A grant of \$2,000 has been given by the Citizenship Branch, Department of the Secretary of State, to ensure that concerned citizens from all parts of the province can attend the annual conference of the Voluntary Association for Health and Welfare of British Columbia to find out "What's Going Right!!"

The conference, which will be held October 22 and 23 in North Vancouver, will focus on successful innovative ways of meeting community health and welfare needs.

Sessions are being planned to provide delegates with the maximum opportunity to find out why and how a wide range of services have been developed and to determine whether similar approaches could be adapted to meet the needs in their own areas. Formal convention proceedings will be minimal.

"It is the concerned individual who cares about the kind of community he lives in and is willing to spend some time and effort to try to solve some of its problems that we are anxious to have register", said Joan Morison, conference chairman.

"Professionals are aware of the problems, and we welcome their participation and expertise," she continued, "but we are really aiming at stimulating the ordinary citizen to recognize the needs in his own community and share in the solution of them." Participation of young people and students is also being welcomed.

Persons from low-income groups, not necessarily welfare recipients, who are engaged in a number of self-help projects will be among the groups making presentations and offering advice and assistance. Conference planners hope there will be a good representation of these people who know the health and welfare needs at first hand from all over the province.

Applicants are urged to register immediately so that if subsidies are required, the grant may be apportioned fairly. Because registration must be limited to 300, VAHW planners hope to be able to balance the attendance so that all areas in B.C. will be represented.

Billeting can also be arranged. Brochures for the full agenda and registration forms are available from the VAHW office, 1625 West 8th Avenue, Vancouver 9, or at 736-4367.

Among the groups and services which will be featured are: Silver Threads, Victoria; Cool Aid; Crisis Centre; Health Sciences Centre Hospital at UBC: Meals on Wheels; Nanaimo Family Life Association; Association Self Help, Kelowna; Dental Health, Vancouver Health: Metro Handicrafts for the Homebound Handicapped; Acadia Day Care Centre, Sixty and Up Clinics, and the Indian Centre Society.

In closing, I would only like to say, keep up the spirit and enthusiasm for the rest of the year and this will make BCIT an even better place and something to be really proud of. 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## EDGAR'S ESTABLISHMENT

#### A COUNCIL COMMENT BY PARRY BELLOT

The first Student Council Meeting of 70/71 school year was called to order at about 6.15, Monday Sept. 21st. Before going into the formal agenda, the President allowed a Red Cross Official to speak on the coming R.C. Blood Drive and its usefulness.

The Chairman then introduced the rest of the S.A. Executive allof whom said a little something about their work these past weeks. The President pointed out that he and the Vice Presidents had had two meetings with the Minister of Education and other government officials discussing several topics including the budgetary cutbacks, parking, and the present book-keeping system at BCIT which works to our disadvantage (technical explanation available from Edgar.)

On the Library issue, the President stated that voluntary services from staff and students were being encouraged so that Library hours could be lengthened. The staff were not co-operative though, but Messrs. Goard and McAdam set a fine example by volunteering their time last week. Student Library assistants were also being persuaded to accept a cutback but one Rep stood up to announce he was an assistant and was not aware of

#### any such salary decrease!! (tut, tut)

The mens Sports Chairman outlined the  $3\frac{1}{2}$  mile Cross-Country Meet carded for Oct. 14. The Social Chairlady mentioned that since the S'A' absorbs  $\frac{3}{4}$  of Tech-sponsored show losses, she reserved the right to cancel any tech function involving much finance.

The President announced a planned improvement in the poster arrangement at BCIT (it's certainly a messy mass of confusion ... ) and that the Multi-purpose Building would be opened on Nov. 20th (finally). For Open House next March a grant from the government had been requested but this was turned down witha hint that the funds be obtained by selling government programs for B C Centennial Celebrations, The President suggested we do this so that a later loan application would be looked on more sympathetically.

