

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
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

When it's your turn Act Naturally

In 1962, seventy-five wellknown scholars of American history were asked to rate the presidents up to John Kennedy.

The preponderant opinion called five Chief Executives "great" in this order - Abraham Lincoln, George Washington, Franklin Roosevelt, Woodrow Wilson and Thomas Jefferson.

Of these five, three -Lincoln, Roosevelt and Jefferson - were the subject abuse during their presidencies.

One, Wilson, was sharply repudiated by the Senate and then the voters and lived out his final days in near-disgrace.

The two Chief Executives deemed to be failures by a later generation - Ulysses Grant and Warren Harding were enormously popular during their Presidencies.

History is almost always kinder to a President than his contemporaries have been.

In the case of Lyndon Johnson, they could scarcely have been less kind - for just as Lincoln, Roosevelt and Jefferson came under heavy criticism during their terms of office, so did Johnson.

How one man, in 1964, could receive from the American electorate one of the largest pluralities in presidential history; and yet, a scant four

years later refuse to run for the same office due to the increasingly vitriolic attacks against him is some sort of a mystery.

During the campaign of 1964, when LBJ and the nation knew as each day passed that he would win the election hands down, the President would occassionally ask visitors: "Why don't people like me?"

One guest, too old to be concerned about preferential treatment by the White House, replied: "Because, Mr. President, you are not a very likeable man,'

It is strange and somehow sad that the man Lyndon Johnson who wanted so much for people to like him as a person and a president should have been forced to live out the last four years of his life in virtual recluse.

Johnson had become a "nonperson" after January of 1969 it was as though Lyndon Baines Johnson had gotten aboard Air Force One on January 20 and flown off into the Texas sunset, never to be heard from again.

As last years Democratic National Convention, huge posters of famous Democrats were prominently displayed about the convention hall. Conspicuous by its absence was a poster of LBJ.

And yet, I wonder why. For surely despite his record in Viet Nam, Johnson will come to be regarded in the years ahead as a "great" president ranking with Roosevelt and Lincoln and Wilson.

What are the indicators to assess a presidents just place in history? One traditional guage is the enactment of major legislation.

By that measure, the Johnson administration was conspicuosly succesful. Medicaire and federal aid to education broke through longstanding barriers. Three farreaching civil rights bills went beyond anything since the Reconstruction.

A series of laws aimed at slum renovation and consumer protection were progressive and long overdue. The various anti-poverty programs were the beginning of a necessary break with the dole approach.

Indeed, some of Johnson's domestic programs may set patterns for the future.

In the foreign field, Viet Nam overshadowed significant achievements - and it may be several years yet before the final verdict on that conflict is known.

Agreements with the Russians and the beginning of the process that has lead to

realistic arms control were steps in the right direction. The Glasboro summit meeting with Aleksei Kosygin helped to start this movement.

It has been said that Lyndon Johnson, the President of the United States of America in this 1960's - this was the time when the man, the office and the country all had a rendezvous with tragedy.

I think not. Certainly LBJ was not perfect, he had personality flaws, but like some of his predecessors, they will become less significant a decade hence, and even more so, a decade after that.

I feel that while today Johnson is chiefly remembered as the man who got the USA so deeply involved in Southeast Asia, he will come to be remembered and known as the man who moved America ahead, farther and faster than any other President.

Viet Nam was a great blot on his "Great Society". He wanted to avoid war. Lyndon Johnson says: "Vietnam has been the most frustrating of all the crises I have faced... the last thing I wanted was to become a wartime president. But history determined that I should face the awful choice of intervention or retreat in Southeast Asia. I could not escape or delay it."

History will forgive Lyndon Johnson for his actions in Viet Nam. And it will praise him for his incredible, imposing legislative record as congressman, senator, vice-president, and finally chief executive.

It's been overlooked, but will surely be rediscovered soon, that in the first 14 months in the White House after assuming office upon the death of John Kennedy, Lyndon Baines Johnson had either initiated or put through more legislation embracing more domestic reforms than any president in American history.

After his defeat at the polls in 1968, President Johnson said: "People will look back on these 5 years as some of the most important in the nation's history." Of that, there can be little doubt.

Perhaps the first eight years of the 1960's can best be summed up by a magazine article title it reads "The Kennedy Legend and the Johnson Performance.'

TELETHO N COMING

VANCOUVER -- Two performers who've become great British Columbia Favourites on the Variety Telethon will be back for the 1973 fund-raising spectacular, scheduled for February 10-11 on the full B.C. Television Limited network.

