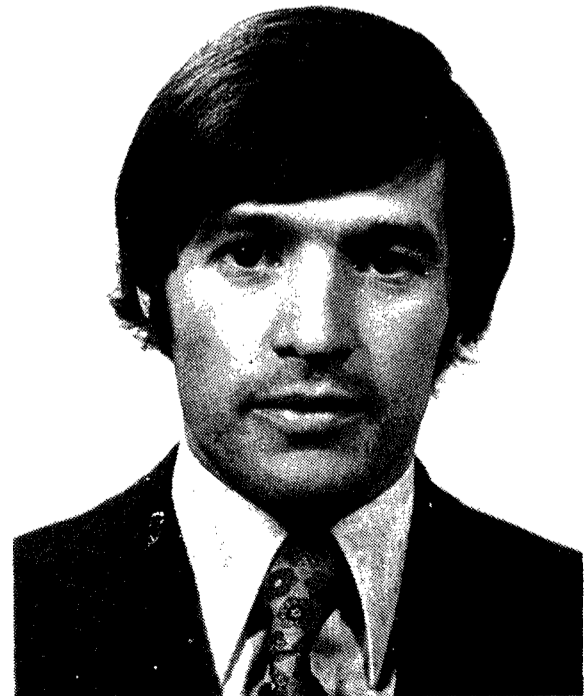

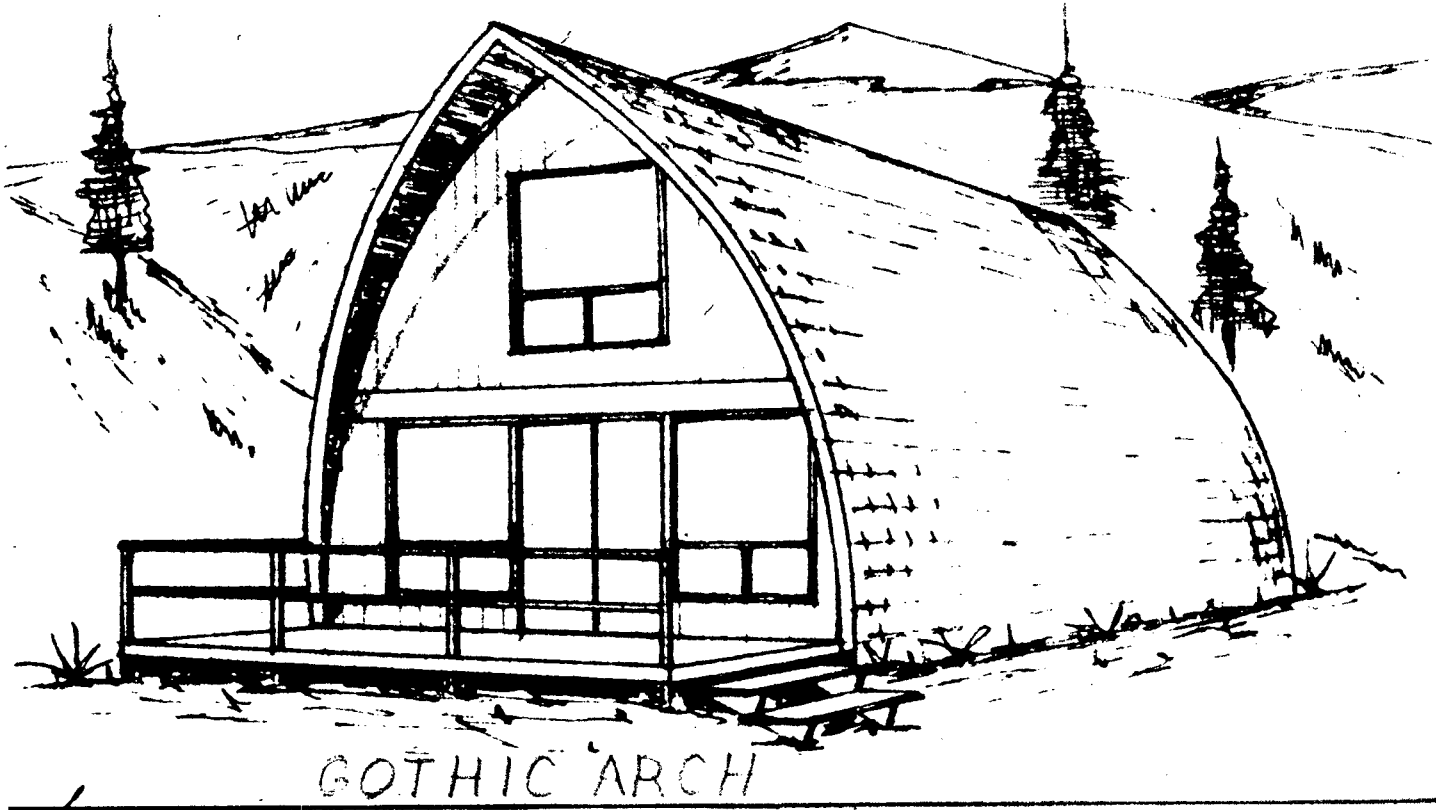

BCIT WHISTLER LODGE



whistler lodge

The Student Association rents one and one half acres of land from the BC Government on a 21 year lease. The idea behind renting the land is to provide a location where the BCITSA could build a lodge for the use of the students, staff and alumni. The purpose of the lodge is to provide, at a reasonable price, a place to get away from it all, where one may enjoy many recreational activities year round, or just relax. The property is located a short distance north of the Gondola at Whistler Mountain and is within easy reach of the ski slopes, the hiking trails and the lakes. The lodge site is in a subdivision specially set aside for clubs and organizations. At present UBC, UCC and SFU have lodges in the subdivision.

The lodge committee feels that a lodge would be a real asset for the people associated with BCIT. It would be a place where the people using the lodge could have a very inexpensive holiday because the annual membership for a single student is \$10.00 (Married \$18.00). The overnight fee would be \$1.00 per person per night. The lodge would also be used by the technologies and clubs for their get togethers.

The lodge committee has four proposals for a lodge. The committee would like to present the four proposals to the student body for a referendum. The referendum would approve the financing and building of the lodge by picking one of the four proposals or turn the lodge down by voting "no".

All four proposals are prefabricated structures which can be easily erected by student labor in very quick order. Two of the proposals are of post and beam construction with vertical walls on the main floor and an "A" frame roof on the second floor. The exterior finish is red cedar siding. The roof is covered with heavy butt cedar shakes. The interior walls are panelled with ponderosa pine. These two proposals are the Mountaineer McKinley and the Alpine Banff models which are sold by Lindel Cedar Homes.