Members of the Council after much discussion voted to accept a quarterly Magazine in place of a yearbook (see page 3) by a vote of 21-11-5, many stating their reservations on such a rush decision which was, however, necessary. At one heated stage, Good Ol' Edgar had to dash for his 'little blue book' on Parliamentary voting procedures.

Concerning the formation of a Constitution Committee (members are still wanted) it was stated (rather foolishly) that, since the three technologies seemed hard to communicate one with the other the idea was to try and formulate three separate constitutions. Seems to me that this is the worst way to remedy the problem ...

Suggestions from Council members concerning alleviating the traffic problems were passed on to the traffic committee (no doubt to die...) Aclothes salesman showed off several patterns of tech jackets which could be supplied by his company for about \$20.00 each. Parking was still a bugbear. The President regretted that most students have apparently accepted the \$1.00 parking. He warned that the fee was the first stage in an ever-increasing spiral, and that students should take some sort of protest action. In this he had unanimous support and plenty of ideas from his Executive.

It was approaching 9 p.m. and the meeting was forced to adjourn as members had already begun leaving.

As for the other ice rinks in the Greater Vancouver area they are booked solid with some exceptions of ice rental starting at 2:30 am on til about 6:00 am.

Ice Hockey could be a big sport at BCIT with the extra-mural team already established and a great potential for intra-mural. It seems BCIT could use a rink here on the campus. Not that I think we could utilize all the ice time ourselves but perhaps in conjunction with the Municipality of Burnaby which badly needs another rink.

Whatever the answer there is no doubt that BCIT needs ice, and ice that can be sure of holding for more than one short season.

#### WOODSTOCK

What does it mean to you? Most obviously, a rock festival and a film. The film deals with the festival. Equally obvious. Both are concerned with peace and love - and cash. Many have protested at the high prices of both, particularly the film, but I submit that if you can scrape the bread -- go.

Firstly, about the film. It is basically a first class documentary, both thorough and well-conceived. The full impact of the whole scene explodes on screen, and you feel surrounded, both by the super size picture and the tremendous sound. The big sounds are with you, in sight and sound, and as the commercials have it, "it's the next best thing to being there."

Actually, it's even better. The film is a mind bending piece of technical virtuosity, a classic of auditory and visual trickery. All the stops are pulled out - wide angle pans, angle distortions, split screen, changing perspective - these bring Woodstock to you.

Woodstock, though? Bias, through the necessity of editing and the limited number of viewpoints possible, is of course inevitable, but by and large the film makers do more than justice to the happening. There are even segments of tedium. This is certainly cinema verite, but doesn't do the film much good. Part of the way it was I could do without. (ie. the field owner's spiel).

#### THE VIRGIN & THE GYPSY

D. H. Lawrence seems to be the latest 'in' author with the film -making crowd, and, oddly enough, it is a real pleasure to see his works being done justice to in the shape of the latest cinematic offerings. Generally speaking, films 'based on the book' make a monumental mess of their attempt as a result of trying to express the thing in filmic terms, miss nothing important, and please an audience.

This film, however, succeeds. Johanna Shimkus is the Virgin in this case, and gives a most stirring performance. The film centres on her and her feelings, - she is the keystone to the entire structure, and happily brings off her character magnificently. She is ably helped by the other members of the cast., most notably Fay Compton as the nasty old Granny. The Gypsy is perhaps the most disappointing character, not helped by a rather flat, one-sided rendition.

Visually the film is a triumph. It is laden with atmosphere, positively reeking of earth and mud and misty cold northcountry gloom, and always underlying everything - sex. The divorced mother is never mentioned, the friends who are blatantly living in sin are not received - and indeed refused seats at the parish benefit by the rigidly righteous reverend.

Lawrence's theme of the hypocrasy of the middle classes and the life force of things earthy and"close to the ground" is vividly brought to life - in a picture that is composed of movements around a point of stillness - the central character awaiting awakening. It is notable that when she does 'awaken' (sexually) the Granny is killed off, and she leaves her repressive family for the world offered to her by her more enlightened sinful friends.

A most moving and intriguing film.