They are Leonard Nimoy and Blake Emmons. Many others will join them for the 20 hour show broadcast live and in color over Channel 8, Vancouver, Channel 6, Victoria, and more than 35 satellite and repeater stations throughtout the

Interior and Vancouver Island.

The show will also go to Prince George And, for the first time, it will start in "prime" evening hours - going on the air at 9:00 p.m. PST, Saturday, February 10. It runs through until 5:00 p.m. Sunday. Previously the Telethon had gone on the air shortly after 11:00 p.m.

Nimoy, who gained fame as a member of "Star Trek" stars on network TV in the U.S. and later on "Mission Impossible," before gaining a lead role in a Broadway stage hit which kept him away from the 1972 Telethon here, will be making his fourth appearance in five years for the Variety Club of Western Canada.

The Telethon is the major fund-raising function of Tent 47, the Vancouver chapter of Variety Clubs International - a chapter whose activities and support for Handicapped and Needy Children extends more widely each year, reaching into Kamloops, Kelowna, Vernon and other Okanagan areas, Price George and Terrace, as well as the Lower Mainland and Vancouver Island.

Last year, when Blake Emmons was perhaps the most popular of all performers on the Telethon. viewers pledged \$190,000 and actual contributions exceeded 95% of that total.

Major project currently under way under Tent 47 auspices is Variety's Treatment Centre for Children in Surrey, where more than 170 crippled children will receive treatment under direction of the Lower Fraser Valley Cerebral Palsy Association. Funds raised last year enabled the club to commit \$225,000 toward construction of the first two phases of the centre - a physiothereapy centre and hydro-therapy pool. The completed centre is expected to cost \$600,000.

Council Briefs

The wheels of work have finally started to produce some material decisions as far as BCIT student council goes.

The meeting last Tuesday night showed some real progress on the part of both the student representatives and the Executive.

It was disclosed that Education Minister Eileen Dailly had paid a surprise visit to the Institute December 27 and that members of council had put together a hasty presentation concerning the need for residences on campus but the presentation that was given was last year's. As a result a new presentation is being formulated and will be again presented sometime this term.

If the scheme is approved this year it will take at least two years until the final completion of the residences so members of the Executive are looking for temporary alternatives to the problem. Several members of the executive visited the Willingdon School for Girls since they had heard that the complex was being phased outby April. After visiting the complex they were impressed and have sent a letter to Rehabilitation Minister Norm Levi asking for usage of the Willington School for Girls.

The SAC pub will start issueing a new color of beer token starting February I, the old orange tokens will not be accepted after the January 29

Pub manager Robert Simmons explained that the new color would be used as a precautionary measure as some students have secured tokens the same color as the present orange ones and the pub staff goes through such volume in one evening that it is impossible to stop and check each token to see that it bears 'Sac Рub'.

Only 34 members of council were present at the meeting which did not warrant aquerum so the Executive was asked to vote. Presidents and vicepresidents of techs take note.

BCIT now officially has a Whistler Lodge after council approved an expenditure to buy a prefabricated lodgewhichwill comfortably house 20 people. The lodge is located on Whistler Mountain and the Student Association has been paying taxes on the land for the past three years.

teaching his academic subjects. Everything that transpires on a campus has an educational impact. If we are truly preparing ourselves for thefuture, we have a responsibility not to create an artificial environment; such as disregard for dress standards, namely the tie. By

creating this artificial environment, a smooth transition is difficult. Once we leave this campus, we assume the responsibility we seek, and obviously you will have to conform to the morals and disciplines of society. Why make your life's burden any harder than necessary?

The issue seems to be that little piece of cloth around your neck is strangling your civil rights and freedom of expression. If this bothers you, then why wear pants or shirt, and so forth. This might sound ridiculous, it is, the whole issue is, there shouldn't even by any issue. If the tie, such a small trivial thing, is infringing on your civil rights and freedom of expression, then how will you be able to handle real problems? BCIT has built up a reputation not only because of our dress code, but also because of our academics. A radical change, as advocated by a selfish few who only give a dam about their unrealistic ideology, will be detrimental to all students, not only this year, but in years to come. The outcry is, "But we're the only

educational institute with dress standards; we should be like the rest." For the most part the rest are with patched-up jeans and old army shirts and jackets. How much is there to be said of this dress standard? As for the outcries, they are something you'd hear from a little child. BCIT is a unique school in many respects, especially dress standards, then why make hamburger out of us to finer prospects. When Ryerson, Sait and other educational institutes dropped their dress standards, so did their hiring, like thirty to forty per cent average and has taken them many years to overcome this mistake, and even today they are still below what they should be.