The other two proposals are of Gothic Arch construction with two floors. One design is 30ft. x 50ft. and the other is 30ft. x 35ft. The roof runs from the bottom of the first floor to the peak of the building. The roof is covered in heavy butt cedar shakes. The exterior finish on the end walls is cedar siding. The interior walls are panelled in ponderosa pine. These two buildings are sold by Canada Modular Buildings.

All the lodges are complete with kitchen utensils, stove, refrigerator, plumbing, tables and chairs. The lodge is to be completely finished inside and out. Each proposal is similar in design in that they each have a spacious living room with a fire place, a dining room, a complete kitchen with all facilities, indoor toilet facilities with showers, one or two small bedrooms and a large dormitory area. All that you will have to bring when you use the lodge is food and a sleeping bag.

The lodge would be financed by the student association through a short term loan of six or seven years once the student body approves one of the lodge proposals.

Before looking at the cost of each proposal it should be pointed out that although the cost of the lodge may seem like a fair sum of money, it is not really a large expenditure if you realize that the student association puts out large sums of money each year for which they receive little in return. A prime example of this is the sports budget which was \$19,000.00 last year. The lodge would be a major asset of the Student Association and could benefit many people.

The four lodge proposals are:

1) Lindal Cedar Homes
alpine-Banff with a usable area of 1267 square feet at \$31,750.38. The cost per square foot is \$25.06

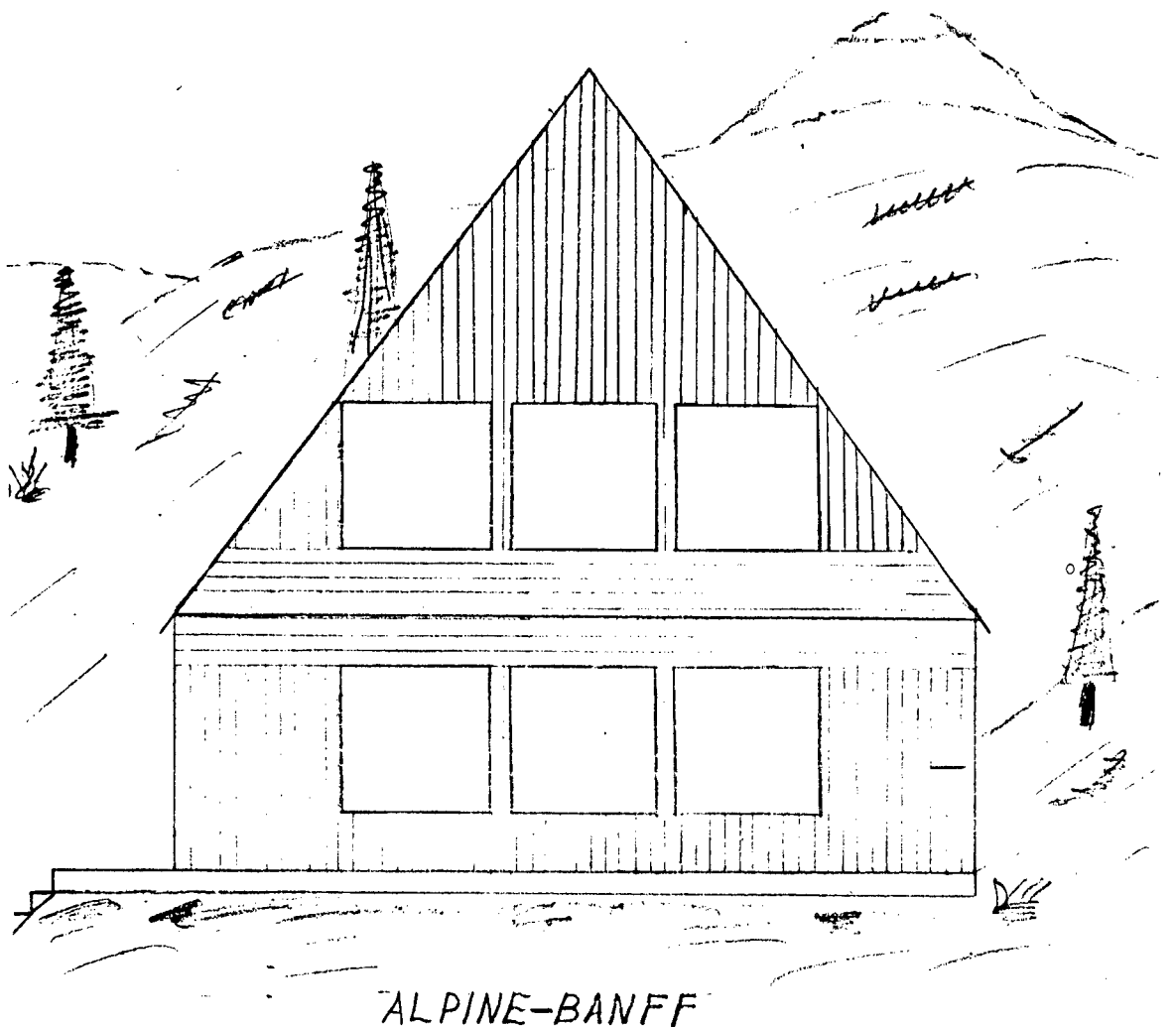
2) Lindal Cedar Homes
Mountaineer McKinley with a usable area of 1018 square feet at \$29,913.93. The cost per square foot is \$29.39

3) Canada Modular Buildings
30ft x 36ft Gothic Arch with a usable area of 1994 square feet at \$31,610.62. The cost per square foot is \$15.85

4) Canada Modular Buildings
30ft x 50ft Gothic Arch with a usable area of 2700 square feet at \$37,028.73. The cost per square foot is \$13.71.
Usable area is the area in which there is a minimum of six feet of headroom. All prices include a 10% estimating allowance, all taxes, and completely cover all costs that would be incurred. It is the opinion of the committee that the Gothic Arch design would be the best all round design.

The lodge will be discussed at the next council meeting and your tech. rep. would appreciate it if you would voice your opinions so that your rep may properly represent you at the meeting.

The general appearance of the lodge proposals can be seen from the sketches.


